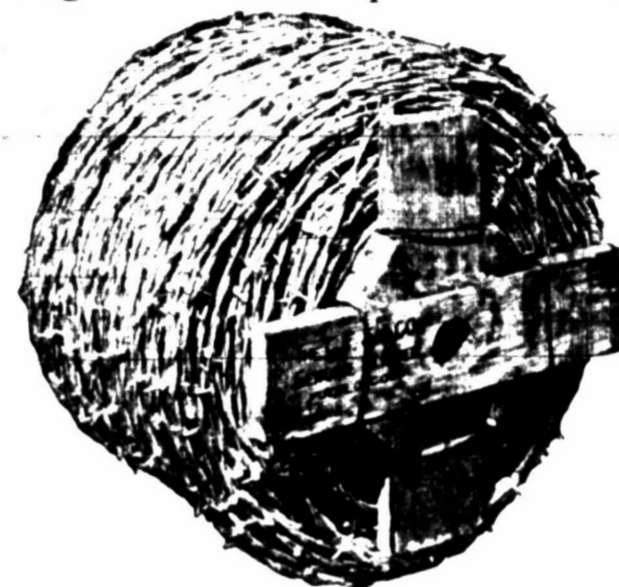

There was motoring yesterday both far and near. Some even went to far as to cross the Angelina River into Nacogdoches County, and enjoyed the good roads provided by that splendid county. Returning over the highways, which Angelina County has provided, there was but the one thought, "Why Can't We do the same?" Of course this is plainly put, but it is the truth, nevertheless.—Lufkin News.

The story is borrowed, but if it will make you smile it is worth the while. An Irishman, fresh from the mother county, was being introduced to a wedding party, and all went well until one fellow was pointed out as the "best man." This could never be harmonized, the attendant of the groom having to be taken to the hospital and Pat to jail. The Irish are exceedingly practical in comprehension and disposition, and will tolerate nothing artificial at even a wedding ceremony.

A dispatch from Longview, dated November 29th, and appearing in the state papers, imparts the information that there have been over one hundred cars of sweet potatoes shipped from that place out of this season's crop, which have been sold at 60 cents per bushel. Get your pencil and multiplication table and observe with your own calculation what a nice sum of new money brought into the community through this new industry.

It is difficult to liken the labor and time of labor on railroads, in factories and mines to the labor and time of the farm. Farm labor is conditioned on so many vicissitudes that it is impossible to compare it to railroad labor. Often there are weeks when the farmer cannot get into his farm on account of weather. Often a few hours added to the usual day's work will save a crop and after the crop has been saved the farmer can find time to take it easy, take a day off, go hunting or fishing, and some times he can take his family and attend a big meeting for a week at a time. To limit the hours which men may work on railroads, especially to eight hours, may be wrong, but to attempt to regulate the hours on a farm is wholly impracticable.—Col. Miller in Rusk County News.

Let the boys, farmers and business men not forget the meeting of the Boys Corn Club, the Seed Breeders Association and the Syrup Raisers to be held in this city tomorrow afternoon. The world is starving for something to eat. In many of the populous sections boycotts, riots, etc., are following as a result of the shortage of the very things we can produce in this section, and no line of endeavor or business offers such handsome returns as the noble avocation of farming. These meetings stimulate interest in the industry, as well as contribute to more successful marketing, and should be the center of interest for all classes are dependent upon the prosperity of this particular line of endeavor.

In an early issue of The Sentinel we will develop the story which gives an account of a farmer of this community, receiving \$5,355.00 for a crop of peanuts which cost him \$1,370.00 to produce, leaving a net profit of \$3,985.00. We are especially anxious that every cotton farmer in this county, and every man looking for some profitable pursuit, to read it.

The Sentinel has neglected to note sooner that the T. & N. O. is now operating solid steel trains in handling the passenger traffic over its line, which is an improvement over the old trains of wood. The new coaches are all of the latest design and equipment, and are very beautiful in their arrangement. Added to this convenience, the danger of loss of life in wrecks has almost been entirely removed, for if one of these cars were to turn turtle it would in all probability remain whole. Now if the line will give us a night train, it will have supplied all demands of the public and be voted the best road passing through the city.

Your question is easy—we got on where you got off, son. Now, maybe your town is a whole brass band, but in your little tune above we note you are sadly lacking in harmony, for what would you do without Alto? You ought to know by this time that Alto bears the same relation to Nacogdoches that "alto" does in blending the sounds. But to stay with the original subject, come over and see a sure enough good town, far from the "maddening throng," as you would make us believe.—Alto Herald.

