TREY ELLIS, Parmer County's DPS Chief, has given a couple of programs locally in recent weeks, and Ye Editor was fortunate in hearing our "near cousin" who gave the program at Lions Club.

Trooper Ellis encouraged the Lions and other members of the community to be vigilant in wearing their seat belts, even if they were driving from "the house to town" and back.

"With the widening of Highway 60, our through traffic is picking up, especially truck traffic. Even though you're only going to be on the highway for a few blocks, that could turn out to be enough, or too much, in case of an accident," he said.

The DPS official pointed to a recent accident in Farwell involving teenage boys, in which a couple of youths were seriously injured. The youths were heading from high school down to a drive-in restaurant on the highway, when a truck made a wide right turn, crashing into their pick-up.

The two youths were both seriously injured. The passenger hit his head on the windshield and sustained a concussion and neck injuries, and the driver likewise had neck and back injuries, in spite of the fact that his air bag inflated.

"Neither were wearing seat belts. One of the boys' father stated that he was very good to use his seat belt whenever he was driving out on the road, but that since they were only going from the school downtown, the seat belts weren't that important," Ellis said.

Even most air bags are designed to work in conjunction with seat belts, the DPS spokesman said, pointing out that if you're wearing your seat belt, the air bag won't hit you with such a jolt.

The recent accident near Bovina involving the four teenagers was also mentioned by Trooper Ellis. He pointed out that all of the youngsters sustained severe injuries, and he felt that their injuries were worse due to the fact that all were ejected from their automobile and none were wearing seat belts.

"No one was killed, which was fortunate, but some of these boys will have injuries they will carry with them the rest of their lives," he commented.

The Parmer County law officer said motorists need to try to return to the style of driving which was practiced in this part of the country in earlier days, and "drive friendly." He encouraged drivers to always give turn signals when they were preparing to change lanes, to pass another vehicle.

"People need to drive defensively. Look down the road, and get the "big picture." Give other drivers the benefit of the doubt. Don't assume anything. When you assume what I'm going to do, that could make an 'ass out of u and me,'" he stated.

(Editor's personal note: For years, when our kids were travelling with us, when we'd pass the Hub intersection (southbound or northbound on Texas 214), Ye Editor has always slowed considerably, almost to a stop, looking both ways.

More than once, one of our kids has said "Dad--you have the right of way, why are you slowing up." We would reply that while they were correct, we had personally made several trips to that particular intersection to photograph fatal accidents for the paper. Some of the fatalities, we would point out, also had the right of way.)

This is what our trooper friend was emphasizing. Watch cars approaching your path from the side. Just because they have a stop sign, a blinking red light or stop light doesn't guarantee that they will stop. Something might happen to distract the other driver.

Ellis said that Texas led the nation in 1992 in railroad grade crossing accidents, with 482 crashes, 193 injuries and 59 deaths, and that Parmer County also had

Chamber Of Commerce Banquet Honorees Named

The 34th annual Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet was held on Thursday, March 24. The theme for the banquet was "Open A New Door In '94". Guests were welcomed by 1993 Chamber of Commerce president, Bret Whitten, and the master of ceremonies was Bob Owen.

He spoke about the problems we face with candor, as well as humor.

presented by Todd Ware, the 1994 Chamber of Commerce president, to the Bovina Volunteer Fire Department and the Bovina Ambulance Service for the work and dedication they give to the citizens of Bovina.

"The Heritage Award" was presented by D'Lynn Jamerson to Joe Looney, who came to Bovina when she was 14 years old. She is the wife of the late Reagan Looney and the mother of June McMeans, Howard Looney and the late D.C. Looney. She is the grandmother of ten grandchildren

and numerous great-grandchildren. She is the longest living member of the First Baptist Church and has taught Sunday School classes and is still very active in church. She has belonged to the Bovina Study Club for many years and was a charter member. She was also a charter member of Bovina chapter #839 Order of the Eastern Star. She plays bridge and 42.

