A BAD MAN IN CUSTODY

Triple Murderer is Run Down by Sheriff Owen After a Hunt of Four Years

After a man hunt which lasted for four years Sheriff J. W. Owen passed through here yesterday morning with his man in irons en route to the jail at Lincoln, where he will be held for the May term of the District Court.

Four years ago F. Gomez, a water tender for a sheep herder at Los Palos, killed a fellow employe in cold blood.

There had been trouble between the two men and on the morning of the killing Gomez crept up behind his companion, who was bending over a fire just kindled, and shot him to death. The body fell into the fire. The murderer then pulled the dead man away a distance of about ten feet, calmly cooked his breakfast over the other man's fire and then left the country.

Sheriff Owen traced Gomez to a

point several miles below El Paso where he lost track of him and it is supposed that he went over into Mexico. The hunt was given up for a time, but Sheriff Owen was constantly on the lookout for trace of his man, and several days ago he learned the fugitive had returned to the American side of the Rio Grande and was then at Colorado City Texas. He immediately renewed his efforts to bring the murderer to justice with the above stated result.

Gomez is half Mexican and half negro and a notoriously bad man. Twelve years ago he killed a man at a point some ten miles below El Paso on the river and shortly after that another at San Antonio in this territory. Up to last Friday when he was captured by our plucky sheriff he had succeeded in evading the officers of the law. Sheriff Owen is very much gratified at the final success of his long hunt and apprehends no further trouble in getting his man into court.

Chance for the Boys

A letter has just been received at this office from Professor J. J. Vernon, of the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, announcing the intention to hold a corn growing contest for boys. Liberal cash prizes are to be offered and free seed will be furnished from the Station Farm to anyone writing them that they wish to enter the contest.

Professor Vernon writes that the matter is being taken up with the county superintendents of schools and that an effort will be made to get as large a number of boys interested in the contest as possible from all parts of the territory.

It seems to us that this is a very good thing and should receive the support of everyone who is interested in the development of the resources of the territory. A contest of this kind, in addition to encouraging the boys to spend their time in some useful occupation, will show in a substantial

way, what can be done in New Mexico in the way of farming. Then, too, what fine exhibits can be secured from the patches of corn tended for this contest to exhibit at the Territorial Fair. If the boys of Lincoln County get busy in the corn growing line this spring we will be able to surprise the visitors from Kansas and Iowa this fall and there is no good reason why our county may not get a share of these prizes.

Right in this connection we will take the liberty to say that this valley should have a rousing exhibit at the Territorial Fair next fall and it is none too soon to begin planning for it.

Postmaster, P. E. Lacey, sent in his resignation last Saturday and the office is now in the hands of John Gallacher of White Oaks, and Miss Irene Tinnon until a new official can be appointed.

It is evident that the Governor has made a careful investigation of conditions the various departments of the territorial government and has recommended what he believes to be for the best interests of the whole territory, rather than favoring any particular locality or interest and it is to be hoped that the Legislature and the people will give him their support.

Cash Advertising

It is said that the Santa Fe Railway has sent out cash advertising contracts to thousands of papers along its lines. At this time no exact figures as to the amount the company will pay on these contracts can be given, but it is estimated that it will run as high as \$150,000 per year. This is exclusive of the large amount required to execute contracts in some of the large cities.

The country press is liberally represented and it is believed that when the plan has had a fair trial it will be preferred to the former transportation arrangement.

**HOME OF THE

Found Dead

Last Saturday afternoon as Ira
O. Wetmore of this place was go-
ing to Lincoln on business, his at-
tention was attracted by a horse
wandering around on the prairie
with the saddle and bridle on, and
on looking around a little he found
the dead body of an old man by
the name of Silva, who has lived
in the Tucson Mountains for many
years. The Justice of the Peace
at Nogal was notified at once and
had the body removed to the
ranch of Jose Vega and held an
inquest resulting in a verdict of
death from heart failure, there be-
ing no marks on the body to indi-
cate injury by accident or vio-
lence. The fact of the rope being
taken down from the saddle is an
indication that he got off of his
horse and sat down by the road-
side and died of heart failure.

The deceased was a respected
citizen, and one of the oldest in-
habitants of the county, being
past 70 years of age.

The body was taken to Capitan
for interment, after the inquest,
by his sons who were notified as
soon as the death was known,

UNLAWFUL FENCES

The following order of the De-
partment of the Interior being a
matter of general interest through-
out the territory, we publish it for
the benefit of our readers.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR,
Secretary's Office.

Washington, D. C. Jan. 3, 1907.
Commissioner, General Land Office
Sir: Referring to the circular of
instructions to special agents of
your office, approved by me Febru-
ary 29, 1904, relative to their duties
under the act of February 25, 1885,
entitled, "An act to prevent unlaw-
ful occupancy of the public lands,"
you are advised that said circular
is hereby amended and modified as
follows.

Strike out from said circular par-
agraphs 5 and 6 and insert in lieu
thereof the following.

It shall be the duty of the special
agent on receipt of any charge or
complaint or upon information be-
ing acquired by him from any
source, that an unlawful inclosure
is being maintained by any person
or persons, association or corpora-
tion, to at once proceed to secure
sufficient data, including a descrip-
tion of the lands inclosed, with
reasonable certainty, not necessari-
ly by metes and bounds, nor by
Governmental subdivisions of sur-
veyed land, but only so that the in-
closure may be identified and the
person or persons guilty of the vio-
lation as nearly as may be, and by
description if the name can not, on
reasonable inquiry, be obtained and
to at once submit the case, with the
data thus obtained to the United
States attorney for prosecution.

It shall be the duty of the special
agent, and he shall be so instructed
to be alert and vigilant to detect
the existence of unlawful inclosures
in his district and proceed in ac-
cordance with the above directions,
and he is not to construe his duties
as requiring that there must be a
formal complaint filed before he
can act, but it shall be his duty, to
above stated to take the initiative
himself.
