

Tonight Is Ranger Night at the County Fair

BATTLE OF LENINGRAD RAGES WITHOUT EITHER SIDE CLAIMING GAINS

A battle raged without definite advantage to either side at Leningrad today, and at the gateway to the Russian Crimea as new outbreaks of armed resistance and unrest disturbed Nazi rule in the Balkans and in Scandinavia.

A Nazi spokesman in Berlin revealed that 2,000 German regular troops had been dispatched to aid pro-Nazi Serb troops in attempting to quell spreading Anti-Nazi outbreaks in Yugoslavia and which were said to be centered principally around Sarajevo, scene of the assassination of Archduke Francis of Austria, which touched off the first world war.

The spokesman said that reports that Italy had been forced to employ an entire division of regulars in fighting to put down patriot activity was "exaggerated." Nazi reports seemed to indicate fairly large-scale anti-Nazi guerrilla activities in the Balkans. Moscow dispatches said that several sectors of Russian counter attacks, with infantry, tanks, armored trains and cavalry had pushed back the enemy, as much as six miles in one sector of the Leningrad front.

But, it admitted most intense fighting and highest casualties, without claiming any definite change in the progress of the battle generally.

Nazi spokesmen said that the Germans had broken the back of the outlying Russian land and naval gun resistance, but that the inner fortress of Leningrad was fighting furiously.

Some Employers Fail To Include a Workers' Statement

ABILENE, Texas—Complaints received from workers indicate that some employers are not familiar with the requirements that a statement of wages paid must be given to each employee, according to W. O. King, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Board.

"The Social Security Act provides that every employer shall furnish a written statement to each of his employees, in a form suitable for retention by the employee, showing the amount of wages paid," Mr. King said.

No special form is prescribed, but the statement should show the employer's name, the employee's name and account number, the total wages paid, and the amount of tax deducted. The statement may be given for any period not exceeding one year; if given on each pay day, the date should be shown, but if it covers more than one pay period, the statement should show the period of time covered. When a worker's services are terminated for any reason, a final statement covering all wages paid since the preceding statement must be given by the employer at the time of the final wage payment. Willful failure of any employer to comply with these requirements makes him subject to a penalty of not more than \$5.00 in each case.

Mr. King concluded, "Employees should take care to keep accurate statements. Monthly retirement insurance after age 65 and insurance payments to the family in case of death are based on total wages received by a worker. In case of discrepancy in the wages reported, the wage statements are good evidence to prove the correct amount of wages received."

INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED UPON SOLDIERS

The 88th district court grand jury late Wednesday returned indictments for robbery with firearms against four United States soldiers, who, on Sept. 15th, are alleged to have held-up and robbed W. T. Luton, proprietor of a cafe and filling station at Scenic Point just east of Ranger.

The quartet composed of Walter Sakatis, Chicago; Roy Rankin, Tacoma, Washington; J. A. Stinebaugh, Greenville, Texas, and Audrie McBride, Klondike, Texas, escaped from Camp Wolters at Mineral Wells just a few hours prior to the Scenic Point holdup. The men were arrested just after noon Sept. 18, near Cross Plains by Texas Rangers, assisted by members of Sheriff Loss Wood's force at Eastland and other peace officers of this section.

Brought to Eastland the four men were placed under bond in the sum of \$10,000 each following charges of robbery with firearms, and car theft filed against them by District Attorney Earl Conner.

District Attorney Conner stated Thursday morning that the men were being held in the Eastland County jail, having failed to make bond would be fixed by the court.

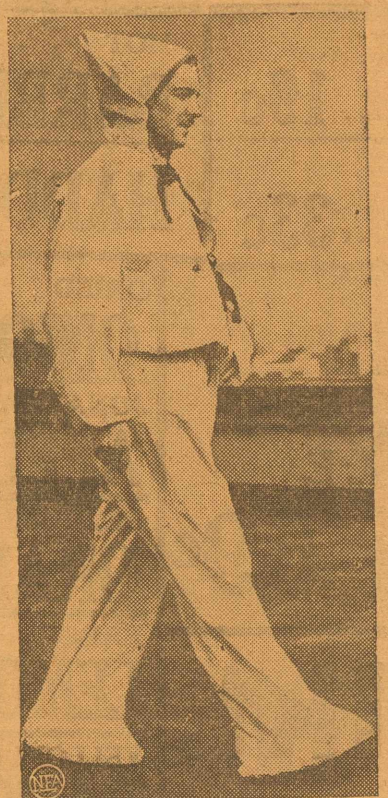
Conner also said that he expected to bring the men to trial within the next ten days.

