INCREASE IN POSTAGE IS EFFECTIVE NOV. 2

WILL COVER POSTAGE ON ALL FIRST-CLASS MAIL INCLUDING POSTAL AND POST CARDS.

The following regulations have been received by the Kerrville post office in regard to the increase in postage on first-class matter.

Increase in Rate of Postage on First-Class Mail, Including Postal and Post Cards:

Pursuant to the foregoing amended regulations, postmasters shall, on and after November 2, 1917, see that postage is paid at the rate of three cents an ounce or fraction thereof on letters and other first-class matter except drop letters. All drop letters, that is letters mailed for delivery from the office at which posted, including those for delivery by city, rural or other carrier of such office, as required, to have postage paid on them at the rate of two cents an ounce or fraction thereof.

Postal cards are required to be prepaid two cents, and, therefore, the one-cent postal cards must have a one-cent postage stamp affixed to them in addition to the one-cent stamp impressed on such cards. Post cards (private mailing cards) bearing written messages must have two cents postage prepaid on them.

Postmasters at offices of address shall be careful to rate with the proper amount of postage due on all mail reaching their offices with the postage insufficiently prepaid.

THE 400TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE REFORMATION

Dr. Martin Luther (1483-1546).

The nailing of his ninety-five theses on the door of the Old Castle Church at Wittenberg on Oct. 31, 1517 started that world-wide movement which is known as the Reformation. The protestants of the whole world, but especially the Lutherans, celebrate the 400th anniversary of that event with great enthusiasm. As a jubilee offering the Lutheran Church of America raised ten million dollars for educational and charity institutes.

In the United States the Lutheran Church has about 3,000,000 communicants, 10,000 ministers, 16,000 churches, 3,401 parochial schools, 49 academies, 10 young ladies seminaries, 41 colleges, 29 theological seminaries, 61 orphan's homes, 38 homes for aged and 63 asylums and hospitals. She

publishes periodicals as follows: English, 123; German, 78; Norwegian, 27; Swedish, 12; Danish, 8; Finnish, 3; Hungarian, 2; French, 1; Icelandic, 3; Slavonic, 3; Lettish, 1; Estonian, 1; total, 262.

The Lutheran Church has over 70,000,000 of baptized members in the world. She sustains 2,600 missionaries in foreign lands. She uses about ninety languages in which to preach the gospel on all the continents and in nearly all the islands of the world.

The Lutheran Church at Kerrville will celebrate the 400th anniversary of the Reformation next Sunday, October 28th. German services at 10:30 a. m.; English services at 8 p. m. B. SCHLEIFER, Pastor.

KERRVILLE HOLDS LIBERTY RALLY

Pursuant to the proclamations of President Wilson and Governor Hobby designating Wednesday, October 24th, as Liberty Day, a Liberty Bond Rally was held at Pampell's Opera House, Wednesday afternoon. All business houses closed from 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock. The opera house was filled with an enthusiastic audience and representative citizens from different parts of the county were in attendance.

The program consisted of a symposium by prominent local speakers interspersed with appropriate musical and vocal renditions. Mayor H. C. Geddie presided over the meeting, which opened with prayer by Rev. J. B. Riddle. Five-minute addresses were made by L. A. Schreiner, Bishop J. S. Johnston, Prof. G. C. Jones, Dr. S. E. Thompson, Rev. B. Schleifer, Rev. W. P. Dickey, Senator Julius

Real and Judge Lee Wallace. Rev. S. W. Kemmerer spoke the benediction. Each speaker's brief talk was impressive, forceful and eloquent; designed to show every indifferent American his duty and inspire any "slacker" to action. The pent-up patriotism of the audience frequently broke forth in prolonged applause throughout the program.

The rally had its effect and many listened to their country's plea for a loan who probably would not have been touched otherwise. Immediately following the meeting the Kerrville Boy Scouts canvassed the crowds on the streets and sold several Liberty Bonds.

