#### **CONSTITUTIONAL DOPE**

Comment on the Constitution Soon to be Accepted by People of New Mexico

#### SOME POINTS MISUNDERSTOOD

One of the best features of the new constitution of New Mexico is that it can be amended with reasonable ease, and that such amendments will, if adopted, represent the desires of a majority of the people of the state. The amendment provision is practically the same as that of Texas, which state has amended its constitution whenever its people so willed. The second year, and thereafter every eight years, after the ratification of the constitution, a majority of the members elected to each house of the legislature may submit constitutional amendments to the people. These amendments must be ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, which majority must be at least forty per cent of those voting at the election. ### LINCOLN PUTS UP BOND

\$10,000 Bond Is Signed By Many Citizens of Lincoln And Sent To Judge

#### **WILL BE EXAMINED SATURDAY**

A message received by The Outook last evening from Lincoln stated that Lincoln has produced the bond of \$10,000 required by Judge Wright in the County Seat Case. The committee appointed by a mass meeting of Lincoln citizens Monday returned Wednesday evening with sufficient signers to the bond to more than qualify, it is stated. The Bond was forwarded to Alamogordo Thursday and will reach that city Friday evening at which time Judge John Y Hewitt and several citizens from Carrizozo will be present with Judge Wright, who will approve or reject same.

Quite a little excitement occurred in Lincoln Thursday morning when it was discovered that the bond which the committee had brought in the night before had been lost, probably thru an oversight while the parties interested were in a bacchanalian condition. After a thorough search the papers were finally found in the bed of one of the committee, and all again re-

This Bond if accepted by the defence and Judge Wright means that the injunction restraining the contractor and commissioners from con tinuing work on the court house will remain in effect until after a hearing is had in the Quo Warranto proceedings which have been filed acceptable or not can not be determined until after Saturday.

Should the injunction be dissolved, the contractor would be allowed to finish the buildings, the quo warranto proceedings not interfering with the building operations in any way; and should the bond be accepted it will cover any and all damages sustained by the contractor thru the delay.

#### WHY NOT ACCEPT IT?

IT IS NOW ABOUT THE TIME When every pat riotic citizen of New Mexico should be waking up to the neccessity of giving the largest possible approving vote for the adoption of the constitution, the election for which will occur on the 21st day of January. White it is certain that the fundamental law will be endorsed by the people it is well to understand that there are forces which are aligned against it, and that it will be necessary to meet them.

In the first place a thorough study of the constitution is necessary. It was with this idea in mind and in order to give our readers the earliest opportunity to study the constitution that The Outlook issued the complete organic act as a supplement to last weeks paper, being the first news paper in the vicinity to do so. We are satisfied that if the reasonable man will read the constitution carefully that he will realize that there has been a vast amount of misrepresentation in regard to it and that it is worthy of the approval of the fair minded. In many respects it is the best constitution adopted by any state in years. There are some sections that might, perhaps, be changed if the progressives had their way, but they are really of negative importance compared with the whole, which insures a thoroughly good state government and the early coming of independence for which New Mexico has been struggling for more than fifty years. It should be remembered than even if the constitution were turned down, and another convention assembled, that the result of their labors would be very similar to that body which recently adjourned, absolutely nothing being gained by the delay, whereas a great deal would be lost. To reject the constituion now offered would be about the worst set back to the material interests of the commonwealth that could be conceived.

The people are not going to be short-sighted, and a majority of them will do all that they possibly can in order to make the vote as nearly unanimous as psssible

Of truth it is sincerely to be regretted that there should now be any opposition whatever to the consti tution, and most of all that those forces which are supposed first and most of all to stand for good government and progress should in part at least be lining up against it. That they should do so will not add to the respect with which they are regarded by the people, nor add to their strength when they need it.

This constitution is going to be approved. The reasonable men of all parties have said it, and they have said rightly. Given the privilege of self government, New Mexico can settle all problems coming before it by the decision of its people. There is too much at stake now to turn aside from the high road to liberty and progress, simply because a plank or two of the proposed constitution may not be framed to suit some enthusiasts.

