### NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

"In '61 the war began  
And broke in '65—  
I tell you, boys, it warn't no fun  
I'm glad that I'm alive."

The Confederate States was a bona fide organized government made up of states that, in good form and faith, seceded from the United States because they could not get their lawful rights in the Union. They were overpowered and driven back, or rather suppressed. Then they were considered guilty of disloyalty, and therefore were disfranchised and classed as subjugated territory. They tried to get back by resuming their former features. Secession was denied them by the United States. They were never seceded, according to law. Then admission to the Union was denied them, and provisional government was placed over them. Loyal rulers were sent down to the South from the North to make the rebels behave. These were called carpet baggers, because they only brought their grips. They were to return home when they got tired of their oppressive jobs. They got up lots of trouble. They kicked out all the dirty rebels, and put good, loyal officers over them to make them be good. Decent voters were kept out. Negroes were voters, and they guarded the polls with guns. They were led by white men, generally strangers and tyrants. This was a sequel to the awful war, and its troublous times. Social and political corruption and devilry was abroad in the Southland. There were two companies of U. S. soldiers stationed in town to see that the so-called rebels behaved. These soldiers were from the holy North, and it took them two years to reconstruct the disloyal South. And this left the bad elements in power over the good.

The only way to resist these oppressive conditions was by a secret organization called the Ku-Klux-Klan. There was a Klan in Nacogdoches county, but few other folks knew it then. It did things but dared not tell. It made some evil deeds hide out. It meant well, but it sometimes made blunders, because it had to practice lynching.

One of these unfortunate Ku-Klux mistakes happened at Dixie, in the lower part of Cherokee county, about five miles north of the present railroad town called Wells, and on the west side of the Angelina river opposite what was called the Durst crossing, now Hinckley's.

Along the river at Dixie there were several abandoned plantations, having residences on the hills and farms in the adjacent valleys. The Confederate war had freed the slaves and dismantled the plantations, but the lands and negroes were still there. So when the war was over these premises were taken over by sundry farmers, some of them from Nacogdoches county. One of these was A. H. Morgan; another was John P. Davidson. Both lived very near Dixie. But there are few persons now living who can relate the story now being told. One of these is Major Stokes, who still lives

near there. Whig Rogers may know about it, and if Sam White was living he might tell.

An impudent and troublesome negro man there abused Col. Morgan, cursed and defied him and threw a rock at him. The Ku-Klux heard of it and came over one good old summer night to do honor to the aforesaid colored grandee. There was a thick settlement of negro residents, and an alarm was spread. The negroes armed themselves and waylaid the searchers, firing into them and wounding several—one, a Dr. Tinsley of Douglass, who was shot in the head and died. The noted Jack Diamond was along. He was afterwards sentenced to death for murder, but beat it by hanging himself in jail at Rusk. The Ku-Klux kept mum, but later they came back. They had been informed that a decent farmer at Dixie named Bryant had let the negroes have guns for the shooting. So they wanted to show their appreciation of him. They called at his home one lonely night. He jumped out of a window and escaped, as did his wife and children. It was dark and persons could not be seen. A school teacher named Hill had arrived at Bryant's that day from Appleby. He and the K-K-K were at the same door, not aware of who or why. He held the door till they forced it open, carrying him behind it. They thought he was Bryant and shot him dead. They also shot and killed a little boy, who ran beneath a bed, supposing he was Bryant. The Bryant family moved to Rusk at once, and there was no further disturbance. This happened in 1868.

### INVESTIGATING MURDER OF PRESIDENT CARRANZA

Mexico City, May 26.—Formal investigation of the part taken in President Carranza's death by Rodolfo Herrero and members of the Carranza party was recommended by the four commissioners Obregon and Gonzales named to investigate the tragedy. The commissioners' report alleges the facts they uncovered "prove a conspiracy prepared in advance by Herrero which inspired confidence in him by Carranza and ended in the president's betrayal."

