#### College Men.

Neither in scholarship nor in fitness for the business of life does the product of the great colleges of the present day compare with the graduates turned out from the little colleges of a generation ago. Then, it is true, the boy with the diploma was often too stuffed with Latin and Greek and philosophy to be much of a practical man; now he knows a little about manners, more about clothes, something about "grinds," "peaches" and "profs," but the sumum bonum of his knowledge relates to drop kicks and line bucking. The old type was better, says the Washington Post, because, though impractical, he had a trained mind and was inured to discipline, whereas the new product has gotten most of his training in the ways of a good time. College life is, or should be, a period of training which prepares the youth for the business of a broader life. It will not do to cultivate exclusively the superficialities, which the atmosphere at most of the larger universities is doing. One of the reasons why men who come up from rude walks of life without the benefits of education frequently outstrip the college graduates is because such men have trained their powers through hard work, while the college man has vitiated his talents through overmuch play.

The bureau of engraving and printing at Washington has completed designs by Postmaster General Meyer for a new issue of United States postage stamps. It is expected that shipments to postmasters will commence some time in November. The new issue has been designed with the object of obtaining the greatest simplicity commensurate with artistic results. The profile has been taken in each instance, giving a bas-relief effect. All the stamps are of a similar design, containing a head in an ellipse, the only decoration being laurel leaves on either side of the ellipse. The lettering is in straight lines, at the top being "U. S. Postage" and at the bottom the words "Two Cents." The onecent stamp contains the head of Franklin, while all the others will bear that of Washington, taken from busts by Houdon. The color are the reds and blues of the early stamps. Director Ralph of the bureau of engraving and printing regards the new stamp as the most artistic ever issued by the government.

David Lubin, formerly of California, has finally won complete success for his long-cherished plan to aid agriculture in a world-wide way. After appealing in vain to his own government to encourage agriculture by bounties on leading agricultural staples, instead of continuing a hopeless struggle he changed his base of operations in behalf of agricultural interests and appealed to the king of Italy with so much persuasiveness that his recommendations were adopted by that monarch much as he made them. The result is the endowment and permanent establishment at Rome of the International Institute of Agriculture. The test of its value is shortly to be made. Within a month delegates from 46 nations will meet at the first session of the general assembly of the institute, and working plans will be considered and probably adopted.



BUSINESS FARMING.

Use System in the Work and It Will Pay.

I have been a farmer long enough to learn the cause of so many sons and daughters and well-meaning, reliable farm hands leaving the beautiful farm and country and going to the city. A lack of order and system on the farm and too long hours for a day is what is driving the best minds from the farm to the city and shop, declares a writer in Farmers' Review. What can we expect of a hand, or the way of intellectual development, when until 8 or 9 p. m.? And no attention paid to the sanitary conditions of the home, and necessary conveniences on the least labor and time.

Give me the educated farmer as a boss and the educated farm hand as a hand. When I come in contact with a hand or farmer that studies his business I find him advancing, and it is a pleasure to work for such men.

The majority of the farmers are eight-hour men, that is, eight hours in the forenoon and eight in the afternoon. Eight or ten hours on the farm cannot well be adapted in all cases, but it need not be from 14 to 16 hours. If the family arise every morning at five o'clock and the wife and daughters attend to the household duties, and the farm hands and sons attend to the chores and go to the field at seven o'clock and work until 11 or 11:30, and go to the field again at one and keep at it until six o'clock, and go to the house and eat the supper and then do the evening chores, they have done a farm day's work. Regular hours for work and regular hours for sleep and regular hours for rest and recreation, with plenty of standard papers and books, including the best agricultural papers and books, and a full faith in God, and good grub is wanted.

The family should rise at five o'clock on Sunday morning as well as on week days, and do the necessary Sunday morning chores, and then go to church and show the business man in the city that Sunday on the farm does not consist in changing the stock from one field to another, or salting it, or unloading a load of hay that was brought in on Saturday evening.

Coming to the meals at the meal hour makes it easy on the wife so she can arrange her household duties in order, as can also the husband his farm work.

Men of worth and standing in the shop and city tell me that if order and system were used on the farm they would go back to the farm. If the farmer wants to keep his sons and daughters on the farm he must not lengthen the hours for a day's work at both ends. Limit the hours of work on the farm to 12 or 13 with pay for overtime, and freedom to the hired man on Sunday.

## Bedding for the Cow.

Place plenty of dry bedding in the cows' stalls all through the winter. There is less evaporation in cold than in warm weather and floors become very damp. Bedding not only makes it comfortable and healthy for the animals but also absorbs the liquid manures. The man who keeps stock and masters the art of bedding is on the road to success in stock raising and also the building up of his land.

