



A good mixture to keep before the hogs at all times is one composed of: Charcoal, one bushel; hardwood ashes, one bushel; salt, eight pounds; air-slaked lime, eight pounds; sulphur, 4 pounds; pulverized copperas; two pounds

Mix the lime, salt and sulphur thorughly, and then mix with the charcoal and ashes. Dissolve the copperas in two parts of hot water and sprinkle over the whole mass, mixing thoroughly. Keep some of this mixture in a box before the hogs at all times.






