## WILSON'S ELECTION IS NOW CONCEDED

### A. P. CONCEDES DEMOCRATIC VICTORY

SOUTH AND WEST RALLIED TO DEMOCRATIC STANDARD-BEARER, OVERCOMING NEW YORK AND ILLINOIS.

The most reliable news that has been received in the city today with reference to the presidential election yesterday is contained in a telegram received by our townsman, W. W. Lee, from W. A. Scoville, of Chicago, which says: "Associated Press concedes Wilson's election. Definite news will follow."

Similar news comes from Shreveport in a telephone message received by a citizen of the county, together with the further information that the stock and cotton markets had taken an upward jump in consequence.

Last night it appeared that Hughes had been elected beyond doubt, and some of the prominent papers and politicians conceded his victory, but the western states rallied with such strength that overcame the lead of the republican standard-bearer and put the democratic leader in the forefront. The cause of this confusion doubtless due to the fact that Judge Hughes carried New York, Illinois and some other states with strong electoral votes.

It will possibly be a day or two before the final returns can be had which will determine the exact strength of each candidate, but it is pretty generally conceded that the democrats are safe against any probable switch in votes that might be contemplated, and is only a question as to how much majority.

The national election has so overshadowed the state election, that no news has been received from the different places, and it cannot now be ascertained as to who won in the contest for railroad commissioner, or how the educational amendment came out. In this particular county a very light vote was polled, and the interest so low that no report was kept, making it impossible to determine the exact result until the commissioners court canvasses the returns. The court will meet for this purpose next Monday.

Since the above was put in type, Hon. Moss Adams has received a telegram from his brother, in Kansas City, stating that republicans concede Wilson's election, with Wilson 271, and Hughes 238. Zeno Cox Jr., who is in New York wires Postmaster Donegan that republicans concede Wilson's election.

**IN BAY CITY MOB**  
Bay City, Texas, Nov. 6.—Joe Johnson, negro, was taken from the sheriff here Sunday night by a mob of some fifty persons, well armed and masked, and hanged from the Southern Pacific bridge near the city.

The negro Saturday night shot and killed a white man Tom Fitzmaurice, on the Fitzmaurice farm in Caney.

### DEAD MAN WAS FOUND OVER AT JACKSONVILLE.

Jacksonville, Texas, Nov. 4.—Luther Sanders, a white man about thirty years old, who lived near Ironton, was found dead tonight at 8 o'clock by the side of the International & Great Northern track, where it is crossed overhead by the Texas & New Orleans.

The back of the skull was crushed and he was also injured on the forehead. The body was picked up by the southbound train, which brought it back to the station.

The man had not been robbed, and it is not known how he was killed.

In a short time, Center will extend an invitation to the town councils of Nacogdoches, Lufkin and other neighboring towns to come up and take a look at some really and truly good streets. We are going after the sidewalks next.—Center Champion.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram is authority for the statement that there is considerable discussion over the country in the matter of revising the ten commandments, changing the word "hell" to a softer term, and substitute "condemn" for "dam." It's no use; the wicked would fall in line and swear with much precision to "condemn you."

The Mexican-American Joint Commission, which has been in session for some weeks, having for its purpose the matter of working out some plan and terms for the settlement of the differences between the two countries, has adjourned until November the 9th. But it might as well adjourn permanently in so far as reaching an agreement by which our neighbor across the Rio Grande would abide.

Over in Nacogdoches county the people are planning to have a fair next year, and over one hundred and forty farmers have signed an agreement to grow something for display at the fair. We wish that the people of Jacksonville community could be persuaded to take an interest in a fair for this section next year. It would not be a hard matter to put on a fair that would be worth thousands of dollars to the country in the way of an advertisement.—Jacksonville Progress.

The Lufkin Daily News, our interesting and spicy neighbor across the creek, has passed the first milestone in its pilgrimage down the stream of journalistic adventure, and enters upon the threshold in its journey to another with the vim and vigor that has characterized its efforts in the past. Long may it live! It is a credit to the town in which it is published, as well as the whole of East Texas, and the Sentinel trusts that it will be suitably rewarded for its great work in the future years.

