NEW ROAD CERTAIN

FREDERICK CITIZENS ASSURE RAISING OF BONUS FOR W. F. & N. W.

\$33,000 ALREADY RAISED

Balance of the Necessary Bonus Will be Forthcoming This Week.

That Frederick will secure the Wichita Falls and Northwestern railroad now seems more than probable, although only about \$33,000 have been subscribed at this writing, but as the settlement in and around this point is practically a unit in favor of giving the bonus the soliciting committee feels assured that they can raise the balance among those who have not yet subscribed. Three public meetings have been held in the opera house one last Thursday afternoon of last week, one Tuesday afternoon of this week and one again this afternoon. A number of business and professional men spoke at the two former meetings and considerable enthusiasm was manifested.

At the meeting this afternoon Chas. Hunter of Oklahoma City who has had considerable experience both in promoting railroads, as well as the giving of bonuses, made some pointed remarks. At the close of the meeting notes were signed by each subscriber, payable when the road is completed into Frederick. In case the line is not completed before July 1, 1908, the note is to become null and void. It is generally thought, however, that the train will be running into Frederick over this line before January 1st, 1908.

The soliciting committee, consisting of about a dozen, is at work in the country and city and everyone interested in the town will be expected to contribute. Frederick Enterprise.

WASHINGTON CLUB MAN

Shot and Dangerously Wounded a Cab Driver in the Arlington Hotel.

The chauffeur said they had been quarreling over a commission Mackabee claimed, presumably for his services as a guide.

TOLSTOI'S SON IS ACQUITTED

Of a Charge of High Treason For Publication of Political Pamphlet.

St. Petersburg, Russia, May 11.—Count Leo Leonovitch, son of the famous author, arrested February last, charged with high treason in publishing his father's latest political pamphlet, has been acquitted. The court, however, ordered the Russian edition burned and the plates destroyed.

TO CLOSE THE DEAL.

Immunity is Said to Have Been Promised Adams if He Would Testify Against Haywood.

Wallace, Idaho, May 11.—General Duplek Wells of Colorado arrived here yesterday and called at the jail where Steve Adams is confined pending his re-trial for the murder of Fred Taylor. According to the report of Adams to his attorney, J. H. Wourms, Wells said: "I want you to close up the deal." Adams replied nothing. Wourms believes that Wells came here to get Adams to testify against Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone and that the "deal" referred to meant a promise of immunity to Adams. Wells denies having the interview. He said that he came to Wallace on private business.

SACRIFICED HIS OWN LIFE.

Chicago Man Threw Himself in the Way of a Shaft to Save His Wife.

Chicago, Ill., May 11.—In a collision between his automobile and a wagon, William C. McClintock, a retired capitalist, was almost instantly killed yesterday. He threw himself in the way of a shaft which would otherwise have struck his wife.

THE LENGTHY TASK

OF SECURING A JURY TO TRY HAYWOOD CONTINUES.

WHOLE OF NEXT WEEK

May Be Taken Up in Completing the Panel of Twelve.

Noise, Idaho, May 11.—(With the opening of court this morning, the attorneys continued the long task of securing a jury to try Haywood. There were twelve men in the box when today's proceedings began and only five of the twenty peremptory challenges had been exercised, three by the prosecution and two by the defense.

The work of securing a jury continued to drag this forenoon and the major portion of next week will be consumed in completing the task. The sixth, seventh and eighth peremptory challenges were used before noon, the state exercising one and defense two of the panel. Haywood frequently consulted his counsel as the examination progressed and particularly on the exercise of the challenge rights.

A FAVORITE SON.

Senator Knox Will be Indorsed for President by Republicans of the State of Pennsylvania.

Knox is to be indorsed by the Republican State Convention of Pennsylvania, which meets June 6th, as the choice of the Keystone state for president. THE SCOPE AND POWER OF THE COMMITTEE OF SEVEN IS SUBJECT OF SPECULATION.

A WRITTEN AGREEMENT

In a written agreement, it is said, to carry out any request which this committee may make of him. The committee has already begun the investigation of the police department and will gradually extend the scope of its inquiries to other departments.

OPPOSE THE REPORT

FIRST INDICATIONS OF ANTI-PATHY IN THE PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

ANTI SALOON LEAGUE

Should be Supplanted by the Churches Own Societies.

Columbus, Ohio, May 11.—The first indication in the Presbyterian General Assembly of the smoldering antipathy toward the temperance report came today when Dr. David Willis, Jr., of Oswego, N. Y., appointed Friday by the moderator, William H. Roberts, handed in his resignation with an absolute refusal to serve. He said he did not wish to be at the head of a committee which would be the target of the shafts of those opposed to the report. He movement to shelve the report has been started.

There is a strong opposition to the anti-saloon league, many commissioners declaring they will not vote to continue the work of this league in the church. Wayne Wheeler, superintendent of the league, who is urging his friends to stand by it, says the movement against the league started with the prohibitionists, who brought forward an inter-church council as a substitute.

Moderator Roberts has appointed Rev. Henry E. Dosker of Louisville as successor to Willis upon the committee. The temperance controversy did not get upon the floor of the assembly today because of adjournment soon after noon until Monday. Moderator Roberts, at its installment, expressed a determination that the temperance question shall be settled at this meeting.

