THE BIRTHPLACE OF ANDREW JACKSON.

The Dallas Times-Herald and the Houston Post have had a little tiff over the birthplace of Andrew Jackson and outside papers have butted in on the subject to settle the dispute.

"Curiosity with some and state pride with others forbids indifference as to the birthplace of a man so widely known as a soldier and statesman and to settle the dispute between North and South Carolina, I shall give the facts as gathered up, showing that although General Jackson always believed that he was born in South Carolina, yet he was undoubtedly born in North Carolina. There is doubt from the evidence whether the family left the Waxaw graveyard when the father was buried, on Trelte-Mile Creek, in North Carolina, to return to the home where they had lived over two years in North Carolina, or started immediately to South Carolina; but either the night after the burial, or in a day or two, the mother and her two little boys, Robert and Hugh, started about to South Carolina, where Mrs. Jackson had a brother-in-law named Crawford, and was kindly taken in for the night by a man named McKamy (a branch of this identical McKamy lives in Dallas county) and Andrew Jackson was born there that night. Some papers written after Jackson became famous, by a man called General S. E. Walkup, said to be a most estimable citizen; fell into the hands of Mr. Parton, which Parton verified by going over the ground, which established conclusively that General Jackson was born in North Carolina. He (Parton) also took the statements of James Massy, John Carnes, James Faulkner, Samuel Wharton, Jane Wilson and James D. Craig. These statements were taken in 1859. The witnesses were all old persons and who had seen and known persons who were at the house when he (Jackson) was born, or had talked with people who lived in the neighborhood where he was born and knew the facts."

The Republicans of Ohio, according to a statement by George B. Cox, the Cincinnati boss, have brought harmony out of chaos and restored peace in the party ranks in the Buckeye state by an agreement to endorse Taft for president and return Foraker to the senate. This was years ago and the man who did the trick was Governor Hoadley. The conditions then are about what they are today. The Republicans were at war among themselves and it is at such times that the Democrats step in and take the offices away from them.

In a special to the Fort Worth Record dated at Lawton a few days ago, it was stated that a proposition was being considered to use the United States army to remove a few inoffensive and peaceable business men from the public road that ran through towns along the line of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern railway. This is a most ridiculous fancy and in all probability government officials had nothing to do with its origin. The idea was in all probability conceived in the fertile brain of some government townsman boomer or newspaper man. A scheme was attempted, the result of which would become as a result of the reports from his celestial wind mills.

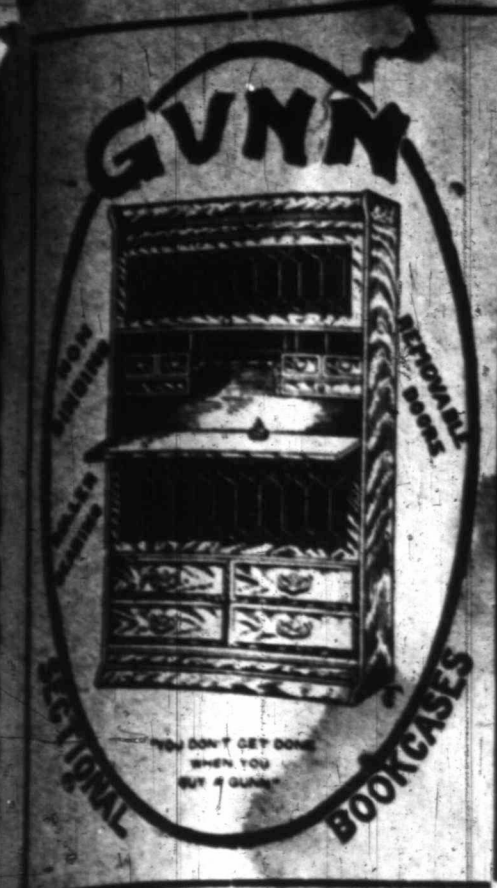

EDWARD STEEL DRIVES 30 MILES WITH LOAD OF COAL.

FROM NEW COAL FIELD

Fuel Was Brought Here to be Tested. Mining Operations on a Big Scale Contemplated.

After being two days on the road, Edgar Steele, living twelve miles south of Graham, arrived in Wichita Falls yesterday with a wagon load of coal mined from the Young county field.

The coal itself weighed 1,800 pounds and with the weight of the wagon made a heavy load for the long haul of nearly eighty miles.

The coal was delivered here to J. A. Kemp, who has leased a large district of the coal area in Young county with a view of going into the coal mining business on an extensive scale. Mr. Kemp will at once test this coal to determine its usefulness for steam generating and domestic purposes.

From appearances the coal is of an excellent quality and seems to be of a quality highly suitable for steam generation.

Mr. Steele says that he was engaged in mining coal nearly all last winter. So far, most of the coal mined is gotten out in a crude manner. Over near the mouth of Whiskey Creek, however, a number of shafts have been sunk and some improved mining machinery has been installed.

The nearest shipping point is at Graham and the coal is hauled in wagons to that place. At the mines the coal sells for \$2.50 per ton.

In the mine from which the coal brought here by Mr. Steele was taken, there are three distinct strata. This coal was taken from a strata located about eighty feet below the surface.

A sample of the coal is now on exhibition at the Times office.

What Pure Food Law is Showing Up.

The pure food law is uncovering some queer impositions.
