## Gallego files for reelection

Pete Gallego has filed for reelection to the Texas House of Representatives.

"I am honored to serve as state representative, and I want to continue representing the people of the 74th District," said Gallego, D-Alpine, who was in Brackettville on Monday.

"During my time in office, there have been positive changes throughout our legislative district, and I am proud to have been a part of that change," he said.

"I will continue to work ... to see that the needs of rural Southwest Texas and the border area have a strong voice."

By virtue of his key positions in the House leadership, Gallego has helped obtain needed state dollars for an area that, in the past, had been largely ignored by state government. This included major increases in funding for new degree programs at Sul Ross State University campuses in Alpine, Del Rio, Eagle Pass and Uvalde; increased grants to city and county governments; and increases in funding to state agencies that provide services to taxpayers.

"While this increase in state funds is great, there is still much to be done," Gallego said. "Many needs and challenges remain. There are kids that need to be educated, colonias that need sewer ad water, roads that need paving, and clude: criminals that need to be taken off

# County receives new ambulance

The Texas Department of Health presented Kinney County officials with a new ambulance Monday at Las Moras Inn.

"Certainly, it will be a big help," County Judge Tommy Seargeant said. "We've had some breakdowns on the other ambulances."

The new ambulance is valued at approximately \$112,000, according to Lee Sweeten, an emergency medical services (EMS) program administrator with the Texas Department of Health.

"The state bought this vehicle approximately three years ago," Sweeten said. "It's a '95 model, stateof-art vehicle and equipped it to the hilt.

"We took it around to conferences and we towed an old antique ambulance along so we could show then and now. It was also used in some training pro-

"The state decided it was time to look at giving it away and, at some point in the future, maybe purdown the road with it.

Sweeten, who recently concluded an assessment of Kinney County's EMS program, said the local Agreed judgement on the program was definitely in need of a new ambulance.

'Kinney County currently has two ambulances, between Kinney County and was time to get a new vehicle.

## City's rebates jump 8 percent

December sales tax rebates for the city of Brackettville have jumped 8 percent over the returns for the same period last year, according to State Comptroller John Sharp.

The city of Brackettville received a December sales tax rebate of \$2,869.75, up from the \$2,654.27 delivered to the city last year.

Kinney County's allocation for December totaled \$1,941.69, down 1 percent from the \$1,962.63 payment for December 1996.

Kinney County Health Services, one of 29 special purpose districts around the state, received a sales tax rebate of \$1,957.23, 9.9 percent higher than the rebate of \$1,780.23 for December of last year.



In the Christmas spirit of "peace on earth, good will to brave people who fight for our


I hope our troops will stay safe May this season be the greatest and warm during this holiday season, and wish them a very merry Christmas and happy holidays.







As a pharmacist, he has served a very vital role in assisting people.


She is a fine wife and mother. They are both warm hearted, jovial, friendly people.

1857. Deeply impressed from his youth by the stirring deeds and stories told by veterans of the Civil War, he realized his ambition for a military career by entering the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, where he graduated 12th from the Class of 1879. He was assigned as 2nd Lt. of "E" Company 19th Infantry and came West. Following service at Fort Garland, Colorado Territory and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the regiment moved to Fort Brown at Brownsville, Texas, where Lt. French was detailed as the Regimental Adjutant. In December of 1882, the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883,
