Know all Men by These Presents, That we the undersigned, A. H. Harvey, S. B. Rose and N. S. Rose, being desirous to form a corporation under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, and being all the present subscribers to the capital stock thereof, to that end have made and subscribed and acknowledged this certificate of incorporation.

I.

The name of this corporation is the Carrizozo Publishing Company.

II.

The principal office for the transaction of business in this territory is at the town of Carrizozo, in the county of Lincoln. The name of the statutory agent upon whom legal process may be served is N. S. Rose.

III.

The objects of this corporation shall be: To print, publish, issue and distribute all kinds of printed matter including books, newspapers, catalogs and advertising publications and novelties; to own manufacture, buy, sell, lease, mortgage or otherwise deal in all classes of type, machinery and printing materials, engines and motors; to own, buy, sell, lease, mortgage, and deal in land, real estate and buildings; to own, erect, operate, buy, sell and deal in engraving, stereotyping, electrotyping and lithographing machinery or process; to manufacture, buy and sell all kinds of advertising novelties; to act as agent or attorney in organizing other corporations, advertising the same and selling the capital stock thereof, and in exploiting any and all mining and mercantile or manufacturing enterprises; to act as trustee for the deposit of stocks, bonds or evidences of indebtedness of any other corporation, and to buy, sell and deal in the same by contract or on commission, either in the Territory of New Mexico or in any other state or territory of the United States, or in foreign countries.

### PROPER TREATMENT OF BURNS.

The Use of Flour or Oil Is Strongly Depreciated.

In cases of burns death may be due first to asphyxia; secondly, to shock, and, thirdly, to septicaemia, says the London Hospital.

The medical man seldom gets to the case in time to treat the first condition; the second is essentially a general condition, while the whole success in preventing the third depends upon the immediate local treatment. It is therefore the last condition which must be considered here. Among the public it is a generally accepted idea that the thing to do in the case of a burn is to dust flour over it or to cover it with oil, and, indeed, even in some comparatively late text books on surgery a mixture known as "Carron oil" is advocated.

The use of such applications cannot be too strongly deprecated, and indeed if the lay mind could be taught that the best thing to put on a burn before the doctor is called is a hot compress which should contain some boracic acid, if there is any in the house, it is probable that the majority of deaths due to septicaemia after burns would be prevented.

For the whole aim and object of the local treatment is to prevent sepsis; flour and olive oil may be soothing and may allay the pain; but there is no antiseptic property in them; rather they are excellent culture media for bacteria.

### WHEN CRACKERS ARE SERVED.

Good Filling to Spread on Crisp Toasted Accessories.

Toasted Crackers, spread with a mixture made from hard-boiled eggs are nice to serve with oyster or clam cocktail, or with a plain salad. Toast square or oblong crackers, and while warm spread lightly with butter. For the filling take five hard-boiled eggs one tablespoonful grated cheese, half a teaspoonful prepared mustard, tablespoonful butter, salt and pepper, one tablespoonful sugar, a little celery salt, four tablespoonfuls vinegar, one-third of a cup of cream. Mix the eggs into a paste with all the ingredients except the vinegar and cream. Into the cream stir two well-beaten eggs; let vinegar come to a boil in a granite pan; stir in the cream and eggs and then paste; cook until it thickens. When cool, if too thick, add cream and vinegar, if too thin add fine cracker crumbs.

### Leather Belts.

There is a craze for pigskin in Paris, and the fad has been taken up by American women. Crush effects are popular in pigskin belts, which are finished with leather covered buckles in square or oval shapes. Steel studded leather belts lead every other style in popularity. A new style combines the stiff and crush effects, the wide back is made stiff with overlaying steel studded bands shaped to conform to the figure. The sides and front are made of flexible leather and finished with a leather buckle with cut steel points. A decidedly novel belt is made of wide silk braid, corduroy style, accented with tinsel stitching. The belt is finished top and bottom with leather bands matching the braid in color and fastened with two narrow leather straps finished with tiny gilt buckles.

### Hints on Frosting Puddings.

Here is something for your cook book. When making an orange pudding or any kind of pudding which calls for a frosting to be browned and you wish to use a pretty glass dish try my way. Beat whites of eggs and sugar together, then select a pie plate the size of the top of your glass dish, put your frosting on it, brown in the oven, then loosen the edges carefully and remove your frosting to the top of pudding. Have seen a prune pudding fixed that way which looked very pretty. Black at bottom, yellow, then white.

