### YOUNG MAN WAS BITTEN BY A BANANA SNAKE LAST NIGHT

A strange incident occurred last night in the City Bakery while Willie Woodlan, one of the employees, was plucking some bananas from a bunch the bakery had for sale. On attempting to pull off the second or third banana, a curious brown snake, which was concealed in the bunch, sank its vicious teeth with a vise-like grip into one of Willie's fingers. The snake was speedily killed and a physician was quickly sent for. Upon his arrival and examination of the snake and wound he lanced the finger and bled it thoroughly. The bite did not make the boy ill, because of the quick medical attention procured.

Quite a bit of interest was in evidence as to the kind of reptile it was. The unanimous opinion was that it was a banana snake. If such is true, it is of a very poisonous nature, and is a specimen of the tropics.

### FREIGHT ACCIDENT ON T. & N. O. YESTERDAY

A thrilling little accident occurred yesterday on the T. & N. O. up about Cushing when the 156 Beaumont bound freight wrecked, turning over four cars and derailling three. No cause for the accident is known, and no one was injured.

Service was delayed about two or three hours until the wreckage could be removed. At this writing the track is clear and everything is ready for traffic. The Gentry show today was delayed something over two hours on account of the wreck. It is rumored that another wreck took place up about Sacul yesterday, but it is not known definitely whether these rumors are true.

### LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS BEING MADE FOR TAKING CENSUS

J. W. Shotwell of Center, census enumerator for this congressional district, was in the city today making arrangements for classifying the work and getting in readiness for the taking of the census, the enumeration of which begins on January 2nd. Mr. Shotwell says that he has some applications for the positions of enumerators from this county, but none from this city, and desires more applications. The applications will be received up to the 20th of this month, when the appointments will be made, but it is desired that they be sent in as soon as possible. Women as well as men may apply, and Mr. Shotwell says that frequently the women make more efficient workers in this connection than the male species.

Mr. Shotwell says that the enumerators will receive about 1c for each person, 10c for each barn, and 30c for each farm. The pay will be about 50 percent greater than it was in the 1910 census, in which an average of \$200 per month was made in the county by the enumerators. He says that the merchants and business men of Port Arthur and Beaumont have agreed to allow their clerks and employees a leave of absence during the taking of the census to make the extra money, and that this would be a good plan for Nacogdoches to adopt.

The city of Nacogdoches will have three enumerators, and will be divided into three districts as follows: All south of Main street will form one district; all north of Main and east of North street will form a district; all north of Main street and west of North street will form another district. There will be 21 enumerators for the county, divided into Justice precincts as follows:

Justice precinct 1, 4 enumerators.  
Justice precinct 2, 1 enumerator.  
Justice precinct 3, 3 enumerators.  
Justice precinct 4, 2 enumerators.  
Justice precinct 5, 2 enumerators.  
Justice precinct 6, 2 enumerators.  
Justice precinct 7, 2 enumerators.  
Justice precinct 8, 2 enumerators.

Mr. Shotwell will be in the city today, and possibly part of tomorrow, when he will leave for Carthage, to make arrangements for a Polka county.

The 1910 census for the city of Nacogdoches was 3,500. This is not thought to be representative of the city, for the corporate limits were so small that they did not include nearly all of the city. Estimates of the present population of the city range from between seven and eight thousand. The register of school pupils in Nacogdoches Independent School District shows about 2,500 students, although some of these do not live in the corporate limits.

### CENSUS CLERKS TO BE APPOINTED.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—Several thousand clerks are soon to be appointed for service in the census bureau at Washington for from one to two years, but not longer than June 30, 1922. Entrance salaries \$900 to \$1020, with chance of promotion to \$1080 and \$1380 per year, to which a bonus of \$20 a month will be added for clerks who show proper ability.

Civil Service examinations will be held Oct. 18th and Nov. 15th, 1919, at Beaumont, Jacksonville, Lufkin, Marshall, Nacogdoches, Orange and Port Arthur, in my district, and appointments will be based on the result of these examinations. Spelling counts 10 points, arithmetic 30, penmanship 15, letter writing 30, copying and correcting manuscript, 15. Preference given to honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines and widows of such, and to wives of injured soldiers, sailors and marines who themselves are not qualified but whose wives are.

Appointees will likely be called to Washington in the first part of 1920, some as early as January or February.

### PROMINENT CITIZEN DROPS DEAD SUDDENLY TODAY

Mr. W. A. Nelson, a prominent and well known citizen of the city, dropped dead suddenly this morning about 10 o'clock, at his home on East Main street, with heart failure. Mr. Nelson had been complaining a little in the early part of the morning, but was not down, and the sudden death came as a painful shock to the many friends of Mr. Nelson in the city.

Mr. Nelson was between 55 and 60 years of age. He was born and reared in Nacogdoches, and is widely known and respected. He is a son of Capt. A. A. Nelson, deceased, a former prominent pioneer citizen of this section. In his young life he was a prescription clerk, later engaged in the drug store and grocery business in this city. At the time of death he was engaged in the drug business out at the Frost-Johnson Lumber Company mill. Mr. Nelson was a member of the Episcopal church of this city, in which he was reared, and has been in active service for many years. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge.