The military officers and civilians captured at Tlaxcalantongo following the death of Carranza will be held prisoners here until Adolfo de la Huerta takes the presidential office. It is understood that he will decide upon the disposition of them.

### INCREASED FREIGHT RATES

Washington, May 24.—Increased freight rates of 30 43-100 percent in the Eastern territory, 30 95-100 percent in the Southern and 23 90-100 percent in the Western territory were advocated today by Chairman Howard Elliott of a subcommittee of the general rate committee of the Association of General Railway Executives.

The increase, Mr. Elliott said, is necessary "to meet the difference between 6 percent returns and property investment permitted under the transportation act" and the returns received. For the country as a whole, he said, the returns were slightly more than 1 percent. He said expenses had gone up 100 percent, while the revenues had increased less than 40 percent. He declared the railroad operators are as desirous of obtaining a fair wage adjustment for the men as to receive an increased revenue.

The \$1,700,000,000 additional revenue the railroads are seeking through increased freight rates does not take into account the increase in wages the Railroad Labor Board may grant the two million railroad employees, Mr. Elliott said.

### HIGH-BORN KITTENS

El Paso, Texas, May 25.—Lieutenant C. R. Evans, 12th aero squadron, was transferred from Fort Bliss to Douglas, Arizona, and he moved his effects in an airplane. On his last trip, Lieutenant Evans put his pet cat in his plane and sailed off for his new station in Arizona.

"When I landed in Douglas I found that my pet family had increased six members en route," Lieutenant Evans said.

### HUGE DEFICITS

Austin, Texas, May 26.—The State Control Board has virtually concluded the drafting of a bill carrying appropriations of approximately \$750,000, representing estimated deficiencies in the State Department and the eleemosynary institutions for the remainder of the fiscal year ending August 31, 1920. It is expected that the bill will be presented to the legislature Thursday.

### PAPER CHANGES HANDS.

San Angelo, Texas, May 24.—The San Angelo Standard has been purchased by Houston Harte of Boonville, Mo. J. G. Murphy, who, with W. A. Guthrie, deceased, founded the Standard thirty-six years ago, has retired from the business.

### E. H. BLOUNT CHOSEN A NATIONAL DELEGATE

A telegram was received Wednesday morning conveying the intelligence that E. H. Blount of this city had been chosen as one of the delegates from the Second District to the National Democratic Convention at San Francisco. The name of the other delegate from this district was not given.

It will be pleasing news to the friends of Mr. Blount, who regard his selection as a fitting recognition of his work in a former national convention and in behalf of democracy at all times. The writer found a well developed sentiment in favor of offering him as a candidate for congress two years hence. Everyone who knows him will agree that he is of "congressional size," and would make an honorable record in the national legislature.

### RECOMMENDED COL. HOUSE

Berlin, May 26.—Col. E. M. House of Texas was recommended to the German Foreign Office by von Bernstoff, German ambassador in Washington, when the former made his second trip to Europe early in 1916 as President Wilson's personal representative, according to letters from Bernstoff to Gottleib von Jagow, then foreign secretary. These letters were published here with other documents presented before the committee investigating President Wilson's peace proposal during the war. Bernstoff wrote: "The mission of Col. House appears to me to be desirable, especially as the United States is so poorly represented in Berlin. Col. House, who is wholly neutral, very discreet and deserving of confidence, should contribute much to the betterment of mutual relations."

### BOLL WORM DISPUTE

Austin, Texas, May 26.—Compromise efforts in the pink boll worm dispute will be attempted in a conference of all interests tonight. If prospects of a compromise develop, four members of the Federal Horticultural Board will be called in.

The house and senate were not in session.

