## PRESIDENT CONFERS WITH REPUBLICANS

WASHINGTON, July 15.—President Wilson has decided to invite the republican senators to call at the White House to discuss the treaty and the league of nations, Secretary Tu multy announced today.

Senator Lodge, chairman of the foreign relations committee, is understood to be one of the fifteen republican senators with whom the President desired especially to confer. It is indicated that the invitations are not limited to the members of the foreign relations committee. The president is represented as being anxious to talk to all members of the senate and answer any questions they desire to ask. It is also indicated that the president has placed himself at the disposal of the committee, and would not begin to tour the country until the committee has reasonable time to decide whether they wished to confer with him.

## SHIPPING BOARD STEAMER IS REPORTED SINKING

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The American shipping board steamer Allison was reported in distress off the coast of Maryland, in a message to the navy department today. It stated that the ship was sinking fast, and was liable to sink any minute. The steamer Lake View, eighteen miles away, is proceeding to the assistance of the Allison. The coast guard cutter Merrill, is also proceeding to her assistance.

Later advices state that the steamer Lakeview towed the Allison to the Delaware breakwater safely, in a radio advices to the navy department.

## RACE RIOTS IN LONGVIEW FRIDAY

LONGVIEW, July 11.—Four white men were wounded early today when negroes fired upon a group of whites searching for a negro school teacher accused of causing publication in a negro newspaper, statements derogatory to a young woman of this county.

Austin, July 11.—The fight between the whites and negroes in Longview early today resulted in several white persons being wounded, and the burning of several negro houses, according to reports here. Fearing

## CAVALRY MEN GO LONGVIEW

Capt. W. W. Lee received orders today to proceed to Longview immediately with 25 picked men of Troop I, 7th Texas Inf., and the men left early this afternoon in automobiles. The call was issued in connection with the race riots there yesterday and today.

further trouble the Longview authorities requested that rangers be sent there.

LONGVIEW, Texas, July 11.—One of the white men shot was wounded severely. He is Ernest White, 27 years old. The other victims are Er. Nelson, 50 years old, Albert Carry, 25, and Louis Baer, 24. All were wounded in the first fusillade from the negroes' guns.

F. L. Jones is the negro school teacher charged with the responsibility for publication of an article in a Chicago newspaper, which not only attacked the character of a young woman of Kilgore, but also assailed the white residents of the county in general. Two of the young woman's brothers met Jones on the street here last night and beat him severely, although he protested his innocence.

The brothers were not in the party of young men that later went into the negro district in search of Jones. It was one o'clock this morning when the whites approached Jones' house and were met by a simultaneous fire from all sides. When they retired, after exhausting their ammunition they sounded a general alarm, and a mass meeting was held. At 4 o'clock a larger party returned to the negro quarters, but found no trace of the negroes.

The negro houses burned included those belonging to Jones and Dr. C. P. Davis, for whom search was continuing today. It is alleged that Davis had sided with Jones in the controversy over the publication of the newspaper article.

With reinforcement, the whites returned to the scene, but the negroes had dispersed, leaving no indication of casualties among their number. The whites then burned five of the principal negro residences to the ground.

The search for two alleged negro ring leaders continued today, but otherwise the city was quiet shortly before noon, and it was said the authorities expected no further difficulty in handling the situation. An earlier request for aid had been made to Governor W. P. Hobby.

## HENRY FORD RESUMES STAND

MOUNT CLEMENS, July 16.—Henry Ford resumed the stand today in his suit for a million dollars libel against the Chicago Daily Tribune. The things Ford thought and those Theodore DeLavigne wrote for him on the subject of peace are again under examination.

The Tribune counsel repeated the story of Benedict Arnold. Ford said that he had never heard of it.

Asked what the U. S. was composed of before the revolution Ford answered "land." Ford admitted that he was an "ignorant idealist," but subsequently reversed this statement. The Tribune article declared him an "ignorant idealist."

## COUNCIL DISCUSSES MEXICAN OFFER RUSSIAN BLOCKADE MEDIATION REJECTED

PARIS, July 16.—The Council of Five yesterday discussed the Russian blockade. There has been proposals that the powers allow ships to enter Russian ports under special permits.

The United States has been constantly insisting that there is no blockade of Russia, except incidental to embargo imports to Germany.

SAN SALVADOR, July 16.—Mexico's offer to mediate in the Costa Rican difficulty caused by the revolutionary movement from the Nicaraguan border against the government of president Tinoco was declined by both Costa Rica and Nicaragua, according to advices received here.

## LEE WILKERSON IS STRUCK BY TRAIN

About twelve o'clock today, when Mr. Lee Wilkerson, superintendent of the City Light and Water Department, and his son Joe, were going to dinner in the big truck belonging to the department, they were struck by the south bound passenger E. & W. train, as they were crossing the track by the compress. The car was thrown by the train through the right of way fence, and smashed literally to pieces. The boy was thrown from the car, and Mr. Wilkerson was carried on the pilot of the engine for about two hundred feet before the train was able to stop.

