#### ARMISTICE DAY

Armistice Day has recollections both tragic and pleasant. Its observance throughout the nation will be marked by processions, pageantry and patriotism. It will stir the hearts of men and women and make them throb fice and a matchless achievement on the field of arms.

Day when the splendid army of Americans in consort with their allies were beating back the enemy in the Argonne and elsewhere is to be exalted. Nothing quite like it has ever taken place and glorious and valorous as were the martial accomplishments of that rour, the hope of the world is that it may never come again.

Exc. of that Armistice Day is essentially a soldiers' and sailors' day, its annual observance would carry disappointment-regret that the military gains which these warriors made were not consolidated by their statesmen when their hou rhad come. The war was won and it is error to say that peace was not won. Both were victotories and yet the blessings of peace are being frittered away by the nation most conspicuous in both war and peace because its public administrators fail to know, as the fighting men know, that war is a horror that must not come again.

It must be humiliating to the men in whose honor this day is set apart and hallowed that their deeds are so little appreciated that nothing has been done, at least not enough has been done to make their suffering and sacrifices of those who have paid the full guarantee that the world war was the war to end war.

This failure is not the failure of the boys in blue and khaki. Responstbility lies with the men in broadcloth and top hats, the members of tibe United States senate, among others, who blasted the hope of the world for the nasty mess of political potstage they coveted.

The lesson in that is clear, that America should ever keep the gates open for every fit applicant who knocks at our doors. We must never come to fear that the immigrant who brings a fresh idea is necessarily dangerous. A fresh idea is the finest challenges thought. If right it is more priceless than precious gems.

FORMER PRESIDENT WILSON'S ARMISTICE DAY ADDRESS

Washington, Nov. 12.-Breaking the silence that with a few exceptions he has observed scrupulously since he went from the White House nearly three years ago, a broken man, Woodrow Wilson Saturday night broadcast to the world the fact that the months of his seclusion have not altered his conviction that American isolation from Europe is "shameful," and that it is America's duty to lead the world to peace.

It was a typical Wilsonian fighting speech that the former president radioed to his greatest audience-full of stinging criticism for those who frustrated his world peace program at the close of the war, and evangelistic in his appeal that America once more assume the position of leadership in world affairs.

"Cowardly" and "dishonorable" were but two of the terms which Mr. Wilson used in speaking of the foreign policy of America since the end of the world war.

"France and Italy," said the former president, "have made waste paper of the treaty of Versailles."

Mr. Wilson spoke briefly, but there was a sting in almost every word.

He delivered his brief talk while seated in his great arm chair in his study. The only persons in the room were Mrs. Wilson, his wife and Mrs. McAdoo, his daughter.

Recent Survey Shows One State Paid \$25,000 'n Year for "Repeaters."

Retarded school children in one midwestern state last year cost that state at the headquarters of the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, in St. Louis, after an investigation of the health of the school children in that state. These children were what are known as "repeaters." that is, children and had to be sent back to do over again the work that had not been successfully done

Only 3 per cent of these children were backward because of mental defects. The rest had physicial defects, easily corrected, but which acted on strength to do the school work. That the Red Cross never overlooks an opportunity for service was evidenced in the recent International Air Meet in St. Louis when aviators from all over the world, representing both military and civic organizations, competed for world famous trophies. With a daily attendance of close to 100,000 in the way of spectators, and a literal army of flyers, mechanics, attendants, laborers and the necessary personnel of such a gigantic undertaking, there was real work to be done by the Red

A first-ald station was established on the field under the direction of one of the Field Directors of the Southwestambulances with nurses and physicians were on duty all day. A territory of 173 acres had to be covered and ambulances had to be ready on instant call in case of an accident to the fivers. so that a real field service was maintained, with first-aid dressing station

and similar activities. The canteen was under the direction of the Women's Overseas League of St. Louis, and while the service of the First-Aid station and its personnel was given free to the public, the canteen charged for its service and the money thus raised was used for the disabled members of the league.

The St. Louis Chapter of the American Red Cross also furnished motor by 15 to 50 cents per barrel. cars and other transportation to bring the World War veterans from local hospitals o the field to witness the flying.

Although the percentage of accidents and other casualties was remarkably small there were enough of them to keep the Red Cross workers constantly busy for the entire week of the meet, and to gain the thanks not only of the individuals who were given attention but of the officials of the meet and the representatives of the United States and other governments taking part in the contest.