### "STEAM ROLLER" APPLIED

Washington, May 26.—Declaring the "steam roller" was being applied on him, Secretary Daniels told the senate investigating committee that he would appeal to the full committee if Chairman Hale insisted upon putting into the record "an unfair and unfounded" statement as to the condition of the American warships when the war began. Before the secretary's announcement Senator Pittman, democrat, of Nevada warned Chairman Hale that he would protest on the senate floor against the character of the questions the chairman was asking Daniels.

### WOOL PROSPECTS GOOD

San Angelo, Texas, May 25.—West Texas sheep and wools are commanding the highest prices in the history of the industry and growers say the indications are that the spring wool crop in this section, estimated at between 8,000,000 and 10,000,000 pounds, will bring the producers between \$5,000,000 and \$6,500,000. Long twelve-months' wools have brought prices ranging from 65 cents to 72 cents per pound.

### MEXICAN PRESIDENT ELECTED

Mexico City, May 25.—Adolfo de la Huerta, who was elected provisional president of Mexico by congress late yesterday, will take the oath of office June 1, according to present plans.

General Ignacio Enriquez is leading a strong column of troops into Southern Chihuahua, where Francisco Villa, who recently announced his opposition to the new government, is operating.

The government has prohibited the sale of liquors containing more than 4 percent of alcohol.

### DEFIES NEW GOVERNMENT

El Paso, Texas, May 25.—Francisco Villa, bidding defiance to the newest government, again has become an outlaw among his own people.

### MEMORIAL SERVICES AMERICAN LEGION

The local organization of the American Legion is planning elaborate memorial services for Sunday afternoon, the purpose being to show proper respect and honor to all service men who served in the wars of the past as well as the late World War. It is earnestly desired that every ex-service man be present—Civil War veterans, Spanish-American war veterans and World War veterans.

The services will be held at Oak Grove cemetery at 4 o'clock. The program has not been completed, but the work upon it is progressing satisfactorily and it will be published in a few days.

Everyone is invited.

### H. L. MCKNIGHT DELIVERS FINE ADDRESS.

The following is from the Mount Pleasant Daily Hustler of the 19th inst.:

In response to an invitation of the Mount Pleasant Chamber of Commerce, Hon. H. L. McKnight, secretary of the Nacogdoches Chamber of Commerce and who for fourteen years was connected with A. & M. College delivered an address here Monday evening at the Methodist tabernacle on Commercial Club work, agriculture and the trend of the times. The object of the meeting was stated by H. A. Watson, who first introduced Col. J. B. Mayfield of Tyler, who in turn responded with a splendid talk on East Texas, her resources and possibilities. Col. Mayfield is a very enthusiastic East Texan. He believes in East Texas and her people and we love to hear him talk.

Mr. McKnight then introduced Mr. McKnight, the speaker of the evening, who was greeted by a fairly large audience and who delivered a masterful address on the things nearest and dearest to his heart—mainly the development of East Texas, better conditions in the rural districts, better farms, better homes and better education.

Mr. McKnight said many good things, true things, things that counted, for something. He pointed to the danger of people leaving the open country for the cities and towns, and the reason for them doing so, and the remedy to check it—conditions and advantages in the country as good as those found in the town.

### FIGHT OVER SUFFRAGE

Baton Rouge, La., May 26.—Announcement today of the plans of the rival suffrage groups seem to preclude immediate action in the Louisiana legislature on the resolution which, if adopted, would make Louisiana the thirty-sixth state to ratify the Anthony amendment.

### LEVER ACT GETS JOLT

Indianapolis, Ind., May 26.—Three sections of the Lever act were held unconstitutional today by United States District Judge A. B. Anderson, who quashed twelve of the eighteen counts in the indictment against miners and operators.

### SOLONS AT CONVENTION

Austin, Texas, May 25.—with the exception of the work of the joint committee investigating alleged pink boll worm infestation, which resumed its hearings today, no business was transacted by the legislature today, as a majority of the members have gone to Dallas for the State Democratic Convention.

### REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

San Antonio, Texas, May 26.—The Republican State Convention which met here today is in complete control of the faction opposing negro national delegates. They will elect delegates to cast the 23 convention votes and probably will discuss a full state ticket.

Early indications are that the negro delegates will hold a separate convention.

### BRYAN'S MOUTH GOES OFF

Washington, May 26.—William J. Bryan today took ylat issue with President Wilson on the question of an American mandate over Armenia, declaring in a statement that "any mandate is impossible."

### BEAUMONT TRADE TRIPPERS GET CORDIAL WELCOME

The Beaumont Trade Trippers were with us Tuesday evening, their special train arriving promptly on schedule time, 7 o'clock.

They were met at the station by a delegation of representative Nacogdoches business men and a number of ladies, led by Secretary H. L. McKnight of the chamber of commerce and Robert Lindsey, chairman of the reception committee. A sufficient number of cars had been provided to comfortably take care of the visitors and their hosts, and were driven to Rose Lake, where a get-acquainted meeting was held, followed by an address of welcome from A. A. Seale, who introduced Secretary McKnight, and this gentleman sustained his reputation of saying the right thing at the right time. Capt. I. L. Sturdevant, Prof. R. F. Davis and Mayor V. E. Middlebrook followed Mr. McKnight and emphasized the pleasure it afforded our people to meet the live-wire visiting boosters.

Responses were made by Messrs. E. K. Smith, Charles A. Bland, traffic manager for the Beaumont Chamber of Commerce, and W. G. Blanton for the Trippers.

Music and dancing enlivened the occasion, and a toothsome luncheon of ice cream and cake was served. The Trippers carry with them their own cornet band of eleven pieces, and these boys contributed much to the enjoyment of the occasion.

The gathering dispersed about 10:30 and the visitors returned to their train, which left at 11 o'clock for Center, the next stop scheduled for a visit.

### BOLL WORM INVESTIGATION

Austin, Texas, May 24.—While many legislators are leaving today for the state convention at Dallas tomorrow, the pink boll worm investigating committee began the probe of the alleged infestation in Southeast Texas with a number of witnesses already arrived. Sixty witnesses were summoned. C. L. Marnett, chairman of the federal horticultural board, arrived today to testify. Bruce W. Bryant, assistant attorney general, was assigned to aid the committee.

The house adjourned until Thursday. The senate, not having a quorum, recessed till tomorrow and will have to recess for today to day until a quorum is obtained.

### CAMPAIGN MANAGER QUIZZED

Washington, May 24.—Frank H. Hitchcock, manager for General Wood the first witness before the senate committee investigating presidential candidates campaign expenditures, told the committee he had no information regarding contributions to the Wood campaign; that he made it a condition upon joining the Wood forces that he would have nothing to do with the gathering of campaign funds. Mr. Hitchcock said that as far as he knew the largest sum spent by the Wood organization was \$15,000 in New Jersey. The next largest was \$12,500 in Maryland. He said in New York, "as well as a number of other states," the Wood supporters "financed their own campaign in their own way" without asking for assistance from the Wood organization.

### UNIFICATION RECOMMENDED

Des Moines, Iowa, May 24.—The committee report on unification of the Methodist Episcopal church with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was adopted at the general conference here. The report recommends a joint convention of the two conferences, not to exceed 400 members, to work out the details of acceptance of the unification plan.

## EXPLOITATION MUST GO

Any person in any walk of life who puts jealousy, hate and fear out of his life will be distinguished. All good things shall be his. They will flow to him.

Power gravitates to the man who can use it; and love is the highest form of power that exists.

If ever a man shall live who has infinite power he will be found to be the man who has infinite love.

Just don't think much about it, but lose yourself in your work. If your intentions are good, your actions will be right, also. It is said hell and heaven are not localities—they are states of mind.

Once we thought work was a curse; then it came to us as a necessary evil; and now the truth has dawned upon us that it is a precious privilege.

There is more joy in useful work than in the painstaking avoidance of it.