### Moths and Rugs.

Dyed rugs, such as dog and goat skins, are not attacked by moths, because in curing and dying them poisons are put in that make them practically immune from attacks by these insects; but the contrary is true of the natural skins, such as polar bear, tiger, leopard, etc., for, though the curing process they go through contains more preservatives than are put into that used on muffs, coats, etc., they are much more likely to attract these destructive insects than those that are dyed.

### Favors for Bride's Cakes.

Where the cake is to be distributed among the bridal party only a fashionable fad is to put in it not only the proverbial wedding ring, silver thimble and copper cent, each wrapped in paraffin paper, but also tiny silver skates, miniature motor cars, stick-pins, etc., one for each member of the party. Of course, this is not feasible where the cake is distributed among the whole number of guests.

**BELONGS TO THE CHILDREN.**

Properly Equipped Playroom a Paradise for the Little Ones.

The most interesting feature of a New York home, according to Town and Country, is the "Do Do Room," a completely equipped playroom where the word "don't" is never heard. The idea of this juvenile paradise originated with paterfamilias, whose childhood was marred by continually hearing "Don't do this!" or "Don't break that!"

The room itself is a large sunny place, splendidly ventilated by plenty of windows, which are safely barred. One end of the hardwood floor is uncovered, while the other has a thick woolen rug, fastened down so securely that acrobatic feats or any amount of running or sliding cannot loosen it. The walls, which are deadened, so that noises cannot penetrate to other parts of the house, are covered with blue paper from which finger prints can be easily washed off. The pictures and electric lights are caged, this precaution making possible a mild game of baseball or any amount of handball or bean bag tossing.

The chairs (minus rockers) and the tables are made with rounded corners. The fear of breaking dainty bric-a-brac does not bother the little inmates of the "Do Do Room," and the built-in bookcase, where favorite books and magazines abound, has no glass doors to be kept away from, or silk curtain which must not be touched.

**ADDS TO LIFE OF CURTAINS.**

Dry Cleaning Process That Is Better Than Washing.

Take down the curtains, shake and brush well, getting out all the dust from the gathers, fluting, etc. Prepare a quantity of good wheat bran, put it into a large pan and place before a fire to dry, stirring with the hands frequently. Afterward, if the curtains are of silk, mix with the bran an ounce or more of finely powdered indigo blue. Provide several pieces of clean flannel. Spread the curtains, a piece at a time, on the table and sprinkle with bran, a handful at a time. Next, with a bit of flannel, rub the bran round and round on the material, letting it rest before brushing off. As you proceed take clean bran and flannel, and the curtains will become much brightened and improved in appearance, says Woman's Life.

If glazed chintz curtains are often cleaned in this way they will not require washing for a long time. They never look the same after being washed.

Clean ottomans and sofas occasionally in the same way, and they will look much improved.

**To Can Asparagus.**

Cut the stalks to within two inches of the tips. The rest of the stem is wood. It will not be eaten and takes up room in the jar that might be occupied to more advantage. Lay the asparagus, thus abbreviated, evenly and close together in a boiler and cover with cold water slightly salted. Put the cover on the boiler and set over the fire. Bring to a slow boil and keep up ten minutes, never letting the bubble become violent. Remove the asparagus gently with a wooden ladle; put into the jars, the tips, in orderly array, uppermost; fill with boiling salt water and seal.

Put the roasts in the pan free from seasoning and flour. When sufficiently cooked pour off every particle of grease from the pan, and rub two tablespoons of flour into the brown substance left in bottom of pan; pour over this one pint of cold water; put over the fire and cook until it thickens, stirring constantly to prevent lumping. Season with salt and pepper and strain into gravy boat. For chicken gravy a half cup of rich cream is a great addition. Gravies made thus are free from grease, which is so harmful to delicate stomachs.

**Egg Salad Dressing.**

One egg well beaten, add tablespoon of flour, teaspoon of prepared mustard; one-half cup of sugar, teaspoon of salt, and pepper, if desired. Beat all thoroughly, then add one cup of cider vinegar. Boil—stir constantly, or cook in double boiler—till thick, and add heaping tablespoon of butter.

