WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 17, '90.

Secretary Rusk is working man-
fully to have Mr. Harrison nomi-
nate his friend, Senator Spooner, to
the vacancy upon the bench of the
Supreme Court, and, owing to the
fact that Mr. Harrison and Senator
Spooner are warm personal friends
of many years standing, it will not
be surprising if he succeeds. Bu
the friends of other candidates
among the returning Senators and
Representatives are by no meanst
idle and it may be that some of
them will in the end secure the
prize. At any rate the uncertainty
will not be of long duration, as Mr.
Harrison, owing to several impor-
tant cases that are being held back
by the Supreme Court for the
action of a full bench, has promis-
ed that the nomination shall be
sent to the Senate as soon as Con-
gress meets.

The supporters of Representatives
Mills for Speaker of the next House
are somewhat disconcerted by the
authorized announcement that
Representative-elect, Dan Lock-
wood, of New York, is a candidate
for the position. The friends of
Mr. Mills had been confidently fig-
uring upon the active support of
ex-President Cleveland, but now
they will be satisfied if they can
secure Mr. Cleveland's neutrality in
the fight for the coveted honor of
presiding over the House. The
reason for this sudden change ap-
pears to be that Mr. Lockwood
claims, or some of his friends claim
for him, that he was the discoverer
and creator, politically speaking,
of Grover Cleveland, and that he
will ask his aid now, and that Mr.
Cleveland cannot refuse, without
proving himself guilty of ingrati-
tude, that basest of all crime.
Representative Springer, another
candidate, thinks he also has
claims upon the ex-President.

But an attempt is now being
made to form a combination, which
if successful, will probably settle
Mr. Lockwood's chances for the
Speakership. The scheme is to
get a majority of the democratic
members of the next house to
agree that no citizen of the state
which receives the Speakership,
shall get their support for the Pres-
idential nomination in 1892. This
is a bold scheme but the average
congressman will lack the nerve to
join it unless he has positive assur-
ance that it will succeed, and there-
in lies the weakness. It looks like
serving positive notice upon
Messrs. Hill and Cleveland, the
two most prominent candidates of
their party, that New York can't

have the Speakership and Presi-
dential nomination too, and while
such notice would probably reflect
the real sentiments of four fifths of
the Representatives-elect, the num-
ber who would care one might
almost say dare, to take any part
in serving such a notice is small,
very small indeed.

Great things are expected of Mr.
Blaine in the way of reciprocity in
the near future, but I must confess
that I don't see how he can do any-
thing further than to start the ball
to rolling. New legislation by
Congress will be absolutely neces-
sary before anything really prac-
tical can be accomplished. True
Mr. Blaine may negotiate reci-
procity treaties, but reciprocity
treaties, like all other kind of
treaties, have to be ratified by the
Senate, and the same men who
brought about the defeat of the
Mexican and Spanish reciprocity
treaties a few years ago are still in
the Senate, and their influence is
still powerful, and some of them—
Senator Edmunds—has stated in a
public speech upon the floor of the
Senate that regarded Mr. Blaine's
reciprocity as chairman.

That several reciprocity treaties
will be negotiated in time to be
acted upon the Senate during the
coming short session is almost a
certainty. The new Spanish min-
ister was selected by his govern-
ment for that very purpose, and al-
though he only arrived here last
week he has already opened nego-
tiations with Mr. Blaine. Nego-
tiations are also pending with
several of the Central and South
American republics, and unless
some unforeseen obstacles turn up,
will soon be concluded. Reciproci-
ty would undoubtedly be beneficial
to this country, but it will proba-
bly be some time before we get it
on a large enough scale to be of
any practical benefit.

Everybody is curious to know
what course the republicans will
pursue at the short session of Con-
gress, and nobody seems able to
answer the conundrum. Republi-
can Senators and Representatives,
who are daily arriving here, make
a bee line for the White House, as
soon as the dust of travel is re-
moved from their whiskers, but
when asked what they propose do-
ing when Congress meets, they
either refuse outright to answer,
or else answer in such a way as to
convey no information. It is evi-
dent that they have not fully de-
termined themselves what they
will do and probably will not until
some sort of a conference or caucus
is held, and it is by no means cer-
tain that an arrangement can then
be reached.