## Get a Gasoline Engine.

A gasoline engine on many farms will take the place of a hired man.

## FARM MACHINERY.

Have the Shed Where It Is Stored Water Proof.

In what kind of a shed are your farm machinery and tools? Many farmers have a big machine shed with the sky for a roof. This is a roomy house, but it has the disadvantage of being leaky when it rains, and water is not the best thing for wood and iron.

So many complain that net profits of farming are small. No wonder when they are compelled to purchase a new binder or cultivator nearly every summer. These machines ought to and will last for many years if properly cared



### AID IN TURNING WAGON.

Bolster That Will Facilitate Handling of Wagon in Field.

The device shown in the accompanying sketch will save time and trouble in turning with a wagon in the field. It is a 2x4 piece with notches in each

end as shown at AA and fitted on the

bolster as indicated.

The standard is to fit in the notches to prevent slipping, explains Prairie Farmer. This will raise the front end of the bed. If this does not make it easier in turning around, another piece similarly fashioned can be added.

## UNNECESSARY DITCHES.

How They Can Be Eliminated and Made Productive Soil.

In many fields unnecessary ditches are allowed to form. A certain amount of drainage is necessary for every field, yet in many places ditches ten times too big are allowed to form. These both reduce the area for cultivation and are a hindrance to plowing. cultivating, and reaping. Where such ditches are not absolutely necessary for carrying of surplus water they should be filled with brush or straw and be made to catch soil wash and fill up. After they are filled so that they may be crossed with team and tools. and the tendency for washing is still strong, the area may be planted to grass. The grass will annually catch and hold new soil, tending to level the field, and the immediate ditch area will become very productive soil instead of a nuisance. It will be "made soil," similar to bottom land, and made soil, regardless of source, is good soil.





## A NOVEL SUBMARIN

NEW TYPE OF UNDER WATER CRAFT INVENTED BY NEGRO.

Problem Solved If Principles Work Out as Well as in Trial—Boat Will Be of Great Service as Life Preserver.

Denver.—Robert Lincoln, a negro inventor of this city, has perfected an entirely new-type of submarine craft, which is to be brought to the attention of the war department by a number of capitalists who have become interested in the invention. If Lincoln's principles work out as well in the trial boat as they do in the model, there is no doubt that he has solved the problem of under water naviga-

tion. He gives the following details concerning his unique craft:

"My invention will not only prove an improvement in submarine navigation, but will introduce a new mode of propulsion, which may be applied to all water craft, whether running on or beneath the surface of the water," the inventor says.

"It can be steered or controlled with as much ease and safety in rough as in calm seas. Observation can be taken as accurately while the boat is wholly submerged as when on the surface by a system of mirrors and refracted rays, only exposing an eightinch pipe to view.

"The boat is agile, swift and durable. It will stand the pressure of the water at any depth. By the application of hydroplanes, keel, and turrets, we are able to do away with the propeller and its ponderous machinery, absolutely necessary to get speed from the style now in vogue.

"The revoluble hull is the greatest achievement of the invention. It has a spiral arranged blade encircling it from end to end, resembling a corkscrew. When this hull is set in motion upon its axis this blade coming in contact with a great surface of water, the forward movement of the boat is smooth.

"The inner boat, being carried by the outer boat, does not come in contact with the water, and can offer no resistance to its speed or momentum.

"The inner boat is similar in construction and size to the outer, and constitutes the living apartments and affording a place to carry all the necessary appliances according to the usage of the boat.

"At a suitable distance from each end of the inner boat two turrets are constructed that rise at right angles to the inner boat to a distance of a foot above the greatest diameter of the revoluble hull. So that when running awash only a very small portion of the boat is exposed to view, and no vital parts.

"The rear turrets constitute a pilot house and also afford an opening for ingress and egress to the inner boat, the pilot house being telescoped in the turret and closed with watertight fastenings when boat is submerged.

"The lower ends of the turrets are made flat and thin, and extend downward to a point sufficient to hold a h will receive an additional \$1.

solid iron keel, which allows the revoluble hull to turn between it and the inner boat. This keel steadies the boat latterly and adds stability to the inner boat, being rigidly connected at both ends.

"If in the rapid rotation of the outer shell the inner boat may have any inclination to deviate from a level, by working the hydroplanes of the one side adverse to those of the other, their action on the water will easily and effectively arrest such deviations.

"From both ends of the inner boat there is a conical prow extending and coming to a point which makes a most formidable weapon and can effectively be used in ramming other vessels. In these prows and in front of the forward turret and rear of the rear turret are torpedo tubes, using compressed air force.