Mr. Nelson is too well known to Nacogdoches citizens to need further review. He was progressive, upright and honorable, ever working for the growth and advancement of the city, civic, morally and otherwise; always ready to help a friend in need. It was a life well spent, a life that was useful to his community, and it is with great pain and regret that he must be given up; a life spent in such manner that the pagewords of the record in the Great Beyond will say "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joys of thy Lord." He has been useful to the world, he has gone to his reward. All honor to his name.

Mr. Nelson is survived by one son, Luther, three daughters, Miss Martha, little Miss Helena Augusta, and Mrs. Fannie Burt Rogers.

The funeral services will occur tomorrow afternoon at 5 o'clock unless some changes are made, it depending on the arrival of a daughter, Mrs. Rogers. Rev. C. D. Atwell, rector of the Episcopal church, will conduct the ceremony.

**BONDS NOT APPROVED  
BY BONDING COMPANY**

Commissioner G. A. Blount returned home yesterday afternoon from New York and Chicago, where he had been on a pleasure and business visit, together with his wife. As stated in this paper a few days ago, the Nacogdoches county good roads bonds were approved by Dillon, Clay & Thompson, attorneys of New York, whose judgment was relied upon by the majority of the bidders for the Nacogdoches bonds. This firm specializes in the kind of work, and upon the county's inquiry as to their opinion, through Mr. Blount, stated that they were in good order. From New York Mr. Blount went on to Chicago, where he insisted that Elston & Co., accept the bonds, in which Mr. Blount was not successful. Woods & Co., of that city, are the attorney for the bonding company.

Elston & Co. gave as their reason for turning the bonds down that an error was made in the transcript, that is in the notice of election, it failed to give the name of the various voting boxes, and the holders of the election. The transcript was made after a form sent out by the attorney general of the state, and the attorney general approved the transcript the second time. The company purchased the bonds with the provision that they must be approved by their attorneys, and consequently when the asserted flaw was found, they claimed the right to turn them down.

County Judge Marshall states that the matter will be considered at the regular meeting of the commissioners court on the 13th of October. He says that in the meantime the county will advertise for bids on a resale of the bonds, and hopes to be able to receive the bids at the regular meeting.

In addition to this, it is reported that the school which gets the largest number of points will get a prize of \$50.00.

An interesting time is expected by all going, and everyone waits eagerly to learn what the outcome will be, assured that Nacogdoches' athletes will do their part.

And every one knows about the handsome bank buildings which are being constructed, and the beautiful little gasoline filling station which has been completed by the Columbian Refining Co. in this city.

A large amount of decorative activity is also in evidence. This is borne out by the firms of the city who have recently "newed" up the looks of their establishments by painting their fronts, including Cason, Monk & Co., the City Bakery and others. In the drug stores, Kennedy has installed a new fountain and Swift Bros. & Smith have added new cigar counters. The Redland Barber shop has moved into a large building and added new and up-to-date fixtures. The Metropolitan barber shop has moved into a larger building and put in new fixtures. D. E. Among the other progressive features of Nacogdoches is its wonderful mail facilities. To begin, Nacogdoches has a \$50,000 postoffice building, and its value is increasing every day, as the cost of building material continues to increase. Nacogdoches easily has a postoffice that is the envy of all East Texas.

The amount of business transacted in the local postoffice is staggering. The yearly average of stamps sold in Nacogdoches conservatively estimated aggregates \$40,000. Practically three times that amount of stamps are cancelled. Then there are the money orders. No less than 10,500 money orders are written each year in Nacogdoches, and a conservative estimate of the registered mail is easily 3000 pieces. These are tremendous figures for a town the size of Nacogdoches, with a population of approximately 8000 souls.

To facilitate the movement of this enormous amount of mail matter the postoffice has 7 employees who are kept constantly busy attending to this huge task. Six rural carriers are kept busy carrying the mail into the rural districts over the county. The Nacogdoches postoffice supplies 19 post offices in this county—and 87 postoffices outside of the county.

Nacogdoches postoffice possesses an easy superiority over any post office in East Texas. It would have to be if it stayed in the city.

These are only a part of the new things in a building way which are on in Nacogdoches. It would almost require this issue to tell about every new enterprise which is under way, and is being planned for the city. Nacogdoches is strictly on the boom. It has the money, the spirit, the pen and the civic pride, which will ultimately make it more than ever before the only town in East Texas.

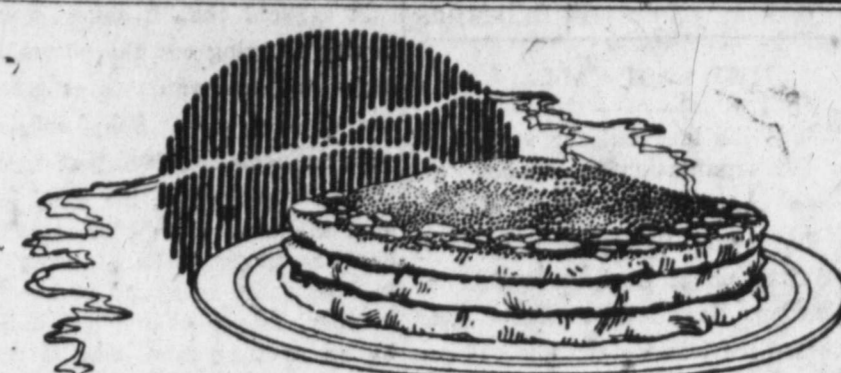
## SAYS VERY LITTLE OF ARMY FOOD SOLD HERE