With that Lufkin fellow "daring" us to put foot on his soil, and our Thanksgiving hymn drowned out with the "alto," we suppose we have to be thankful for today—that "we are still living." We suppose we should ask our spunky little neighbor what it did with its road bond issue in its onward march of progress to a "sure enough town, removed from the maddening throng," etc., but we don't know much about this "singing" business and might interfere with the relation of that element of the "tune" which makes the "blend." So shake, old boy, and let's connect with the suburbs, make two blades of grass grow where one formerly existed, and with glad refrain sing the praises of old East Texas so loud and long that the whole United States and the town of Lufkin will sit up and take notice.

"In Nacogdoches county a man took an old, abandoned farm and planted 200 acres in peanuts," says State Topics. "He reaped a harvest of \$5,500, but it can't be done—in Texas. Years ago they said a basement could not be built in Houston that would not flood after every rain. There are probably 50 big buildings in Houston of from 4 to 18 stories in height, all with dry basements, but it can't be done—in Texas. Whenever any person suggests any innovation he is confronted with the statement that 'it can't be done in Texas.' Now State Topics would like some one to enlighten us on this 'Can't be done in Texas' business. Why can not those things which can be successfully done in the other 47 states be done in Texas? State Topics believes that it is this 'Can't be done in Texas' spirit which is greatly retarding the prosperity of Texas. ## THE DEDICATION.

As many people from this city participated in the exercises, we reproduce the following report of the dedication of the new Masonic temple at Lufkin from yesterday's issue of the Lufkin Daily News:

"The dedication of the new Masonic Temple in the city of Lufkin last evening was a great event from every standpoint, and it was estimated that one thousand visitors were present.

The exercises proper did not begin until 5 p. m., the hour of the arrival of a special train from Houston, bearing Houston Masons and their ladies, and also the band of the Arabia Temple, Shriners. There were many at the station to greet the arrivals, as was also the case when the regular train arrived earlier in the day from Nacogdoches.

"A parade formed at the H. E. & W. T. station, headed by the Shriners' band, and took up its line of march to the old Masonic hall. After brief ceremonies there, the members of the order marched through the principal streets to the new Temple, where a splendid program was carried out, orations being delivered by prominent citizens, and later a banquet being served the invited guests.

"The News cannot dwell upon the event at much length in this issue, but learns that among the speakers for the occasion were Hon. Dan S. McMillan of White-rig, the most worshipful grand master of the Masonic fraternity of Texas; Hon. W. B. O'Quinn of this city, and also Rev. Timmons, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Lufkin.

"There were hundreds served at the banquet, which was one of the best spreads ever laid in East Texas. And just here it should be mentioned that the good ladies of the Eastern Star are responsible for the feast which so many enjoyed, and the compliments passed upon their endeavor would fill a good sized book.

"Later on in the evening a number of the visitors repaired to the Elks' club rooms, where refreshments were served and dancing was indulged in until a late hour.

"All told, it was a big day in Lufkin, and one of the finest lodge buildings in this section of the country was duly dedicated by one of the finest orders that the world has any record of, and every one present enjoyed the event most heartily from beginning to end.

"The same cordial welcome which obtained in Lufkin yesterday will obtain forevermore, and all those who enjoyed our hospitality are urged to return as often as they can."

## WATSON CONVICTED.

Waco, Dec. 1.—Thos. R. Watson was found guilty of the murder of John S. Patterson, former bank commissioner, and was sentenced to ninety-nine years in the penitentiary. Patterson was killed at Teague on August 28.

Roscoe Watson asked the court to allow him to assume his father's penalty. The case will be appealed.

The only dramatic incident connected with the case occurred yesterday when Pat N. Neff of Waco, leading counsel for the defense, was completing his argument to the jury.

Referring to the widow of John S. Patterson, who was in the court room, Mr. Neff said, I know the good little woman, the wife who bore his name." Mrs. Patterson at this point stood up and interrupted with "Yes. You carried his dead body to the grave and pretended to be his friend." The widow then sat down. Mr. Neff continued his argument.

In the charge to the jury the court instructed the jury at the beginning of the case the defendant had applied for a suspended sentence provided he was convicted of manslaughter and that they could recommend a suspended sentence provided they found the defendant had never been convicted of a felony before.

### WANT PEANUTS.

The Beaumont Chamber of Commerce and the Beaumont Cotton Oil Mill Company are starting a campaign to interest farmers to move to Jefferson county and engage in the cultivation of peanuts, cotton, corn, potatoes, can and other crops. The owners of large farms are getting interested in the matter and several thousand acres of land have been offered by 3 owners that have improvements, good water, located accessible to shell roads, schools and churches, free of rent the first year in order to get farmers to move to Beaumont, Texas and vicinity and engage in growing these crops.

The high price that all kinds of farm products are bringing now is a stimulus to land owners and they are beginning to realize the "back to the land" movement is the solution of the high-cost of living and incidentally the opening up of more and better farms and the better tillage of the present farms will mean more for the prosperity of the country than high prices, and for this reason the land owners have agreed to allow their lands to be cultivated the first year free by any new farmer moving to this section. This plan enables the farmer to move here and start operation with almost a sure chance of success and the free rent will more than offset the cost of moving to a new country.