Oftentimes the subject is discussed concerning the population of the larger cities of Texas, it being claimed by some that one city is ahead of another. Here is what the census department hands out, according to the estimates of July 1, this year: If unsatisfactory, go count the inhabitants yourself—the editor hasn't the time. It says: The population of Dallas is 124,527; that of San Antonio 123,831; Houston 112,307; Fort Worth 104,562; Waco 33,385. Those who happen to be dissatisfied with these figures may consider themselves at liberty to go and count the inhabitants themselves, being assured in advance that there will be no objection from this quarter. The only thing The News can complain about is the fact that Lufkin was not listed in the category of the larger cities of Texas, neither was Nacogdoches. For this we beg the opportunity of asking the reason why? Hills and dales, rivers that move in majesty and the complaining brooks, which make the meadow green, cannot respond to the interrogatory, but the government should be held to a strict accountability for its downright oversight in this instance.—Lufkin News.

## PRODUCE CLEARING HOUSE

Last winter The Sentinel editorially urged the importance of establishing a produce wholesale house in Nacogdoches, where the farmers could store their surplus produce and thereby not come in competition with each other, as well as give an intelligent idea of how much the country contained whereby car loads could be made up and shipped to other places when we had more than could be used for home consumption. We believed at the time that the plan was a good one, and the logic of it was not disputed by any one, but the agitation failed to arouse sufficient support to get the enterprise under way and we were finally forced to abandon the discussion to preserve self-respect.

Many good things are lost in this way. The competent newspaper, or the booster in any other line of business, may offer an idea of real merit and insist upon a trial, but when the point of annoyance appears the idea must be abandoned in self-respect until the time is more ripe.

In yesterday's Houston Post we find the following editorial, which carries out the idea offered by The Sentinel one year ago, to which we invite your attention:

"The Growers and Produce Marketing Association of Tyler, Texas, has opened a market house in a convenient location in that city and announces it is now ready to fill all orders for fruit, vegetables and produce in wholesale lots. The association expects to handle through the market house everything produced on the farm. Especially does it intend to give encouragement to the growing of such produce as has heretofore been imported from other sections, thus keeping Smith county money in Smith county."

Thus Tyler has beat us to it—but it is not too late for Nacogdoches to do likewise. The commercial life of Nacogdoches depends upon the development of the agricultural interests of the surrounding country, and there is no more intelligent or quicker way than developing a market for everything for which there is or can be created a demand. Plans for this work can be worked out in an investment plan by which returns can be had on the money used which would be far better than the waste that is suffered in giving donations to so many things which die with each individual effort.

We should by all means have a clearing house for everything raised in Nacogdoches county, and we should have sweet potato curing plants, evaporating plant for making syrup and sugar, and many other enterprises and facilities which would bring both individual and community prosperity, and we could have them all if the business people and farmers would get together in a cooperative way and put their money and brains into the effort.

Good roads in Smith county have brought thousands of bales of cotton to Tyler this fall that would have gone elsewhere. Keep the good roads in repair and they will continue to bring farm stuff. Good roads are town builders and country builders, but they must be kept in good condition.—Tyler Courier-Times.

