OUR PEACE-TIME ARMY

Washington, D. C., March 10.—An authorized peace-time army of 289,000 enlisted men and 17,820 officers as approved by the house today.

QUARANTINES AGAINST TEXAS PINK BOLL WORM.

Baton Rouge, La., March 10.—The Louisiana Department of Agriculture has declared a quarantine against the entire state of Texas on cotton seed, cotton seed meal and hulls as a precaution against the spread of the pink boll worm, recently discovered in Cameron county.

MORE RUSSIAN HORRORS

London, March 9.—The chaotic conditions in the wake of Denikine's army as it retreated in South Russia before the bolsheviks are vividly described by a British officer, who says "I have never seen such a scramble in my life. The worst feature of the whole business was the townspeople of Tangorod turned bolshevik and looted everything. In Rostov the conditions were worse. The streets were swept by hailstorms of machine gun fire, while the bodies of men, women and children who were hanged to telegraph posts and trees by the retreating Denikine army. It was awful. The whole scene was enacted in a blizzard of snow and sleet, so you can imagine the plight of the women and children."

PROBABLE SUFFRAGE DEFEAT

Charlottesville, Va., March 9.—Senator A. R. Montgomery, listed as an anti-suffragist, arrived in Charlville today. It is announced by opponents of the federal suffrage amendment that he would break the deadlock in the senate this afternoon and allow that body to adjourn before Senator Bloch, suffragist, who is hastening here from California, could arrive to vote for ratification.

WANT EGYPTIAN INDEPENDENCE

London, March 10.—Fifty-two members of the Egyptian legislative assembly recently adopted a resolution proclaiming the independence of Egypt and the Sudan.

CASHIER SLAIN BY ROBBERS

Kansas City, Mo., March 9.—Glen Shockey, cashier of the South Side Bank, in the heart of the residence district, was killed today in a sensational attempt by four bandits to hold up the bank. An official of the bank saw the four men reach for weapons as they approached the entrance of the bank and he attempted to close the door. One bandit fired, the bullet grazing his head. The janitor tried to assist in preventing entrance, when other shots were fired, one killing Shockey, who was behind the counter. The bandits fled in an auto without loot.

TEXAS WOMEN'S SALARIES

Austin, Texas, March 10.—The average salary of women and minors in Texas mercantile establishments, telephone exchanges, laundries and factories is between twelve and thirteen dollars weekly, according to figures the industrial welfare commission gathered. According to statements of employees, the average living cost for workers without dependents was between thirteen and fourteen dollars weekly.

The reports from employees, covering 13,500 workers, included women and children under 15 years, will be used as a basis for setting a minimum wage for women in the four industries named. There are so few children in these industries that the figures virtually apply to women exclusively.

TO RECOGNIZE SOVIET

Honolulu, March 9.—The Japanese foreign office estimates an early resumption of commercial relations with the soviet government of Russia, preliminary to the formal recognition of the soviet as the de facto government according to a Tokio cable.

FRIGID IN NEW ENGLAND

Boston, Mass., March 9.—Scores of towns in North New England remain isolated today because of the storm and freeze-up of Saturday. There is a shortage of food and fuel in several places.

LEASES NOT TAXABLE

Austin, Tex., March 9.—Comptroller Wiginton announced that he would advise county tax assessors to follow the opinion of the attorney general that all leases which convey fee in land are taxable and leases which merely convey privileges are not taxable.

EXPLOSION KILLS MANY

Berlin, March 9.—A dispatch from Bernath, Rhenish Prussia, says fifty persons are estimated to have lost their lives as the result of a large boiler bursting in the Rhenish-Westphalian Electricity Works. The explosion buried ninety workmen.

WORKING FOR COMPROMISE

Washington, D. C., March 9.—A modified draft of the repudiation of Article 10 to the peace treaty is understood to have been assented to today by a number of republican leaders working with the democrats for a ratification compromise.

AERIAL MAILMAN CREMATED

Elkhart, Ind., March 10.—A government airplane mail carrier was burned to death in his airplane when it fell near New Paris, Ind., today. The victim was Lieutenant Stoner of Ohio.

LONG PRISON TERM

Wichita Falls, Texas, March 10.—John and Charlie Burnside, cousins, convicted of the murder of Kenneth Goodwin, were sentenced to 99 years in the penitentiary. Goodwin was killed in an attempted holdup.

