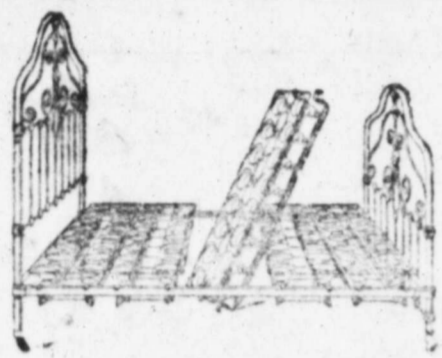

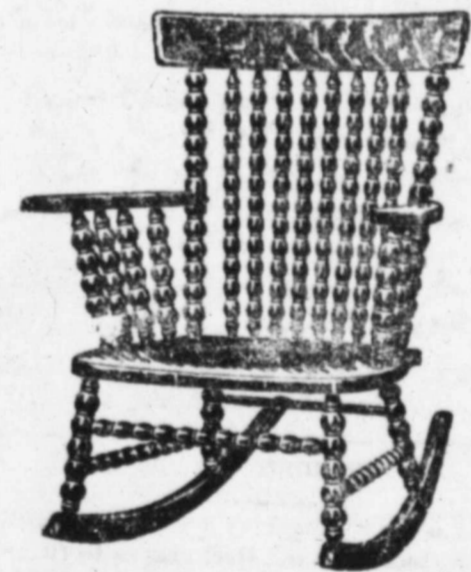

FOREIGN PRESS COMMENTS ON HARDING'S ELECTION

London, Nov. 4.—The London morning papers devote considerable editorial space to the American election. They dwell upon what they characterize as the decisive rejection of the present government's policy and express the opinion that the turnover gives prospect that whatever policy President Harding and his cabinet may adopt, will at least have a chance of acceptance by a congress strongly republican. The American elections on this occasion has a much greater interest for Europe than has usually been the case. The Times is "pleased to think that Mr. Harding will not be his own prime minister and foreign minister."

It regards the election as a distinct warning to bolshevists and extremists of all kinds.

The Morning Post compares President Wilson with Lenin. It says both are idealists with identical methods, though different aims, and thinks that "America's rejection of such autocratic idealism will bring relief to the world."

"Americans," adds the paper, "have decided, not in favor of strident and arrogant nationalism, but against prying and unworkable internationalism."

The Daily Chronicle admits that the battle raged around the body of the league of nations, but not in the sense that America is hostile to concerted measures to preserve peace, and believes that not the domestic problems loom large the average American desires above all things "a policy opposite a policy of adventure."

The Daily Mail says: "In electing Mr. Harding the American people declared emphatically for a spell of conservatism in home politics and cautious Americanism in the world outlook, the defeat of Cox condemns the League of Nations as constructed at Versailles. But, while Mr. Harding discards the league, he and his party are aware that the United States must sooner or later take their part in settling the troubles of the old world."

The leading British provincial news papers consider the election of Senator Harding to the presidency as an indication that the electorate is tired of what the journals call a "one man rule." The Liverpool Post says: "Senator Harding goes to the White House as a representative of a profound belief, long maturing among the larger part of the nation, that Wilsonism is alien to American traditions and that America should not entangle herself in the affairs of distracted Europe."

The newspaper expresses the opinion that the election of Senator Harding does not mean antagonism to the league of nations and believes "that America is searching in her heart of hearts for some method for achieving the august purpose of the covenant which she can approve without misgiving."

The Yorkshire Post considers it a good thing in the present difficult phase of its natural history that the United States should have elected the candidate it did.

"We believe we interpret European as well as British opinion," it adds, "when we say that an American government which stands for its country first, last and for all time, will be understood and appreciated in this old world of ours which has lost its illusions and is no longer in a mood to strain after visionary policies."

The Manchester Guardian says: "The main political motive for the electors' choice is by general assent, accumulated dislike for Wilsonism and not love of Harding nor his party. The national repudiation marks a tragic change from those weeks in the autumn of 1918 when the material power of America was deciding the World War and her foremost mind was leading the world towards such a peace as might have given us a tranquil, swiftly convalescent world instead of the present world's fair of spite, greeds and suspicions, between nations and disunion inside of them. The soiled, scared old world of international politics seemed to be on the eve of redemption on the day when the news came that Germany would surrender on the basis of Wilson's 14 points.

"In what proportion a want of dynamic genius in President Wilson and an irredeemable viciousness of spirit in other politicians contributed to darkening that opening prospect we can not yet tell. It is gone now. Europe is snarling, grabbing and jockeying in the old slime, while all the remaining effect of Wilsonism in America is the decision of the presidential election by an overwhelming balance of public antipathy to it. The story is that of one of the most pitiful of all failures in the execution of a task nobly conceived."

