This is incorrect. Work is going steadily ahead on the new ditch here. It has simply been temporarily suspended on that portion of the canal which runs through the Fort Selden military reservation till the secretary of war can examine into the matter.

The ditch will do at the earliest possible moment, when work will again be resumed on that section of the canal and completed as rapidly as possible.

Should, through any unforeseen reason, it prove impossible to locate the ditch mouth at the point selected on the Fort Selden reservation, another and a very good point has been located lower down and the part of the ditch at present under construction is being so built that with very little additional work it will be connected with either of the proposed mouths.
