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

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CLEVELAND HAPPY.

The Ex-President Expresses his  
Opinion on the Result of Tues-  
day's Election.

It Shows that the People could not  
Be Deluded to Their Ruin.

New York, Nov. 5.—To an Ass-  
ociated Press reporter who asked an  
expression of his opinion on the re-  
sult of yesterday's election, ex-  
President Cleveland said to-day;  
"I am delighted. I challenge the  
right of any man in the country to  
rejoice more heartily than I over  
the result. My gratification is that  
of an American, proud of his fellow-  
countrymen, who though led away  
for a time by party prejudice and  
by blind confidence in cunning and  
selfish leaders could not be deluded  
to their ruin.

"They have demonstrated that  
in dealing with them it is not safe  
to calculate they are stupid or  
heedless of the welfare of their  
country. The necessity of tariff  
reform with its consequent reduc-  
tion in cost in living and the duty  
of the democratic party to advocate  
it has been fully demonstrated by  
the action of the people yesterday.  
Their decision was deliberately  
made and it is all the more signif-  
icant because they have voted up-  
on their reason and judgment and  
because they have proved that cor-  
ruption is powerless as against  
their conviction. Of course there  
is nothing for the democratic party  
to do but to push on the battle at  
times and at all places, on the lines  
which they have laid down, that is,  
to insist upon a wise adjustment of  
tariff taxation to the reasonable  
needs of the government as opposed  
to the plan which enriches the fa-  
vored class at the expense of the  
the masses of the people.

"Our party made an honest and  
earnest fight. It has planted  
itself upon the disinterested and  
unselfish devotion to the interests  
of the people. Its absolute unity  
and harmony upon the question of  
tariff reform shows its quick rec-  
ognition of true democratic princi-  
ples and its enthusiasm in the  
cause which involves the popular  
welfare. Everywhere our people  
have done magnificently and the  
harvest they have gathered has  
been nobly earned."

In answer to a query as to his  
views on the operation of the ballot  
reform law, Cleveland said: "I  
think there should be no more op-  
position to the principles of ballot  
reform. The evidence of its useful-  
ness and benefit to the people I  
regard as conclusive."

The Policy Of Watching Others.

Obviously the best to do when  
one is in doubt at anything at a

all right, helping himself to salt  
with a very small gold spade pro-  
vided for the purpose. It reminded  
him to the tool he had employed  
many a time to dig potatoes with,  
save for the metal. Of potatoes  
themselves mashed, he was pres-  
ently helped to a portion and he  
found that his fellow-guests utiliz-  
ed an instrument, the like of which  
he was also supplied to push the  
vegetables upon their forks.

Subsequently he learned that the  
instrument was called a "pusher,"  
but at the time it seemed to him  
nothing more nor less than a di-  
minutive hoe, in the exact shape of  
which it was undeniably construct-  
ed.

Curious freaks of Steel.

The finest grades of razors are so  
delicate that even the famous  
Damascus sword blades cannot  
equal them in texture. It is not  
generally known that the grain of a  
Swedish razor is so that its general  
direction is changed after a short

service. When you buy a fine razor the grain runs from the upper end of the outer point in a diagonal direction toward the handle. Constant strapping will twist the steel until the grain appears to be set straight up and down. Subsequent use will drag the grain outward from the edge, so that after steady use for several months the fibre of steel occupies a position exactly the reverse of that which it did on the day of purchase. The process also effects the temper of the blade, and when the grain sets from the lower outer point towards the back, you have a razor which cannot be kept in condition, even by the most scientific barbers. But here is another curious freak: Leave the razor alone for a month or two, and when you take it up you find that the grain has assumed its first position. This operation can be repeated until the steel is worn through to the back.

#### Important Papers Filed.

The Pecos Valley Railway Co., says the New Mexican of a recent date, have filed important papers at the county clerk's office in Las Vegas. This line is projected to begin at a point in the New county of Eddy and extend by the most feasible route, west of the Pecos River, in a northerly direction, through the counties of Eddy, Chaves, San Miguel or Lincoln, Valencia or Bernalillo, to a point of connection with the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe road, at or near Albuquerque, or such other point of railway connection in this territory as the directors may determine upon.