"While the boat has been recommended for war purposes, its greatest service to mankind will be as a life preserver.

"All parts and appliances of this boat are made and put together from the inside, so that the boat can be repaired at sea as well as in dry dock."

#### NOVEL CLUB FOR GOOD BOYS.

Iowan Starts Bank Accounts and Helps Lads Making Pledges.

Des Moines, Ia.—To every boy in Iowa who will take a pledge to use neither tobacco nor liquor Samuel Saucerman, a wealthy Des Moines resident, will give \$1, a cent a day for three years and another dollar at the end of the three years. At the same time he urges the boys who accept his proposition to save the nickels and dimes they would otherwise have spent for tobacco and alcoholic drink and put them with their account. He has figured out that if the boys will do this none will arrive at the age of 21 years without having enough to take them through college or give them a good start in life.

Mr. Saucerman is reputed to be worth \$1,500,000. The new organiza-



tion he is perfecting to help boys is to be known as "The Trimmer Band." To demonstrate his earnestness he has deposited in the name of "The Trimmer Band" \$5,000, which is drawing interest.

The plan as outlined by Mr. Saucerman is to take boys from the age of nine to 16 and organize them into plants or companies of 50 or 100. He would have these boys hold monthly meetings at which time they would discuss and be taught economy, finance and how to earn morey, clean living and everything in line with industry and morals. Each boy on joining the club will receive \$1. The boy must deposit with his dollar 50 cents, to show good faith. Starting his bank account with \$1.50, each boy will receive one penny per day for three years, and at the end of that period

An extra session of Congress for the revision of the tariff has been announced for March 15,

The bill creating Curry county out of the northern portion of Roosevelt and the southern portion of Quay, and parts of Guadalupe and Chaves, with the county seat at Clovis, has passed both houses of the legislature, FRANK J. SAGER and now goes to the governor for his assent, which of course, it will get. There are several other bills for creating new counties before the legislature, but little hope is entertained for their passage.

The latest is that New Mexico is to have the biggest dam in the Territorial Engineer world. Sullivan reports that the Gila Farm Company, in Grant county, contemplates the construction of a monster dam, three times the height of the Elephant Butte project, and more than three times the size of the Assuan dam on the Nile, making it the largest reservoir in the world. Nothing small about that. As Capt. Fleming, of Silver City, says: "Grant county is the best county in New Mexico and Silver City the best city in Grant county."

The Arizona legislature passed a local option law last week. The state of Idaho followed suit. New Mexico has no less than three local option bills up for consideration, but no real action has yet been taken on the question, although Governor George Curry informed the legislature that local option, in his opinion, would be a good thing for New Mexico. Already ten states have gone "dry"-Maine, Kansas, Iowa, North Dakota, Georgia, Oklahoma, North Carolina, Mississippi, Alabama, and Tenenesee; while as many more have passed laws regulating the sale of liquor.

## CAPTURED AT ALAMOGORDO.

burglarize Peoples store Sunday morning was captured at Alamo- installment plan at reasonable gordo, Wednesday by Sheriff prices. Denny, who escorted him back to this place, and turned him over to Deputy Sheriff Oswald. The man is about 24 years of age, a Russian-Polander, and answers to the euphonious name of Zygmunt Ostrawiski. He stated that he was only seven and a half months in this country, and understands only a few words of English. With the exception of having a low, contracted brow, his frontispiece would not denote a criminal. His left arm was bandaged, where the bullet had struck him.

## **HOME-MADE CANDIES**

CONFECTIONS THAT ARE PURE AND WHOLESOME.

Bea Foam Delicious and Cheap—Gingerbread Nuts — For Perfect Butterscotch—Chocolate Caramels.

Sea foam is one of the cheapest yet most delicious candies of the roster.



It is sometimes made with the addition of whites of eggs, and again without. Try both ways. For the first add to three cupfuls light

brown sugar one cupful boiling water and place over the fire. Stir only until the sugar is dissolved, then cook without stirring until a little dropped from the tip of a spoon spins a thread. Take from the fire, and when the mixture stops boiling add to it gradually the stiffly whipped whites of two eggs. Continue to heat with a wire whip until the mass is soft and creamy, yet of a consistency to stand alone, without spreading. Flavor with vanilla when half beaten. When done, drop in pats on waxed paper. If preferred, a cupful of nut meats coarsely chipped can be added just before dropping on the paper. The surface of this sea foam is also made in this wise: Boil together until the sirup spins a thread one pound dark brown sugar and a cupful cold water. Take from the fire, add a half teaspoonful vanilla, and beat until soft and creamy. Drop in irregular pats on waxed paper.