To Whom It May Concern :

In all alleged entries of Public Land made at the Las Cruces land office wherein the original or final receipt has not been issued and wherein the original or final receipt has not been issued and wherein the settler claims that he has paid a certain sum of money thereon, affidavits must be submitted to the Register and Receiver of the Las Cruces land office embodying the following facts, to wit:

1st. The class of entry, date when made, and a description of the land embraced therein.

2nd. The sum of money paid thereon, and whether paid by currency, draft, check, express order, post office order or postal note, and when paid by draft or check should be embodied in the affidavit, and the original draft or check be attached as an exhibit to the affidavit; Whenever it is impossible to produce the original draft or check, a certified copy by the cashier of the bank will be sufficient; Whenever the original draft or check or a certified copy thereof cannot be had the fact why such cannot be produced must be set forth.

3rd. State to whom the money was paid, whether to the then acting Receiver, naming him officially or to the then acting Register, naming him officially.

4th. In all entries where money has been paid to the then acting register and by him paid over to the then acting Receiver, a supplemental affidavit of the then acting Register, stating that said sum of money was by him paid over to the then acting receiver, naming him officially, must also be submitted.

Upon the receipt of such affidavit from entrymen their cases will be examined and whenever the facts warrant the entries will be put on record and receipts will be issued to the entrymen.

During the latter part of last week Manuel Salsido and two boys, Esmila and Andres Ramirez, started from the Capitan mountains for Roswell, each with a load of lumber. The three parties were overtaken by a heavy snow storm about a mile beyond Black Water. They were all residents of Picacho and

as a heavy snow had also fallen at that place, friends and relatives at once started out to search for the missing parties. Two miles from Black Water the body of Manuel Salsido was discovered. He was dead and was entirely covered up with snow. Two miles further on was the body of Esmila Ramires who was lying in a snow drift, frozen to death. One mile from the spot where Emila met his death was his brother, Andres Ramiriz, he also having perished in the storm. Manuel Salsido was 22 years of age, while his two companions were only 12 and 17 respectively. The bodies were taken to the Picacho where they were buried the first of the week.—Lincoln Independent,

THE EDDY ROAD.

THE PUBLIC BUSINESS FIRST.

From The Deming Headlight.

For the first time since defined political issues came to prevail in New Mexico, the House of Representatives is Democratic. Though the majority is small, it is enough, and there is no sufficient pretext for increasing it by undue changes in the membership.

As a rule, there properly are no revenges in politics. What the public judgment has decreed at the polls should stand, at least till that public judgment has had opportunity to reverse or sustain itself. The Legislature, four and two years ago, recognized itself by force and fraud. The people have in good degree rebuked that policy in the late elections.

That verdict of the people should stand—neither narrowed or broadened. Though the temptation is great to repeat upon those who were the instigators of past outrages the not illogical consequences of their acts, in retaliation in kind, it would be bad policy. Much valuable time of the last Legislature was worse than wasted in mock investigations ostensibly for the purpose of determining the rights of Democratic members to their seats, but really in seeking some plausible excuse for their expulsion.

Upon the organization of the Legislature, every hour of its time belongs to the public for the transaction of public business—not in seeking pretexts for ravenge or retaliation. The sixty days time allowed for the session is short for the work required, and will soon be gone. The fittest way to vindicate the election of that majority is to proceed at once to the work for which it was selected—the repeal of the obnoxious and mischievous action of two years ago, and the enactment of needed laws. A legislative body acts not for itself, nor for any party, but for all the people, irrespective of parties and of mere partisan considerations.

The Territory is to be re-apportioned for the election of future Legislatures. That is an important matter and one that will require time, and should be entered upon at once. A perfectly fair, non-partisan apportionment should be assured before adjournment.

