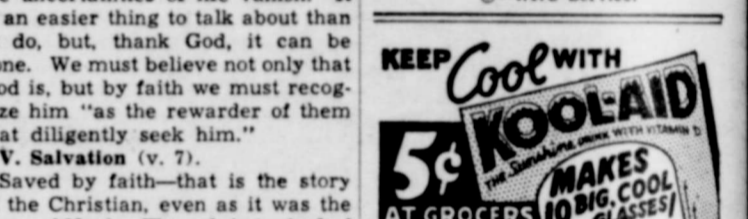

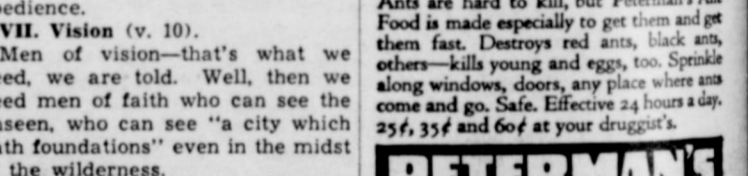

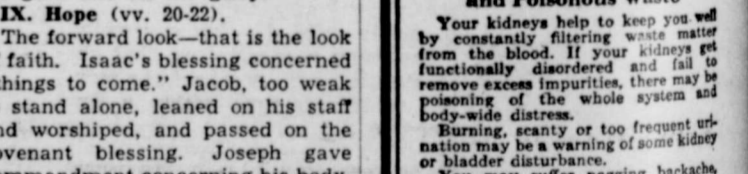

Soil Conservation Districts Favored

In the reorganization meeting held at State College recently, the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau went on record as favoring certain steps to be taken in regard to improving various conditions in the state affecting the agricultural and range lands, as well as general conditions.

One of the major resolutions adopted was that in regard to the formation of soil conservation districts under the new state law to give the operators of range and farm lands equal consideration in the new districts.

Under the new law enacted by the 1937 legislature, provision is made whereby two-thirds of the landowners in any district may petition for the formation of a soil conservation district. In view of the fact that many of these areas where districts may be considered have large acreages of range lands immediately adjoining large numbers of farms, it is felt that each should develop a separate district.

The Farm Bureau feels that this is an important factor in the creation of districts and will prevent controversy in the future. This resolution will probably be of considerable importance in view of the fact that the meeting of the Soil Conservation Committee will be held early in July. At that time, this committee expects to consider the formation of districts in the various parts of the state.

MORGAN FARM AN EXAMPLE OF KEEPING BLOOD LINES

Livestock men who believe desirable breeds or blood lines occasionally should be perpetuated by foundations—rather than by individuals who cannot afford the expense—point to the United States Morgan Horse Farm at Middlebury, Vt., as an example.

About the beginning of this century, the valuable blood of the Morgan horse, a true American breed, was so scattered and diluted by years of mixing with trotting and saddle-horse blood that there was danger of losing it entirely.

In 1906 the United States Department of Agriculture and the Vermont State Experiment Station, to prevent the breed's extinction, assembled a few mares at the Burlington, Vt., station. Later, when Joseph Battell, a Morgan admirer, donated his farm near Middlebury as a breeding head headquarters, the work was transferred there and the station named the United States Morgan Horse Farm.

Justin Morgan was foaled about 1793 and died in 1821. He was the property of a Vermont schoolmaster by that name. Meager records indicate he carried a great deal of Arabian blood. His potency was so great that his descendants look and act as he did.

Morgans are noted for their ruggedness, style, courage, intelligence, and general usefulness both in harness and under the saddle. For years they have been used as remount stallions by the army. In the United States many of the great trotters and saddle horses carry Morgan blood; and on the western plains they have been crossed with native range stock to produce good "cow horses."

Morgan blood also is scattered in other parts of the world. Morgan horses have been sent to Japan, China, Central and South America, Canada, Cuba, Puerto Rico, and the island of Guam. Wherever they have gone they have left their mark.

Today, horses of this famous breed are available through the foresight of the government and others who cooperated.

McClure Reserves Decision in Hearing Shallow Well Applications

State Engineer Thomas McClure at Roswell Friday heard testimony of five applications for shallow wells in Chaves county, and reserved decision until later.

McClure said he will have all testimony transcribed, and announce his decision after further deliberation.

Protests had been dropped against the five applications heard Friday because they had not been filed within the time allowed by state statutes. Applicants were Glenn Wheeler, E. C. Whitney, R. O. Whitney and Ernest Nelson.

Five witnesses, whose testimony favored the applicants, were on the stand Friday. Because protests had been stricken out, the opposition was not represented at the hearing.

McClure announced that he would examine all applications in regard to the attorney general's ruling that all protests filed more than ten days after the date of the last publication on applications should be knocked out.

Ross Malone, Jr., of Roswell, attorney for the applicants, said that he did not know how many protests the ruling will cut from the list, but that the number will be "considerably larger than was expected at first."

Mr. McClure said he would conduct hearings only on those cases

which were filed within the legal time limit.

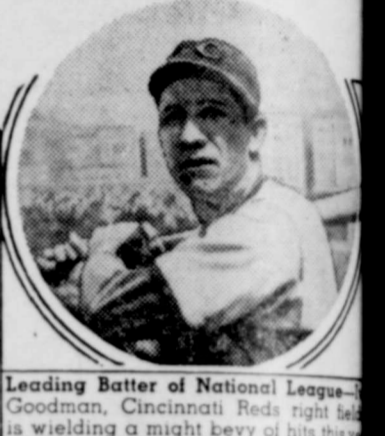

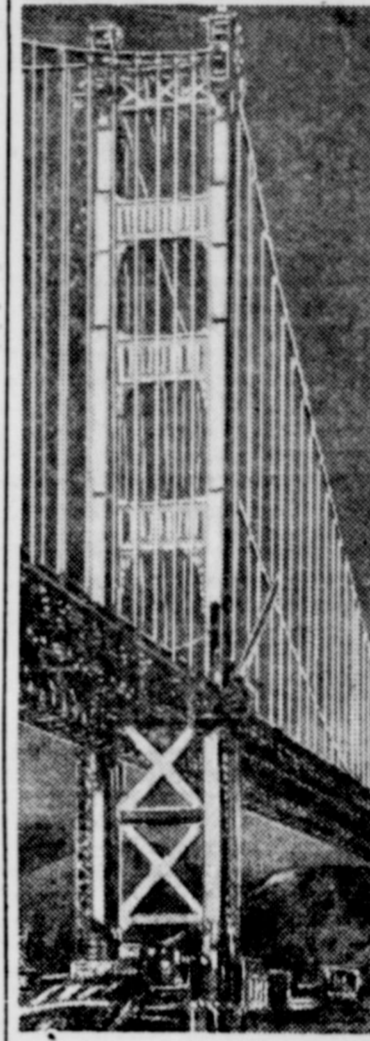