Creeping into the lives of men everywhere is the thought that co-operation is better than competition. We need each other, and by giving much we shall receive much. That old maxim, "Cast thy bread upon the waters," is a stern psychological law. Everything we give out comes back to us. Give out love and love returns. To prasp and grab and to seize is to lose.

We are reaching enlightened self-interest. And there is a strong setting of the social life toward useful effort and the elimination of the parasite. This comes through the knowledge that we can thrive through service and not through exploitation.

## FOR BETTER MEN IN OFFICE

"There are too many laws, a great many too many laws on our statute books, but if I had my way I would pass more. I would draft every man who at 50 years of age had a sufficient amount of this world's goods to care for himself and family throughout the balance of their natural lives into the service of the state and nation when and as might be required of him. Boys fresh from school, petty lawyers and professional politicians can not be expected to yield good government from their legislative deliberations. The legislature is the most important branch of government, excepting none. It makes the laws by which you daily live; it deals with your property and property rights, fixes your taxes, directs and controls your educational system and the education of your children. It rules most intimately your existence and circumscribes your actions, yet the legislative position, particularly in the large cities, is considered a 2x4 political office, hardly on the parity with the town dog catcher. Pick out your best citizen—he does not need to be an orator, nor is it necessary for him to be an oracle in parliamentary law and rules. If he is a man of common, hard every day sense, stands well and has the respect of the community in which he lives, and is a moderate success in his own affairs, depend upon it he will be nearly right on questions of legislation. Don't put him in a position of seeking a favor at the hands of the voters, but of doing a favor to the people of the district. Go out and elect him and send him to Austin. If every town in Texas will pursue that course, I guarantee that within five years time the discontent, restlessness and unhappiness existing, due to ill-timed and cumbersome legislation, burdensome taxes, poor rural schools, lack of teachers, wastefulness in disbursement of public funds, and ills of the kind growing out of legislative procedure, will have disappeared."

The above is from the opening Houston, candidate for lieutenant governor.

In this utterance, Mr. Davidson tells the people of Texas how to secure better laws and how to curb dissatisfaction, discontent and unrest. Elect men to office who can afford to be drafted for unselfish service—not men who practice office holding as a side line or who are in office for selfish business purposes.

Make the office more honorable by putting honorable men in office. Select good citizens for positions and get behind them with enthusiasm and earnestness; don't leave politics to politicians and then complain when things go wrong.

Mr. Davidson himself is a striking example of a level-headed business man who accepted the nomination for legislative position when called upon by the citizens of his county.

He has studied well the needs of his state and in his address at Groesbeck he makes many timely recommendations. He believes in fewer and better laws; he advocates improvements

in our educational system and urges better pay for teachers; is for economy of administration; for fewer bureaus and commissions, and strongly favors both woman suffrage and national prohibition.

Lynch Davidson is for the best interests of all Texas and will make Texas a splendid lieutenant governor.—Houston Chronicle.

## VILLA BOBS UP

Boquillas, Chihuahua, May 21.—Francisco Villa is yet a factor in Mexican affairs, as ready and willing to take the field against the new revolutionary forces as he was against Carranza, he told an Associated Press representative in his camp here today. He declared the successor of Carranza must fully satisfy his ideal of government before he would retire to private life.

## AN UNUSUAL HONOR TO TEXAS MINISTER

Fort Worth, Texas, May 20.—The Rev. Dr. James Burton Gambrell, personal scout of General Robert E. Lee, for the fourth time has been elected president of the Southern Baptist convention, the highest office to which a Southern Baptist can aspire. The honor is further enhanced by the fact that the unwritten law of the church is that a president may serve but three terms.

Dr. Gambrell, who received his fourth election at the recent Southern Baptist Convention in Washington City, has passed his 78th birthday. For the past ten years he has resided in Dallas as editor of the Baptist Standard, while, at the same time, he has acted as theologian of the Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Fort Worth.