NEGRO GIVEN FIFTY YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

At the courthouse Tuesday, Jim Yarbrough, colored, who killed his wife at the Frost-Johnson lumber camp, was convicted of the crime and given fifty years in the state prison. The case was one that attracted a great deal of attention, and during the trial the courthouse had a considerable number of visitors, who were anxious to get some information on the case. The jury did not deliberate, it is reported, but a few minutes on the case until they rendered their verdict of guilty.

GERMANS START SOMETHING

Berlin, March 9.—Another demonstration against French officers is reported. When the Frenchmen entered the barracks in Bremen to conduct negotiations with German officers, soldiers sang "Deutschland Uber Alles." The singing attracted a crowd which roughly handled the French when they left the barracks. Police dispersed the crowd and escorted the officers to their quarters. An inquiry into the affair has been opened.

WEST INDIES ARE NOT FOR SALE

London, March 9.—Premier Lloyd George, replying to questions in the house of commons regarding the suggestion that the West Indies be transferred to the United States in payment of part of Great Britain's debt to that country, stated that there was not the slightest intention on the part of the British government to barter or sell any part of the West Indies.

AIRPLANE CREW KILLED

Miami, Fla., March 10.—Maxwell Blanehard of Chicago, pilot, and Charles Sims of New York and Joseph Earle of Montclair, N. J., were killed when their airplane crashed to the ground enroute to Miami.

ACUTE FUEL FAMINE

Grand Rapids, Mich., March 9.—Isolated since Thursday's blizzard tied up practically all railroads, many Western and Northern Michigan towns today are in the grip of an acute fuel famine. Actual suffering from cold is reported in Muskegon, where dealers are helpless to respond to the appeals for coal.

NACOGDOCHES GIRL AT THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Austin, Texas, March 10.—Miss Floy Lewis of Roswell N. M., formerly of Nacogdoches, Texas, has completed her term as president of Ashbel Literary Society, the oldest society for girls in the University of Texas. She was vice president in the fall term. Ashbel makes a study of some literary subject each year, and furnishes literary associations among the girls. The basis of membership is high scholastic standing. This term the society has been studying the rare and interesting volumes in the Wrenn Library which was bought for the university by Major George Littlefield last year, and is one of the most valuable libraries in the country.

Miss Lewis was toastmistress at the Valentine tea of the woman's building this year. This is a coveted honor, and the identity of the toastmistress is kept secret until she walks down the stairs with Mrs. Neil Carothers, the director of the building, the night of the tea, and leads the girls into the banquet room.

Miss Lewis has served two years on the cabinet of the Young Women's Christian Association. Last year she was finance chairman of the cabinet, and this year is chairman of the program committee. She is now on the committee to nominate the officers for next year, and to assist in naming the cabinet. Last year she had charge of the registration at the Homecoming.

As reporter of the Daily Texan, the student newspaper, Miss Lewis did good work for a year. She will take the degree of Bachelor of Arts in June, 1920.

Miss Lewis is the niece of Mrs. Karle Wilson Baker of Nacogdoches.

SPECIAL NOTICE REFERENCE THE GREAT ARMY ESSAYS

Up to the present time no reports have been received from district headquarters at Dallas, with reference to the army essays. A heap more time is required for the classification of the district's essays than was at first anticipated by the Dallas board of judges.

Nevertheless the Nacogdoches county entrants' essays are expected daily at the local recruiting officer's office. Immediately upon the return to the recruiting officer, they will be turned over to the local board of judges for classification so as to determine the winners in Nacogdoches county.

The local board of judges consists of three of the most capable men that could be selected by the chairman of the chamber of commerce. They are, as well, among the most prominent men in the county:

Judge V. E. Middlebrook of Nacogdoches, chairman; G. F. Garrison of Garrison, R. N. Tilghy of Appleby. Lieutenant Louis J. Harant of the army recruiting station here, left for Dallas Wednesday to confer with high officials with reference to rebuilding the regular army and its maintenance. At this time it is certain that he will return with definite information as to when the army essays will be returned here for classification.

SHELBY FARMER KILLED

Timpon, Texas, March 10.—Jim Richardson, a farmer, was shot and killed by Henry Bowlin, a neighbor, who surrendered to the authorities. Domestic trouble is given as the cause of the tragedy.

