They even talk of tariff duties to "exclude the flood of foreign goods," which is equivalent to depriving our debtors of the only means to to pay their obligations. Dr. Vissering of the Netherlands Bank pointed out at the financial conference in Brussels the consequence of the policies of isolation and selfishness which the Republicans are preaching. Those consequences would fall not only upon the European nations, they would fall heavily upon us. In their deunuciation of the Administration, of the Peace Treaty, of the League Covenant, all of the great works in which Mr. Wilson has been engaged, the republicans have let themselves be betrayed into declarations of policy which would bring political, financial and social ruin to other nations to which we profess friendship. We cannot believe that they understand what they are doing, for it is certain that the normal human mind cannot deliberately intend such consequences.

The campaign draws to a close. The republicans are jubilantly confident, the Democrats are justly apprehensive. Yet the whole course and outloog of the campaign could be changed, would be changed, if the Democrats could get the truth into the public mind, could make the people understand the immeasurable importance of the issues involved. Four yars ago in September Mr. Wilson was as surely beaten as the republicans now believe Mr. Cox to be beaten. Victory came to him through later changes in the political situation. The third of the amendments, relates to the compensation of public officers. One of its objects is to provide that definite salaries shall be paid to a large number of officers such as Sheriffs, Court Clerks, etc., who are now paid fees, and some of whom enjoy a much larger income than is received by the principal officers of the State. Another object of the amendment is to make it possible for the Legislature adequately to compensate a number of officials whose salaries are now fixed by the constituttion and at low sums. These officials are the Governor, Attorney General, the State Treasurer, Comptroller, Land Commissioner, Secretary of State, members of the legislature and Lieutenant Governor. The legislature is now free to fix the compensation of all other officers and has done so. 

HOLLANDERS OF OLD TIMES

Colchis, Caucasian Tribe, Free People Because They Had Always Command of the Sea.

The inhabitants of Colchis, set in the valleys of the inaccessible Caucasus to the northward of the Aslatc plains, were the Hollanders of anclent times. They were a free and barbarous people, but were invited to the cultivation of commerce by the vicinity of two seas which were formerly joined towards the north, and attained by means of it to a great degree of opulence which made them celebrated. Their territory of small extent lay on the eastern shore of the Euxine sea. The greater portion of it was marshy, and the atmosphere humid; they had frequent and heavy rains, a great number of channels intersected their plains, on the banks of which the dwellings of the people were placed, raised for the most part upon stakes. The natives of the country were corpulent and somewhat above the middle stature, and their language was hard of utterance and ungraceful. Their chief river, the Phasis, like the Rhine, lost itself in interminable sands.

Skeleton of Glant Wombat, Recently Found in Tasmania, Believed to Be 20,000 Years Old.

A complete skeleton recently discovered in the Mowbray marsh, on the far outskirts of the wild marshy regions of Northwest Tasmania confirms the No; we must have thoroughbred Poexistence 20,000 or 30,000 years ago of a giant wombat (one of the pouched animals peculiar to the Antipodes). The discovery was made by Mr. Lovett, a farmer, who was digging a drain into the swamp.

The skeleton lay buried in six feet of decayed vegetable matter resting on sand that was once the bed of a lake. Mr. Scott of the Launceston museum, examined and excavated the skeleton and expressed the opinion that the animal had lived perhaps more than 20,000 years ago, says the London Daily Mail. It is the only specimen yet discovered. In life the animal would be bigger than a mule, with marsupial approaching in size the Brontosaurus (which weighed 80 to 90 tons). It has long, bearlike tusks, and probably lived on herbs and was slow

The present-day wombat is a bur- ficially reported to the Bureau. rowing animal from two to three feet legs and very little tail.

Sugar Cane.

Sugar cane requires an abundance of sunshine and water and a deep, fertile soil. In planting the stalks are laid lengthwise in furrows, and each joint sends up a shoot, which later produces suckers. When ready for Yorktown, harvesting a field of sugar cane re sembles a corn field, but the plants are somewhat larger and there are no tassels and no ears. The stalks at this time have been growing about 12 months and have changed from green to reddish in color, while most of the lower leaves have fallen away. They are cut by hand with a long knife, Hearne, Marlin, Polytechnic. stripped of their leaves and carried on carts or small cars to the sugar mill



SAVE THE CHILDREN

Austin, Texas, Oct. 23 .- Nearly 20,000 children in Texas are exposed to tuberculosis every year. These figures are the result of research work of the National Tuberculosis Association. This statement was issude by the Texas Public Health Association

Research by the National Organization shows that at least one percent of the normal population of an Amer-i can community has active tuberculosis, and that an additional one percent has this disease in a relatively negative form. This would mean that Texas, with a population of 4,661,027, would have 46,610 people with the active disease, and the same number with it in a negative form. This is a total of 93,220 cases of the "white plague" in the state, according to the figures of the National Tuberculosis Association.

"In order to control the disease," said D. E. Breed, executive secretary of the Texas Public Health Association, "the anti-tuberculosis agencies of this country are advocating three definite policies: First, the prevention of infection, especially from adults to children; Second, the building of bodily resistance; and, Third, the cure and restoration of the curable to working efficiency.

"To carry out these policies we must discover the cases by means of tuberculosis nurses, dispensaries, clinics, private physicians and general education. Then we must work for hospitals and sanitoria to care for the cases. These things our Association and local societies are advocating to stamp out tuberculosis in Tex-

MEN NEEDED FOR ARMY

Recruiting for the Army of Occupation now on duty in Germany will be resumed of November 1. For the infantry 200 men are needed of whom 12 must be clerks, but only recruits of a high type, who can be quickly trained will be accepted. When 310 infantry racancies are thrown open on October 1 they will be filled up so quickly that these enlistments for Germany had to be closed on October 6. Major General P. C. Harris, the Adjutant General of the army says:

"The service in Germany has proved to be so attractive that the ranks there are always filled. Our chief difficulty is that regiments are apt to be over-enlisted before we can stop the recruiting officers from accepting more applicants, and we must send such men to the station for which they were accepted.

Equally popular is army service in Hawaii, and as a rule few recruits can be accepted for duty there. However, the 13th Field Artillery has left the United States for service in the Mid-Pacific, and enlistments for this regiment are authorized in orders issued today.

In the old army new recruits had no choice in the selection of a regiment, and could not name any particular station. In the new peacetime army a man may either pick his own regiment or designate the part of the world to which he wishes

Feeding Value of **Potatoes**

Co-Operative Extension Work AGRICULTURAL AND HOME ECONOMICS State of Louisiana.

Baton Rouge, La., October 9, 1920.

Mr. P. R. Perkins, Nacogdoches, Texas. Dear Sir:

This is to acknowledge receipt of yours of the 4th instant, in which you ask for data showing the relative value of sweet potatoes and corn in feeding hogs.

Experiments conducted by this stattion show that it takes three bushels of sweet potatoes to equal one bushel of corn in feeding value. Upon this basis the grower who argues that he can derive more from his potatoes by feeding them to his hogs than by selling them at \$.80 per bushel either does not know their feeling value or the market price of corn. The farmers of this state are receiving from \$.75 to \$1 per bushel for their corn. At the price of sweet potatoes, \$.80 per bushel, it would cost the growed \$2.40 to feed his hogs as against \$1 by feeding them corn. In other words it would cost him \$2.40 to get the same amount of gain from his hogs that \$1 worth of corn would give him. It would certainly pay him to sell his sweet potatoes and buy corn.

The foregoing is not intended to belittle the feeding value of sweet potatoes for they should form an important part of the hog's diet, especially when the culls can be left in the field and harvested by the hogs.


