Schuster files for election

Three of four incumbents not seeking terms

Michael D. Schuster has filed for election and three of the four incumbents in the Brackettville City Council and Brackett ISD School Board of Trustees May 1 elections will not seek re-election.

Schuster, Ronnie Dean Hobbs and Henry Joseph Lutz have all filed to run for the Brackett ISD School Board. Two at-large positions will be filled in the election.

As of noon Wednesday, Alderman Wes Robinson was the only candidate to file for the City Council election.

March 17 is the deadline to file for a place on the ballot for the City Council and School Board elections. The deadline for writein candidates to file for each election is March 22.

Sources indicate that School Board incumbents Steve not seeking re-election.

The positions currently held by Robinson and Alderman J.J. Guidry are up in the Brackettville City Council election. Each position has a two-year term.



Early voting for both elections will run from April 14-27. Early voting for the City Council election will be at City Hall and early voting for the School Board election will be at the district's Central Office.

The City Council election is limited to Brackettville residents. All registered voters in Kinney County are eligible to vote in the School Board election.

The Kinney County Commissioners Court agreed to a request to upgrade the county's EMS license from basic life support to advance life support and named Dr. Katherine Young the medical director during Monday's regular meeting.

Rural areas lack EMS resources

Rural areas are often at a disadvantage when it comes to health care. This is especially true in an emergency situation.

During a crisis, every minute counts. So when the nearest medical facility is 40 miles away, the trauma system must have the equipment and personnel to respond immediately.

Currently, rural areas lack the emergency response resources. Death rates due to trauma in these areas are considerably higher than urban areas. Preventable death rates due to trauma could be as high as 85 percent.

The problem is further compounded when large urban centers, which have the appropriate resources available, are overloaded with patients and may not be able to take rural trauma trans-

Trauma is the leading cause of death for people from the age of one to 44. Over 10,000 Texans die every year from injuries.

The Texas Legislature is making an effort to improve trauma care so that it does not matter if you live in Hudspeth or Harris County, you will be covered by emergency medical service.







Francis Henry French was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana on September 27, 1857. Deeply impressed from his youth by the stirring deeds and stories told by veterans of the Civil War, he realized his ambition for a military career by entering the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, where he graduated 12th from the Class of 1879. He was assigned as 2nd Lt. of "E" Company 19th Infantry and came West. Following service at Fort Garland, Colorado Territory and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the regiment moved to Fort Brown at Brownsville, Texas, where Lt. French was detailed as the Regimental Adjutant. In December of 1882, the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort

At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries, which he faithfully maintained for the next 30 years.