OLD ARMY AND NEW

What a wealth of memories does it not conjure up—the old guard that fought the Indian and the out-law in the reclamation of our western frontier from the Missouri river to the shores of the Pacific and from British Columbia to the shores of the Gulf of Mexico, known in our geography in the days following the civil war 1865, as the Great American Desert, a distance east and west from St. Louis to San Francisco measured by rail of 2,197 miles, and from north to south from Vancouver to Galveston Texas, of 2,925 miles. This vast territory was practically without a fence over which roamed many tribes of Indians and countless thousands of buffalo.

Very few men of the present generation stop to consider the wonderful achievement of the American people that in the lapse of half a century has organized this vast domain into states filled these thriving cities, busy with the fruits of commerce, and enjoying the fruits of civilization—days when the their forefathers and their fathers braved the dangers of the desert and battled with the Indian and the out-law to find homes for themselves and their children—days when the pony express (1861) ran relay between Atchison, Kansas, and San Francisco, entailing a journey of fifteen days, to be followed by the Concord coach and the locomotive, when to protect emigrant travel the government established frontier posts garrisoned by our little army of 25,000 men that included twenty-five regiments of infantry and ten cavalry regiments when the notes of the bugle sounding "Boots and Saddles" kept the troopers of the horse regiment in the saddle day and night as they rushed over the Santa Fe and the Oregon trails to relieve the distressed emigrants surrounded by encircling Indians.

A WAR CONGRESSMAN

The Armistice was signed November 11, 1918 and Germany made unconditional surrender. On March 4th, 1919, the Hon. John C. Box went into office as congressman from this district. And yet he seems determined to build up a War Record. Shortly after he went into office Judge Box went with a delegation to see the Secretary of Labor to have our immigration laws suspended, so as to admit a lot of ignorant Mexicans. Judge Box began to hear from home on the immigration question, and sought to excuse himself on the ground that it was a "war measure". On October 15th Judge Box undertook an explanation in the Congressional Record in which he used these words:

"With reference to the admission of Mexicans as a war measure to meet certain industrial needs, I took no action."

Yes, Judge Box, you did take action. You went with the party to see Secretary Wilson and had the immigration law suspended so as to allow the exicans to come in. Not satisfied with this "war measure" excuse, Judge Box had a piece printed in Congressional Record of January 31st in which he sets up the following plea in defense of his conduct:

"I did not object to any temporary emergency measure necessary to win the war, even to the admission of a comparatively few of the laborers while the boys were away."

In a further attempt to build up a war record of Judge Box advertised in the newspapers that he was prepared to send the soldiers overcoats and other clothing, and issue their Liberty bonds to them. He is just now deadheading a letter to that effect through the mails in the same envelope with the speech he never delivered in Washington, and which was printed in the Congressional Record for "home consumption". This last part of the Box war record is truly laughable. The soldiers paid for their bonds with their own money and are as much entitled to receive them as Judge Box is to get his salary. If any official negligently withholds these bonds from the soldiers Judge Box should get in behind the careless official, instead of burdening the mails with deadhead letters to the soldiers themselves. And as to the overcoats and other articles the soldiers are entitled to. They were paid for out of an appropriation made by congress before Judge Box went into office. If Judge Box had not meddled with the law as he found it, the soldiers would have gotten what they were entitled to under the law much sooner. But Judge Box wanted to make it appear that he was the giant killer that was getting the bonds and the clothes for the boys, and as a result there was much delay. To sum up Congressman Box's war record it appears that he did not go into office until several months after the war was over and yet he went with a delegation that had our immigration laws suspended to let in a small army of ignorant Mexicans "as a war measure", which he would have us to suppose was "necessary to win the war". That when he went into office Judge Box found upon the statute book a law providing that the soldiers should receive certain clothing and equipment, and instead of allowing the War Department to proceed in an orderly manner to send our boys what belonged to them, Judge Box undertook to make politics out of the matter and caused the soldiers to suffer much delay.

I helped to pass the immigration law over President Wilson's veto. And no congressman, cabinet minister or president should have power to set it aside "as a war measure," after the war was over. I helped to pass the law making liberal allowances to the soldiers, and Judge Box offers an insult to their intelligence when he tells them that his assistance is at all necessary in getting their own. The truth is that the War Department wants a law for compulsory military service, and I helped to vote it down before I went out of office for such a law by making a sort of "garden seed" matter out of the issuance of soldier equipment. If Judge Box would let alone the wholesome laws that I helped to place on the statute book, these laws would not only work better, but he could save a vast sum to the taxpayers by not filling the mails with the postage stamp left off.