The Sun is unable at present to ascertain the total amount of bonds bought in Kerrville to date, but the names of all local buyers will probably appear in a later issue.

3-CENT LETTER POSTAGE IN EFFECT NOVEMBER 2

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—Three-cent letter postage will go into effect November 2. The Postmaster General has just issued a set of rules and regulations on new rates.

On all first-class mail matter the rate will be one cent per ounce or fraction, in addition to the present rate. Written post cards will carry two cents in stamps instead of one cent. Printed cards will go at the present rate. "Drop letters" or letters dropped at the post office will be delivered in the same city for the same rate.

It is estimated that \$3,000,000 will be derived during November and December in New York alone from the increased postal rates, which were made a law by the passage of the war revenue bill.

People Starving in Poland.

New York, Oct. 22.—A cablegram reaching here today from the American legation at Copenhagen through the State Department says hundreds of persons are literally starving to death in the streets of Warsaw and other cities of Poland and Lithuania. The provisional executive committee for general Zionist affairs, which received the message, announced it would place the situation before President Wilson.

Buck Gardner Shot.

Junction, Tex., Oct. 22.—W. H. (Buck) Gardner was shot by an unknown party Saturday night at his ranch in Edwards County. Gardner was moved to Junction, where his wounds were dressed and then sent to San Antonio for an operation to be performed on his head.

Gardner, who was perfectly conscious, says he was lying in bed asleep about 9 o'clock Saturday night when some one shot him from the outside, the shot passed through the wall and hit his left shoulder, the bullet splitting into several pieces which made three very ugly wounds about his face and head.

Gardner says he does not know who fired the shot. The sheriff from Rocksprings made an investigation, but no arrest has been made. Gardner is not very seriously hurt and will be well in a short time unless some complication sets in.

THE KINGDOM OF GOD.
Power of the Kingdom.
W. P. DICKEY.

God declares in the second Psalm that he has given the whole world to his Son for a possession and the heathen for his inheritance. And Paul says, in first Corinthians, that Christ is the power of God and the wisdom of God to salvation.

Certainly, if the promise of God, that the whole world shall be to acknowledge and practice the love, under the direction of faith is to be realized, some force, outside of man, must operate to bring it about.

To think that there is no such power directing the forces of nature and the destinies of men is enough to drive any thinking man insane with terror. Suppose you were in a powerful automobile, rushing down a steep mountain side, with the engine and steering gear out of all control. To sit still would be death and to jump would be suicide and you would be paralyzed with terror. If you look at the wreckage of the past and realize the awful power and direction of human passions and then think that there is no power to direct and no hand to control, you will be driven, as many have been, to an awful fear and a hopelessness for the future. But we have not only the promise of God of a coming Kingdom of Righteousness, but we have the demonstration that there is a controlling power that is moving toward the new order.

The Power of God in History.

The only way in which we can know any force is by its effects. No man ever saw gravity, but every time you drop an object you see the effect of it and have a demonstration that the force is at work.

So, "no man hath seen God at any time," but we can see the effects of the power of God working in the world. Now, the facts of history demand an explanation, a source and a purpose just as much as does a house or a machine or a picture. This is so clear that men who are unwilling to acknowledge a personal God have been compelled to say that there is in history a "Force that makes for righteousness."

That is exactly what we contend, that there is a force, the Power of God, operating in history, making for the establishment of the Kingdom of Righteousness.

A French king once asked his Chaplain to give him a demonstration of the truth of Christianity in one sentence. He unhesitatingly answered, "The Jews, Sir." There is a fact of history which demands an explanation. In their origin and history they are unlike all other people; they introduced a new idea of God, of government and have been the enigma of history. Not the least

GOOD NAME AND REPUTATION OF RED CROSS IS ASSAILED

To All Chapters: We are daily amazed at the disclosures by United States Department of State showing the lengths to which Prussian intrigue, infamy and conspiracy has been conducted in this country to form public opinion favorable to our enemies. That same policy is still being insidiously cultivated throughout the entire country, in large places and small.