Dust Bowl Terror Soon To Be Only An Old Wives' Tale

AMARILLO, Texas—Terrors of the dust bowl will soon be old wives' tales if the U. S. Department of Agriculture keeps up the good work.

The dust is being settled in the Southern Great Plains. The Soil Conservation Service is winning the battle against the "black blizzards" according to reports out of the wind-gripion region. Reorganized farms are doing the trick.

The farms are large enough to support the average family and allow diversified farming, a major factor in the conservation plan. Prior to the expansions, farms were so small that a continuous planting of wheat or other cash crops was necessary to keep the farmers in jeans. Land with a deficiency of moisture should have been seeded with wind-resistant sorghums.

The region may now be sown with proper crops each year, as the farmers have enough individual acreage to make a living. Livestock production is expected to increase with the release of fields from a steady diet of wheat for the raising of fodder.

The program began shortly after the migration of the early 30's, following the severe dust storms and drought. The land was left free for reorganization into more extensive holdings for the die-hards.

Recent experiment and research have installed coordinated conservation practices, and milled down the soil with units of 320 to 640 acres. Under the present plan, these units are owned by the operators. Additional 640 to 1280 acres are leased from non-resident owners for a five to 10-year period.

Nearly Half of The People Will Seek Licenses On Oct. 1

AUSTIN.—Nearly half the people in Texas will start a stampede for new drivers licenses Oct. 1.

There's really no need to get in a hurry about it, State Police Director Homer Garrison explained today. From Oct. 1 until Dec. 31, old licenses numbered from 1 to 450,000 will be renewed.

From Jan. 1, 1942, until March 31, those numbered from 450,001 to 900,000 will be renewed. Those numbered from 900,001 to 1,350,000 will be renewed between April 1 and June 30.

Any license numbered from 1,350,001 upward will be renewed between July 1 and November 1.

Here's the procedure for getting your new license. Obtain an application form from any Highway Patrolman or Drivers License Examiner, or by writing directly to the Department of Public Safety in Austin. The forms will also be available from police and from sheriff departments, banks, and other public places.

Either print in ink or use a typewriter to fill out the application, enclose a 50-cent money order or cashier's check with it, and mail it directly to the Department of Public Safety, Austin. The new license, good for two years, will be mailed to you from Austin.

Persons renewing licenses will not have to take an examination unless they have a bad record of traffic violations or collisions. But if you fail to renew your license in the stipulated time, you will be liable both to arrest for driving without a license and an examination.

NEW STORMS DO DAMAGE IN NORTH TEXAS

As the Gulf Coast region of Texas dug out after the worst hurricane in recent years, a new wave of wind, rain and electrical storms hit North Texas today and left in their wake millions of dollars in property and crop damage, and at least three dead.

The new death toll added to seven who lost their lives in the Gulf Coast hurricane, brought the total dead from storms in the past few days to 10, as a result of three days of beleaguering weather conditions.

High winds, rain and lightning killed one in Dallas, one in Fort Worth and one in Burkburnett last night and laid down late North Texas crops, unrooted trees and blew the roofs off many buildings in the three cities.

126-Pound Snake Proves Just a Myth

COLLEGE STATION.—The Loch Ness sea monster and the 126-pound snake at Texas A. and M. College museum have one thing in common: both are imaginary.

Persistent rumors that the snake is on display at the museum have brought many visitors, who are sent away disappointed. The process began several weeks ago and has the museum staff in a stew. All efforts to trace the reports to their source failed.

The first visitor to inquire after the snake said he read about it in a Houston newspaper. He said the story was that Negro found the huge reptile near Navasota, was bitten by it and died; that it was killed with dynamite and was a water moccasin weighing 126 pounds.

Files of the Houston paper were checked, but no such article was discovered.

A few days later, other visitors said the snake had been seined out of the Navasota river by two Negroes who were bitten and died. Another version was that the snake bit a small child, who survived.

One visitor said he had read a story that the snake was being prepared for display by the Aggie museum. Dr. O. M. Bell, museum curator, said: "The cottonmouth or water moccasin is not a large snake and none has been received by the museum at A. and M. So far as can be determined, the story has no basis of fact."

Ranger Negro Is Indicted By The 88th Grand Jury

Pearl Mayberry, Ranger negro, was indicted by the 88th district court grand jury Wednesday on charges of felony theft.

Mayberry, is alleged to have stolen money from W. S. (Uncle Bill) Harbin, at Ranger, and to have stolen towels, bed linens and a number of other items, which were recovered.