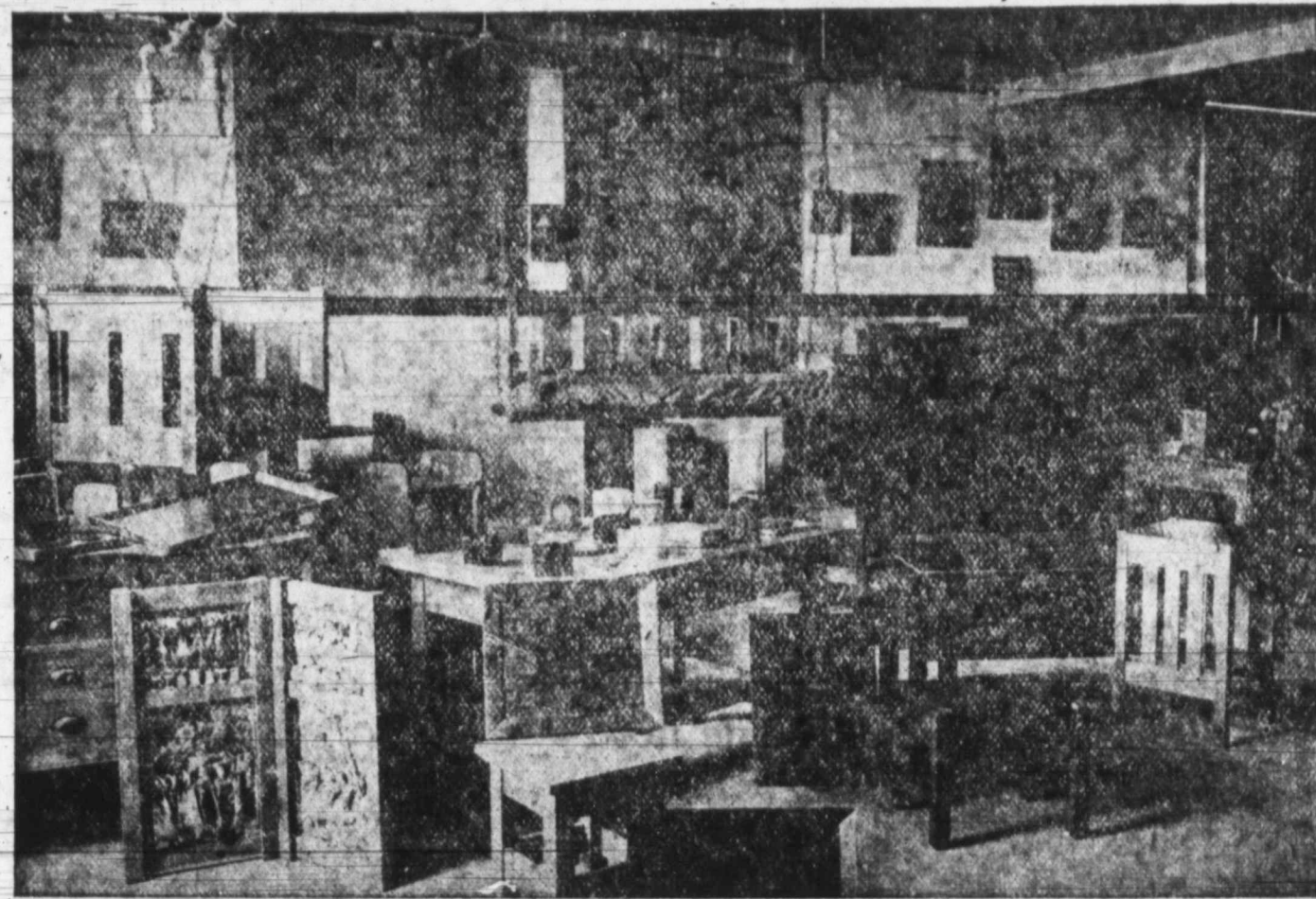

WOODWORKING AT THE COLLEGE OF INDUSTRIAL ARTS

In the accompanying cut are shown specimens of the work of woodworking class, Manual Arts course, at the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas.

It will be seen that specimens include almost every article of furniture used about a home, all made of good wood and beautifully finished. The work of the manual arts classes is among the most interesting in the C. I. A., and it is even more interesting to see the girls at work in the well equipped classrooms.

Many people who know of the manual arts course wonder why such things are considered education with which to fit a young

woman for home life. "My girl is never going to bother with making furniture," is commonly exclaimed. The real necessity of the manual arts course is not the fact that a girl is taught the art of woodworking, to the end that she may supply her own home with tables, chairs, desks, etc., but that she may be able to choose unerringly the most substantial furniture when she goes about the business of buying it. A girl from the Manual Arts department of the C. I. A. learns to identify every kind of wood, and knows instantly whether or not a piece of furniture is cheap veneer, good veneer, or solid wood. She also knows by look-

ing a moment or two whether a piece of furniture is put together in a most substantial way—and the most substantial is often the most economical even at first price. She knows all about furniture that the housewives of the past have never known, to their great loss, and can make money go the farthest in equipping the home she is to keep.

