### Bandera News Letter.

(Regular Correspondence)

As a result of heavy tax collections, interest and school land sales, the State School Board will be able to make an apportionment of about \$3.00 per capita for the month of February. This with the \$1.50 already paid, will leave only about \$1.50 still due on the state apportionment of \$6.00 which will probably be paid during the month of March. Bandera county schools will receive for the month of February, about \$4,000, together with heavy county collections and the semi-annual lease on school lands, will assure a cash balance for the remainder of the school year.

In an agreed verdict between the State and the Breweries entered at Sulphur Springs court, \$281,000 in penalties were assessed against the Breweries, and when paid, it is planned to place it to the credit of the Confederate Pension Fund.

Tax collections for the month of January will aggregate near \$20,000. There has been much complaint of the increased taxes, yet Bandera county's rate has not been changed for a good many years, and the increase was due to an increase of 17 1/2 cents on the \$190 State Annuity.

Bandera county is, and has always been operated upon a most economical plan, the county officials drawing the same wages (with few exceptions) as were paid 40 years ago, despite the fact that their work has increased many fold.

The Board of County School Trustees met last Monday in regular session. The Secretary reported no cases on appeal and schools running with good attendance.

F. D. Barnes is making extensive improvements at his ranch a few miles below town.

F. W. Dorow was up from Pipe Creek section and placed his name on the Advance subscription list for the coming year.

The colored school opened in District No. 16 last Monday, with Miss Mary Thomas of Hondo, as teacher.

The lumber from the old school building is all sold except about 5,000 feet. Those desiring some of it had best get their orders in at once.

The Tax Assessor will be working the first days of this week on Mason Creek, and the last days of the week above Medina.

**The Senatorial Race.**

The entry of Senator Charles A. Culberson into the Senatorial race for re-election at this time very much bewilders the situation for all aspirants for that office.

The Senator states in his announcement that he is physically unable to make a canvass, but will rely on his friends to look after his interests. The other candidates, Campbell, Brooks, Henry, Colquitt and Riddle, have all stated that the entry of Culberson will in no way affect their plans, and set dates have been arranged for their several opening addresses.

We are sorry to see Senator Culberson announce, for he is unable to properly represent Texas in the Senate, but as to the effect it will have on the chances of other candidates for election, we are at present unable to forecast. However, the Advance believes Dr. Brooks the best man for the office and are sure his chances are as good as the rest, if not better. However, the coming in of Culberson has, it seems, blocked the possibilities of Ex-Senator Bailey being a candidate, thus relieving the State, for the present at least, of being reinfected with "Baileyism."

A CLEANUP crusade against gambling is on in many cities and towns. Gambling is one of the most demoralizing vices of the present day and the laws against it should be strictly enforced, it matter not who is caught in the meshes. It used to be that gambling was carried on in back room additions to saloons, but most of the gambling of today is found to be in pool halls and domino halls. It should be stopped and these places put out of business.

Bishop J. S. Johnston, whose residence now is Kerrville, delivered a great sermon at St. Mark's Episcopal church in San Antonio last Sunday upon the subject of Equal Suffrage, in response to a request by the Equal Franchise Society of that city. Previously, the Bishop had expressed himself as being opposed to the equal franchise theory, but in this sermon he says: "Times change and we change with them, and I am now ready, when this question becomes a political issue in Texas, to vote for the State enfranchisement of women, where it properly belongs."

It was former Senator Horace Chilton, we believe, who, a number of years ago, predicted that the saloons of Texas would be wiped off the face of the earth the day they undertook to run the politics of the State. The recent developments in the oyster suits by Attorney General Looney has fully demonstrated that the time has arrived for the culmination of this prediction.

THOS. J. MARTIN, a prominent young attorney of Fredericksburg, and the son of Judge Clarence Martin, has announced as a candidate for Representative from the 89th District, now represented by Wm. Bierschwale. The 89th District is composed of the counties of Blanco, Kendall, Llano, and Gillespie.

OUR friend, Harold Baldwin, editor of the Sentinel, has announced as a candidate for Representative of the 116th District, subject to the action of the Democratic primaries. Baldwin is alright and we hope to see him elected.

**KERRVILLE**

is the county seat of Kerr County, has a population of about 2500, is situated 70 miles northwesterly from San Antonio, and is the terminus of the Kerrville branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. It has two daily trains to and from San Antonio, and daily mail route, carrying passengers in trucks, to Ingram, Junction, Rock Springs Harper and other places north and west of Kerrville, and also a daily line to Fredericksburg. From Kerrville to Fredericksburg is 25 miles; to Bandera and Medina City, 25 miles; to Junction 60 miles; Rock Springs 80 miles; Harper 21 miles.

The elevation at Kerrville is 1750 feet. The Guadalupe river, which heads 30 miles north of Kerrville, runs through the city. On the east side where the city is located, there are high bluffs on the river, and on the west side is a fertile and beautiful valley, and mountains surround the city on the east and west. The Guadalupe valley is occupied by thrifty farmers and ranchmen, and the mountain regions, among which there is considerable valley, creek and arable land, there are large ranches of cattle, horses, sheep and goats, all of which do well in the Kerrville country. The land generally is well wooded, principally with live oak, Spanish oak and cedar, and the range is good, and water excellent.

Our farmers grow wheat, oats and all other small grain, cane and alfalfa, cotton and corn, and fruit and vegetables do well. Kerrville is one of the largest wool markets in the state, and large quantities of wool, mohair, cotton, oats, cattle, etc., are shipped from this point.

The climate of the Kerrville country is unsurpassed. The winters are short and generally mild and invigorating owing to the dryness of the climate and the prevalence of sunshine. The summers are cool and delightful, and the mountain air is pure and bracing. Game abounds in the Kerrville country, and fishing in the Guadalupe, especially north of Kerrville, is good. Kerrville and the adjoining towns are popular resorts for health and recreation.
