## Depot Injunction Stands.

Saturday, last, District Judge R. H. Burney heard the motion filed by Hon. R. J. Boyle and Judge Lee Wallace, attorneys for the Sap Ry., to modify the injunction so as to permit the railroad company to use the new depot it has recently erected about two blocks south of the present depot. It was proposed to use both depots until the injunction suit is finally determined. Judges Burnett and Geddie opposed the motion and claimed that the use of the new depot, built after the suit was filed, and off the depot grounds, would in effect, be a removal of the depot and impair the rights of the complainants, who bought their property and erected business houses near the depot upon a contract of the company to maintain the depot on the depot grounds, opposite their property. Judge Burney refused to modify the injunction and held that operating two depots so near each other would bring about confusion, and that the depot should not be removed off the depot grounds, pending the final judgment of the court. It developed at the hearing that the Railroad Commission had, before the new depot was built, issued an order to the general manager of the company forbidding the removal of the depot without the consent of the Commission. It is understood that the plaintiffs in the suit and other citizens will make an effort to compel the company to erect a new and adequate depot on the depot grounds where both the passenger and freight depots have been established ever since the road first entered Kerrville in September, 1887. According to the court's decision, the only issue is whether the interests of the general public demand the removal of the new depot off the grounds originally designated and established by the company, and it devolves on the company to show this before it can remove the depot off these grounds.

**Charles H. Morris for Governor.**

Let every good citizen who believes in good clean government in behalf of all the people, get in line and support Mr. Morris for Governor. The enemies of good government are going to fight, hard to defeat him, but let's show them that right can win in Glorious Old Texas.
