ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

An election of the qualified voters of Lincoln county, Territory of New Mexico, is hereby called to be held in the several precincts of said county of Lincoln, as established by the said board, on the 6th day of September, A. D., 1910, for the purpose of electing three delegates to the Constitutional Convention, as provided for by the act of Congress, entitled "An Act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states; and to enable the people of Ariment and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states," approved June 20th, 1910.



#### FARM NOTES.

Any farmer can make his farm a model with time, planning and work. Getting along with anything that will do is not making the most of conditions.

With corn, as with animals, do not forever be mixing and crossing breeds. By fertilization, cultivation and selection, try to improve the breed, and seed corn to sell.

It is best to manure corn ground in the winter and plow or disk it under in the spring.

Every beekeeper needs one or more books on bee culture, dealing with the keeping of bees.

Farmers in general now are building in a more substantial way. The use of concrete is responsible for a part of it.

New corn as part ration is good for horses doing fall work, and it is excellent for fattening beef cattle.

Corn should not be planted on sod which was broken up this spring for the first time until late in the season.

The barn set on a concrete foundation looks substantial, and it is so, and will last longer than the one set on wooden posts or blocks.

As soon as the corn plants are tall enough so the driver can see the rows, go into the field with a disk cultivator and disk the ground twice.

### ANTHRACNOSE SPOT ON BEAN

Nearly Everyone Is Familiar With Spotted Appearance of Wax-Podded Varieties.

Anthracnose is a bean disease of fungus origin and goes under a number of names, as rust, wilt, pod spot, etc. As there is a true rust and a wilt, caused by bacteria, the name pod spot or anthracnose is preferred for it.

Practically all parts of the bean plant except the roots are subject to attack of the fungus. The most common indication of the presence of the disease is the occurrence of brown or black sunken areas on the stems, leaves and pods. They may also appear on the leaves and stems of the plant soon after it appears above the older plants the attack is most serious on the larger veins of the leaves and the leaf may be wholly destroyed or its efficiency greatly reduced. From the stems and leaves the fungus spreads to the pods, and as many are rendered unsightly considerable direct loss is occasioned.

The presence of the fungus is often unnoticed until it appears upon the young pods. On these it produces small brown or rusty spots, which en years ago.

large and darken until they become nearly black. The affected tissues of the pod dry, leaving sunken areas, in the centers of which may be seen small pink spots, masses of spores which rapidly spread the disease from plant to plant.

The spores by which the fungus is spread from plant to plant are very sticky when wet and are readily

transferred on the hands, clothing or implements. On this account beans should never be cultivated or gathered while wet with dew or rain. If it is too much trouble to observe these precautions for the whole crop it could be done with little extra effort

for a small plat on which to grow seed for future planting.

If the following recommendations are observed but little loss will result from anthracnose:

1. Plant seed free from disease.

2. Keep away from the plants while they are wet.

3. Remove and burn diseased

plants as soon as they are observed. Bad Roads.

# Camels Are the Freight Cars of Bagdad



WASHINGTON—Some of the weekly ceived in Washington from representatives of the United tates in foreign lands tell of interesting things in other countries. Freight between Bagdad and inland points in Mesopotamia is commonly packed in pairs of bales, each bale weighing about 225 pounds, for the convenience of camel drivers in loading. The rates charged for carrying freight across the desert vary with conditions, being lowest when camels are cheap, labor and pasture plentiful and freight offerings none too numerous. 

# DRINKING TUBE IS SANITARY

So Arranged That When Mouthpiece Is on Level With Person's Mouth Water Spouts Gently.

A common fault of ordinary sanitary drinking fountains is the waste of water, but a drinking device of this, and, although only running when in use, it is likewise claimed to be impossible to get a drink from it before the mouthpiece is thoroughly cleansed.

It is attached to a water pipe in the same manner that a faucet is attached flush to the wall. When a drink is wanted, the lever is pushed upward and the mouthpiece forward on a line with the drinker's mouth. The water spouts up gently with a sufficient scouring action to cleanse the mouthpiece and in a stream sufficiently great to obviate the necessity of touching it with the lips. In this

### USEFUL BED FOR HOSPITALS

Can Be Lowered or Raised at Head to Any Position Comfortable for Patient.