When you made application for, and accepted, the direction of Red Cross organization in your community, you undertook a solemn obligation to protect the interests of the Red Cross in every way. You, of course, are quite ready to fulfill that obligation. One way in which you can do so now is to be energetic in ferreting out every kind of a report or rumor which tends to assail the character, integrity or effectiveness of the work of the American Red Cross. If our enemies can shake the confidence of the American people in this, its most representative and democratic organization, they will have accomplished more than they could accomplish in many battles and much bloodshed at the front. It is a solemn command to you most earnestly the careful study of a telegram received from the General Manager of the American Red Cross, Mr. Harvey D. Gibson, and request that you make every effort to give it publicity, and to have every person in your community understand that whenever there is suspicion or doubt on any subject whatever, regarding the Red Cross, its activities, its methods, its efficiency, its things, should be immediately reported to you—the custodian of Red Cross honor in your territory. You should then promptly "kill" any false rumors, at the same time reporting them immediately to this office, whether they seem to you important or not.

It is evident that rumors and insidious attacks of and calculated to embarrass and injure the Red Cross are being industriously circulated as part of an anti-patriotic propaganda. Red Cross members and the public generally should be alert to proceed on the theory that nothing should be allowed to pass until the Red Cross is thoroughly investigated. THE RED CROSS IS RUN AS AN OPEN BOOK. IT HAS NO SECRETS. It is making a sincere effort to serve mankind, and is doing it as carefully and economically as it knows how, and under the direction of the highest authorities.

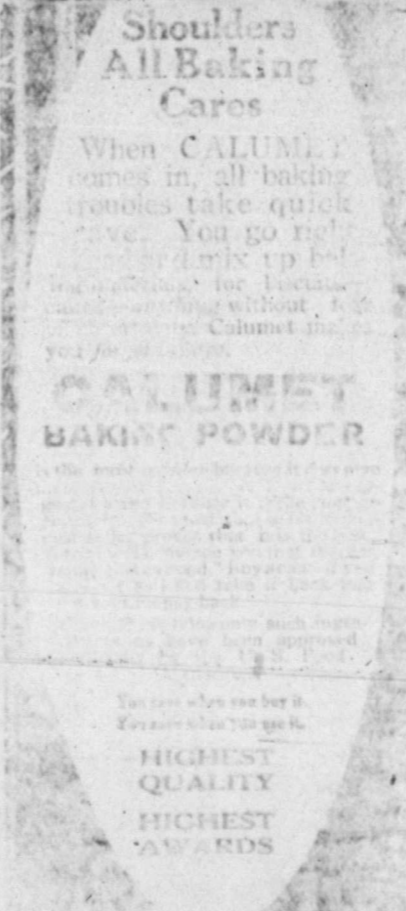

WHAT'S THE USE OF MONEY UNLESS WE WIN THE WAR?

This is the reply to the man who says, "I can do better with my money than buying Liberty Bonds."

He cannot do better. He cannot do as well. He means that he can obtain a higher interest rate.

Let us suppose that everyone, or even a large number of men, talked this way. The Loan would fail. That would mean the defeat of civilization, and the triumph of Germany.

Tried almost beyond human endurance, our allies might "lie down," discouraged, disgusted. "Unlikely," you say, "they will fight on." This raises a point which is not yet thoroughly understood—it is money that is going to win this war. The supply of bravery amongst our own boys and our allies is ample; what they all need, what they must have, is money.

What would be the result of a wavering attitude on the part of our allies? Germany would take heart, possibly would make one supreme effort, and open the way for an invasion of this country, which our own fleet might not be able to frustrate. Even supposing that as a result of her great effort, Germany was successful enough merely to force a draw, and an inconclusive peace, what would happen? Her every energy would be bent towards the object of invading this country at the earliest possible moment in order to replenish her bankrupt stores of money and supplies.