Mr. Wilkerson was immediately rushed to the hospital in an ambulance, in an unconscious condition. An early examination by physicians showed that he had one leg broken and many severe bruises, including a ugly wound on the head. It was not known at that time whether his skull was fractured, or whether he received internal injuries. He had not regained consciousness. His son, Joe, escaped with a few severe bruises.

It is believed that neither Mr. Wilkerson or the engineer were at fault. The compress is right up against the

railroad track, and hides both the road and the railroad from the view of either a party on the road or the track until they get right on each other.

Mr. Wilkerson is a capable efficient young man, is well known, highly respected, and has a host of friends who were shocked and pained beyond words when they heard of the sad accident, and who are hoping and praying that he may recover.

## ITALIAN AUTHORITIES STOP STEAMER FROM LONDON

NAPLES, July 16.—The steamer Cablons, which arrived here from London today, was stopped by harbor workmen who refused to allow her to continue her voyage because she carried ammunition. The crew was forced to unload the cargo, after which the ship proceeded.

The workmen claimed the ammunition was intended for use against the Bolsheviks in Russia.

# WEEKLY SENTINEL STRIKE DISORDERS OCCUR IN ITALY

Lifting of the blockade around Germany and granting of permission to resume trading with the former enemy has had a stimulating effect on markets. Prices in many commodities Germany needs have risen sharply, and the business world is looking forward with considerable satisfaction to the trade when goods will be moving again in large volume to Germany.

But while lifting the blockade presents a big opportunity for Americans to increase their business, there is both an opportunity and a responsibility involved in the opening of Germany to world markets. It is not to be forgotten that before the war the Germans had a great world trade, and the first thing Germany will do will be to make an effort to recover her trade. She again becomes a competitor of the United States in the world markets, and the United States can not afford to let any grass grow under its feet now in building up its foreign trade.

Of course, we have the advantage at present. Germany is seriously crippled economically. Her ships are gone, and her overseas trade shattered while she is bare of raw materials. But the fact must not be overlooked that the Germans are a most capable and resourceful people, and they will recuperate rapidly from the effects of the war. Their factories are still intact and their country was little hurt by the war. The allies are pledged to a policy of allowing Germany raw materials and assisting her, in order to give her people a chance to earn the reparation they are required to pay Belgium and France.

Under the pressure of debt, and with the aid it is necessary to give them, the Germans may be expected to make a Herculean effort to get on their feet economically and commercially again, and when they go into the world market as our competitors again, as they will shortly, in the language of the street, we are going to have to "hustle."

Particularly is this true in Central and South America, where the Germans had a strong foothold before the war, and where there is yet a considerable sentiment favorable to Germany. Doubtless this will be the field to which the Germans will turn first. Dispatches are telling us now that five thousand Germans are preparing to emigrate to Mexico.

The war gave us a big advantage in Latin-American trade, but that advantage will gradually disappear now, and we will have to adopt methods that have proven successful when employed by competitors, or lose the field.

So, while opening up of Germany to the world again may cause considerable hilarity in commercial circles because of the prospects of immediate gain, remembrance of the vigorous competition in the world markets that Germany furnished before the war, and will furnish again soon, will subdue the exuberant spirit and goad Americans interested in foreign trade to their best efforts.

To compete with her is going to require the same sort of organization, scientific efficiency and patriotic spirit, that was necessary to defeat her on the field of battle.—Houston Post.

# GENERAL PERSHING ARRIVES LONDON

LONDON, July 15.—General Pershing, commander of the American forces in France, arrived here with his staff to take part in the peace celebration, and was met at Dover by General Sir Henry Horbe and a guard of honor, arriving at Victoria station in London.

Pershing was welcomed by Colonel Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for war, and officers representing Field Marshal Haig and Sir Henry Wilson, chief of the imperial staff.

# DALLAS MUNICIPAL COURT SETS ONE DAY RECORD

DALLAS, July 15.—What is declared to have been a record for cases disposed of in Dallas Corporation Court for one day was set recently when Municipal Judge Robertson tried 263 offenders and imposed fines aggregating \$1,145. Of the fine assessed \$845 was paid in cash. The previous record for fines imposed was said to be approximately \$800 in a single day.

Of the 263 cases disposed of, 224 were new and the others left-overs from previous sessions. Court was in session from 9 to 11:45 a. m. and from 4 to 6:15 p. m. The majority of the offenders were charged with violating traffic and speed laws.