**Trimming Lamps.**

When trimming lamps use a pair of old manicure scissors. They round out the ends of the wick and prevent it from smoking.

Butter bread on the loaf, having first creamed the butter. Cut off the crusts and beginning at one corner of the slice, roll it tightly over two sticks of crisp celery. The butter will hold it together, but baby ribbon tied around each roll improves its appearance. The celery should be broken into thin strips about the size of the smallest stalks toward the leaf end, and also cut an appropriate length. This sandwich must be served as appreciated. Try the little novelty in your school girl's luncheon as well as at your next social function.



## Articles of Incorporation of the CARRIZOZO IMPROVEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT COMPANY

Know all Men by These Presents, That we, the undersigned citizens of the United States and residents of the Territory of New Mexico, desiring to form a corporation for pecuniary profit, under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby enter into and adopt, for ourselves, our associates and successors, the following articles of incorporation:

### ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be The Carrizozo Improvement and Development Company, its principal place of business shall and is hereby established at Carrizozo, in the county of Lincoln and Territory of New Mexico, and the name of the agent on whom process may be served is B. F. Brown of Carrizozo, New Mexico.

### ARTICLE II.

The amount of the capital stock of this corporation, authorized, shall be Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) and shall be divided into five thousand shares, each of the par value of Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

### ARTICLE III.

This corporation is formed for the purpose of engaging in the following lines of business, to-wit:

To acquire, hold, sell, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of real and personal property; to erect, construct and maintain electric light and power plants and to operate the same either by steam, electric or water power; to construct, maintain and operate telephone lines; and to construct, maintain and operate ice plants for the manufacture of ice.

### ARTICLE IV.

No indebtedness shall be contracted (or be held binding against the corporation) or extraordinary expenditure made by this corporation unless the same shall have been authorized by the stockholders, and it shall require the consent of not less than two-thirds of the capital stock outstanding to authorize the board of directors to invest the money of the corporation in any of the purposes named in Article 3 hereof.

### ARTICLE V.

The term of the existence of this corporation shall be fifty years.

### ARTICLE VI.

The board of directors of this corporation shall consist of seven persons to be selected by the stockholders at the annual meeting thereof to be held on the third Monday in October in each year, and the directors elected for the term beginning three months after date hereof, shall hold their offices until the second annual meeting. ### ARTICLE VIII.

These articles of incorporation may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the stockholders or at any special meeting thereof called for that purpose, by a two-thirds vote of the stock issued.

### ARTICLE IX.

Special meetings of the stockholders shall be called by the president and secretary on the application of any two directors or any number of stockholders representing not less than 10 per cent of the capital stock outstanding, but no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except such as shall be named in such application and call. The notice of all special meetings shall be by personal delivery of the same upon each stockholder appearing on the books of the corporation as such, or by mailing such notice, postage prepaid, to such as cannot conveniently be personally served, addressed to such stockholder at his last known address, and such notice shall be served or mailed not less than 10 days prior to the holding of such meeting and shall contain the time and place and the object of such meeting.

## High-Speed Steel.

"Bigness in everything is become so characteristic of the material things that go to make up modern civilization that only undertakings of tremendous magnitude attract more than passing notice." Thus writes O. M. Becker in the Technical World Magazine. "Thirty story buildings, three mile dams, and Panama canals alone are able to hold the public eye long enough to be even a seven-days' wonder. Next week it is an old story and not at all wonderful. The great engineering feats which appeal so strongly to the eye undoubtedly have an important part in the remarkable industrial and commercial development now writing itself in such bold letters into the history of civilization. There are, however, other agencies at work in this development, some of them surely destined to bring about great changes in methods and efficiencies now regarded as superlative, and one of these agencies, yet quite unknown to the general public, but nevertheless already exerting a powerful influence upon industrial efficiencies, has made a place for itself in the modern machine shop. The essential function of the machine shop is to fit accurately the various metal parts which are to be assembled into other machinery of one sort or another; and this is generally done by cutting or paring away any excess and unevenness of metal left in the casing or forging. This sort of cutting obviously is something very different from that seen in the wood shop, for example. Special tools and machines, the former strong and hard enough and the latter rigid and powerful enough, are necessary to remove the excess of material from steel, iron, or other resistant metals. Ordinary cutting edges, as they are commonly understood, would not do at all. An account of the processes by which high-speed steel has been perfected and the uses to which it is put, forms subject matter in an exceedingly interesting article of some length, amply illustrated.