Manual Arts is also taught in the Household Arts course at C. I. A., in which between seven and eight hundred of the thousand young women are enrolled this year. Other popular courses include the Literary, Rural Arts and Sciences, Fine and Industrial Arts, Homemaker's one-year course and the music course

### CHIRENO PIONEER WITH THE DEAD

A message was received in the city at an early hour this morning bearing the sad news that Uncle Mich Flournoy, a pioneer citizen of Chireno, had died between six and seven o'clock.

The remains of the old gentleman will be laid to rest in the cemetery at Chireno this afternoon.

"Uncle Mich," as he was familiarly known and tenderly addressed by a great host of friends was taken ill last Saturday afternoon, but his condition was not thought to be serious until the last hours of his life. Death came to him with the sweet peace he had always enjoyed in life—just a little journey across the river to a brighter and better world where the tired body, worn-out with service in this world, will find rest and sweet repose in the companionship of his blessed Savior.

Mr. Flournoy was eighty-six years of age at the time of his death, but notwithstanding his great age, has been very active in mind and body until overtaken with the illness that claimed his life. He was a native of the state of Mississippi, moving to this state with his parents and settling at Chireno in 1840, when he was but ten years of age. During the war between the states he answered his country's call to arms, and served through the conflict as captain of the government teams, distinguishing himself with faithful and efficient service. It is said that one of his old drivers, Dave Anderson, a colored man of this county, is still living. Returning home after the great struggle, he took rank with the useful citizenship of the country, at all times ready to do what he could for his family and his neighbors, and throughout his long life he has been a good man and a good citizen who was always highly esteemed by those who knew him, and disliked by none. He was also a consecrated christian, and died in the sweet faith in which he had always lived.

Mr. Flournoy is survived by three daughters and three sons. The daughters are Mrs. Mary Wilson of this city; Mrs. Eula Hallwell and Mrs. Edna Ray of Chireno. The sons are Sam Flournoy, who is making his home in Oklahoma, and John T. and E. H. Flournoy of Chireno. Like their noble father, they all occupy prominent places in the ranks of the useful and deserving citizenship of the country, and have a great host of friends who will deeply sympathize with them in the loss they have sustained.

The last feature was especially interesting as the last number on the program was filled by one of the brightest boys of the county, who not only made an interesting talk, but gave an exhibition of cattle judging.

Many good points were brought out in the discussion which should have been heard by a much larger crowd than was present. One particularly interesting point was the statement of Mr. Burgess that the demand for improved registered Jersey cattle can not be filled. The producer can sell this product at sums ranging from one hundred dollars to two hundred and fifty dollars, and when once you get a foundation, the cost of production is but little more than would be invested in raising the inferior grades.

Mr. McNess made the point that the conservation of the fertilizer of the dairy cow was worth \$39.00. Mr. Pou made many interesting points along other lines, as did other speakers.

Capt. Cooper is a believer in refreshments as we journey along down the stream of time, in either business or social life, and called a recess at which a crate of ice cold soda water and coca cola was served.

Altogether, it was a great meeting, and it is to be regretted that more farmers and business men of the county did not participate.

### CHARACTERISTIC RAID BY VILLA BANDITS

Chihuahua City, Mex., Nov. 1.—via El Paso Junction, Nov. 2.—After shooting the 29 Carranza military guards of the south-bound passenger train which left Jaurez Monday, Villa bandits looted the train, robbed the passengers, and even took the clothing from the women passengers. Dr. Haffner, a German passenger on the train, who was mistaken by the bandits for an American, was struck over the head by one of the bandits, who used his gun as a club. Dr. Haffner was not seriously injured. The bandits, who were in command of the Murgia brothers and Sylvestre Quevedo, then abandoned the train, carrying the loot away in mule-drawn wagons.

### NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS.

In the Daily Sentinel of Oct. 30, 1916, editorial reference was made to a letter from L. Leach of Snyder, Texas, inquiring about the survivors of his old Confederate comrades, and referring to his old Co. G., 8th Tex. Inf.

