Deeply regret to inform you that a message from abroad now states that Corporal Baxter Carlisle Duncan, marine corps, was killed in action on September 15. No particulars are available, but see general information mailed you today. Accept my heartfelt sympathy in your loss of one who nobly gave his life in the service of his country.

This is the message that came over the wire at 7:50 p. m., and has cast a pall of sadness over the people of our city.

Baxter Duncan was one of the choice young men of our town, one who was ever ready to do service for his fellow men and delighted in clean living and religious work. He was broad-minded and above the petty differences that retard development, a graduate of our high school, a trusted employe of one of our largest and best business houses in the city. Baxter was a man of men, using the talent given him by nature to the best advantage, his virtues were many, and if he had faults, they were so covered by his manliness as not to be seen.

Born near the small village of Doyle, La., May, 1894, he was at the time of his untimely death, 24 years, 4 months and 9 days old. Eight years of his life was given in the service of the Master in the First Presbyterian church of this city. He was our honored superintendent of our sabbath school, and deacon at the time of enlisting. He was ever-present, prepared for service in the church as well as in the business world. His true worth as a man and citizen cannot be estimated. He was the four-square man. The old man's friend, the children's idol. He heard the call of his country at a time of real and great danger, he answered that call with his life's blood.

To the bereaved father and mother, brother and sister, we can only express our sympathy. We are all sad and sorrowful with you. His untimely death has cast a shadow across our pathway, we point you to the Master's Words for comfort. He gave His life for the liberty of people burdened by oppression imposed by the hands of men. He died to free us from sin's blighting effects. Baxter gave his life to keep back the foes of human liberty and in so doing, has wrought a great work, though he is not permitted to in this world and enjoy the fruits of the victory. We, those of us who are living on those fruits should erect to his memory a suitable monument to in some measure express our gratitude for the great sacrifice he has made for us and those he loved.

The ways of Providence bring death to some, liberty to others, while we have achieved liberty on earth, Baxter by his trust in the blood of the Christ has found that liberty and light in the Father's House, in those "Mansions in the City, not made with hands," where in and death never, never, never come.

**TWENTY MILLION BE SPENT
TEXAS ROADS THIS YEAR**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Twenty million dollars of federal funds will probably be spent in Texas, building improved roads this year. Nearly five million will be spent in Louisiana, according to estimates of the bureau of roads engineering, which plans to spend a total of three hundred million, which, with the postal expenditures, brings the aggregated estimated federal expenditures on roads this year to a billion dollars.

WHEREFORE, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein and upon a hearing she have judgment dissolving said marital relations which still exist, for cost of suit, and such other and further relief as she may be in law and equity entitled to receive.