Three Sections Of Grassland Burned

Almost three sections of CRP grassland was burned last week and firefighters from six fire departments were on hand to battle the blazes for five hours.

Volunteers were from Bovina, Friona, Farwell, Bootleg, Hereford, and the Rhea community. About forty-seven firefighters worked long hours to contain the fire in high winds.

Bovina's Fire Chief, Jessie Stone, said the fire trucks used 45,000 gallons of water in an attempt to fight the fires. They returned to their stations and made two trips each.

Stone also credited the 'good ole boys' who work on maintaining the county roads and said they had done a good job keeping the bar ditches clean and the roads in good shape. Had the fire jumped the road another eleven sections of CRP land would have burned, according to Stone.

The fire began on the Hollis Horton farm where cotton burs were piled and an internal combustion ignited them. Flames leaped twenty feet. The CRP land that burned belonged to farmers,

Ralph Shelton, Red McFarland, Jack Moseley, and the Johnson brothers of Muleshoe.

D. T. and Joan King said the fire really came close to their house. They said the inside of their home still smells strong from smoke. It would have probably burned had it not been that D. T. had already burned a large area around their place some time ago.

Besides all of the fire trucks there were two farm tractors, one with a chisom plow and one with a disc, also a county maintainer on hand to help.

Firemen from Bovina who fought the fire were Wes Cockerham, Ray Dela-Rosa, Raymond Rocha, Mark and Tony Engant, Mark McAllister, Andy Garza, Richard Bonham, Gene Hutto and Chief Jessie Stone.

Roy Hartzog was alot of help to the firemen because he brought them hamburgers, French fries and water. They really appreciated it!

Jessie said there were a lot of people who came to watch and several got in the way. Jessie said it could have caused trouble because the fire was very much out of control for a time. He asked that we remind people to please not come watch the firefighting efforts.

MASHED POTATO/ BROCCOLI CASSEROLE
1/2 cup water
1 cup instant mashed potatoes
1 cup milk
1 onion, chopped
1-10 ounce package frozen chopped broccoli
1/4 teaspoon dried leaf marjoram (optional)
1/8 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 cup shredded cheese
1 stick oleo

In large sauce pan, melt oleo. Add onion and cook until it is tender. Add 1/2 cup water and broccoli. Cook until broccoli is tender. Add 1 cup milk. Stir in

potatoes, cheese and seasonings. Serves 6.

PORK CHOPS
2 pork chops or shoulder steaks
1 onion, chopped
3 medium potatoes, diced
1/2 can green chilies, chopped
1/4 teaspoon comino
Salt and pepper to taste
2 tablespoons flour
3-4 cups boiling water
Brown steaks, onions and potatoes. Add chilies, seasonings and flour. Brown well together. Add water and simmer like gravy.

Jessie Sisk, a former resident of Bovina and Friona, shared her chowder recipe with us.

CHICKEN CORN CHOWDER
3/4 cup chopped celery

3/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup margarine
1-3/4 cups milk
1-7 ounce can whole kernel corn
1/2 teaspoon basil
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of black pepper
2 cans cream of chicken soup
Saute celery and onions in margarine until tender. Add milk, corn, soup and seasonings. Stir often until mixture is hot. Do not boil.

Addie Moyer, a former Friona resident who now lives in Mulshoe, contributed her SQUASH CASSEROLE recipe.

Cook enough squash to make two cups when drained with 1 small chopped onion. Add 1/2 to 1 whole can chopped green chilies, salt to taste, 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 cup bread or cracker crumbs. Pour into greased 1-1/2 quart casserole. Cover with slices of cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven until cheese is melted. This usually takes about 30 minutes.

A local resident, who is a native Frionan, Lunell McFarland Horton, contributed LIMA BEAN AND BEEF BALL CASSE-ROLE.