CIVILIANS MAY BENEFIT BY MEDICAL SERVICE

In case of emergency a former soldier, sailor or marine may be admitted to an army hospital on his own application, according to a bulletin issued by the Secretary of War this week. Under the law discharged soldiers or civilians are not usually admissible to the army hospitals, but under the war risk insurance act such treatment may be provided.

The facilities offered by the medical service of the army have been extended to discharged soldiers, sailors or marines, as the majority of men receiving treatment at the army hospitals have been discharged.

AID GOD'S POOR, SAYS MRS. DANIELS

The plight of the people of Armenia presents a tragedy inconceivable. Hundreds of thousands of the descendants of the earliest Christian race are now, because of their religion, undergoing sufferings beyond the imagination of civilized America. During the war it is estimated that 1,000,000 Armenians, a third of the

total population, were massacred. No barbarity in human history exceeds the gross cruelty of that destruction. Thousands were driven out upon the desert, there to die from hunger and thirst under the pitiless rays of a tropical sun.

Such was the price which the Armenian people paid for their Christianity and their loyalty to the cause of justice and democracy during the world war. One-quarter of a million children, chiefly orphans, whose parents perished in massacres, are utterly dependent on American charity.

Hundreds of thousands of refugees in the Caucasus, clad only in torn, verminous rags, without shelter and without food, can exist only if America has compassion upon them.

Shall we fail them? Not if I know my country!

PASTORS OF TEXAS ENDORSE THE PLAN OF INTERCHURCH

EIGHT HUNDRED LEADING DIVINES PLACE STAMP OF APPROVAL AT DALLAS CONFERENCE BY UNANIMOUS ACTION ON FINDINGS OF COMMITTEE REPORTED HERE THAT ALL CHURCHES SHOULD CO-OPERATE IN GREAT CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT.

In a message of acknowledgment and gratitude, the Findings Committee appointed at the recent Pastors' Conference of the Interchurch World Movement held in Dallas issued a statement which was unanimously adopted by the Conference. This is the message to give to the people of Texas, as sent by more than eight hundred active ministers, representing twenty-one denominations from fully two hundred counties in the State of Texas.

We acknowledge with gratitude the gracious leadings of Gods Providence in all things. We rejoice with fervent hearts the profound conviction that this movement is of God.

It has been a season of spiritual fellowship when many of the eight hundred pastors of our Protestant Churches of Texas have been sitting together for three days talking about the people of Texas, as sent by more than eight hundred active ministers, representing twenty-one denominations from fully two hundred counties in the State of Texas.

We have been moved with gratitude to the profound conviction that this movement is of God. It has been a season of spiritual fellowship when many of the eight hundred pastors of our Protestant Churches of Texas have been sitting together for three days talking about the people of Texas, as sent by more than eight hundred active ministers, representing twenty-one denominations from fully two hundred counties in the State of Texas.

We further propose a program by which the churches may unitedly attack their common task. That task is fourfold: To bring the whole church to recognition and acknowledgment of the stewardship of life and possessions; to enlarge the scope and improve the methods of missionary education; to win souls; the chief business of the church; and to enlist the whole life of the church for Christian service.

We approve the spirit and program of the movement since the World Survey Conference was presented to us by the Interchurch leaders at the Texas Pastors' Conference. We feel that this is a program in which all the churches of Christ could co-operate and venture to hope that the day may soon dawn when they will be found in such fellowship of service.

We recommend the approval of the findings of the Atlantic City Conference. We urge that our pastors in their respective ecclesiastical fellowships use every influence to secure adequate support for the ministry and an adequate provision for the care of the aged and infirm ministers and their dependents, and we are persuaded that the realization of this program will make this possible.

We recommend that all pastors co-operate in the holding of interdenominational meetings in order that this program and the fellowship of its service may be brought to all local churches.

We urge that every minister sympathetically study this movement, and humbly and earnestly pray that God may guide in all things and give us the grace to follow where He leads.