One farmer here planted eleven acres in peanuts the last of June and harvested 515 bushels of peanuts and 200 bales of hay the last of October, about four months. He sold the peanuts for \$1.05 per bushel and he had 16 tons of hay, which is now worth \$21.00 on the market. His gross receipts on the eleven acres was \$878.75, or \$79.88 per acre. After harvesting the nuts he turned the hogs in to gather any wasted nuts. The Department of Agriculture advises that three or four hogs can be fattened on the nut left in the ground and scattered over the field in harvesting. As it only takes about four months to grow a crop of peanuts the farmer can use the land the balance of the year for pasture land. By sowing it to rye or oats he can have the finest of pasture for several months and then either gather the crop or turn under the green and help enrich the land. On the crop above referred to the land was planted to oats the fall before and pastured until late spring and then plowed under and no fertilizer used.

Other crops can be grown successfully here as well as the peanut. One farmer at Nome on 55 acres made 3 bales of cotton on four acres, raised 900 bushels of corn and enough peanuts and Irish potatoes to supply the family, and made 600 gallons of fine syrup on three acres. The total gross receipts were \$1577.50 from this farm and was cultivated with one team and the farmer with the assistance of his wife did nearly all of the work without assistance.

The oil mill located at Beaumont has annual capacity of 1,200,000 bushels per year and this means it could crush all the peanuts on 30,000 acres, making an average crop of 40 bushels per acre and this assures a market at home for all the peanuts or cottonseed that will be produced in this section.

Over 300,000 acres of White Spanish peanuts were grown in Texas during the season of 1916 and figures compiled by the Texas Industrial Congress shows that the average crop was over 40 bushels per acre, or a grand total of over 12,000,000 bushels. The price for peanuts opened at 75c per bushel of 30 lbs and steadily advanced until the farmers sold the most of the peanuts at \$1.20 per bushel. There has

been a good demand for peanut hay, but the farmers are, as a rule, keeping their hay for home consumption as the feeding value of peanut hay is practically the same as the best alfalfa. The large mule dealers in North Texas are offering and buying peanut hay in bags at \$24.00 per ton to feed their mules and horses on.

Any farmers interested in the culture of peanuts will do well to write the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce or the Beaumont Cotton Oil Mill Co. at Beaumont, Texas, for detailed information concerning the farms offered free of rent to actual farmers.

I say no; Nacogdoches county cannot afford to discard this work, and in my opinion it would be negligence on the part of the farmers not to make a strong protest against the discontinuance of this work, and a grave mistake for the commissioners court to fail to maintain the work.

Red land, Earl King, first, \$20; no entry for second. Bottom land, Matt Linthicum, first, \$20; no entry for second.

The Sentinel hopes to get a report of the amount of cotton raised by each and the cost of production for an early issue of the paper. We understand that Hefflin's cotton cost him five cents a pound, and the good price he received for it, together with the good price he received for the seed and the prize, makes a nice purse for a single acre of cotton—more than many farmers have made on a full crop in times past.

There were about thirty boys present, all radiant with enthusiasm and interest, and it was easy to see that with them the coming generation is going to do some great things in agriculture in Nacogdoches county.

Mr. Jones is to be commended for his patriotism, encouraging the boys of the county to great effort with both his means and his good counsel.

Dalhart, Texas, Nov. 29, 1916.

Mr. E. R. Ashley,  
Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Ed:

I have just received the eight gallons of syrup that you shipped me on the 18th inst., so that you will see that it takes ten to twelve days to make the trip. It came in good shape, and is all right.

I am going to suggest to you that the next labels you have printed, have Nacogdoches on them instead of Decoy, for the reason that if you Nacogdoches county boys are real good, and keep good, the name of Nacogdoches on a can of syrup will be a guarantee of quality. Also I would suggest that you mark your shipping tags in ink, as they might go astray if not plainly marked.

The freight on a gallon of syrup is about fifteen cents, which makes it cost the merchants here say 75 cents, and they cannot afford to sell it for less than ninety cents, which is cheap enough to those who know the quality of the goods, but lots of people here do not know the real thing from "Farmer Jones," "Mary Jane," "Velva," and many other factory-made products, which can be sold cheaper and at a better profit than the real goods you make on the farm.

Tell old Calvin that I was glad to hear from him, and that I like him and a lot of the good old Nacogdoches darkies better than some of the white folks there, but that this country would not suit him at all. No running water, no pine knots, no possums, and no shade for negroes.

Ed, if you want to find out what kind of folks you are living amongst, just stray off somewhere, as I have and stay ten years, and they will forget just about all the mean things you ever did, and be glad to see you, as they are me.