Let us presume that Germany has been so far successful that the war is brought to our shores, and our export trade is at a standstill. Do you realize what would be the condition of trade? It would be paralyzed. Markets would fall to pieces, industries would be stopped, everywhere there would be country-wide unemployment. 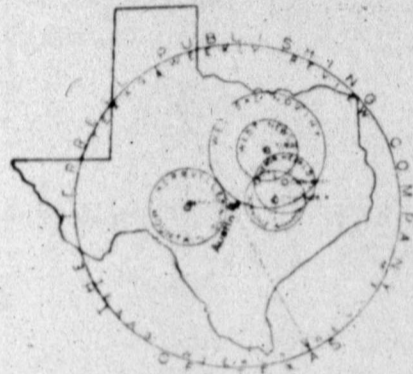

Nothing short of the will of the majority, and that after every man has had a reasonable opportunity to acquaint himself with the merits of the measure and has had a chance to vote his honest convictions, should control man's conduct. Even then, the will of the majority should not prevail any longer than it is found to be wise and beneficial.

Did you ever notice that even a bum show will attract a crowd, at least once? Human nature simply craves excitement and amusement. Recreation is as essential to human happiness as anything else. Restrict recreation and you restrict happiness; restrict happiness and you inaugurate discontent; discontent brings indifference to moral suasion. Man gets to where "what's the use?" appeals to him. When he reaches this condition crime is in sight. Minimize him with wholesome recreation and he'll not see crime. Let him have a say as to the wholesomeness of the recreation he desires.

Recognition of merit comes slowly, but it comes. Christ has not received his full measure of recognition yet. No man has ever lived long enough to receive his due of merit, but it comes. Therein perhaps lies the foundation of the idea that, while the evil we do goes with us, the good we do lives after us. This alone, we feel, is sufficient incentive to do what we believe to be right. God will take care of an honest man's mistakes.

One Reason is Not Sufficient.

New York Times: To explain the fact, so surprising to many, that the young men recently drafted for military service more from the country than from the cities have been rejected for physical defects, the doctor in charge of the Federal Public Health Service in Baltimore presents a plausible theory. The difference is due, he says, to the failure, as yet, of the rural communities to give their children the benefit of the systematic medical examinations to which the boys in most urban schools have for some time been subjected. The natural result, he thinks, is that in the country the boys suffer in after life from lack of skilled attention at the time when it is most effective, while the city boys are not thus handicapped.

That regular medical examination of school children is a commendable procedure can not be denied, of course, but a like superiority of the city boys in strength and development was noted as long ago as the civil war and then, as children in either city or country received any medical treatment except at home. Some other explanation must be sought, and it is probably a complex one, a single factor sufficing to cover the whole ground.

The common belief that country life is more healthful than city life seems to have no basis beyond the greater darkening of the skins of the country folk through exposure to the sun, and the assumption that pallor means illness. But "tan" proves little or nothing as to physical condition, as anybody can see who compares the aver-

age farmer of 60 with the average stockbroker of the same age. The farmer is usually a more or less broken man, while the latter much oftener is hale and hearty. The typical country boy is commonly put to hard work too soon, his food is not likely to be either well chosen or well cooked, and the farmhouse sanitation and hygiene usually violate many of the rules on which health depends. The Baltimore man forgot, too, that the pick of the county boys gravitate toward the city, leaving behind the unadventurous and unambitious, who are likely to be in one way or another below par physically as well as mentally. That is not as true now as it used to be, but the effect of this sort of selection is still to be seen in all the country districts.