## Kaiser as Art Critic.

Kaiser William adds to his many other accomplishments skill as an artist and art critic. In a book just published in Berlin, Prof. Seidel, curator of art in the royal palaces, praises the sovereign's activity in "church architecture, forestry, landscape gardening, genre painting, stage decoration and the applied arts." If he indeed is proficient in all those branches, it can readily be understood that he has no time, even if he had the inclination, to disturb the peace of Europe. As a critic, his taste is catholic, although at times he is severe in his judgments. While he has no prejudice against impressionists, he "hates still life and uninteresting subjects which lack movement." His opinions are given at random, sometimes in the form of marginal notes. When some South German amateurs undertook to decide what kind of monument should be erected for Wagner in Berlin, the kaiser signified his displeasure by writing "nonsense" at the end of one of the articles. Not even a Winckelmann could have expressed an aesthetic opinion more concisely and forcibly.

## Good, if True.

Has a cure for cancer actually been found? If so, fear of one of the most dreaded enemies of mankind will be greatly diminished. Discussion has been aroused in Europe by the appearance in a Berlin medical journal of high order of an article testifying to the merits of a recently tested remedy, and in which this is said: "One of the foremost authorities on cancer in the world, Prof. von Leydon, has expressed opinions which do not appear to err on the side of optimism when the work of Prof. Morton of New York and other students of cancer is considered." The article goes on to specify what has been shown by various experiments to prove the effectiveness of the remedy in destroying cancer germs, and concludes with the declaration that what has been learned is "sufficient to excite hopes of the greatest results in the minds of all studying the problem of cancer." Of course it would be unwise to be over-sanguine, even in the face of testimony such as this. But, remarks Troy Times, the facts go to show what progress the medical world is making in getting control of ailments once thought beyond cure.

# LITTLE CAUSE FOR WORRY.

More or Less Glittering Bait Held Out to Cow Punchers.

Over in the Salmon river meadows country, in Idaho, ranged a wild and woolly bunch of long-haired cow punchers, whose knowledge of the world was confined mainly to trips after cattle into surrounding counties. Into this reckless but verdant community there came the smooth-tongued representative of a wild west show, who hired several riders at a high salary to do a hair-raising act, the chief feature being that they should appear to be thrown from their horses and dragged by the foot.

After they had practiced in a corral for a while one of them loosened himself and rising from the dirt, disheveled and dazed, inquired:

"Say, mister, ain't this ruther dangerous? We might git killed."

"That's all right," chirped the show's representative cheerfully. "Your salary will go on just the same."—Lippincott's Magazine.

## THE REORGANIZED NEW YORK LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY.

The new Board of Trustees of the New York Life Insurance Company, chosen by the policyholders under the Armstrong laws, has taken charge of the company's affairs and has begun the work of reorganization.

In choosing the principal officers of the company, the Board has adhered to the idea that a life insurance company should be managed by life insurance men. The new president is Darwin P. Kingsley, a college bred man of good New England stock, who has been in the company's service in a variety of capacities for a period of nearly twenty years. In the parlance of life insurance, he "began with the rate book" and has advanced step by step up to his present position.

The first vice president of the company is Thomas A. Buckner, who has served the company for more than a quarter of a century,—indeed has never had any other business connection.

Associated with these men are others long trained in the company's service, each an expert in his own department of work. Wm. E. Igersoll, who has for many years had charge of the company's great business in Europe, is one of the second vice presidents, and will continue at the head of the company's office in Paris.

Rufus W. Weeks, who has been in the company's service for nearly forty years, ranks next to Mr. Buckner as vice president, and continues as chief actuary of the company.

