TO BE EXTENDED

BALLINGER RAISES \$50,000 FOR A RAILWAY EXTENSION.

SOON ANOTHER OUTLET

To the Southwest Will Be Given Wichita Falls If the Road is Built.

Ballinger, Paint Rock and Winters want connection with Abilene and the outside world on the north and by their works they are letting their wants be known. An enthusiastic mass meeting was held at Ballinger Saturday and during the meeting and since that time the people have subscribed \$50,000 as an inducement for the Abilene & Northern railroad to extend to that point. Paint Rock has also raised the same amount. Committees were appointed to consult with other towns on the proposed route and it is understood that all will come up liberally for the extension.

It is not known with what favor the Abilene & Northern people will look upon this extension, but it is a known fact that the extension will be pushed south to a connection with the Younion line, and those towns have taken the right steps at the right time to get the road.

The distance from Abilene to Ballinger is approximately sixty miles and a road between the two points would traverse one of the most fertile sections of West Texas, and the route is said to be practicable in all other respects.—Abilene Reporter.

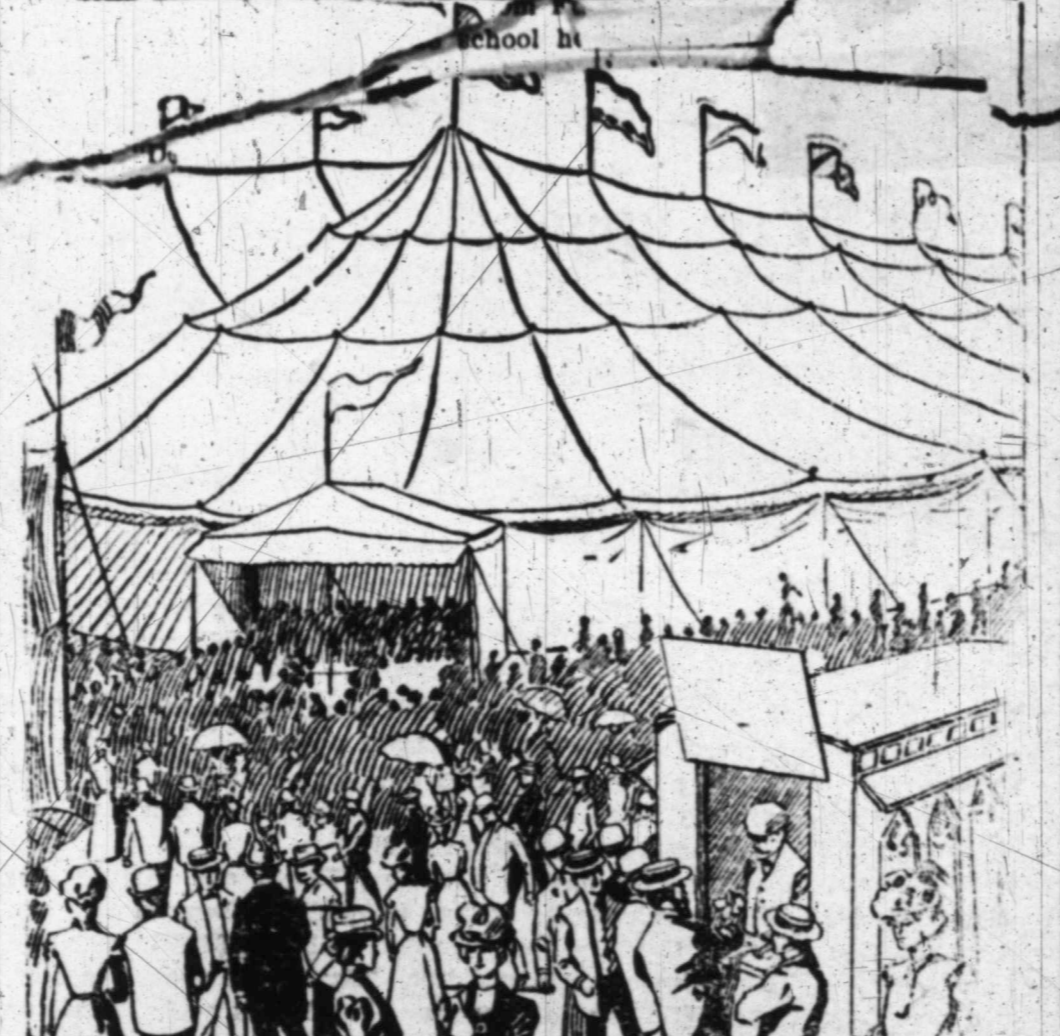

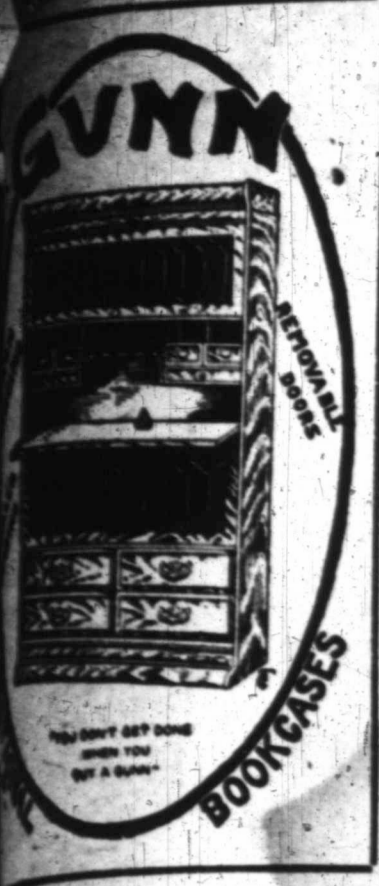

SCHOOL HOUSE DEMOLISHED—BUILDINGS DAMAGED.

NO ONE WAS INJURED

Later Details of Thursday Night's Storm Damage.

A special to the Times from Byers this morning gives additional details of the storm damage done by Thursday night's storm.

At Byers the storm reached the proportions of a cyclone and great damage was done to the buildings in that vicinity.

The Benvenue school house, about one mile east of Byers, was lifted from its foundation and was literally torn to pieces, the fragments being scattered over the fields for a distance of over a mile.

The new bank building in Byers, which is in the course of construction, was badly damaged.

The Methodist church was so badly damaged by the storm that it will be necessary to rebuild it. The new school building in Byers was also badly damaged.

A number of barns were demolished, and several houses were blown from their foundations and as many more were unroofed.

The telephone wires were blown down and for this reason the Times was unable to learn the extent of the storm's damage yesterday.

The storm struck Byers at about 11:30 p. m. Thursday.
