

The pool is able to operate through donations from Kinney County, the city of Brackettville, area churches, non-profit organizations and individuals.

The pool will be open on Tuesday through Saturday from 2 to 8 p.m. Fees are 50 cents for children under 10, and \$1 for anyone older

No children 10 years old or younger will be allowed in the pool area without an adult, 18 years or over, staying with the child.

A signed waiver will be required for all pool entries. A parent must sign a waiver for each child, 17 or younger. Once a waiver is turned in, it will be kept on file.



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
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Sheriff's request for raises strikes a nerve


Every working person should be paid adequately for what he does, not because he wants more money. There must be taken into consideration the money source and amount.

Rights shredded

I read a great quotation in Forbes magazine a few months ago. It's from James Bovard's book, Lost Rights.

He writes: "While courts have created new due process rights for welfare recipients, disruptive school children, and criminal defendants, the rights of farmers, homeowners, parents, and businesses have been shredded. The modern idea of due process appears to be to permit citizens to exhaust their life savings fighting court battles against heavy-handed government agencies."

It seems to me, as well, that people who raise their families, pay their taxes, obey the law, keep up with their mortgages and mind their own business are the only ones for whom our society has carved out special rights. Quite often they are treated as if their lives, property and livelihoods are of little consequence.

The government's treatment of an 82-year-old California woman offers a textbook case of how this works.

Back in the '70s, Mrs. Suitum and her late husband bought an undeveloped lot near Lake Taho'e on which they hoped some day to build a home for their retirement. The cost of caring for her husband when he became ill absorbed most of their income for years, so it wasn't until 1989, after her husband had died, that Mrs. Suitum was able to proceed with her plans.

But predatory land-use regulations, driven by narrow special interests, had a surprise in store for her.

Although her lot was in a subdivided area, surrounded by existing houses and streets, she was told she could not build because her property was in a "stream environment zone." Run-off from her lot might (just might) pollute Lake Tahoe.

Only after an expensive, protracted legal battle did the U.S. Supreme Court finally rule earlier this year that she had been unfairly and unconstitutionally denied the use of her property. Poor Mrs. Suitum. For the elderly especially, justice delayed is justice

Congress has enacted laws requiring that the economic impact of proposed new regulations be determined.

There are countless other examples of this:

■ The Internal Revenue Service has announced plans to raise taxes on limited partnerships, a rule change that would impose tax increases on tens of thousands of small businesses, although Congress rejected this proposal less than four years ago.

A night club in Bellevue, Washington was assessed a \$4,500 fine under the Americans with Disabilities Act because it did not have a wheel-chair lift attached to its stage for disabled dancers.

■ The EPA requires local drinking water suppliers to test for 25 additional contaminants every three years, regardless of whether they occur locally or pose any actual health risk. This costs municipal utilities millions annually, which must be passed on to citizens in the form of higher utility

These are but a few of many depressing examples of government run amok. But there are reasons to believe that fewer such instances will occur in the future.

Congress has enacted laws requiring that the economic impact of proposed new regulations be determined. This is slight progress, but we need more. And what we really need most in federal regulations is simple: common sense.

of the TEKS, head toward this letter.

If, as a teacher, you find yourself locked in shared knowledge. "turf wars" as you and your fellow teachers try to decide within your school district what elements should be taught at each grade level (with little help from the TEKS, which repeat almost the very same elements over and over again within grade clusters of K-3, 4-8, and 9-12), you should locate this letter.

you try to figure out exactly what the TEKS say ping. your child should learn at each grade level, run and find this letter.

If you see that your school district is beginning to shift its curriculum from knowledge-based limited number of copies. upon subjective measurements instead of objective criteria, don't forget this letter.

If your circumstances require that your child must move to a new school during the school year different curriculum requirements, remember the contents of this letter.

When the above-mentioned scenarios arrive at your door, and they will, remember the Texas Alternative Document (TAD).

The TAD uses explicit, easily understood language. When we TAD writers had to use terms which are not commonly used among the general public, we defined them, inserted helpful charts, and other supportive information.

The TAD is specific to each grade level with the skills increasing in depth and complexity as

the child progresses from one grade to the next. The skills are knowledge-based and include a strong emphasis on phonemic awareness (the subsounds of the English language), phonics, grammar, spelling andvocabulary, and reading

The TAD includes a literary emphasis at each grade level complete with literary terms and suggested literary selections in grades Pre-K through to spend meaningless, frustrating hours in staff 10. Under the TAD, every teacher, parent, and student would know exactly what should be taught and learned at each grade level. Let's do this for the kids.

Pesticides on foods and vegetables are minimal

Question: Do the pesticide residues found on fruits and vegetables cause cancer?

Answer: Because animal studies show that high concentrations of pesticides can cause cancer, federal regulations limit the amount of pesticide residues permitted on foods. These regulations are based on an "acceptable level of risk"-calculated as causing an increase of no more than one cancer death per million people.

Government agencies monitor the food industry to be sure pesticides do not exceed legal limits. The Agriculture Department recently examined 7,328 items and detected excesses in 1.5% of the samples. Apples, celery, and peaches were the greatest offenders.

Eating less produce because of concern about pesticides would be unwise

because the levels that may be present are unlikely to cause cancer. Furthermore, washing usually eliminates surface pesticides, although small amounts of some chemicals can be incorporated into the food itself. Studies also show those who eat more fresh fruits and vegetables have lower cancer rates than those who consume less. Meanwhile, the three most effective ways to reduce cancer risk are not smoking, avoiding direct sunlight, and (possibly) consuming a lowfat diet.



That year, 88 VISTA workers spent the summer going door to door, educating parents about WIC and the need for immunizations. In some instances they even arranged transportation to clinics.

The results were carefully noted. In San Antonio, WIC clientele increased from 300 in June 1992 to 1,000 in June 1993.