The policyholders have expressed their belief in this company in no uncertain terms. The upheaval in life insurance within the last two years has resulted in a great deal of misunderstanding and policyholders, alarmed on matters which were not very clear to them, have been disposed to give up their contracts at a heavy sacrifice. This has not been true in the New York Life to any great extent. The company had \$2,000,000,000 insurance on its books when the life insurance investigation began, and while the laws of the State of New York now do not permit any company to write over \$150,000,000 a year (which is about one-half the New York Life formerly did), the company's outstanding business still exceeds \$2,000,000,000.

Policyholders generally will be still further reassured by this action of the Board, as it places at the head of the company to protect their interests men of thorough training and unexceptionable character.

## Injury from Mosquitoes.

New Jersey has many places ideal in situation and accessibility, and one such place developed rapidly to a certain point and there it stood, halted by the mosquitoes that bred in the surrounding marsh lands. Country club, golf, tennis and other attractions ceased to attract when attention was necessarily focused on the biting or stinging pests that intruded everywhere, and the tendency was to sell out. But the owners were not ready to quit without a fight, and an improvement society was formed which consulted with my office and followed my advice. In one year the bulk of the breeding area was drained, mosquitoes have since been absent almost entirely; one gentleman, not a large owner, either, told me his property had increased \$50,000 in value, and new settlers began to come in. This year one of the worst breeding areas of the olden day was used as a camping ground, and 100 new residences are planned for next year.—Prof. John B. Smith, in the Popular Science Monthly.

## Her Disease.

A postoffice has been established at Hillside, Quay county, and Henry Wasserman has been appointed postmaster.

## To Greet Captain Curry.

There was held a meeting of the members of the executive and sub-committees having in charge the matter of preparing for the inauguration of Captain George Curry as governor of New Mexico upon his arrival in Santa Fe in July.

Plans for the inaugural ceremonies were informally discussed. It was decided that the chairmen of the several sub-committees should get their committees together and outline their part of the work so as to be in a position to report progress at the next general meeting to be called by the chairman of the executive committee.

At the annual meeting of the Farmington Fair Association, incorporated, the following officers were elected: President, A. E. Austin; secretary, C. C. Pitrat; treasurer, A. M. Amstutz; directors, F. B. Allen, O. Jackson, George K. Griffin, J. A. Duff, R. T. F. Simpson, E. A. Depew, A. E. Dastin, J. R. Pond and Mrs. J. A. Duff.

Messrs. West and Holt, owners of the "Three Bar Ranch" in southern Colorado, left Albuquerque the first of the week with a number of cow boys in charge of 2,000 head of cattle which they are driving overland to Colorado for pasturing. The cattle were rounded up near Deming. The party expects to make fifteen miles a day and at this rate will reach its destination in about thirty days, barring unusual delays and accidents.

At a public meeting held at Las Vegas it was decided to at once commence experiments in the raising of sugar beets in order to settle the question in regard to securing a sugar beet factory for the Meadow City. Fifty acres will at once be planted in sugar beets and when the crop matures the beets will be shipped to the factory of the Holly Sugar Company at Swink, Colorado, where they will be ground up and tested by the factory so as to determine the quality of the beets. Montgomery Bell will have charge of the planting and as a sufficient quantity of seed is already on hand this will be done at once.

After being pursued across country for a distance of 200 miles, during which time his pursuers were almost within shooting range, Frank Edwards, a young man aged 22 years of Carlsbad, was taken into custody at El Paso charged with horse stealing. Edwards it is alleged gave a tenderfoot a bogus check on the First National Bank at Carlsbad for \$37.50 and in return received a horse, saddle and bridle. Immediately after the sale he left for parts unknown. When the check was discovered to be bogus, officers took up the trail and the chase was begun. On the way the youthful horse thief stopped at a ranch and finding no one at home he helped himself to an automatic Winchester, two Colt's revolvers and some provisions. When arrested he was heavily armed but offered no resistance. The New Mexico officers took their prisoner to Carlsbad where he will be held to await the action of the grand jury.

