Washington, Aug. 10 .- The president Saturday sent to congress a letter from Governor Steele of Oklahoma, representing that great distress prevails among the residents of the Territory, and requesting that the attenion of congress be called to the fact. The president in transferring the letter says:

"Information received by me from other sources leads me to believe Governor Steele is altogether right ing among the settlers in Oklahoma.

Many of these people expended most urgent necessities of the poo people in Oklahoma. Steps have been taken more particularly to provide the condition of the people throughout the Territory and if a larger relief should be necessary the facts will be submitted to con-

Irrigation in the Balance. The sundry civil appropriation bill is all agreed upon except in relation to the irrigation matter. The probabilities are that an agreement will finally be reached in conference by which the act of Oct. 2, 1888, will be amended so as to throw open the lands to settlement under the homestead and desert land laws, limited to 160 acres in each entry, with application likewise to the townsite and mineral laws. The reservoir sites already designated will remain segregated, surveyed by the government and turned over to the states and territories, so that their legislatures may enact laws to prevent these sites from being controlled by syndicates or corporations.
