

### ONE CENT POSTAGE.

Mr. Wanamaker has a good werd to say for one cent postage in his annual report, but it is said with a good deal of reserve and qualification.

He points out the fact that it is letter postage alone upon which the Government makes a profit, and that the entire profit, with something more, is swallowed up by the losses on other kinds of mail matter. He says that to reduce letter postage to one cent would be to cut eff one half of the revenue from that source, and by so much to increase the annual deficiency. Hence, by implication at least, he suggests that the rates on other mail matter should be increased as a means of rendering one cent letter postage feasible.

The rates upon newpapers and periodicals cannot be increased without diminishing the value of the postal service at the very point where the government finds its best justification for maintaining the service at all. The primary object of the service is the easy, quick and cheap dissemination of intelligence among the people. Something might perhaps be done to exact of paper covered books the same rates that bound books pay, and the merchandise by mail, which is essentially a parcels express business, might be made to pay the cost of its transportation. There is no apparent reason why it should not.

But even wishout such economies one cent postage is more feasible than the Postmarter-General seems to think. In the first place Mr. Wanamaker does not sufficiently publicans in their place who did allow for the increase of letters which would follow the reduction of rates. No Postmaster-General ever did sufficiently allow for that factor. All previous reductions of rate have stimulated increased use of the mails in a degree beyond the estimate of the Department.

In the second place, the development of the country is rapidly reducing the number of unprofitable mail routes, and these, as the Postmaster-General knows, eat up an enormous part of the appropriations With their elimination the cost and the revenues of the service must steadily come nearer together.

Third, the postal card need not be reduced when the letter rate is.

Finally, it will not greatly matter if the postal deficiency is considerably swelled by the reduction in rate. The service is not maintained for profit but for the popular convenience, and so great a gain in convenience would be cheaply purchased by an increase of a few millions in the deficiency bill for two or three years to come. In the face of these facts the grim question arises was the omission on the part of the last legislature, to provide an innocent and unpremeditated eircumstance, or was it an omission carefully guarded and fostered for the benefit of the county and territorial brokers? The coming legislature will please make sufficient appropriation to amply provide for court expenses within the territory of New Mexico.—Black Range.

The estimates for the next fiscal yaar are enormous. For 1891 they footed up \$341,428,977. This year they are \$407,077,137. The appropriations last year were \$73. 000,000 in excess of the estimates. If the appropriations for the next year are increased in the same ratio they will be more than \$480,-000,000. There is no sign that the executive branch of the Republican party intends to do anything towards puutting an end to the extravagance against which the people protested at the last election.

A deficit of \$33,000,000 in the item of pensions is glibly announced as if it were a small thing, and indeed for a population of some 63,000,000 it is less than a dollar a head. But look at it in another way. At 5 per cent. it takes more than \$650,000,000 to make it, and at 4 per cent. it takes \$850,000,000. In other words, the use of these enormous sums must be withdrawn from the people to meet this single deficit.


The attention of Denver is called to four facts. One is that Denver, Pueblo, Trinidad, Las Vegas, White Oaks and El Paso, are almost in a straight line. Trinidad lying a little too much to the east. A road from Trinidad through Las Vegas and White Oaks to El Paso, on the line proposed, would be 140 miles shorter than is Denver's present connection with El Paso.

The second fact is that such a road built from Trinidad to Las Vegas would draw to a connection at Las Vegas the Pecos valley road, giving Denver the best access to that garden region of New Mexico.

The third fact is that by the building of the road through Las Vegas to El Paso by the way of White Oaks, Colorado would secure the largest part of the smelting and cre business of Old Mexico, which now goes to Kansas City.

The fourth fact is that the road from Trinidad through Las Vegas and White Oaks to El Paso, would pay from the laying of the last rail. It is probable that El Paso is the best coal market in all the west. In fact, it may be said that the demand for coal there is practically without limit. The Southern pacific road has no coal on its line from New Orleans to the Pacific coast, and much of the fuel it uses is imported from Australia. The Texas & Pacific gets a little coal from the Indian Territory, but virtually it is without coal except what it gets at El Paso. The Mexican Central, 1,-700 miles long, is also a coalless road. Taking then these lines and the demand by people living along them, it is seen that the El Paso market for coal cannot be supplied and that the demand will grow with the coming years. It is stated that the other roads, at El

The stand is made of stained wood, mounted with raised letters in brass, thus forming an ornamental paper weight. 