Judge Robertson recently won a state-wide reputation by inaugurating a system of fining violators of the speed law at the rate of one-dollar-per-mile instead of imposing the customary nominal fine. Imposition of the heavier penalty, according to police officials, has resulted in greatly decreased numbers of offenders against the speed ordinance.

# 100 MEXICAN FARMERS WILL ATTEND THE DALLAS FAIR

EL PASO, July 15.—According to advices received here from Mexico City 100 farmers of Mexico will attend the State Fair of Texas at Dallas next October. It is also said that Mexico especially the state of Coahuila, will have a large agricultural exhibit at the coming exposition.

The Mexican farmers will travel by special train, it is said, the excursion being organized by Zeferino Dominguez, known in the southern republic as the "apostle of corn." The excursionists, who will come from all parts of the republic, including forty from the Laguna cotton district, are said to be especially interested in modern American agricultural machinery which is to be exhibited at Dallas.

# BAXTER DUNCAN KILLED DAY BEFORE ARMISTICE

According to the latest information, which is in the form of a letter just received from a soldier by the parents of Baxter Duncan, and in which his picture and other papers were enclosed states that he was killed on the 10th day of November, 1918.

There has been a good deal of confusion in regard to this young man's fate, except that it has been known that he was killed in action. From the information at hand now it appears that Baxter was first gassed on the night of the 13th of June, while fighting with his outfit in Belleau Woods. He was in the hospital then for several weeks and after being assigned to his command again, was wounded on the 15th day of September, 1918, near Thaircourt, while in battle. He recovered from his wound according to the latest information, and was killed on the 10th of November while operating a machine gun against the enemy.

The family was notified when Baxter was gassed, but the next information was that he was missing in action on the 15th of September, and then later that he was killed on that date, but letters from comrades now coming to the family show that he was not killed on the 15th of September, but wounded, later assigned to the battle line and killed on the 10th of November.

# SAYS JAPAN GOT SECRET PLEDGES

WASHINGTON, July 15.—The charge that Japan secretly secured the pledges of Great Britain, France Italy and Russia in 1917, stipulating that the peace settlement should award the Shantung peninsula to the Tokio government for certain considerations was made by Senator Norris, of Nebraska today, who produced copies of diplomatic correspondence embodying the promises of Great Britain and France to the pledges.

The senator fully explained the pressure which resulted in Shantung's transfer to Japan under the treaty ratification, and said it would be the blackest page in the nation's history.

# NACOGDOCHES TROOPS RETURN FROM LONGVIEW

The twenty-five cavalymen of Troop 1, Seventy Texas Cavalry, of this city who were ordered to Longview last Friday, for service in connection with the race riots in that city, returned home yesterday afternoon.

The troops were commanded by Capt. W. W. Lee, and were used on guard and police duty. The men did not carry tents with them, and were forced to sleep on the grass of the court house square in that city, where they had headquarters.

It is the opinion of the officers that there will not be any more trouble in Longview.

# GIFT OF NEW YORKER TO MUSEUM CAUSES SATISFACTION

LONDON, July 16.—The gift by J. P. Morgan of New York, to the Victoria and Albert Museum of the collection of stained glass, which occupied five windows of one of the corridors caused widespread satisfaction here.

The collection is of peculiar interest to students and designers. The earliest items of the glass are four small panels of French glass of the latter part of the 13th century. Two of these represent scenes from the "Temptation in the Wilderness." The subjects of the other panels, evidently contemporary, are the "Miracle of the Feeding of the Five Thousand"

and a scene from the life of St. Nicholas.

The rest is entirely of German and Swiss origin, and provides material for studying the distinctive developments of art, particularly in the Rhine Valley, towards the close of the Gothic period and during the Renaissance.

# JAPAN STUDYING MEANS OF MEETING LABOR PROBLEM

(By Associated Press)

TOKIO, July 16.—The increasing tendency of the Japanese workers to assert their rights and to interest themselves in socialism is causing Japanese to study the means of meeting this labor problem. It is pointed out that strikes are increasing and that as Japanese labor has no organized voice, the strikes are liable to lead to dangerous violence, as in the case of the race riots last year.

The Herald of Asia says that there is considerable element affected by socialist theories, but that owing to the severe repression imposed by the authorities that there is no means of knowing how far socialism has spread. The journal adds: "That the bacteria exists here, there is no doubt. It is kept under so far, but it only smoulders, ready to break out on occasion. If socialism cannot legitimately raise its head, then it will try to do so illicitly, and the result is Bolshevism and anarchy."

The journal recommends immediate and effective improvements of labor conditions in line with the suggestions of the League of Nations, political and educational reform, the elimination of bureaucratic methods and a true restoration of the ideal of democracy.

SAN SALVADOR, July 16.—Dr. Salvador Gallegos, former minister of state, and rector of the national university is dead. He will receive military honors of the division, by order of the government.
