Getting antsy

Just thinking about fire ants those vicious, stinging insect pests that have colonized Texas back yards, pastures and Little League fields - is enough to make your skin crawl.

This pest goes after animals, people, plants and even electrical devices indiscriminately. It has been known to destroy air conditioning units. It has invaded traffic boxes and airport runway light systems. And worst of all, according to the Texas Department of Health, there were 11 fire ant-related deaths reported in Texas from 1980 through 1995.

Texas cattle producers alone sustained \$67 million of losses due to fire ants last year, while homemakers spent more than \$93 million trying to rid their lawns, gardens and houses of this "attack ant" with an attitude.

All told, fire ants cost Texans \$300 million annually in pesticides, agricultural losses, medical bills and utility problems.

Nor is there any sign of a reprieve. The fire ant population has been pushing steadily westward, now infesting 156 of our state's 254 counties. Neither record heat nor cold seems to faze them. Texas now is home to more fire ants than their native Brazil.

This uninvited guest, which arrived here by way of South America in the 1950s, needs to be sent packing before it spoils any more picnics.

Given that the fire ant has no natural predators in Texas, it is up to us humans to turn back the insect tide.

The countless Texans affected by this plague need both shortterm relief and help in finding a long-term solution to the fire ant problem. I am co-sponsoring a bill that would set up a national research and management strategy to address both those needs.

The legislation would:

■ Establish a National Advisory Board on fire ant control, management and eradication.

HOST COMMUNITY AGREEMENT

This Host Community Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into on this , 1997, by and between day of ADOBE ECO-SYSTEMS, LTD., a Texas limited partnership, and KINNEY COUNTY, TEXAS, who agree as follows: RECITALS:

WHEREAS; Adobe Eco-Systems, Ltd. ("Adobe") desires to develop a municipal solid waste landfill management facility in South Texas and, in furtherance thereof, Adobe has filed an application with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for authorization to construct and operate the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility and Adobe pledges that the landfill will be constructed and operated in accordance with the latest EPA and State of Texas regulations to ensure an environmentally friendly facility for the safe disposal of authorized solid waste and will not receive any regulated radioactive waste;

WHEREAS; Adobe acquired rights to locate the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility on real property in

Kinney County, Texas;

WHEREAS; Adobe pledges that the contract for the landfill construction will emphasize that sub-contractors, as well as construction workers from Kinney County and the surrounding area be utilized to the fullest extent possible;

WHEREAS, Adobe wishes to be a good corporate citizen of Kinney County and wants to help improve the environment and contribute to the prosperity of the residents of Kinney County and the region;

WHEREAS; Adobe pledges to give priority to hiring local residents of the area to the fullest extent possible;

WHEREAS; Kinney County recognizes the need for the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility, the benefits that flow from economic development within the county, and the need to provide a legal alternative to current illegal dumping; and

WHEREAS; Adobe and Kinney County desire to enter into a beneficial arrangement respecting the siting and operation of the Rio Grande Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility.

AGREEMENT:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the above premises, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, ADOBE ECO-SYSTEMS, LTD., a Texas limited partnership, and KINNEY COUNTY, TEXAS agree as follows:

1. Investment/Tax Revenues. Adobe estimates its initial investment in Kinney County will be three million (3,000,000) dollars. Adobe will not request any local tax exemptions and will pay full property and ad valorem taxes. Based on 1996 tax rates, this calculates to be over sixty thousand (60,000) dollars in annual property taxes (Kinney County being paid over twenty two thousand (22,000) dollars a year and the

Brackettville Independent School District being paid over thirty five thousand (35,000) dollars a year):