#### Young Thurman on Cleveland.

Columbus, O., Nov. 8.—Allan W. Thurman, son of Judge Thurman in whose honor a banquet is to be given Nov. 13, addressed a jollification meeting at Hamilton, Butler county, the home of Governor Campbell, this evening and gave the credit of the recent victory to ex-President Cleveland, and at the same time paid the following handsome tribute: "Yet this was the issue, plain and simple, brought about by the McKinley bill and to the man, Grover Cleveland, three years ago boldly and fearlessly attacked this whole system. More than to any other do we owe this victory. Never for one moment, amidst all the abuse that was heaped upon him, did he falter or his courage fail. Believing in the truth and justice of his position; believing that the government had no right to take money from the pockets of the people solely for the benefit of a particular class, he continued year after year when others hesitated to battle for the right and now, when all are eager to join in the fray, certain of this fact, that he dared to lead when scarcely anyone dared to follow, shows the metal

he is made of, and I believe that the whole people will see to it and only he, shall be again chosen as their leader in 1892. If ever man spoke the truth surely he did when he said, a few days ago: "No one has a greater right to rejoice than I."

#### President's Proclamation.

Washington, Nov. 8.—The following is the proclamation by the President of the United States: A proclamation. By the grace and favor of the Almighty God the people of the nation have been led to the closing days of the passing year, which has been full of the blessings of peace and the comforts of plenty. Bountiful compensation has come to us for the work of our minds and of our hands in every department of human industry. Now, therefore, I, Benjamin Harrison, president of the United States of America, do hereby appoint Thursday the 27th day of the present month of November to be observed as a day of prayer and of thanksgiving, and I do invite the people upon that day to cease from their labors, to meet in their accustomed houses of worship and to join in rendering gratitude and praise to our beneficent creator for the rich blessings he has granted us as a nation, and invoking the continuance of his protection and grace for the future. I commend to my fellow-citizens the privilege of remembering the poor, the homeless and the sorrowful. Let us endeavor to merit the promised recompense of charity and the gracious acceptance of our praise. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this 8th day of November in the year of our Lord 1890 and of the seal of independence of the United States the one hundred and fifteenth. (Signed,)

county cannot build it let's get a charter from the legislature and have a private bridge with tolls. What is needed is a bridge, and if the county cannot build one, why let's have a private corporation do it. The thing will pay and will help the business of our city.—Socorro Chieftain.

The democratic territorial central committee, in figuring on the complexion of the next legislature, classes with the democrats the candidates of the people's party, if they shall be elected from this county. But in so doing are they not counting without their host? There is no new birth known to the possibilities of politics, which can make a democrat of Col. T. B. Mills. It is generally conceded that he voted for Otero in the election just past, and his republicanism is unalloyed, and unadulterated. Pablo Herrera is a republican, who resents any impeachment of his loyalty to republican principles. Nestor Montoya is the friend and pensioner of T. B. Catron. Of the other three candidates on that ticket the OPTIC cannot speak for lack of information. But in the three already mentioned the democrats will find but little material to aid them in organizing the legislature on a democratic basis.—OPTIC

Chicago, November 8.—Chairman Jones, of the republican state central committee, concedes the legislature to the democrats, but claims the election of the republican state ticket by 6,000 to 10,000. The democratic state central committee are unwilling to concede the claims of Jones on the state ticket.

Official returns from 27 counties out of 102 in the state show a net gain of over 10,000 for the democratic state ticket.

AFTER THE BATTLE.

From The Albuquerque Democrat.

A view of the field after the recent political battle in New Mexico produces the ghost of the republican party in this territory. The democrats without money and no federal or territorial officials to draw upon for assistance to defray the expenses for printing, carried ten of the fourteen counties in the territory, giving Hon. Antonio Joseph about 1,000 votes more than he received over the same opponent two years ago. Beginning with Grant county the democrats elected every man on their ticket but sheriff who slipped in by only 34 majority. Latest advices from Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, indicate that the democrats were victorious in all electing the legislative ticket by about 800 majority. The fight in Dona Ana was very close and will require an official count to decide which party carried the day. Two years ago the republicans elected their ticket in Dona Ana by majorities too large to mention. So considering the democrats were in the soup in Dona Ana to start on, they did very well to save a ladle when the campaign closed. Socorro Co. was carried by the republicans by the shameful majority of 400, completely disorganizing the party in that county, with little hope of recovering lost ground. But this year the gallant democrats of Socorro county went into the field with the best ticket ever nominated in the county. The boys started out with the determination to win, and scored a magnificent victory for Joseph and the whole county ticket from top to bottom, not leaving a republican sign board in the county to guide their steps. It was a sweeping condemnation of political desperadoes in Socorro county.

