To the Reading Public of the proud little City of Sherwood and all LIBERTY LOVING people:

I come not before you as a writer, nor as a statesman defending the cause of his country, nor as a warrior fresh from the fields of victory.

But alas! Alas! I hail from a felon's cell; from a prison wall.

For twenty two long months I have been confined in that lowly institution officially known as a lease labor camp of the State Penitentiary of this broad bosomed Lone Star State, where my companions and associates were every degree of criminals.

Remember, wayward boys and girls who are just blooming into manhood and womanhood: That is the home of all criminals, where but few ever repent. Why? It is a very easy question for me to answer. Perhaps some lady will say, why is this article directed to girls as well as boys—are there women in the penitentiary? There are, and they are thrown on an out "side camp," till the soil, have no advantage of a chaplain, no advantage of a library, they are thrown under the lash, swung up by the thumbs as same as a man. The youngest convict ever in the Penitentiary was a girl 8 years of age; but was pardoned after serving eleven days.

Gentle readers, words with me are inadequate to paint it as black as it really is.

I have read the graphic description of the Black Hols of Calcutta and the subterranean tombs of France, and the grim and ghastly remains which they hold yet the thoughts of a doom life that has no horror for me to compare with the horrors of the State Penitentiary. 'Tis oft in my midnight slumber I fancy I hear the shrieks and moans of an unfortunate convict under the lash, or pleading for water.

Although the chasm's wide which yawns between,
For you tread nature's fields green
Yet it may sound as poetic a rs,
'Tis from one who wishes you well,
'Tis from one behind the bars.
