A noble woman, a devoted mother, a friend indeed, has laid down the burdens of life, to receive upon her brow the well merited crown of Heaven. But like the rays of the evening sun after it has sank behind the western hill tops. reflecting back its beauty, the life of Mrs. Tankersley, though she has passed into another world, yet illminates and impresses many minds in this world with its purity of purpose and true conception of womanhood.