The runaway was apprehended upon the receipt of a letter from his mother at Denison, giving his description and stating that he had run away. The young man told a Times reporter this morning that he had not run away, but had been driven from home by his mother. "I took a job in the city," the boy told the reporter, "and my mother killed them. I asked her why she did it and she told me that if I didn't like it to get out, so I left home and came here. Now she says I ran away."

"Were those roosters the fighting kind?" was asked the boy. "Yes they were fighting cocks, but I never fit 'em," the boy answered.

He will be held here until his mother can be communicated with.

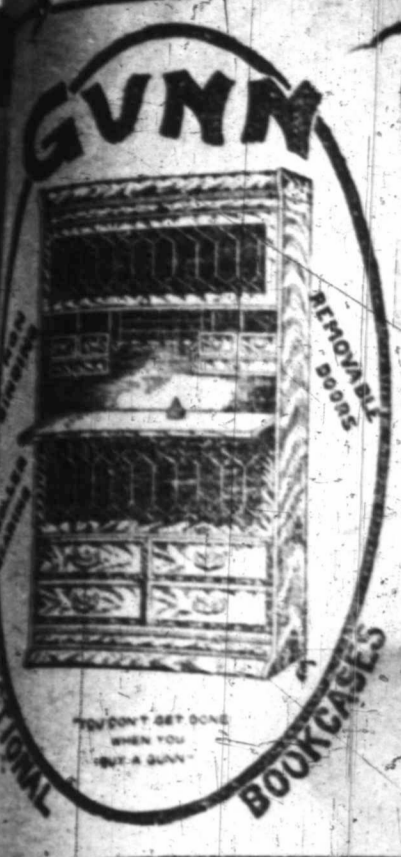

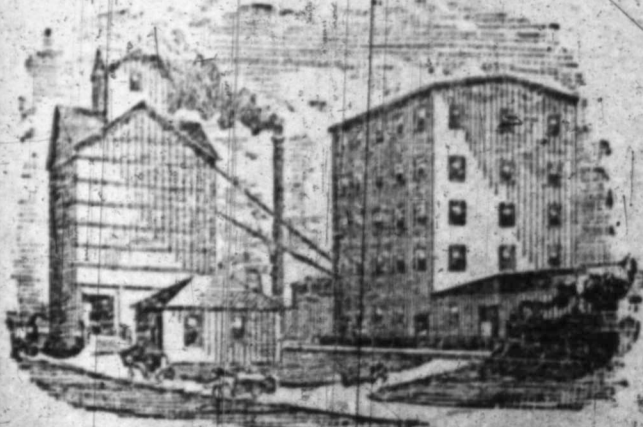

MRS. W. A. McCUTCHEON SUSTAINS BROKEN ARM.

BUGGY POLE DROPPED

Frightened Team Makes Mad Dash and Buggy Was Overturned Upon the Occupants.

Later Mr. McCutchen was removed to her own home on Tenth street, where she was resting easily this afternoon, and no serious results are anticipated from her injuries.

The team, after breaking loose from the buggy, turned west on Eighth street and were finally captured in the western part of town.

Death of Glaucus Lee.

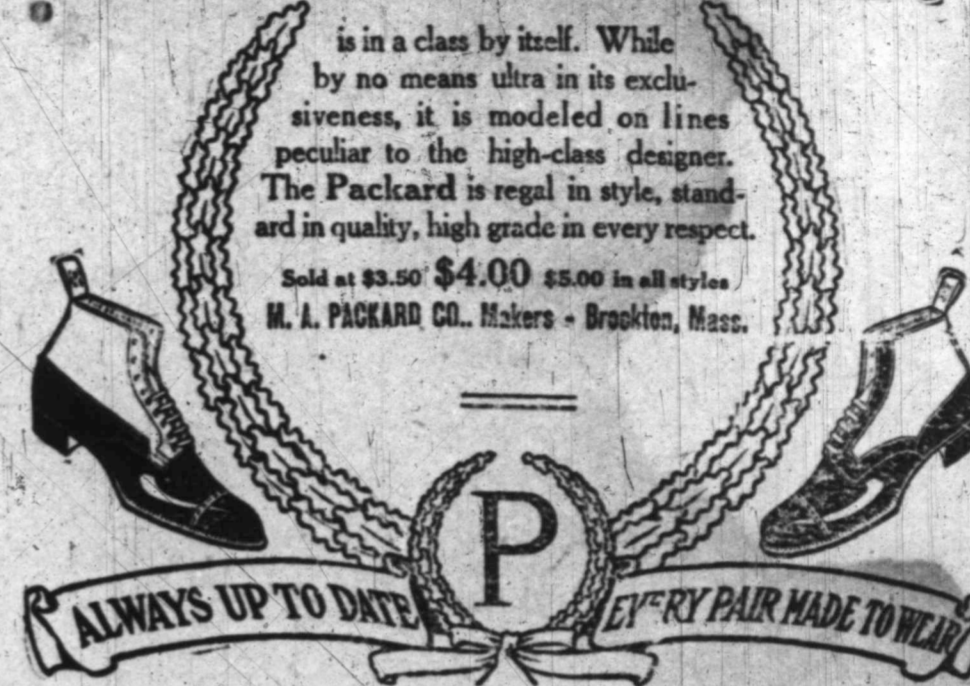