TEXAS LEADERS CHOSEN FOR INTERCHURCH WORK

Notes Ministers Selected to Head Departments of Spiritual Resources, Stewardship, Missionary Education and Life Enlistment.

Announcement was made today of the three departmental heads of the Interchurch World Movement for Texas following the very successful Pastors' Conference attended by more than 800 pastors of 21 denominations held at Dallas, and the women's training conference held in the same city. The heads of these three departments are Rev. H. L. Bell, pastor of the East Dallas Presbyterian Church, temporary chairman for Spiritual Resources; Rev. H. E. Beckler, stewardship secretary of the Christian Church of Dallas, Department of Stewardship; Dr. Robert S. 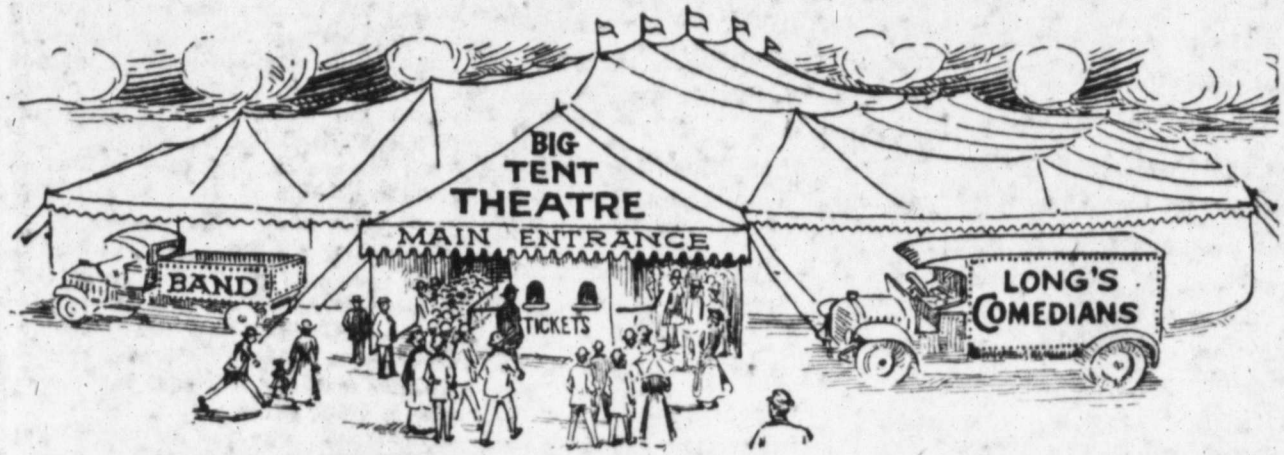

U. S. INCOME TAX EXEMPTS NOBODY

Every Person Who Had Income in 1919 Must Determine Own Liability.

MARCH 15 LAST FILING DATE.

Best Way Is to Follow Form 1040A. Free Advice in Doubtful Cases. Severe Penalties in Law.

Nobody is exempt from income tax. An obligation is laid directly on the shoulders of each citizen and resident to consider his own case and to get his return in on time if one is due.

With each return showing a tax due a payment must accompany the return in the full amount of the tax or at least one-quarter of the tax.

All returns for 1919 must be filed on or before March 15.

Don't Show Two Figures. In figuring up his earnings for income tax purposes a person must take into consideration all items of taxable income, and each item must be reported in amount. Gains and losses must be avoided, for the return is made under oath.

Everybody who had an income during 1919 must now determine whether he or she has income sufficient in amount to require an income tax return. The best way to find out is to get a Form 1040A and follow the instructions printed on it. That form will serve as a reminder of every item of income; and if a return is due, it tells how to prepare and file it.

One of the important points to keep in mind is that a person's net income is found by a computation prescribed in the law, and that each item of income from every source must be considered, unless specifically exempted.

Another thing to remember is that the personal exemption allowed taxpayers by law has no relation whatever to the requirement to file returns. This exemption is not to be considered until a person has figured out his net income and determined whether it was sufficient to require him to file a return. Then, if a return must be filed, he should read carefully the instructions for claiming exemption, and complete his return.

If in doubt on any point as to income or deductions, a person may secure free advice and aid from the nearest Internal Revenue office. Many banks and trust companies are also furnishing similar service during banking hours.

