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

To Whom It May Consern ;

In all alleged entries of Public Land made at the Las Cruces land office wherein the original or final receipt has not been issued and wherein the original or final receipt has not been issued and wherein the settler claims that he has paid a certain sum of money thereon, affidavits must be submitted to the Register and Beceiver of the Las Cruces land office embodying the following facts, to wit:
