## WANTS CONSTITUTION.

Tams Bixby Says Convention's Work Will be Ratified by People of New State.

Washington, May 13 .- Tams Bixby, of Muskogee, I. T., a Federal officeholder, is of the opinion that the Constitution of Oklahoma as adopted by the Constitutional Convention, will be ratified by the people of Oklahoma. He so expressed himself to-

"There is a great deal of opposition to the Constitution among the Republicans of the Oklahoma part of the new State, however," said Mr. Bixby, " and some little opposition in the Indian Territory."

The view of Mr. Bixby is directly opposite to that of Dennis Flynn, Republican politician and former delegate from Oklahoma. Leaving the White House one day last week, Mr. Flynn said the defeat of the Constitution by the people was certain.

The President and Attorney General Bonaparte both have given some consideration to the Oklahoma Constitution, a copy having been handed them by Representative Watson, of Indiana.\* A question has been raised here as to whether the copy is identical with the one adopted by the Constitutional Convention. For this reason there has been no intimation as to the probable action of the President or the Attorney General on the

proposed Constitution. Mr. Bixby, whose resignation as Commissioner of the Five Civilized Tribes in Indian Territory, has been accepted by Secretary Garfield, arrived in Washington today, having been summoned here with other prominent Oklahoma Republicans and Federal office holders by Representative James Sherman, chairman of the Ropublican National Committee, for a confer-

ence on political matters. The conference will be held Tuesday. The purpose is to further the conspiracy of Republican politicians, who hope to induce the president to refuse to approve the Constitution, and thus keep Oklahoma out of the Union until after the presidential election next


