Rokovich resigns as BHS athletic director

Roy Rokovich has resigned as Brackett's athletic director, officials confirmed this week.

Rokovich's resignation will be the topic of a special School Board meeting slated for 5 p.m. tomor-

"Presuming the board approves the resignation on Friday, we would begin the search for a replacement immediately," Superintendent Taylor Stephenson said. "We would hope to have somebody on board this spring."

Rokovich has served as Brackett's athletic director and head football coach for three years. If his resignation is approved, his tenure would officially end on Friday, Jan. 30.

Officials set to discuss fireworks ordinance

Montalvo trial begins

Case postponed because of sick juror

County Commissioner Joe Montalvo went to trial this week to face charges dealing with theft and misappropriation of highway guard rails.

District Judge George M. Thurmond ruled Tuesday that three of the five charges Montalvo faces dealing with abuse of official capacity would not be considered by this jury because of a clerical error.

The trial began Tuesday, but was postponed Wednesday because one of the 12 jurors became ill. The case is expected to resume at 9 a.m. today.

Montalvo and County Judge Tommy Seargeant were indicted by the grand jury in July and were arrested on charges of theft and abuse of official capacity.

Thurmond ruled that the two county officials would be tried separately, at the request of Seargeant's attorney, Robert T. Bass of Austin.