## Moriarty is Growing.

Following is from the Santa Fe New Mexican: Rev. J. T. Walker, of the Methodist Episcopal church, who has made a homestead entry and also taken up a desert land entry four miles west of Moriarty, spent a day in the city on church and personal business. Mr. Walker came to New Mexico last year from Oklahoma with his wife and two children. They were accompanied by a grown son, W. A. Walker, who is married and has two children. Each of them made a homestead entry and took up a desert land claim near Moriarty and together now they have one section of land fenced. Mr. Walker has about sixty acres in cultivation upon which he has planted corn, wheat, oats, kafir corn, milo maize and sorghum. His son has about 75 acres of similar crops under cultivation. They are both very hopeful of securing good results this season. The rains so far have been abundant and the crops are doing very well. On their claims they have a plentiful supply of water for all domestic purposes, having two fine wells thereon. They are well satisfied with their move from Oklahoma to the Estancia valley. They are located just south of the Santa Fe county line in Torrance county.

The little town of Moriarty is growing nicely. In the school district of which Moriarty is the center, it is estimated there are between 900 and 1,000 people. The town has three stores, one of them the Hughes Mercantile Company, being one of the largest retail establishments in the territory; the building is of adobe, 240 feet long, 40 feet wide with a basement running under it. The company carries a large and well assorted stock. There are the Dobson grocery and feed store and the Goodwin general store in active operation. There is a newspaper—the Moriarty Messenger—two blacksmith shops, and a hotel all doing well. A private school is in operation which is held in a mission tent belonging to the Methodist Episcopal denomination and furnished by the Rev. J. W. McKean, of this city. Mr. Walker holds services in this tent every Sunday afternoon and night and reports good congregations. The Methodists in Moriarty and vicinity are talking seriously of the erection of a new church at an early date. The tent is also used by the Christian denomination which has many believers in and about Moriarty.

Settlers are coming in constantly and taking up homesteads and desert land claims. They hail mostly from Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri and are of a good and substantial class of people. They are hard working and prosperous. The people in the school district are anxious to have a good public school building at the place when the school year commences in September and there is much talk in favor of erecting a substantial and commodious public school house for that purpose. Mr. Walker is of the opinion that Moriarty bids fair to be one of the nicest towns and most prosperous settlements in the territory within a year or two.

## News Briefs.

Silver City Lodge No. 413, B. P. O. Elks, dedicated its handsome new \$35,000 theater at Santa Fe. The initial performance was given on Thursday evening when local talent presented a farce comedy entitled "I Pays to Advertise."

Dr. Marion Imes chief inspector for New Mexico and Arizona of the Bureau of Animal Industry, in an interview says that no progressive sheep man will shear his flocks twice a year. The wool of a year's growth, according to Dr. Imes, is a finer staple than a half year's growth and brings a much better price.

The committees having charge of the Las Vegas Fourth of July celebration are now at work soliciting funds and indications are that the grandest Independence Day celebration in the history of the Meadow City will take place this year.

Two new cases have just been filed in the District Court for San Miguel county. Annie E. Moyer has brought suit against Lizzie F. Dailey, for the foreclosure of a mortgage to recover judgment on promissory notes, one for \$2,000 and one for \$1,100, together with interest and costs. The other suit is that of Annie E. Moyer, vs. Lizzie Dailey and Albert G. Adams, to recover \$2,000 for the non-accounting of certain promissory notes.

## Territory Wins Cases.

Tierra Amarilla, N. M.—In the large number of tax suits brought by District Attorney Alexander Read against delinquent property owners in Rio Arriba county, which came up for hearing at this term of court, judgment was rendered in favor of the territory in a majority of the cases, while many were dismissed at the instance of the district attorney as the taxes sued for had already been paid over to the county. The remainder of the cases were continued until next term in order that service might be had on the defendants. The amount of tax judgments rendered will amount to several thousands of dollars.

In the case of the Territory vs. Edward E. McQueary, charged with destroying railroad property, the same was dismissed on motion of the plaintiff.

The term of court just closing has been a very busy one and many important cases, both criminal and civil have been disposed of, which reflects much credit upon the court officials.

## PITCHING OUT IS OLD BALL TRICK

MANY A BASE RUNNER, TRYING TO STEAL SECOND, IS CAUGHT IN THIS MANNER.

### WHAT OBJECT OF THE PLAY IS

Catcher is Able to Make a Quick and Clear Throw to Put Out Would-Be Pilderer—Why Balls Are Often Fouled at Seemingly Inopportune Time.

By "pitching out" is meant a ball thrown out of reach of the batter, so that the catcher may have a clear and quick throw to second if a runner on first starts to steal.