A boon to the bed-ridden and to thousands of hospital patients throughout the country is the invention of a Kentucky man. This is a bed which can be raised or lowered at the head to any position comfortable to the patient, and having a rest for the legs in addition. A pair of standards with a crossbar, looking like a horizontal bar on rollers, holds the upper end of the bed suspended. At one side of the standards is a wheel and gear by which the head of the bed may be raised or lowered to change the posi-

ning up from the foot of the bed is a T-shaped bar to be placed under the legs of the patient, so that when the bed is tilted at a steep angle he is kept from sliding downward, the bar beneath his legs giving him the feeling of being in a reclining chair. # WIND GUIDE FOR AERONAUTS

Furnishes Aid Corresponding to Pilot Charts of Ocean Navigator-Record of Years.

A unique sign of the times is Dr. Richard Assmann's guide to the winds of Germany, prepared from the records of the direction and force of the winds kept at forty-nine well-distributed stations for an average of nearly twenty-one years. It furnishes the aeronaut with an aid corresponding to the pilot charts of the ocean navigator. For each season and each station it shows how often, on the average, the wind blows from each of eight directions, and the average frequency of the various degrees of wind between a calm and a hurricane. It indicates the best places and times for making ascents, with the direction airships without high power will probably drift. More than this, it suggests the best location for airship sheds and ports, and gives evidence that not only are places near the coast unsuitable, but that many inland stations are uncomfortably stormy. Friedrichshafen, chosen by Count Zeppelin for his great sheds, is an unfavorable place for handling the huge airships. The records show that it has an average of twenty-four stormy days a year. while Celle has only twenty-two such days, Berlin and Cassel only four, and seven other stations less than ten.






SPARKLE IS BEING TAKEN AWAY FROM HATPINS.

Paris Has Determined Fashion, Which the World Will Follow-Some of the Newest Designs Just Now in Vogue.



# EASY TO IMPROVE OLD FLOOR

Application of Stain and Varnish Will Not Infrequently Make It Good as New.

Sometimes an old floor, if not too badly worn, can be dressed up to look very creditable. In any event it can be improved. The floor, first of all, should be thoroughly cleaned; the grease spots and splotches of old paint can easily be removed with caustic potash. The surface should be smoothed and sandpapered, and the cracks filled with putty or with a preparation made for this purpose which can be purchased at almost any paint store.

A dark stain-walnut color-can be made with burnt umber, ground in oil, and boiled linseed oil. Use only a small quantity of umber at first and lace work, which is of the hand-run gradually add color until the desired shade is obtained. The consistency of the mixture should not noticeably exceed that of the oil; a little turpentine should be added if it needs thinning. The stain should be applied with a rag or brush, preferably a rag, and should be well rubbed in. If one coat does not make the floor dark enough give it another.

Twenty-four hours later the waxing may be done. Shave a pound of bees wax into thin strips and let it soak over night in a gallon of turpentine and apply to the floor with a rag, be ing careful to spread it evenly. Additional coats of wax from time to time will add to the polish.

If an oak finish is desired, after cleaning the floor with caustic potash, make a solution of lye obtained from wood ashes to which sufficient copperas has been added to give the wood the desired shade. This solution must be applied with a mop and serves the same purpose as does the burnt umber stain for a walnut finish. Varnish when dry.-Beautiful Homes.

50 per cent at the expiration of 12 months the county is to pay the money available in their treasury and the balance to draw 6 per cent interest of the balance.

Provided, however, this contract shall be void if the supreme court of the territory of New Mexico decides that Lincoln is the county seat of Lincoln county.

It is hereby further agreed. by and between the parties hereto, as follows:

(1) Should any misunderstanding or disagreement arise between the parties hereto in relation to any part of the work or material provided for or embraced under the terms of this agreement, or in relation to any of the stipulations hereof, which cannot be settled between themselves, the matter in controversy shall be referred to two disinterested arbitrators (one of whom to be chosen by each of the parties hereto), and in case of disagreement between said two arbitrators, they shall jointly choose a third, and their decision in the matter shall be final and binding on both parties hereto; the expense of such arbitration to be borne equally by both parties hereto,

(3) Upon final completion of the work embraced in this agreement, the said second party shall examine the same, and if completed according to contract, shall immediately accept the same and make final settlement with said first party therefor, as hereinbefore provided and stipulated-but no such settlement shall be made with, nor any payment be made hereon to any agent of said first party or any other person whomsoever, except to an officer of said first party, or upon the written order of said first party signed by one of its officers and bearing its corporate seal.

(4) The foregoing contains all the understandings and agreements had between the parties hereto in relation to the furnishing of said prison work and the payment therefor, and neither of said parties is to be held to the performance of any supposed understanding or agreement not herein expressed, or set forth in the specifications referred to herein and made a part hereof.