READ THE CONSTITUTION CAREFULLY before you make up your mind to vote for or against it, then remember that it was made for all the people and not a few.



### **PROTESTING** RATE CUTTING

LOWER COST OF UPPERS IS OP-POSED BY STATE'S AND RAILWAYS.

#### ROADS TO STAND BRUNT

COMMISSIONERS ARE CONFRONT. ED WITH OFFER OF VOL-UNTARY REDUCTION.

Chicago.-An offer of the Pullman company to reduce rates charged for upper berths in sleeping cars 20 per cent, where lower berths were priced more than \$1.50, to make the price of uppers \$1.25 as a minimum, and reduce some lower berth rates, was opposed before the Interstate Commerce Commission here by attorneys general of four states and by two railroads.

The Pullman company's offer left unchanged Pullman seat rates and was to become effective on approval and acceptance by the commission.

Opposition to the plan was offered on the part of the railroads on the allegation that they would have to stand part of the brunt of the lessened price, and by the attorneys general on the claim that the reduction was not sufficient.

Commissioners Lane and Clark, therefore, were confronted with an offer of voluntary reduction of rates for uppers; (also a number of material reductions on lower berth rates) which the railroads said was too much and the state officers called too small.

The whole matter ended in a combining of all complaints against sleeper rates in one hearing by the commission, following an order from the Federal Circuit Court that previous cuts ordered by the commission were not justified.

#### Governors to Meet Annually.

#### Passenger Rate Fight.

Chicago.—What promises to be a bitterly fought railroad-fare battle is to be begun on New Year day. Three Eastern trunk lines—the Grand Trunk the Erie and the Wabash-will slash passenger rates from Chicago to New York and Boston. For instance according to the notice served on thirteen big Western railroad systems by the "insurgent" lines, the first-class fare from Chicago to New York will be cut \$8 and the second-class fare \$6.

#### Deadly Folding Bed Again.

New York.-Benjamin Lott, a wellto-do civil engineer, was fatally injured in his home by the collapse of a folding bed. The bed closed up on him like a steeltrap as he lay sleeping and nearly guillotined him. Members of his family heard his cries and rescued him almost immediately. He was unconscious and an ambulance surgeon said that several vertebrae had been dislocated and that he could not live.

Whereas, the Constitutional Convention which convened in the City of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, the third day of October, A. D. 1910, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to Enable the People of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states; and to enable the people of Arizona to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states," has prepared a constitution for the proposed state of New Mexico and has performed its duties and adjourned; and, Whereas, the Constitutional Conven-Whereas, the Constitutional Conven-

Whereas, the Constitutional Convention requested the governor of the Territory of New Mexico to issue a proclamation ordering an election to be held on the twenty-first day of January, A. D. 1911, to determine whether or not the constitution so framed should be ratified and adopted as the fundamental law of the proposed state of New

Mexico;
Now, therefore, I, William J. Mills, governor of the Territory of New Mexico, by authority vested in me by said Constitutional Convention, do hereby order an election to be held on the twenty-first day of January, A. D. 1911, to either ratify or reject the said proposed constitution, and at said election posed constitution, and at said election all citizens who are legally qualified voters of the Territory of New Mexico, shall be entitled to vote. Those voting in favor of the ratification of the said constitution shall vote in either English or Spanish "For the Constitution," and those opposed to the ratification of said constitution shall vote in either Ennglish or Spanish "Against the Constitution."



#### How to Wash Windows.

Strange as it may seem, there is a right and wrong way to wash windows, and as this operation is usually dreaded, the following method will doubtless be appreciated as it saves both time and labor. Choose a dull day, or at least a time when the sun is not shining on the windows, for when the sun shines on the window it causes it to be dry streaked, no matter how much it is rubbed. Take a painter's brush and dust them inside and out, washing all the woodwork inside before touching the glass.

The latter must be washed slowly in warm water diluted with ammonia -do not use soap. Use a small cloth with a pointed stick to get the dust out of the corners; wipe dry with a soft piece of cotton cloth-do not use before they admit it to you!
