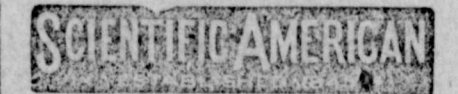

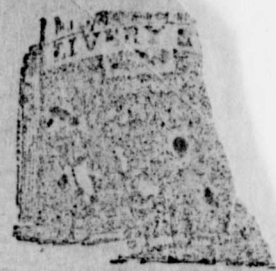

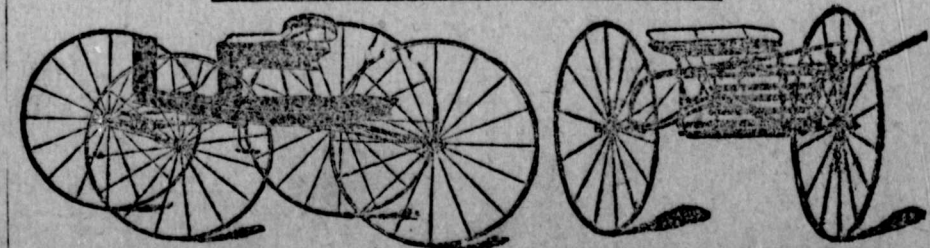

DISASTROUS FIRE.

Last Sunday morning, about 8:45
fire broke out in the barber shop, lo-
cated in the Whiteman block, when
first discovered, it was in the ceil-
ing over the stove. A hole had
been cut in the ceiling over the
stove to run the pipe through; no
doubt is entertained but the fire
caught from an overheated stove
and defective flue. The Whiteman
block was soon consumed with a
portion of its contents—it was oc-
cupied by Mr. Whiteman and fam-
ily, as a residence—the family, at
present are in Roswell, but all the
household furniture was in the
building, much of which was re-
moved. W. L. Hughes, barber,
was another occupant. Watson &
Lund, came next with law office.
uing th

pied in part by Chas. Anschutz as a
residence. The buildings mention-
ed were all consumed. The adjoining
block, Nabors', in which were
the postoffice, Butler & Co., drug-
gist, Ah Nue's restaurant, White
Oaks Club rooms, Mr. Provost's of-
fice and E. McB. Timoney's law of-
fice—all these occupants vacated
and the stocks and materials were
slightly damaged. It took the
hardest kind of work to save the
Nabor block and adjoining property
—everyone worked hard and suc-
ceeded in overcoming the fire—too
much praise cannot be paid to all
who rendered assistance.

The losses are estimated as fol-
lows;

The insurance companies do not
lose a dollar by the fire—had the
Nabors block gone, it would have
been a loss to the companies, Mr.
Nabors' building, \$2,500—Butler &
Co., \$1,000 insurance.

White Oaks is to be congratu-
lated that the fire was stopped, and
a more fearful disaster averted.

All of the parties burned out,
and especially J. O. Nabors, have
requested us to extend to the citi-
zens their kindest wishes and heart-
felt thanks for the assistance ren-
dered in saving their property. We
mention this in general as many
desired to publish cards. J. H.
Whiteman would not take this
course, but persisted in the card
published elsewhere. Everyone feels
thankful, and White Oaks in gen-
eral, that it was no worse.

The Lincoln Independent still

ready framed.”

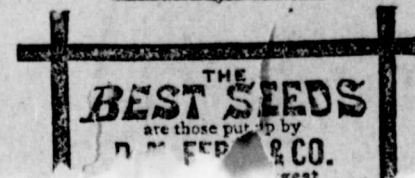
Mr. Terrill was one of the two