Now we come to Valencia. It went republican of course. The democrats in this county are quite numerous, but like the republicans on rainy days in New York elections—they don't turn out, besides Valencia county this year had new tin ballot boxes which attracted an extra number of ballots on the republican side, the democratic ballots being so small in number that it wasn't worth while to count them. Then we go a little north to find Bernalillo which is so reliably re-

publican that if a wooden man or satan were put on the republican ticket he would be elected by the votes of the new town of Albuquerque through the assistance of republican returning boards who fail to furnish books of registration for democratic precincts. Moving a little farther north we reach Santa Fe county. Here is where is located a fine lot of republicans as ever scuttled a ship or cut a throat. About half a dozen of these fellows who live off the fat of the land at the expense of the people by corruption, intrigue and high handed robbery of the people's rights. These filchers of public funds would not be allowed to live in any state in the union except within the walls of the penitentiary. Not one of them produces a dollar or adds a cent to the wealth of the territory. In short they are a vampire upon the people and a disgrace to New Mexico. In the face of all the odds against the democracy in Santa Fe county, who are the tried and true friends of the people, the entire democratic ticket was elected. But of all the surprises that were in store for the republican party the county of San Miguel was a paralyzer. For many years that county has been controlled by the political parasites who make their headquarters of operation in the capitol of the territory. The republican ticket of San Miguel county which met with just defeat, was under absolute control of the land ring of Santa Fe. They owned and controlled the republican leaders of San Miguel. But the "rings" promises, threats and money spent for the purpose of securing county control and robbing the people of their homes, did them no good. The people were united in the fight for the right and won the battle by an overwhelming majority for the entire ticket, Joseph receiving 1500 majority. The effect of this victory will be great and lasting. Democracy scores a triumph in San Miguel county, but the whole territory will reap a benefit. Another election in New Mexico will squelch Catron, Frost and Otero so effectually that the people will forever after have relief from legalized robberies of the people by republican legislatures. Colfax and Mora counties came to the front with democratic majorities, notwithstanding the fact that about \$5,000 was put into those counties by republican looters of the territorial treasury.

Sau Juan county loomed up with 200 majority for Joseph and the entire county democratic ticket. In Rio Arriba county democracy was only partially successful, while in Taos county the party of the people and for the people did not fare so well, there being a very small majority in each county against Joseph. With one branch

of the legislature, two-thirds majority democratic, and probably a majority in the other, 2,500 majority for Joseph in the territory, it was a grand uprising of the honest and unbought against the dynasty of republican rascality.

The republicans are working every point to secure a majority in the Council. Every day brings news of a change; the democrats ahead one day, republicans the next. T. B. Catron, at Santa Fe, is the spirit around which an uncertain quantity prevails. He claims to be elected, while the official canvas will determine the matter as to Catron and Ancheta. Should they both be counted in the republicans will have the Council. The democrats have a sure majority of seven in the Assembly.

JOSEPH THE JUST.

According to election returns from every county in the territory with the exception of Rio Arriba, the majorities for Joseph and Otero stand as follows. It will be seen that Joseph carries 10 out of 14 counties and has a majority of 4395 in these counties. Otero has a majority of 1850 in the four counties carried by the republican party. The final summing up of majorities give Joseph 2545, which is 895 more than Joseph the just received four years ago.

The New District.

Last Monday Socorro became the headquarters for the fifth district of New Mexico, with Judge A. A. Freeman as associate justice. This will greatly help Socorro if we take advantage of our opportunities. Socorro was found to be the most convenient for the location of the headquarter and therefore they were located here. It now remains with the citizens of Socorro to keep the court at this point. In the first place we must have the bridge across the Rio Grande at this point repaired, or, what would probably be better and cheaper, to erect a new one. With a good, substantial bridge at this point Socorro would soon draw the trade of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, which now amounts to considerable. This point will be the natural supply point for all that country, as the majority of the people of those counties will be compelled to attend court in this city, and if the roads are put in good condition, will do their trading here. We should offer every inducement possible to the people of the counties east of here to secure their trade and we feel assured that in a few months will reap a benefit. Let us all work together for a bridge as the first thing of great importance and then we will fix the roads.—Advertiser.

Two terms of the United States court were ordered, one the second Monday in April, the other the second Monday in October of each year. The order took effect on Monday so that on and after Monday last, Socorro county is the judicial seat of the new fifth district.