Gingerbread Nuts.—Put one pound of brown sugar, one pound of honey and the grated rind of half a lemon into a saucepan and simmer them well together; all one-fourth pound of butter, one ounce of sugar, and, lastly, two pounds of flour. Roll out thin, cut into rounds, and bake about 20 minutes in a slow oven.

Delicious Butterscotch.—Two cupfuls granulated sugar, half cup water, half cup vinegar, one pound butter. Stir constantly while cooking, and cook until it forms a hard ball in cold water. Pour in greased tins, and when nearly cold mark in squares.

Chocolate Caramels.—Boil slowly together one pound of brown sugar, one-half cupful of grated chocolate, one-half of a cupful of cream and one tablespoonful of butter until it is like very thick molasses. Take from the fire, add one teaspoonful of vanilla, and pour into straight sided buttered pans, marking in squares when partly cold.

## Porterhouse Steak.

This is the first few cuts of sirloin, and has the very heavy part of the tenderloin, and is the most costly of all steaks, as a general rule, while next in cost comes the fancy portion of the rump. Sirloin steak in years past used to sell for at least 20 cents per pound for any part, and now the prices are as low as 15 cents per pound for the tip, and 35 cents for the porterhouse, if you trade with the fashionable meat market. Recently I saw some of the best cuts of porterhouse sold for 20 cents per pound, but that is only about once in a life time, and was, of course, from light, and not strictly fancy, but really good beef.

## Jersey Apple Dumplings.

Pare and core ripe apples, filling each apple with a tablespoonful sugar. Make a rich pie crust and cut in circles or squares large enough to hold an apple. Set an apple in the center of each, put a bit of butter on top, and fold the pastry around the apple. Put in a granite dripping pan or earthen pudding dish, and cover the dumplings with cold water. Add for each dumpling a tablespoonful sugar, and nutmeg to season. Bake about two hours, keeping the pan covered the first hour. No sauce will be needed beside that in the pan



# HAS A PERFECT HEAD

CRANIUM DETROIT OF EVENLY BALANCED.

A. H. Griffith, Director of Museum of Art, One of World's Rarities, According to Phrenological Expert.

Detroit, Mich.-Joshua J. And then, again, the effect of environment is apparent as changing the instructive tendencies, molding and shaping the destiny along entirely new lines, broadening or narrowing the individuality, or perhaps productive of entirely new conceptions and habits of life.

"Prof. A. H. Griffith is a man whose education and training have been such as to produce the critic and the individuality calculated to demonstrate the ideal.

"Delving among the anthropological relics of past ages, studying the mysteries of human life and its products has brought into play a marvelous number of faculties unknown to the average mind and this continued application and energetic accomplishment in the gathering of facts and fiction as illustrating the development of art has produced a head messages."

## THE BIRD PHOTOGRAPHER.

German Druggist's Successful Experiment with Pigeon Camera.

New York.—The pigeon is the first bird to become a photographer. Dr. Jules Neubronner of Germany, a druggist, has invented a camera of light weight which can be carried by a pigeon and exposures made automatically by a unique form of rubber bulb. So successful has this camera proved that it has a value for military purposes. Among the photographs taken by a pigeon have been views of portions of the park of the imperial palace at Friedrichshof not open to the Pigeon Photographer Ready for Work.

public. This demonstrated the value of the bird photographer for obtaining military data.

The inventor of the pigeon camera first becar interested in carrier pigeons through his father's experiments with them. His father was alsa a druggist. As early as 1840 he made use of pigeons to deliver medicines, which were carefully attached to the neck of the bird. This method of distribution was of great value in cases in which the medicine was needed urgently. Before attaching a camera to the pigeon the inventor made a number of preliminary experiments in taking pictures from express trains while traveling at high speed in order to determine the speed of shutter required for taking pictures while the camera was in swit motion.

He then attached his invention to a bird. The results were surprisingly satisfactory, it is said, although the pictures were only one square centimeter in size. A new camera, by means of which pictures four square centimeters in area could be taken, was made. The camera was fitted to the breast of the pigeon by means of elastic braces passed across the back underneath the wings. Eight consecutive snapshots were made at regular intervals by the automatic exposing

As it has been established that the pigeon is able to carry a burden of more than two and one-half ounces for a distance of 150 kilometers, Dr. Neubronner intends to enlarge the capacity of his camera from eight to thirty films. Pictures can be taken while the bird is traveling at as high a rate of speed as 22 yards a second. At the invitation of the German secretary of war, Dr. Neubronner has exhibited the camera in service before the aerostatic battalion.