- 2. Creation of the Adobe Public Trust Account. Adobe agrees to establish the Adobe Public Trust Account to be used for the benefit of the citizens of Kinney County. Adobe will fund the account through a proportionate share of its yearly tipping fees in lieu of any other taxes. Funding of the account will be through the payment of a fifty (50) cents per ton tipping fee on any waste disposed of at the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility, excluding the first one thousand (1,000) tons of waste disposed of by Kinney County residents at reduced disposal rates pursuant to Paragraph 3. Minimum annual contributions will be as follows: during the first year of operation, Adobe will guarantee payment of fifty thousand (50,000) dollars to the account; the second year, sixty two thousand five hundred (62,500) dollars; the third year, seventy five thousand (75,000) dollars; the fourth year, eighty seven thousand five hundred (87,500) dollars; and the fifth year and each year thereafter, so long as the facility remains in operation, one hundred thousand (100,000) dollars, until such time that the amount of annual waste disposal exceeds two hundred thousand (200,000) tons, at which time the fifty (50) cents per ton tipping fee takes effect. The account is to be funded quarterly with one hundred (100) percent of the funds being distributed to Kinney County. The funds from the Adobe Public Trust Account may be used by the county for any public safety, civic, cultural, or recreational use in Kinney County, Texas provided, however, that annually the first five thousand (5,000) dollars of such funds shall be used for educational scholarships to Kinney County residents deemed qualified by the managers of the account, two thousand five hundred (2,500) dollars of the funds available be allocated to the volunteer fire department, and two thousand five hundred (2,500) dollars of the funds available be allocated to the Emergency Medical Services.
- 3. Promotion of Environmentally Responsible Solid Waste Management. In order to promote environmentally responsible solid waste management in this region, Adobe agrees to accept municipal solid waste generated by the residents of Kinney County, including the residents of Fort Clark Springs, at reduced disposal rates. Adobe will charge no tipping fees for the first five hundred (500) tons of municipal solid waste generated by Kinney County residents each year and delivered to the Rio Grande Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility. Adobe will charge one-half of its usual and customary tipping fees for the second five hundred (500) tons of municipal solid waste generated and delivered by Kinney County residents each year to the Rio Grande Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility. For any municipal solid waste delivered by Kinney County residents to the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility in excess of one thousand (1,000) tons per year, Adobe will charge its usual and customary tipping fees. Because Adobe does not intend at this time to provide any waste collection services, waste generators qualified for these reduced rates will have to arrange for appropriate waste transportation to the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility. In addition to these reduced disposal rates, a drop-off recycling center will be established at the Rio Grande Regional Solid Waste Management Facility.

4. Cleanup of Illegal Dumps. Adobe is dedicated to promoting voluntary compliance with state and local regulations to encourage the most cost effective and cooperative solutions borderwide to address the significant illegal dumping problem. In this regard, Adobe will initiate discussions with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission regarding the possibility of providing a corporate grant to fund a pilot program in the region utilizing its Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility. The results of this program will,

hopefully, provide local governments in the region with a viable disposal alternative to the existing problem of illegal dumping.

5. <u>Cooperation</u>. In order to promote a beneficial relationship between the parties to this Agreement, Kinney County, Texas agrees to hereby withdraw any request for public hearing on the Permit Application No. MSW-2253 which Adobe has filed with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for authorization to construct and operate the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility. So long as Adobe fulfills its obligations under this Agreement, Kinney County, Texas agrees not to lodge any future requests for public hearing or protests with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission or any other regulatory agency, and agrees not to fund or participate in any hearing requests or protests that may be filed by other persons, with respect to the development and operation of the Rio Grande Regional Municipal Solid Waste Management Facility, including, without limitation, the procurement of any permits or approvals in connection therewith. If elected officials of Kinney County act individually and cause a contested hearing, Adobe reserves the right to reconsider its participation in this agreement.

6. Entire Agreement. This Agreement embodies the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior offers, agreements, and understandings, if any, relating to the subject matter of this Agreement, and maybe amended or supplemented only by an instrument in writing

signed by both parties.

7. Power and Authority. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefits of the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns. The persons signing this Agreement represent that they have full power and authority to enter into this Agreement on behalf of their respective parties and have been duly authorized to sign and deliver this Agreement.