Following the filing of charges against him Mayberry gave bond in the amount of \$750. District Attorney Earl Conner Thursday morning, however, requested that Mayberry again be taken into custody pending the making of a new bond, the amount of which had not been set, following his indictment by the grand jury.

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 25.—Gov. Coke R. Stevenson leaves tomorrow for a week end visit in the Panhandle after Gov. Ralph Carr of Colorado invited him to "Come and get Pike's Peak," which Texas won on a football game between the governor of Colorado and governor of Texas several years ago.

He would not comment on whether the Panhandle visit might be one jump on his way to get the mountain.

Odd Techniques Mark Burglars

HARTFORD, Conn.—Burglars can be divided into two classifications, the "strictly-commercial" and the "screwball" variety, according to a Hartford insurance company which has paid plenty to know.

The "strictly-commercial" burglar concentrates on money and wastes no valuable time or effort on whimsy. The "screwball," on the other hand, may do all kinds of irrational things. Sometimes he will break into a house under the most difficult and hazardous conditions only to ignore valuables and steal some trivial object that catches his eye. He may take only a few drinks, a change of clothing or a necktie that wins his sartorial fancy. Some of these unpredictable burglars have been known to break into a house, take a bath, a nap, raid the icebox and the wine-cellar and then depart with only a pocketful of choice cigars as loot.

A variation in the commercial type of burglar with a flair for whimsy. One of his favorite tricks—and one worth remembering to avoid being victimized—is to send the occupants of the house he plans to rob, tickets for a show. He encloses a note reading, "Guess you sent these." The victims are glad to receive the free tickets and feel sure that the donor will make himself known eventually—which he does.

While they are safely out of the house attending the performance, the burglar has three hours in which to ransack the place. Usually the home owners return to find a note pinned to a lamp shade or mirror reading: "Did you enjoy the show?"

Householders can double the protection already provided by police by following a few simple precautions throughout the year; but especially during the vacation seasons.

Locks Are Important

- 1—Use approved types of door locks and window catches.
- 2—Make sure doors are locked whenever the house is left—even if only to work in the backyard.
- 3—Never leave the house for an evening or for a weekend without disguising it to appear as if occupied. Newspapers and milk should never be allowed to accumulate on the porch, window shades should be in a normal position, and if the lawn is to be of any length, arrangements should be made to have the lawn mowed. A light should be burning if out for an evening.
- 4—Notify the police if the premises will be vacant for a long period.
- 5—Keep a list of serial numbers of bicycles, watches, binoculars, guns, cameras, typewriters, and other items that might be easily converted to cash in a pawn shop.
- 6—Conceal your daily routine from tradespeople, deliverymen, repairmen and others that might be tempted to burglarize. Never leave the house while a stranger is on the premises.

Neutrality Act Repeal Is Sought By Sen. McKellar

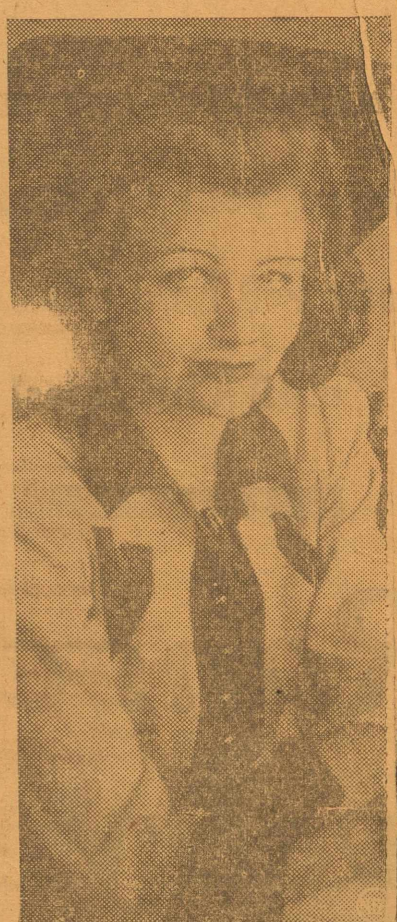

All the equipment, both in the funeral home, the preparation room and throughout the establishment are entirely new. A Superior-Pontiac combination ambulance and hearse has arrived

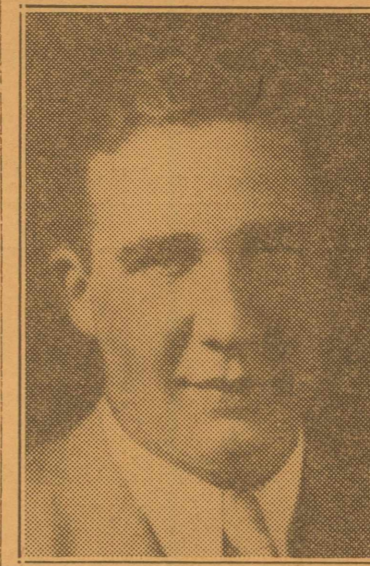
from the factory in Ohio, and is now ready for service at all hours, both night and day.

