COVER CROPS FOR ORCHARDS

Means Provided for Preventing Winter Soil Erosion, and to Hold Moisture in Spring.

By C. W. RAPP, Department of Horti-Oklahoma Agricultural Col-

Any orchardist who neglects cover crops is missing a good opportunity for improving his orchard. In fact, we might almost say that the cover crop is an essential. Its use offers a means of preventing winter soil erosion, adding humus and retarding fall growth of trees.

Cover crops are especially important in hillside orchards. If the soil in these orchards is left bare the heavy fall, winter and spring rains will wash off the top soil and reduce the land to a rough infertile condition. Cover crops will largely prevent this erosion and will also cause large amounts of water to be held in the soil during the winter and spring.

Oklahoma soils are generally deflcient in humus and nitrogen. The summer cultivation which is recommended for orchards in this state pre-A permit is required by persons de- vents the growing of summer crops. Cover crops are, however, beneficial to the orchard, and when plowed up

FIRST-CLASS DAIRY STABLES

Quarters for Milking Cows Are Separated Entirely From All Other Kinds of Live Stock.

The standard now set for the firstclass dairy barns is high. The quarters for the milking cows are separated entirely from all other stock, even from the younger dairy stock. The barn must be narrow, not housing more than two rows of cows. The window surface is to be relatively very large, the walls smooth, floors not absorbent and easily washed.

The new order of construction is the result of the more general under-

Be that as it may, it is advisable for the professional dairyman to build only the best and the smaller dairyman to so build, that, as demands require, he can remodel toward the best structure.



BEES AND CLOVER SEED REARING CHICKS WITH HENS

Cross - Pollinization Through Agency of Insect Is Efficient.

Maintenance of Adequate Acreage of Clover Has Become a Rather Serious Problem on Account of Small Supply of Seed.

Mechanical devices for pollinating red clover have not been found successful by investigators who have been studying the problem of red clover seed production. On the other hand, the investigators found that the bumblebee is an efficient cross-pollinator, and that under certain conditions the honeybee may also be most useful.


For some years there has been an insufficient supply of home-grown red clover seed. As a result not only has the price of the seed been high, but large quantities of foreign seed, which is frequently inferior to the domestic, have had to be imported. In consequence, the maintenance of an adequate clover acreage has become a rather serious problem. To remedy the situation, attempts have been made. to ascertain the minimum quantities of seed per acre required to secure a satisfactory stand and the conditions necessary to maintain such a stand. In addition, efforts have been made to develop a heavy seeding, hardy strain of clover, and finally various mechanical forms of pollination have been

experienced with. A professional paper of the United States department of agriculture has sults of experiments which show that the yield of seed obtained on heads which were not pollinated or which were self-pollinated in different ways, was practically negligible. The actual amount was less than one-half of one per cent, and this insignificant quantity, it is said, may be accounted for by accidental pollination from outside sources. In contrast with these results it was found that the bumblebee was able to pollinate from 30 to 85 flowers a minute in dry weather. When few nectar-producing plants are available it was found that the honeybee also collects large quantities of pollen from red clover and in the process cross-pollinization of the flowers

GATE FASTENER WORKS EASY

Convenient Device for Use on Any Farm Is Made of Strip of Wood, With Wire Loop Attached.

Fowls Should Be Confined to Slightly Darkened Nests at Hatching Time and Not Disturbed.

Sitting hens do best when confined to slightly darkened nests at hatching time and not disturbed unless they step on or pick their chickens when hatching. In the latter case the chickens may be removed as soon as dry, in a basket lined with flannel or some other worm material, and kept near a fire until all the eggs are hatched. In place of this the eggs may be removed and placed under a quieter hen whose eggs are hatching at the same time. An incubator may also be used to

keep the earliest hatched chickens warm, in case they are removed from the nest.


If the eggs hatch unevenly, those which are slow in hatching may be placed under other hens, as hens often get restless after a part of the chickens are out, allowing the remaining eggs to become cooled at the very time when steady heat is necessary.

It is necessary to remove the egg shells and any eggs which have not hatched as soon as the hatching is over. Hens are fed as soon as possible after the eggs are hatched, as feeding tends to keep them quiet; otherwise hens will leave the nest.

MANAGEMENT OF HERD BOAR

Best to Get Good Animal and Keep Him for Years-Feed Sparingly of Fattening Foods.

It is not best to let the boar run with the rest of the herd. It is too common a practice to sell the boar when the season is over. This is largely the cause of so many small litters and weak-boned pigs. It is best to get a good boar, and keep him for a few years, and as he matures his pigs will be stronger and litters larger.

Have a small yard of grass if possible, hog tight and away from the sows, so he will not be worried. A quarter of an acre will afford plenty of exercise in the open air. When grass is not available, give him cut clover or any other good green feed that he





However, if an infested field must be planted to corn a second year, the aphis may be checked by deep plowing and disking during very late fall or winter. This breaks up many of the ants' nests, destroying both ants and aphis eggs.

> There is little data on the economy timothy hay or with corn stover. This hold the sides of a form in place and is due to the fact that such a ration would not contain enough protein. Doubtless barley would somewhat excel corn, pound for pound, when fed with roughages lacking protein. Whole barley may be fed very successfully to fattening sheep.

The fact that cottonseed meal can be purchased for a price comparing favorably with that of corn has surgested the feeding of this concentrate with alfalfa hay for fattening lambs. In this combination, however, we have two feeds high in protein and consequently an unbalanced ration. Oil meal or cottonseed meal can be fed quite extensively with timothy hay and roots, in which combination either will give very good results.

Few records of sheep fattened on cottonseed meal and alfalfa are available, for, as a rule, protein-rich feeds (alfalfa and off meal) are the most expensive nutrients of a ration and are not usually combined. It is very probable, however, that some cottonseed meal can be fed when alfalfa is fed, if we use a mixed ration of corn and cottonseed meal. The best proportion would perhaps be one-third cottonseed meal and two thirds corn, either shelled or cracked. 



TREATING SHEEP FOR WORMS

Pests May Be Combatted by Pasture Rotation, Combined With Drugs Injurious to Insects.

The stomach worm is the worst pest affecting sheep. Lambs are more susceptible than older sheep, probably because the older sheep are accustomed to the presence of the worm. In the spring, soon after lambing, the old sheep should each receive a dose of one or two ounces of gasoline, followed by a small dose of epsom salts. After a day or two they should be placed in a worm-free pasture, if pos-

In July treat the whole herd, including the lambs, with gasoline, and turn them into new pasture, and repeat the process in November. Pasture rotation, combined with drugs that are injurious to the worm, is a practical method of successfully combating this

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