1-10 ounce package frozen lima beans
2 or 3 slices bread
1/2 cup milk
1-1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 egg, beaten
1 clove garlic
1 pound ground beef
4 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup water
1 cup sour cream

Start oven at 350 degrees. Cook lima beans as directed on package. While beans are cooking, soak slices of bread in milk in a small bowl. In another bowl, mix 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper and finely grated or mashed garlic. After bread has soaked a few minutes, squeeze out any excess milk.

Mix bread mixture, ground beef and beaten egg together and shape into small balls--about the size of a walnut. For best texture, handle balls as little as possible. Fry in one tablespoon butter until brown on all sides, then transfer to medium size casserole dish. Pour water in skillet in which meat was fried. Stir well and pour over meat balls.

Now, season lima beans with remaining salt, pepper and butter and add to casserole. Bake 30 minutes, then spoon sour cream over the top and bake another five minutes. Serve straight from the oven. Sprinkle with paprika. Serves 4.

ASPARAGUS CASSEROLE
2 cans asparagus
1 can cream of mushroom or golden mushroom soup
1 can mushroom pieces--do not drain
Crackers
Grated cheese

Mix asparagus, mushrooms and soup together. Layer mixture with crumbled crackers and grated cheese. Top with finely crumbled crackers and grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees until bubbly.

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Loans Are Available For Rural Counties

Loans will be available in

The closing date for filing an economic injury disaster loan application is June 8, 1994.

The program covers businesses which are without credit elsewhere. The interest rate available is four per cent with a maximum of thirty years allowed for repayment.

The Small Business Administration provides assistance to small businesses which have sustained substantial economic or physical injury resulting from natural disasters.

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
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Facts About The **BIBLE** BY JOHN LEHTI

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Where Did Jesus Go Between His Death And Resurrection?

As we celebrate Easter, let us consider what happened to Jesus between the moment of His death on Good Friday and the time of His resurrection on Easter Sunday. It is a popular concept for many evangelists in their preaching to say that during this three day period, Jesus suffered in Hell for us. But is that a true assessment of what the New Testament Scriptures state? I think not.

Yes, Jesus did suffer the agonies of Hell for us, both in the Garden of Gethsemane before His arrest and upon the cross as He died. But I do not believe He went to Hell itself. Let me explain.

Luke 23:46 and John 19:30 both confirm that the moment before Jesus died on the cross He prayed loudly, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit. And when He had said this, He breathed his last. "It should be remembered that this was not a statement of defeat, but of victory and release. He had already given the victory shout previously: "It (God's salvation plan) is finished (brought to completion or fulfillment)!"

"Into your hands I commit my spirit" was a quote from Psalm 31:5, and a popular bedtime prayer for Jewish children, much like our modern, "Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep...." It shows us that Christ died not in fear or defeat, but rather in faith and confidence.

This final prayer also points to the fact that His death was voluntary and willing. No one took His life from Him; rather He gave himself freely for our sins. Actually, He prayed, "Father, I deposit my spirit into your safe keeping until I take my physical life up again." Matthew 27:50 literally reads, "He dismissed His spirit."

Herchel H. Hobbs, noted N.T. scholar, states, "When He had finished His work He bade His spirit depart. King all the way! No man took His life from Him; He laid it down Himself!"

"At that moment," Matthew recorded, "the curtain (veil) of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook and the rocks split" (NIV). This meant that by His atoning death for our sin(s), signified by the writer of Hebrews as His torn flesh (Hebrews 10:20), Christ opened the way into the heavenly Holy of Holies, into the presence of God by His shed blood.

We know that Jesus' body was laid in a tomb where it stayed until its resurrection the first Easter Sunday morning. But where did Jesus' spirit go after He dismissed it?

The idea that if Jesus went into Hell is taken from Psalm 16:10 (quoted by Peter in Acts 2:27 and 31) and 1 Peter 3:19-20. Let's look at the Psalm passage first.