Our revenue system should be thoroughly overhauled and perfected. The last two legislatures were repeatedly urged by the then Executive to action on this subject, and the finance bill was at last secured, as a part, only, though a vitally important part, of the system then proposed. The creation of the office of county surveyor is another very important part of the system urged, that yet remains to be done. Very large amounts of property fail to contribute to the public revenues by reason of the impossibility of properly describing such property on the tax rolls. The ratio of taxation could be materially reduced by this provision. Those who do pay are thus forced to pay more than their just proportion.

The present methods of assessing and collecting the taxes are imperfect and needlessly expensive.—There are too many high salaried and high fed officials, with too little to do, in the revenue department of the Territory.

There is no occasion for the consumption of time in the elaboration of measures for the correction of these evils. Nearly every Western state has spent years in the preparation of their various revenue systems. They are the outgrowth of long years of revision and amendment, and under conditions quite similar in all essential particulars to our own. It would be difficult to go amiss in the selection and adoption of almost any of them for New Mexico. This very necessary work could thus be greatly simplified and facilitated.

Almost our entire revenue system needs to be overhauled. What is most needed is thorough devotion to the work, and prompt, decisive action—no time wasted in revenges or useless retaliation.

FOR A SCHOOL LAW AND STATEHOOD.

With a Democratic House there is reasonable hope for early statehood for New Mexico. That body has in its power by conservative and judicious action, to correct the impression created in large parts of the country, and especially among members of Congress, that the people of New Mexico are not yet prepared for statehood. The defeat of the school bill, two years ago, was fatal to all hope of admission for the time being. That obstacle can now be overcome by the prompt enactment of the defeated bill with such amendments and improvements, if any, as time and discussion have shown to be necessary. It will be in the power of the House to force the Council to agree to at least a satisfactory bill or accept the responsibility of its defeat. This is the first step, to be taken if we wish or expect admission, for New Mexico will never be admitted until that is done. Then an appeal to Congress can be

successfully made for an Enabling Act. There are many important things for this Legislature to do, but the prompt passage of a good and effective school law is first and foremost of all.

Don Cruz Gallegos, ex-candidate for the legislature, spent several days in town this week, attending the land case of Ritor Lueras vs. J. Gardner Riggles. Don Gallegos made a fine race in the late campaign, and if he had paid some attention to Chaves and Eddy counties, he would have beaten McDonald badly.—Chaves County Herald.

The above article we clip from the new Republican paper, started during the late election by some interested candidates on the so-called "Citizens' Ticket." The result of the election has demonstrated beyond a doubt, that Chaves county as well as Eddy and Lincoln, are reliably democratic. Every candidate on the democratic ticket was elected. The Editor of the above named paper, is one Erwin, late proprietor and editor of the Roswell Register, and a republican from Kansas. Besides editing a paper he practices law, some. From the tone of the above article one would be lead to believe that among the profession Cruz Gallegos had become a shining light under the tutorship of Jewett, Erwin and Barber. For fear that the public will fall into the same error that Erwin has, we take the liberty of mentioning the fact, that Cruz was simply a witness in attendance. Will the Herald people tell us what they mean when they say, "had Cruz paid some attention to Chaves and Eddy counties, he would have beaten McDonald badly?" Will they tell us why the Herald dropped the name of Cruz from their columns after the first insertion? Will you also tell us about the \$700 sent out from Roswell during the campaign, to assist Cruz? We are of the opinion that Cruz was paid some attention by the g. o. p. officeholders and strikers in Chaves and Eddy counties, and everything possible was done in that section to make it pleasant for Cruz. But too many good democrats of the two counties, were acquainted with W. C. McDonald and the illustrious Cruz Gallegos. McDonald's flattering majority of 746 in the two counties, and his majority in Lincoln county of 104, bear unmistakable signs that McDonald would not have been beaten very badly by the accomplished Cruz. The "fine race made by Cruz Gallegos in the late campaign," we fail to see where it comss in. Barber, Jewett & Co. cast 42 votes for their candidate in White Oaks, and in company with Cruz stumped the county of Lincoln for weeks before the election, against a man who was lying at the point of death, and whose friends were at

home, confident of the election of McDonald, by the handsome majority he received. No one went into the field for McDonald, even to refute the "hog ranch" lectures the gentlemen were delivering throughout the county of Lincoln. Cruz's few friends in Chaves and Eddy counties did nicely by him. \$700 is no small sum to pay for the vote that Cruz received. The attention Cruz received in Chaves and Eddy counties, was of the substantial character, while it did not elect Cruz it made him a very gay boy for a time, and his working friends also.