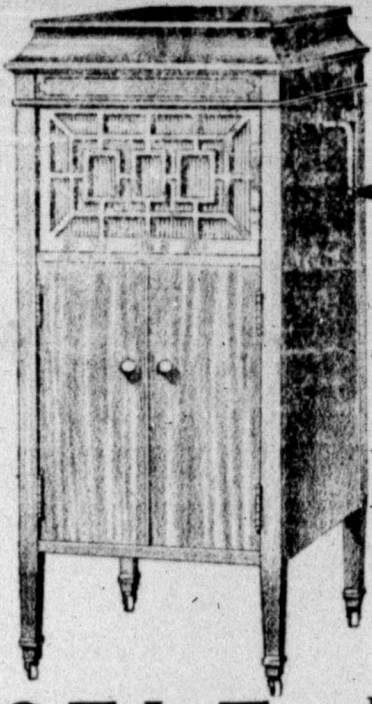

MORE FUNDS WILL BE NEEDED BY RED CROSS

St. Louis, Oct. 22.—Henry P. Davidson of New York, chairman of the War Council of the American Red Cross, said here today that the \$100,000 raised for the Red Cross last summer would not last longer than the early spring of 1918, and that the people should be prepared to make another large contribution within a few months.

Mr. Davidson said that as a result of the campaign of last summer \$74,000,000 had been paid into the Red Cross treasury and it was expected that additional collections would bring the total to \$101,000,000.

"Of every dollar contributed to the Red Cross," he said, "every dollar and a little more goes to relief work. The 'little more' is interest earned on the funds.

"Not one cent goes toward the expenses of the organization, this being provided for by volunteers, workers and private arrangements."

Mr. Davidson said that since the war began the membership of the Red

Cross had increased from 200,000 to 5,000,000; and the number of chapters from 200 to 27,000. It is hoped in a great Christmas drive, he said, to increase the membership to 20,000,000.

AMERICANS WORKING FOR CROSS IN SOUTH AMERICA

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—Ambassador Stimson at Buenos Aires cabled today that a patriotic society of American women, organized when the United States entered the war, had held a two days' fair in Buenos Aires and cleared \$100,000 in gold for the American Red Cross.

Argentines subscribed generously, among them being Foreign Minister Pueyrredon, Senorita Pueyrredon, daughter of the Colombian minister, and ladies of the Brazilian, Uruguayan and French legations took part in the affair.

wonderful thing is that they have existed without a country, without civil institutions, without a capital, without a temple, scattered among all nations and hated and oppressed and persecuted in all lands for two thousand years and yet preserve their identity and customs and have been described as like the gulf stream, "flowing like a river through the ocean of humanity, unmixed with the waters around them." This is the miracle of history and the only possible explanation is the one so simply given in the Bible: God raised them up, God has used and preserved them as a part of his work of bringing in the Kingdom.

In a like manner God used the great Roman government. They had no intention of helping on his work, but he used them to bring the world under the discipline of law. They built roads and made life and travel safe over the known world. Then Christ came and over those roads and under that protection the men like Paul preached the news of the Kingdom over the world in one generation.

The Turks started out to blot Christianity off the earth and captured Constantinople and invaded Europe, but what was the result?

The men of education and the teachers of religion were scattered from Constantinople all over Europe and sowed the seed for the revival of learning and the coming of the Reformation which ushered in modern history and founded modern Christendom.

King George had no thought of advancing the Kingdom of God in his oppression of the colonists of the new world, but by his exactions he forced them to clear thinking and, at last, to determined effort which established a new mile stone in the struggle of man toward freedom and responsibility and justice.

Did the German Emperor intend to advance the Kingdom of God by his ambitions? Hardly. Yet the result has been to crystallize a new and higher conviction as to the rights of all men, to precipitate a new declaration of independence for the whole

race and to fuse all mankind in a determination that righteousness shall be the law of nations. All history teaches in unmistakable language that "God causes the wrath of man to praise him, and the remainder of wrath he restraineth."

"Power of God in the Church"

Another fact of history which must be explained is the church.

We are familiar with the church, as an organization of men who profess faith in and obedience to God. We have a multitude of organizations which are called churches, some of them claiming to be "the church." Now it is evident that these organizations, separately and as a whole, stand for a great truth. The fact is that none of these, or all of them together, is the Church in its completeness, but all are the efforts of men to express their knowledge of God and their relation to his Kingdom of Righteousness. This idea exists before and independent of the outward organization. There have been times when there was no church organization, but there has never been a time when "God left himself without witness" among men. It got down to one man in the time of Noah, and Elijah thought he was the only one left, but God has always had a church.

