### Mutton Market.

Kansas City, Feb. 17, 1902.

Receipts here the past week have been very light. Prices scored a sharp advance and values now being realized are the highest of the season. Today choice fed lambs averaging 70 lbs. brought \$6.50. Yearling wethers fed 100 days sold at \$6.50, while muttons and ewes mixed went at \$5.50 and straight ewes at \$4.75. These prices compare very favorably with other river markets. Quotations at this point and South St. Joseph are practically the same, and the difference between the figures either being paid here or at St. Joseph and Chicago is so small that it does not pay to go forward with stock. We confidently expect this condition of affairs will continue throughout the season. At present choice lambs are worth \$6.75 in Chicago; muttons, \$5.25; ewes, \$4.75 to \$5.00; yearlings, \$6.00. As we have stated before, we have implicit faith in the future and fully believe prospects very encouraging for still higher prices in the near future.

**Special Quarantine Is Extended**

There is no change in either the state or Federal quarantine lines this season, the many reports to the contrary notwithstanding. The following letter from Livestock Sanitary Commissioner Hankins makes that matter perfectly clear:

Quanah, Texas, Jan. 28, 1903.  
The West Texas Stockman,  
Colorado, Texas.

Dear Sir: The quarantine line in Texas will remain the same as it now is until November. The United States Department of Agriculture has adopted the line designated by this Commission, together with a recognition of the special lines of this Commission around Baylor, Throckmorton and part of Pecos county, and also our regulations regarding what is designated border counties west of the line. You can say to your readers that the regulations as promulgated by proclamation of the governor of Texas are in force and have been adopted and recognized by the Department of Agriculture.

The Kansas City Drovers Telegram says on the subject:

Some misunderstanding among cattlemen exists in regard to the order recently issued by the Department of Agriculture and received here yesterday, making certain modifications of the cattle quarantine line, and extending a special quarantine over certain counties in Texas where infected cattle are located. Speaking of the new order, known as B. A. I. order No. 93, which is effective February 1, Col. Albert Dean, livestock agent in charge at Kansas City for the bureau of animal industry, whose jurisdiction extends over the entire Southwest country, said today:

"The only permanent change in the quarantine line in Kansas City's territory is in Oklahoma, where a strip of territory lying between the present quarantine line and the right-of-way of the Santa Fe railroad is left out of the quarantine district and made clean territory.

"Owing to the presence of Texas fever ticks in a number of Texas counties just outside the quarantine line it was recommended by the department and agreed to by the Texas state authorities that a temporary quarantine should be placed upon these counties. The permanent quarantine line in Texas has not been changed. It remains where it has been heretofore, but a special quarantine, which may be terminated at any time by agreement between the Department of Agriculture and the state authorities, has been placed upon these certain Texas counties and upon Greer county, O. T. The Texas counties now outside, or above, the quarantine line, which will be after February 1, and until such time as the temporary quarantine is raised, within the quarantine district, are Childress, Cottle, Hardeman, Ford, Wilbarger, King, Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Garza, Borden, Howard, Mitchell, Glascock, Sterling, West Tom Green, Irion, Upton and Crane. A special quarantine is also placed on the counties of Throckmorton and Baylor, which are below the quarantine, but in which there have been a number of clean herds.

"During the existence of this temporary quarantine no cattle can be moved from the counties so quarantined for interstate shipment except on federal inspection, and none can be moved to other parts of Texas above the quarantine line except on state inspection. Cattle cannot be moved into these counties from below the quarantine line except on state inspection." \* \* \*

**School Land.**

Some time ago the Stockman requested Hon. A. S. Hawkins, present member of the state legislature, to furnish the paper with his interpretation of the new land law, together with such information connected therewith as would be of general interest. Mr. Hawkins has complied with that request and furnishes us with the following:

At the time of the passage of the late land law the attention of the public was so fixed upon the one feature of the bill relating to the cancellation of leases that other important matters in the bill were not given due attention, and for that reason it may not be inappropriate at this time to refer to some of the changes made. Certain changes and their effect are briefly noted as follows:

The applicant to purchase land is permitted to file his application with the clerk of the county where the land is situated, and he is there furnished by records the clerk is obliged to keep and exhibit all necessary information on the subject. The penalties imposed and the particularity of this section of the statute makes this provision for the first time effective. It also avoids delay, and greatly facilitates and lessens the work of the general land office and gives the people in all things better service.

Not over four sections of school land can be sold to the same applicant, i. e., when a party has under this law bought his four sections he can buy no more, and his application to purchase must affirmatively show his prior purchases, if any. This was aimed at the "Repeater" and "Bonus Hunter."

The purchaser is for the first time required to put improvements on the land of a fixed valuation, to-wit: three hundred dollars, and if he fails to occupy it is forfeited and subject to settlement by any other settler without any action of the land commissioner.

The land commissioner is herein for the first time when leasing lands required to award it to the party first filing a written application therefor. This was intended to prevent favoritism and had been the rule all the time with reference to applications to purchase lands. It is also provided that no new lease shall issue for a longer term than five years.

"Detached lands" can no longer be sold except to actual settlers, as other school lands are sold. This cuts off the speculator and those who brought about the detachment of lands in order to purchase without settlement, and the object of the provision was to prevent frauds on the state.

One of the most important provisions of the bill is that which prohibits absolutely the cancellation or consolidation of leases before their expiration. The law has ever been that the land was on the market on the expiration of a lease if in demand for settlement, and this was in line with all of the history of land matters in Texas, which conclusively show that it has been the intention of our laws since the days of the Republic to favor the actual settler. However by means of the cancellation and consolidation of leases before their expiration a system had been ingeniously devised which formed a kind of an endless chain of leases, by which the leases were renewed before their expiration, and this effectively prevented the land from coming on the market for sale to actual settlers, and avoid the very object for which the law had been intended. It not only did this, but it gave to the lessee a perpetuity to the land, and this practice was itself a vio-

lation of the spirit of the constitution of Texas, which denounces monopolies and perpetuities. If the law had contained no other clause its passage would not have been in vain. However, those who had secured these consolidations of leases before the passage of the late law are now "Sorry that they spoke." Under the present law the preference right to purchase extends to only four sections out of any one lease. One party who holds a consolidated lease for something like twelve hundred sections in Howard and other counties north, wishes that he had kept his numerous leases as they stood without consolidation, for each separate lease would have carried with it the right to buy four sections of land, and these leases could have been readily disposed of to prospective purchasers at big prices. As the law does not allow a lease to be sub-divided he can only hold his lease until its expiration, and then get nothing for it whatever. This lease and others in that territory cannot extend for a longer period than two and one half years from the time the next legislature would meet and pass a law cancelling these leases peremptorily, even if disposed to pass such a law. —Colorado Stockman.

Died, in San Angelo, Texas, February 6, 1902, Dr. F. F. Tucker, at the age of 28 years.

This announcement will bring sorrow to many hearts in Sherwood and surrounding country, as Dr. Tucker was well known here and loved by all. He frequently visited Sherwood and was here but a few weeks ago.

Deceased was a warm friend of Dr. Deal's, having graduated from University of Texas Medical College in 1897. Dr. Tucker was married about three years ago to Miss Laura Day, who with one little boy survives him; also his mother and three brothers, who arrived in San Angelo in time for the funeral, which occurred there Saturday afternoon and was largely attended. Deceased was a Mason and a member of the Episcopal church.