During the war between the states he was a scout with the Confederate forces in Mississippi and Virginia and, finally, through noteworthy services, was attached to the personal staff of the Southern commander-in-chief. During his 78 years he has been scholar, soldier, editor, author, teacher and preacher.

Born in South Carolina, Dr. Gambrell, then a child, was taken to Mississippi, where the outbreak of the war found him. Enlisting in the infantry, he attained the rank of captain early in the struggle; was transferred to service in Virginia where he soon attracted the notice of General Lee. Shortly after the close of the war he came to Texas.

## WOULD STAY CONSOLIDATED

Austin, Texas, May 21.—The Texas Railroad Commission has announced receipt of official notification from the Interstate Commerce Commission that application has been made by the express companies merged into the American Railway Express Company during the war for permission to permanently consolidate. Express companies involved are the American, Adams, Wells-Fargo, and Southern.

The Interstate Commerce Commission notified the Texas commission that an investigation is to be made for the purpose of determining the matters involved in the application. The attitude of the Texas Railroad Commission on the proposed matter was not announced.

## FEW PLEDGED VOTES

Chicago, Ill., May 21.—With the democratic national convention a little more than a month away, no candidate has received as many as 100 pledged delegates. The number of un-instructed delegates thus far chosen is 587, leaving 242 delegates yet to be elected. Under the democratic rule a majority of two-thirds is required to nominate.

## MANY HAVE VIOLATED THE PURE FOOD LAW

Austin, Texas, May 21.—Three hundred and forty-seven dealers in Texas have entered pleas of guilty to charges preferred by representatives of the State Dairy and Food Commission, during the period September 1, 1919, to April 1, 1920, according to Commissioner R. H. Hoffman in fifteen cases trials were necessary to secure convictions.

The different charges which brought pleas of guilty are tabulated by Mr. Hoffman as follows:

Convictions were secured against fourteen dealers who offered food not protected from flies, dirt, etc., for sale, and one dealer for not selling full measures of gasoline.

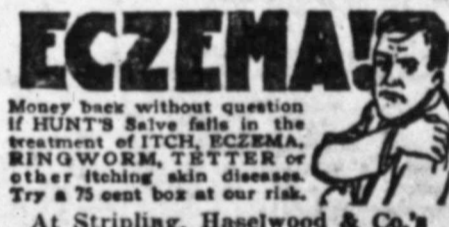

### TENT HOMES PROVIDED FOR AVICTED FAMILIES

Newark, N. J., May 22.—One hundred and ten families, evicted by landlords, are comfortably housed in Vailsburg Park today under tents loaned to the city of Newark by the War Department. It is a real Tentville whose denizens, although temporarily homeless, are as happy as could be expected in a community forced to live outdoors. It is expected that, before the end of the summer, 200 more families will have joined the little colony.

Captain Thomas W. Reilly, a machinegun man with a fine overseas record, laid out the place and gave each arrival a first home, first served choice of their canvas habitation. One of them was a young widow with four children. She received an order to vacate her apartment after failing to defeat her landlord in a lawsuit.

The city appropriated \$25,000 for the operation of the camp and Governor Edwards donated a big tent which, in the center, serves as a community kitchen. Army food from the municipal sales stations helps further to keep down the cost of living. The new settlement is provided with many conveniences including a sewerage system, running water, a laundry tent, equipped with tubs and stoves for ironing, shower baths and toilets.

The total cost of installing the improvements was less than \$500, according to Captain Reilly, the largest single item being \$120 for heavy insulated wire for electric lights. Soldiers and a number of city employees helped put up the tents which are 16x16 feet and lay the board flooring. The tents are boarded up three feet from the ground. Most of the inhabitants of Tentville have stored their furniture in prospect of better days and are sleeping on cots furnished by a local hospital. The "town" is laid out in eight streets with one main avenue bisecting them.

### GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP?

Washington, May 24.—Events of the next few months or weeks will determine whether government ownership of railroads will come again despite the popular opposition, Frederick Strauss of New York, warned the Interstate Commerce Commission today, contending that the main thing at present is to establish a feeling of security in the minds of investors.

### MOONSHINE STILL AND OPERATOR CAPTURED

Information reached the sheriff's office recently that an illicit distillery was in operation in the neighborhood of Cold Springs, in the eastern part of the county, and Saturday night Sheriff Woodlan, Deputy Hardeman and County Attorney King went out on an investigating tour. Suspicion pointed to Bill McRite, an dthe officers went to his home, on a place owned by D. M. McDuffie of Garrison.

They found McRite and two negro women in the house. McRite evidently was prepared for war, having two shotguns, loaded with buckshot, and a murderous looking knife handy. He had just made a "run", and supposed at first that his visitors were there to buy booze. He was finally persuaded to go to the smokehouse, where the liquor was stored, but upon arriving at the door his suspicions were aroused and he made a break to get away. Deputy Hardeman fired a shot in the air to halt him, but he was overhauled only after a stiff chase by Sheriff Woodlan.

The officers found two quarts of corn whiskey in the smokehouse, and this together with the still was brought to town along with the prisoner, who confessed that he had been operating the distillery for about eight months. He stated that he usually made two quarts at a "run", and had been selling it for \$5 a quart.

The still was a crude affair, consisting of a five-gallon oil can as a boiler and connected by a short piece of quarter-inch pipe to the receptacle. The pipe was run through a rude trough of running water, this miniature condenser yielding an output of about a gallon an hour.

Mr. McDuffie, on whose place the negro lived, was indignant when he learned that his premises were being used as a location for an illicit distillery, and offered the officers any aid in his power to secure the conviction of the criminal.

### TO SHIFT JURISDICTION

Austin, Texas, May 21.—A bill proposing to place gas pipelines under the jurisdiction of the railroad commission will be introduced in the house today by representative Cox of Taylor, who said the governor had assured him he would submit it.

### PROFITEERING DRUGGISTS

Austin, Texas, May 24.—Profiteering on whiskey by Texas druggists is charged in a statement by R. V. Nichols, special agent for the Attorney General's department, who has been investigating the situation in Texas.

Many druggists, he said, charge five dollars for a short pint of whiskey which his investigations indicate costs them only six dollars a gallon. The druggist gives twelve ounces, instead sixteen for a pint, and thus gets fifty dollars for a gallon of the liquor, he added.

State officials, he continued, are considering the question of filing complaints against some of these druggists or revoking their state permits to sell intoxicants.

Some physicians, Mr. Nichols added, are charging two dollars for writing a prescription calling for intoxicants and are writing as many as 23 of these prescriptions per day. Thus, according to these figures, twelve ounces of whiskey costs the consumer seven dollars.

### TO INVESTIGATE PINK WORM

Austin, Texas, May 21.—The house committee on agriculture today recommended the investigation of the pink boll worm situation by a joint session of the house and senate agricultural committee of 21 from the house and nine from the senate.

The Louisiana Agricultural Department wired that seed from infested parishes were shipped to the following Texas points: Houston, Beaumont, Snyder, New Braunfels, San Augustine, Fort Worth and San Marcos. No boll worm legislation is expected until the investigation is complete. Educational appropriation bills carrying approximately \$6,500,000 were expected to be introduced today.

The senate adopted the house resolution urging the Louisiana legislature to ratify the federal suffrage amendment.

London, May 21.—Persia has appealed to the League of Nations to protect her from bolshevik aggression. The appeal, which followed the landing of bolsheviks on Persian soil, came through the Persian foreign minister.

The Nacogdoches State Bank is the name under which it was chartered.

It is expected the bank will be ready for business within 30 or 40 days. The selection of a home is now engaging the attention of the organizers.
