Change in Quarantine Line.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 11.—Important changes in the location of the cattle quarantine line in Texas and Oklahoma will be made by the Agricultural Department in the near future. A special telegram from Washington to the Daily Drivers' Telegram states that the changes have not only been decided upon, but that circulars announcing them are now in press, and will be distributed early next week. In Texas the quarantine line will be moved westward one entire row of counties, taking in the following counties now outside the quarantine district: Tom Green, Irion, Sterling, Mitchell, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Haskell, Knox, Foard, Wilbarger and Hardeman. All of Greer county, Ok., will be included within the quarantine district by the new regulations.

At the present time the line in Eastern Oklahoma starting at the Canadian River, runs northward, following the boundary line between Canadian, Kingfisher and Garfield counties on the west and Oklahoma, Logan and Noble counties on the east and following the boundary line between Kay county on the north and Noble county on the south. This line will be moved eastward to the right of way of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe, leaving all that part of Oklahoma, Logan and Noble counties west of the Santa Fe right of way outside the quarantine district. It will also leave a small corner of Payne county, and the greater part of the Ponca, Otoe and Missouri Indian reservations outside the quarantine district.

The changing of the quarantine line in western Texas is of great importance to cattlemen below the line, where pasture has been scarce for the past two or three months. Above the line pasture is abundant, but the Texas State Sanitary Board has been rigidly enforcing the inspection law, and cattle infested with ticks were not allowed to be driven across the line, even during the open season, which ended January 1. As a result of the rigid inspection thousands of cattle were turned back at the quarantine line. The State Livestock Sanitary Board was backed up by the cattlemen in the Panhandle who were interested in keeping their pastures free from ticks, and subscribed liberally to a fund to employ inspectors. Line riders have been employed by the State board,

and cases of smuggling cattle across the line were few. By including these twelve Texas counties within the quarantine district a large territory where grass is abundant is made available to the cattlemen of the quarantine district. These twelve counties will constitute a neutral strip. The Texas quarantine line, it is announced, will remain where the Government line now is, and cattle will be inspected on this line by the State authorities. The Government inspection will be conducted on the new line one tier of counties further west. By including Greer county, Ok., within the quarantine district another large tract of excellent pasture will be made available to the cattlemen of the quarantine district.

The action of the Agricultural Department will greatly relieve the condition of the cattlemen, and do much toward bringing an end to the bitter controversy which has been waging in Texas for months over the quarantine

regulations, a controversy which threatens to become an issue in the next Texas State campaign.