How the Frenche See It
Paris, Nov. 4.—Newspapers of this

city gave prominence to reports of the pathy for France.

Editors are unanimous in remarking that the election clearly condemns the policy of President Wilson and settles definitely the situation existing between the administration and legislative departments of the government. They assert the situation has "completely paralyzed the American international policy," and expresses conviction that the result of the election will in no way prejudice Franco-American friendship.

"By his love of order and the brightness of his character," declares the Matin, "Senator Harding deserves the confidence of the French people."

Mexican Comment

Mexico City, Nov. 4.—Reports of the election in the United States were given the entire front page of newspapers of this city. Only two journals, however, the Excelsior and El Heraldo de Mexico, ventured to speculate editorially on what a republican administration in the United States means to this country.

The former sees immediate recognition as one result of the election, and the other asserts Senator Harding's election "will not be an obstacle to good relations between Mexico American election, and publish many pictures of Senator Harding. The Excelsior devotes its entire front page to the successful candidate and his family. In their comment, the newspapers declare the election of Senator Harding was a triumph, gave him praise to his personality and recall he has always asserted great sympathy for the United States."

The Excelsior, which sees in the election a "personal rebuke" for President Wilson, asserts he now "can scarcely be expected to refrain from recognizing Mexico as a revenge against the republican senatorial majority, which in the past, has assumed an uncordial and hostile attitude toward this country."

El Heraldo rejoices that Senator Harding is not a "fire eater of the Senator Fall class," but asserts his statements regarding Mexico seem to be vague and "we are confused at judging his true mental attitude toward us. His election puzzles us, although we have faith in his ability."

Bryan Brays

Chicago, Nov. 4.—William Jennings Bryan in Chicago Thursday gave out a statement suggesting that "President Wilson should resign at once."

"Now that the American people have decisively declared against the league of nations as written by the president," said Mr. Bryan, "it would seem desirable to carry out the verdict immediately. This can easily be done."

"The president should resign at once and turn his affairs over to Mr. Marshall, on the condition that on the convening of congress in December,

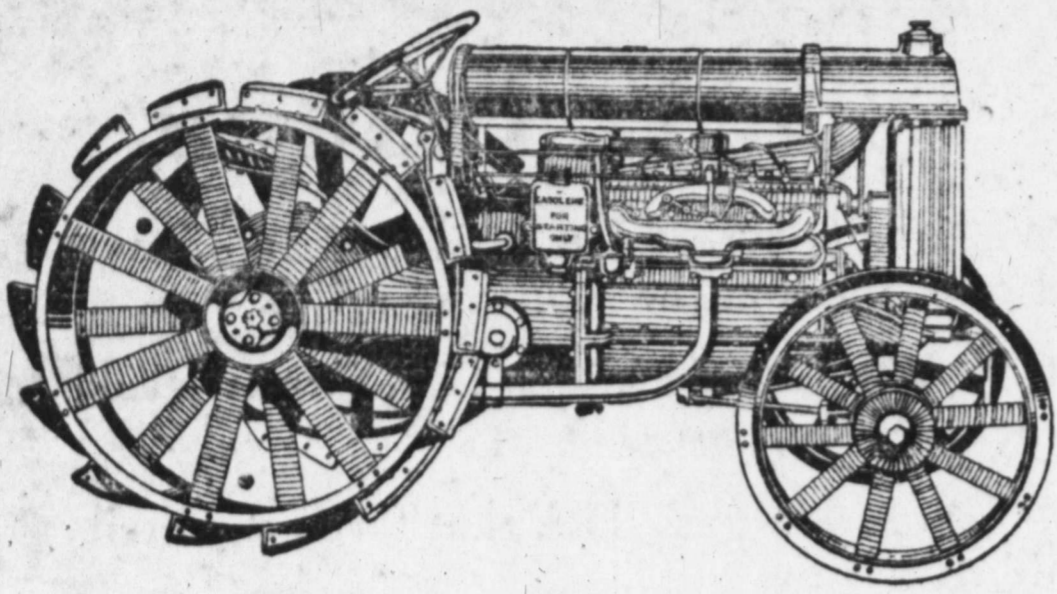

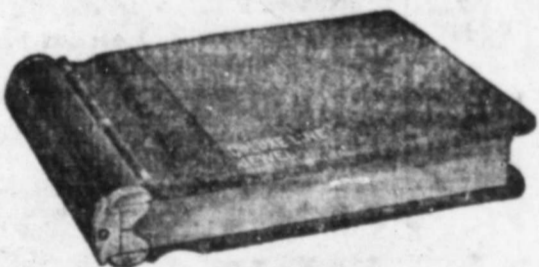
