Stanchions for Calves

Very Handy in Feeding Feeding young dairy calves without stanchions is almost as unsatisfactory as trying to milk cows without having proper stables. Stanchions for the calves may be made very much like the ordinary rigid stanchions for cows, except smaller. A feed trough should be placed in front, with divisions to keep the feed for each calf separate. When feeding time comes, the calves are put in the stanchions and a pail of milk is set in the trough for each calf. After the calves have finished drinking the milk, the proper amount of grain is put in the trough and the calves are allowed to remain until they have eaten their portion. This will usually prevent the calves from acquiring the habit of sucking each

Calf stanchions are usually made from 36 to 42 inches high and 28 inches from center to center. A space of 41/2 inches is approximately correct

Removing Warts

Warts on cows' teats can be greatly benefited by smearing them with olive oil several times a day. This treatment will likely remove most of them. It will also relieve the pain so that milking can be done more satisfactorily. Those warts that are not removed by this treatment can be cut off with a pair of sharp scissors and the sore touched with a stick of caustic potash. Removing warts by cutting them off should only be done when the cow is dry.

Fish eyes are considered a great delicacy in the West Indies, where boiled salmon eyes are a favorite dish in northeastern Asia. Work the butter for sandwiches to a cream, but do not melt it. Cut the bread into thin even slices. If you are going to trim off the crusts, do not butter too near them. Bread for sandwiches is best when about 24 hours old.

Always iron with the thread of the goods, and iron until the garment is dry. pucker. Shiny gloss on hems, tucks, or seams, can be removed by moistening a piece of cheesecloth with clear water, wringing it dry, and wiping it quickly over the shiny

Owing to this bitterness of flavor, it is a good plan to combine the dandelion greens with other vegetables or flavors which modify it. The plan of cooking these greens in several waters is not recommended because much of the valuable mineral matter is thrown away, vitamins are destroyed, and the greens are overcooked. Raw dandelion leaves or those cooked without water are less bitter than those Thursday. that have been boiled.





yesterday called a hearing for Mon- ers. day on the claim that the state highway department has been overcharg- Special Master's Deed: ed \$19,000 for equipment and appointed former District Judge C. R. Brice to preside.

Notice of the hearing, in which State Comptroller Gilberto Mirabel is instructed to participate and make possible the calling and swearing of witnesses, was made public in a letter from the governor to Attorney General R. C. Dow.

In his letter the governor suggests that Mr. Dow may yet find that the hearing should not be held. He referred to the suit brought by Mr. Dow to test the right of state departments to employ special attorneys, which was dismissed when it was contended that it should be brought and was brought by the district attorney.

"It may be that you discovered the case would not lie-and of course the thing for you to do under those circumstances was to dismiss it,' the governor said. He added he hoped that in the highway hearing "that you will not put the state to any expense in the matter of prosecuting suits unless you are fairly certain of your duty in the premises. A repitition of your experience in connection with the matter mentioned above would unquestionably result in 'political death' for you, and there would be no glory in 'dying with your head on the firing line toward the line of battle' if the line of battle existed only in your imagination.'

Originally the investigation was asked by State Auditor Miguel Otero, Jr., based on a report by Linder, Burk and Stephenson, auditors. After nearly three months the highways department made a reply and Gov. Dillon referred this to the auditors with a request for a further statement from them. They replied that they believed nothing could be accomplished except through a hearing in which sworn testimony could be taken.

Declaring himself anxious to get at the truth of "any alleged misconduct," Gov. Dillon adds: "I shall be very glad indeed if you are able to shed any further light upon the subject of the purchase of equipment by the highway department during the past administration as well as during the present adminis-