Psalm 16:10 in the old King James Version reads, "For thou wilt not leave my soul in hell; neither wilt thou suffer thy Holy One to see corruption." The KJV translation of Acts 2:27 & 31 in the New Testament also uses the English word "hell." But "hell" is a poor translation from either the Old Testament Hebrew or the New Testament Greek. Many modern translations, such as the New American Standard Version said the New King James Version, uses a more literal rendering: "Sheol" in Psalm 16:10 and "Hades" in Acts 2:27 and 31. (The New International Version still translates both passages using "grave," but notes the literal word in footnotes.)

"Sheol" in Hebrew thought was the abode of the dead for both the righteous and the wicked, the

nether world. David, in Psalm 139:8, makes it plain, however, that even in "Sheol" one cannot escape from the presence of God.

In the New Testament, the Hebrew concept of Sheol is "Hades." Although translated in the King James Version as "hell," "Hades" is not the same as "Gehenna," the word Jesus used for the actual place of fire and brimstone, as in Mark 9:43, 45, 47. In Jesus' story of the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31), the rich man upon death went to "Hades." Hades in the New Testament usually seems to speak of the abode of the wicked dead, and is a place of torment. But it is not "Hell" or "Gehenna," the place where Jesus warned that "both soul and body" of the wicked will be destroyed (Matthew 10:28).

When Jesus died on the cross, his human spirit, still in God's care, went into "Hades," the abode of the dead, not into the devil's Hell (Gehenna). 1 Peter 3:18-20 seems to indicate the same, although this is one of the hardest to be understood and most disputed passages in the New Testament. But Jesus did "taste death" and "through death...rendered powerless him who had the power of death, that is the devil" (Hebrews 2:9, 14).

Some time before dawn on Easter Sunday morning, Jesus' spirit returned to the tomb and re-entered His body. He lives as risen Savior! Forty days after His resurrection, He ascended into heaven (Acts 1:9-11). His death

and ascension into Hades knocked the lock off of death's door (see Matthew 27:52-53), freeing the spirits of the Old Testament saints, and proved Christ's authority and Lordship over death once and for all (symbolized by the keys to death and Hades in Revelation 1:18).

Jesus had triumphed over Satan, his evil powers, and death, making an open display of their defeat by His victory on the cross (Colossian 2:15). The spiritual battle was won in Gethsemane and at Calvary, not in Hell. The hell He suffered was when He took the sins of a lost world upon Himself. 2 Corinthians 5:21 states: "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." Jesus' hell was when for an instant God turned away from the sin that covered His son, and Jesus cried, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46) The true agony of Hell will be eternal separation from the presence of God (see 2 Thessalonians 1:9).

When He ascended to Heaven, Jesus took the spoils of victory with Him, the spirits of the saints set free. Therefore it says, "When He ascended on high, He led captive a host of captives, and He gave gifts to men" (Ephesians 4:8).

Jesus entered into the presence of God, the heavenly Holy of Holies, as our great High Priest as implied in Hebrews 9:11-14, 24-25. This is consistent with Leviticus 16:15-17, the Day of Atonement, when the High Priest of Israel

entered the Holy of Holies to make atonement for the people. The Old Testament sacrificial could not save from sin, but pointed to Christ as the coming Savior (Galatians 2:16).

As risen and ascended Savior, Jesus now intercedes on our behalf before the Father in Heaven, and will continue to do so until His return. Because Christ lives, the truth of Easter, we who believe in Him and receive Him as Savior and Lord live also. Death does not have the final word!

This just never makes any sense at all to me," he said, pointing out that it takes a train from a half mile to a mile to stop, depending on its speed and size of the train.

The trooper encouraged area drivers to use safe driving habits and to teach their children some of these things when they are learning to drive.

FmHA To Elect New Committee Member

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5, 1994 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Thomas S. Taylor said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Taylor said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An

old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Taylor said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 109 Third Street, Farwell.