If the pitcher is wise he generally has an idea when the runner is going to attempt a steal. He figures what his club could do in case a runner was on first, and acts accordingly. The catcher is also watching, and when he thinks the runner is to start he signals for a "pitch out."

The pitcher then throws the ball wide of the plate and to the catcher's right, so that he can make a quick and accurate throw. Many runners are cut down in this way.

If the play fails and the runner doesn't start, it is tried again. Frequently pitchers get three balls on them in this way, and then cannot get the next one over, and the batter walks. Such a failure is often erroneously interpreted by the spectator as meaning that the pitcher purposely gave the batter a base on balls. A clever base runner can often aid the batter in getting to first on balls by making the pitcher believe the thing to do is to pitch out.

The fact that foul balls are so frequently hit when a runner starts to steal second has prompted several fans to make inquiry as to whether for this there is a scientific reason. There is. Often you see a runner start for second, and just as he is about to reach the bag safely the batter will foul off the ball and the runner has to return to first. All around the stand you hear grunts of disapproval like this: "Chump! What did he want to hit at it for? He had the base stolen sure!" You all have heard it.

Baseball science and experience teach that a batter should always hit at the ball when a steal of second is attempted, and, moreover, he should try to hit the ball. If he misses the base runner will naturally have a better opportunity of being safe, as the swing will confuse the catcher. But the main object is for the batter to hit the ball.

When a runner starts for second either the second baseman or the shortstop is going to cover the bag, and the other may take a chance on backing him up. This will leave two positions practically uncovered, or rather, there will be two holes in the infield, and if the batter can poke a ball through so much the better. Instead of a stolen base the former base runner will have gone to third and the batter will be on first.

If the batter does not succeed in hitting the ball the runner will have that much better chance of getting the base. So you see the plan works to advantage both ways. If the batter waited, the runner might be thrown out, and neither would be any better off.

In attempting this play, the batter naturally hits many foul balls, as he must strike at every ball that goes by. Now, in the future, don't be worried because the runner has to return to first. Both men are playing the game.

### An Unusual Play.

There have been many queer plays pulled off on the diamond, and every year brings out a new one, but the most unique of all was brought about on the New York polo grounds during a series with the Cincinnati Reds. A batter having struck out was thrown out at first by the third baseman. Can you beat it?

It happened thus: Wiltse had struck at the ball three times. The last one was really a tip foul, and struck Schlei on his shins, but the umpire did not hear it on account of his ear muf. The ball rolled in front of the plate, and, thinking it a foul, Schlei threw it to third, as is usually done when fouls are hit. To the astonishment of everybody, the umpire called it a "strike," and Kane threw the ball over to first, and Wiltse was out. That is the first time on record that a third baseman ever got an assist on a strike out.

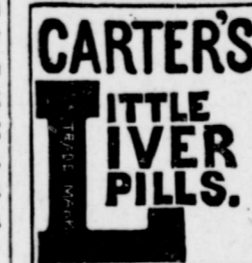

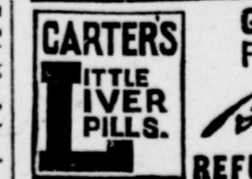

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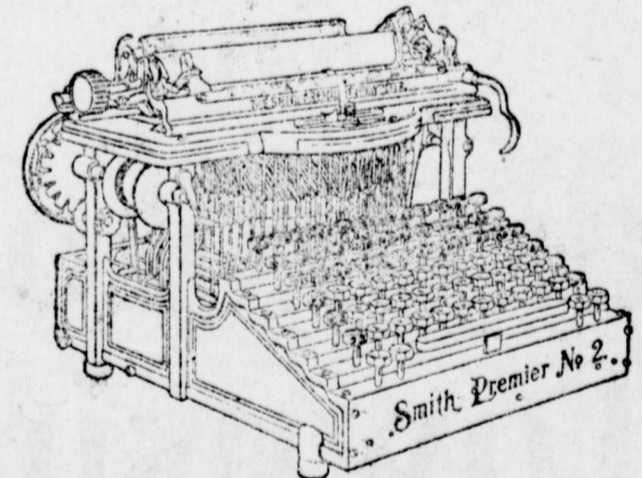
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