Heavy Penalties in Law. For failing to make a return on time the penalty is a fine of not more than \$1,000 and an addition of 25 per cent to the tax, if any. For making a false or fraudulent return the penalty is a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both; and, in addition, 50 per cent of the tax. There are other penalties for failing to pay tax when due and for understatement of the tax through negligence.

Many Sources of Income. Aside from what one may earn by his services, there are many other sources of income. If he sold any property during 1919 he must figure out the gain realized. If he rented buildings, land, apartments or rooms such rents must be considered taxable, and he may claim deductions for necessary expenses incidental to rents.

Bank interest is a common source of income and is taxable whether withdrawn or not. Any amount of interest credited to a depositor is income to the depositor.

Interest on mortgages and notes is taxable; also bond interest received from corporations.

A taxpayer who cashed his insurance during 1919 must report as income any excess received over the total of premiums paid.

Members of partnerships or personal service corporations or beneficiaries of an estate or trust must report their shares of income distributable to them whether or not actually withdrawn.

Dividends of domestic corporations must be reported. Many other forms of income are taxable, unless specifically exempted.

INCOME TAX IS DUE MARCH 15

Penalties for Delay and Failure to Make Returns—Early Compliance Urged.

All income tax returns covering the year 1919 must be filed by Monday, March 15. Each taxable return must be accompanied by check or money order for the full amount or at least one-quarter of the amount of tax due.

Cash payments are accepted only at the collector's main office; if sent by mail, they are at the sender's risk.

Residents of Texas should file their returns with, and make payments of income tax to, Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Tex.

Those who must file returns but have not done so are warned that the revenue law imposes heavy penalties for failure to get returns in on time or to make payments on time.

Early filing and early payments are urged, in order to relieve the internal revenue offices as much as possible of an overload on the final day, March 15.

MEXICO ANXIOUS ABOUT WORKERS LEAVING COUNTRY

Mexico City, March 4.—Mexican workers are going to the United States in large numbers and the exodus is becoming alarming, according to press advices from the northern states of the republic. Serious danger is threatened numerous industries of that section through non-use and to large areas of far lands through lack of cultivation.

JAPS LEAVE SIBERIA

London, March 5.—Rumors of revolution in Portugal, with the establishment of a soviet government, are not credited at the Portuguese legation here. It was pointed out that such reports generally come from the Spanish frontier and are notoriously untrustworthy. Dispatches to the legation dated Wednesday did not mention any trouble.