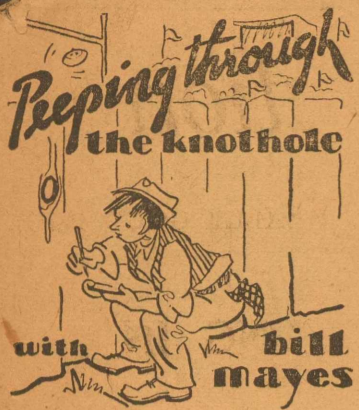

from many who are somewhat doubtful about the outcome.

Tuesday the Bulldogs got a light workout because so many were on the ailing side from minor injuries. Then later Tuesday Coach Jennings carried around about 40 pounds of car tags with the Bulldog schedule on them, and passed them out to nearly everyone who was interested. He had no trouble getting rid of them.

We heard recently that a six-man football game might be played here sometime the latter part of October. There is an attempt being made to get one of the Caddo games transferred here for one Thursday night.

Personally we would like to see such a game. We have never seen one, and had threatened several times to go to Caddo for that specific reason. But we never got around to it. If it was right here

in our back yard, so to speak, we would go. And I imagine there are a lot of others the same way, who would go as much out of curiosity as anything else.

There may be something to that six-man game. It is gaining favor rapidly in Texas among the smaller schools, which cannot put 11-man teams on the field. Those who have seen the games state that they are about as interesting as the 11-man game, have all the thrills and excitement and just as good plays.

Ranger has promise of having the largest high school band in its history, with 70 pieces this year. From our easy chair we can hear the drum thumping every afternoon as they work out up the street, practicing the marching maneuvers that make a band so colorful at a football game, in a parade or anywhere else.

Tonight the entire band goes to Eastland to take part in the Ranger-Night program at the Eastland County Fair. Then Friday night they all go to Weatherford for the game there.

A number of new uniforms have been ordered, so we have been told, and it was hoped they would be in for that game. 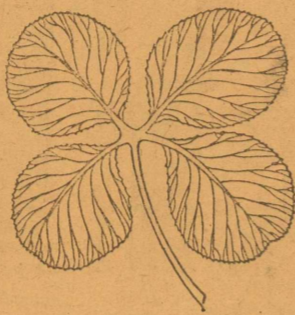
DOVES MAKE RECORD FLIGHT

College Library Build Up Quickly By a Librarian

DALLAS, Tex., Sept.—Two years ago, officials of Dallas College called in Miss Lillian Thompson, who reorganized five libraries in China. They offered her a similar job here. Miss Thompson took stock. She

found 50 books and a library fund of \$2.69. College students returning to classes this fall will have a choice of 1,558 new books and many old ones. Whereas the library at the start circulated only three books nightly, it now distributes more than 100 a night.

A chance remark started Miss Thompson on her career as librarian extraordinary. A teacher for 11 years in Dallas schools, she had accepted a job in the American school at Shanghai, China. In 1922, she joined the faculty of the University of Shanghai.

"One day, I went to the library for a book," she related. "I looked long and hard for it, but no luck."

At a dinner party that night she expressed herself: "I wish the faculty would let me take over that library; I'd see that books could be found."

The remark was overheard by the secretary to the university president. Soon, Miss Thompson was elected librarian, unanimously

She directed the library for 15 years, seeing it expand from 5,000 volumes to 105,000. During frequent leaves of absence, she studied library science and eventually took a degree in that subject at the University of California, Berkeley.

She reorganized and recatalogued four other Chinese libraries, three of them for branches of the university and one for the North China branch of the Royal Asiatic society.

China underwent its greatest economic and educational expansion during Miss Thompson's stay. Eighteen large universities opened their doors in one decade.

there are now 140,000 miles of such roads graded, graveled, surfaced or in some state of improvement.

"I do not think the state of Texas is going to abolish its rural school program," Stevenson said, discussing the road program. "If we are going to have good rural schools and school bus service we have to provide good country roads. There is no point in providing schools that the children cannot reach in bad weather."

The system is also sought for connecting farms and ranches with the present improved highways. It is called variously a "lateral road system" and a "farm to market road system." At present, lateral roads are built and maintained by the counties. Under the new plan, they would have available the engineering experience of the state highway department and the most construction specifications approved by the department.