The history of the church is a continuous miracle. The church in the New Testament just takes up the miracle of the Old Testament church. God told Abram to do the impossible when he sent him out, an old man, to establish a nation and preserve the church. He told Moses to do the impossible in leading his people out of bondage and organizing the church in the wilderness. Christ told his little handful of disciples to do the impossible when he ordered them to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. The church has fallen into error; has been corrupted by ignorant or designing men, has been enervated by prosperity, has been prostituted by kings and almost extinguished by persecution, but some marvelous power has preserved its existence, punished its follies, corrected its errors, directed its development and kept alive its essential spirit so that, in spite of its weakness, the corruption of ignorance, the admixture of the world in its councils and the imperfection of its agents, it has been the refuge of the needy, the mother of enlightenment; the savior of the outcast, the fountain of liberty and the hope of humanity. Nothing short of the Power of God could have preserv-

ed the church from its own follies, to say nothing of its enemies from without. We are compelled to conclude that the church, as an organization in the world is like our flag, the embodiment of an idea in a symbol. The flag may be imperfect in its material and workmanship but its stands for a glowing, immortal idea, and the church is the symbol of the eternal thought of God, the promise of that Kingdom where in dwelleth righteousness.

Power of God in Individuals.

We can easily recall a wonderful list of men and women who have been changed in such a way that the only explanation is that God has made them over. What made a Paul out of Saul? What made Augustine change from a rich, selfish, lawless libertine into one of the most powerful and devoted saints of God? It could have been nothing less than the power of God.

We see Jerry McCauley, a "river rat," on the docks of New York, a sot, a thief, a liar, a murderer, apparently as low as only man can get and beyond any help man can offer, with a companion fit for his beastiality. Then something happens to this pair and we find him clothed and in his right mind, doing righteousness, loving mercy, a savior of the helpless and the hopeless, a father to the fatherless, reflecting the very image of Christ in one of the darkest places in the world. What did it? God.

Christ the Point of Contact for the Power of God.

It is by these effects of the power of God working in the world and tending toward the establishment of the Kingdom that we know beyond a doubt that God is carrying out what he has promised. We do not know when it will be completed nor all the experiences the race will go through before it is ready to welcome the King in his glory, but we do know that it is coming because we know his promise and we can see his work.

But God has given us a clearer evidence still. To bring himself near, to help our faith, to realize the Kingdom for us, he has sent Jesus Christ, embodying all the thought of God for us and showing unmistakably the purpose and power of God toward us. It is in Jesus that God and man meet; it is in him that we see operating all the fullness of the God-head. It is when men touch Jesus that they are made over and become new creatures. He is the power of God and the wis-

dom of God. How are men to experience this saving power of God? How is the world to enter this longed for Kingdom?

Admit.

Admit our need, our helplessness. Admit his right to direct us, to save, to control.

It is not necessary that we should understand all about God's plan and all about Christ and his nature and work, but we are given abundant evidence that he is the messenger of God to us and our intelligence is challenged to admit his claim as Savior.

Submit.

Until we realize that we can not save ourselves and bring in the Kingdom of righteousness for ourselves and others, we are hopeless, and even God can do nothing for us. He lays tribute on our wills and says, "humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God and he will exalt you in due season."

Commit.

God challenges our intelligence with evidence, he commands our wills with authority and last he appeals to our hearts with proof of his love and asks that we commit all our ways, all our needs, all our hopes to him, for "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in him might not perish, but have everlasting life."

Then lift up your eyes and see the overwhelming evidence that we are not helpless victims of a world gone mad, but the children of a Father-creator who has a plan for the highest conceivable destiny for us, both in this life and in the life to come.

This being so, the height of wisdom is to lay aside the promptings of our own pride and ambition and submit our wills to his will.

In view of the proofs of his wisdom and the demonstration of his gracious purpose and provision for our welfare, the highest manhood, the purest gratitude and the best instincts of our nature call upon us to trust ourselves willingly and gladly to his control.