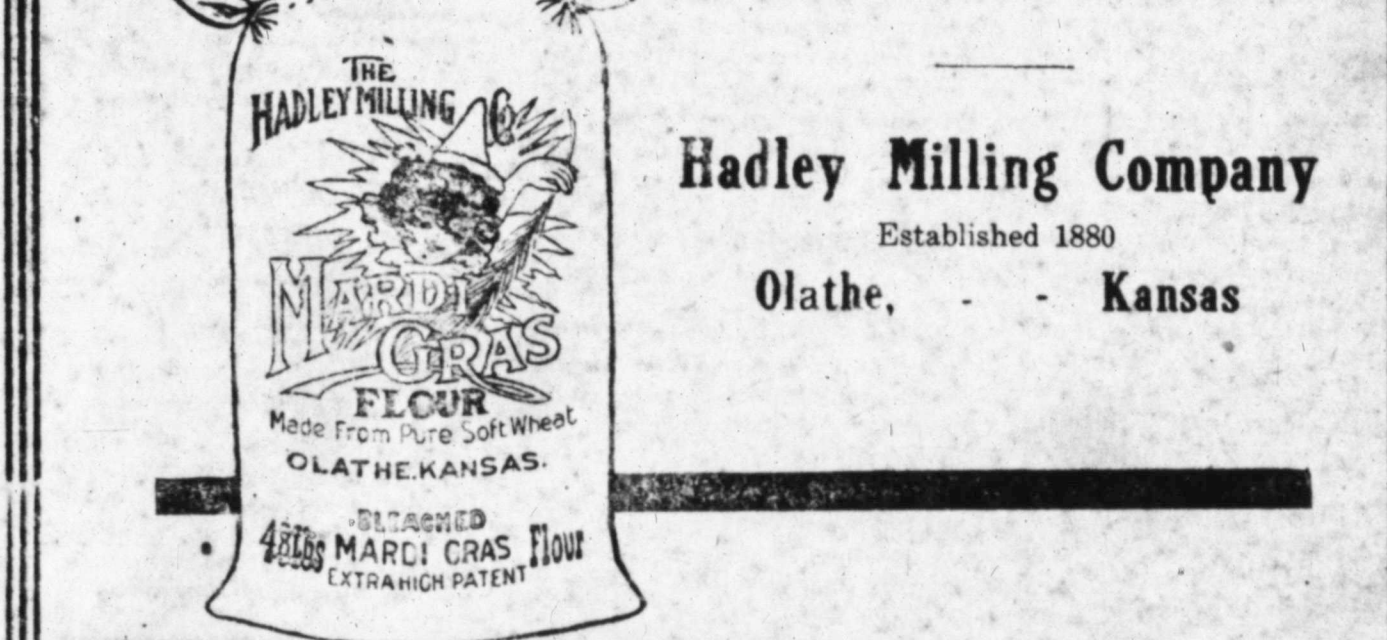

INTERCHURCH WORK

Banish the oyster supper as an essential money-maker in church circles. This a part of the program advanced in Nacogdoches and other Texas cities where the stewardship department of the Interchurch Movement has been adopted because it is felt that a better way has been found of providing funds for the preacher's salary or to plug a hole in the church roof or to send a missionary to India, Africa or China. This way is by means of enlisting Christian Stewards from the membership of the various churches. Rev. H. E. Beckler, Stewardship secretary of the Christian Church in Texas, has been appointed as the head of the Interchurch Movement in the Lone Star State and will have his headquarters in Dallas. His work for the movement will be to find means of appointing a stewardship chairman in every county in Texas which sent its representative to the recent Pastor's and Women's Training Conference held in Dallas.

For the purpose of carrying on this work and at the same time completing the program for Christian Service assigned by the Interchurch Movement, there will be a series of mass meetings held in practically all of the counties of Texas during the early part of April. Preliminary arrangements for these meetings were made last week in Dallas at two conferences held at the Oriental Hotel. It was decided to divide the state into twenty-six districts, placing eight counties or more in each of the groups and arranging for the appointment of teams to hold a one-days conference in each of the counties of sufficient population to warrant it. These teams will consist of four men and a woman, all of whom have been elected by the Interchurch Movement for their qualities of leadership in their respective communities.

In all these county mass meetings four programs will be stressed. The first is a spiritual resources plan which embraces an evangelistic and soul-winning campaign. The second is the stewardship enrollment of members who will set aside a certain proportion of their income for the support of the church, both at home and abroad. Third is a life enlistment service which is to increase the number of young men and women engaging in christian work, and fourth is the missionary education, which is

FARMERS IN GREAT MEETING

Secretary McKnight of the chamber of commerce returned at noon Sunday from Chicago, where he went to represent Texas at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Farm Bureau Federation. In discussing the purposes of this organization, Mr. McKnight said "The term 'Farm Bureau' is widely used in the North, Central and Eastern states to designate the farm organization that is undertaking to do for the farmers in those states substantially what the Nacogdoches Chamber of Commerce is planning to do for the farmers in this county. The Chicago meeting was merely a federation of such organizations on a nation-wide scale. The meeting was attended by 300 farmers representing twenty-eight states. The personnel of this gathering would compare favorably with the Texas Bankers Association, or with any organization or group of men to be found anywhere. Among the delegates I recall Mr. Cunningham, speaker of the Iowa legislature; State Senator Douglass of the same state, State Senator Gray Silver of West Virginia; and State Senator Holloway of Missouri. These men are actual farmers, and represent the highest type of American citizenship. They are men who, looking far into the future, see clearly the need of revitalizing rural life of our country is to finally attain its manifest destiny.

"The resolutions passed by this group of 300 farmers from twenty-eight states prove clearly that the forward-looking farmers of America are yet safe and sane in their views of what constitutes genuine Americanism. These resolutions condemn radicalism in all its forms, especially the growing tendency to lessen production by shortening the day's work.

"I was impressed with the fine spirit manifested by this body of American producers. They understand clearly that increased production is the one big outstanding need of the world today.

"New York state was represented by twenty-five delegates, Indiana by 23, Iowa by 36, Illinois by 21, and Texas—by one lone delegate. At the next meeting, which will be in November, Texas proposes to send a strong delegation. Nacogdoches county proposes to head this delegation too. Why shouldn't we?"