FEATURES OF THE NEW
TARIFF BILL.

Some of our daily contemporaries are having fun out of the articles on the free list under the new tariff law. As a sample of these humors we quote the following from an anti-protection Chicago paper: "Among some of these articles are benzoic and gallic acids, unground acorns, beeswax, books printed in other languages than English, unground chicory root, common blue clay and crude coal tar. It will be noticed that all of these things are necessities of life for the laboring man. He can wear an undershirt gallic acid and common blue clay held together by beeswax. For a winter overcoat or for bed blankets he can use books printed in Chinese. Canned goods will be higher, but McKinley has added to the free list 'eggs of birds, fish and insects,' which may be made into omelets and other palatable dishes. Orchids, lilies-of-the-valley, azaleas and other plants used for forcing under grass for cut flowers are now free; let the farmer and the laborer rejoice. Rough mother-of pearl is free; let the little hills skip with joy. Crude potash and rough goose quills are free; let the lye hoppers and geese sing hymns of gratitude. Snails are kept on the free list; so are loadstones and life-boats. What more can the laboring man ask? If he is hungry and unclothed, let him select what he wants from the McKinley bill."

The democrats will gain after the 4th of March, a Senator in the place of Spooner, of Wisconsin, and another in the place of Evarts of New York. The Republicans will elect a successor to Payne of Ohio.—Lincoln County Leader.

Major! What will you do with Calvin S. Brice of Lima, Ohio? We have it from the best authority that he will occupy the seat to be vacated by Payne. And, by the way, Brice is a democrat. We are further informed that Sherman of Ohio, will go out March 1893, and one Campbell, a Scotch democrat, will take his place.

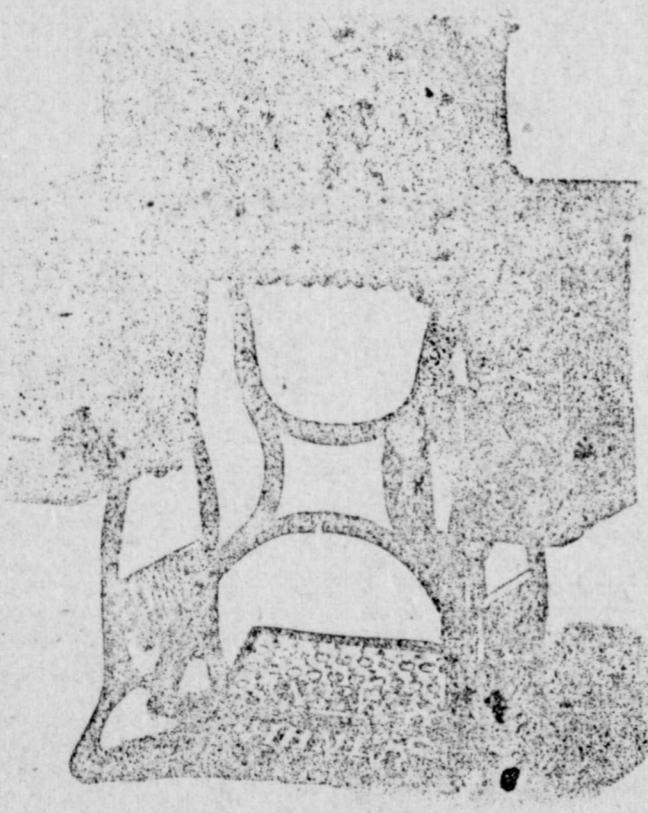