This was Capt. Wm. Clark's company in Col. Overton Young's regiment, which was in Hebert's brigade at the beginning of the war. Following are the names of surviving members of this company, and all of them remember Iadd Leach, the writer of the letter: Fritz Hoya, Tille Hoya, John Davidson, Frank Ingraham, John Christian, John Rusk, Jim Stephens, John Richardson, Joe Mayfield (the present writer) and Jim Bacey.

This company left town with a big “blow-out” on Jan. 1, 1862, and camped that night at Stone's mill, six miles west of town. The next night their camp was at old Linwood, on the west bank of the Angelina river. The company went on through Alto and Crockett to Navasota where they boarded the first railroad train ever seen by most of them, and proceeded down to a training camp on Clear creek, two miles below Hempstead.

This company had more than one hundred men, and as fine specimens of patriots as ever shouldered arms. There were not near so many when they got back home in 1865—and during their absence they had “smelt powder.” Officers had changed, and “Bill Clark” had become colonel. Doc Simpson was captain, and Bill Harris was lieutenant. The regimental and higher officers had also changed more than once. The last brigade commander was the distinguished General T. N. Waul of Galveston.

Among the younger survivors in Clark's company are John Orton, John Nelson and John Walker. The last named is now a prominent Galveston lawyer.

It was said that when Clark's company started away from home there were more people in town to see them leave than had ever been here at one time. The members were largely country men, and this drew the rural population to the scene.

Miss Hellena Rusk was the chosen speaker to present the flag, which was appropriately done at the old Simpson-Clark hotel porch, and when she closed and handed out the banner there were tears in the eyes of every one that heard her. She was true to the blood of her illustrious father, Gen. Thos. J. Rusk.

On many battlefields, and in many military exploits, the best blood of Nacogdoches was shed by these brave sons of this glorious land. Most of them have “crossed the river to rest in the shade of the trees,” and “Though nations may combat and war thunders rattle, They heed not, they hear not, they are free from all pain, They sleep their last sleep, they have fought their last battle, No sound can awake them to glory again.”

In the evening Mr. Blackwell was given the agriculture period to show the pupils some points in judging corn. His talk was interesting and when he would ask a question concerning certain points of corn there was always someone ready to answer it. During this talk the pupils learned several things that make a good ear of corn. His mentions during this period will show them some magic lantern slides but the room could not be made dark enough so he could show them. The slides were to be samples of corn that had been taken in states of the north.

At night County Superintendent Stripling and Mr. Copeland came out and added more to the number of interesting speakers. Mr. Stripling made the first talk and introduced his good roads proposition to the school. His speech was enjoyed by those that attended. Mr. Copeland followed with a talk that was interesting and to the point. It was based on the subject of how to build our good road in front of the school. He said we had a good chance of winning first prize if we just tried hard enough and everyone is going to do his part. But the most interesting of all was the magic lantern show and the lecture on a school fair and what to exhibit. There was also some slides that pertained to high schools and colleges. Although the reflection of the slides were dim they showed what could be done when communities only try.

Mr. Blackwell and Mr. Copeland said some very complimentary things about our school and our prospects of getting our High School, something which we desire so much.

Mr. Blackwell is going to be with us again on November 23, when we have our school fair. He is going to take some pictures of exhibits and some of lectures. We are looking forward to a great day for this community and asking all the schools that wish to come, to help us make it like we so desire.

In conclusion I wish to say that our promised High School and agricultural work has revived since these men's visits and we are going to do our best to get them.

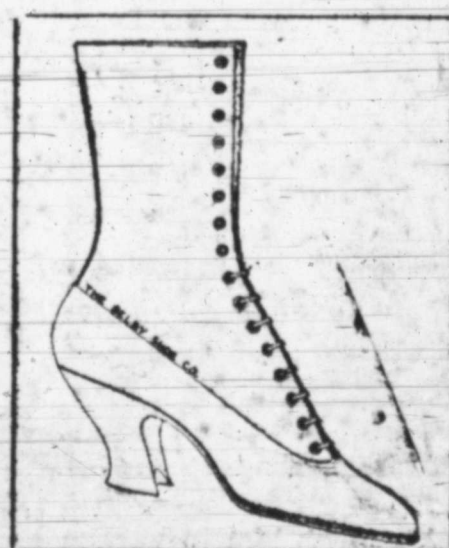
