THE KINDS OF GOLD.

"Most people suppose," says an assayer, "that all gold is alike when refined, but this is not the case. An experienced man can tell at a glance from what part of the world a gold piece comes, and in some cases from what part of a particular gold district the metal was obtained. The Australian gold, for instance, is distinctly redder than the California, and this difference in color is always perceptible, even when the gold is 1,000 fine. Again the gold obtained from the placer is yellower than that which is taken directly from the quartz. Why this should be the case is one of the mysteries of metallurgy, for the placer gold all comes from the veins. The Ural gold is the reddest found anywhere.

"Few people know the real color of gold, as it is seldom seen unless heavily alloyed, which renders it redder than when pure. The purest coins ever made were the fifty dollar pieces that used to be common in California. Their coinage was abandoned for two reasons: First, because the loss of abrasion was so great, and, secondly, because the interior would be bored out and lead substituted, the difference in weight being too small to be readily noticed in so large a piece. These occasional coins were the most valuable ever struck."—N. Y. Tribune.

It is reported that Pere Hyacinth the famous French preacher, whose withdrawal from the Roman Catholic church a number of years ago created a profound sensation and who since has been engaged in an attempt to build up a "Gallican church" with indifferent success, is now in London, engaged in studying Taoesophy and the mysteries of Mahatma. He intends shortly to lecture on the subject of "Esoteric Buddhism," and the inner spiritual sight. Pere Hyacinth is a recent convert to this ancient-modern cult, and an enthusiastic one. Parabrhma, he confesses, has become manifest to him, and he expects before long to be able to work those miracles that the Vedas promise to those attaining perfect self-control.

The Chinese are outwitting Uncle Sam to a very considerable extent. Since the exclusion act the government has been in the habit of sending back to China all Chinamen engaged in trying to enter Arizona across the Mexican border. It is a well known fact that Mexican ports are open to the Chinese, and a large number have undoubtedly tried to enter the United States through the medium of Mexico, and men have been apprehended and returned to China. The resi-

dent Chinese have not been looking on at the action of the United States government in sending Chinese back to China without profit. Chinese are constantly leaving the United States for China, and it has become the fashion for an Arizona Chinaman or a Chinaman from Texas, New Mexico or elsewhere who desires to go home to China to cross into Mexico and then make a break to enter the United States, carefully arranging matters to cause his own arrest, whereupon the United States government sends him home to China and the Chinaman saves all traveling expenses. This is a shrewd trick, but no smoother than many others that the Chinese are capable of practicing, and did put into execution, and the United States government is paying the fiddler while the Chinese are doing all the dancing. In this way most of our Chinese population are liable to get their passage home paid by the United States.

On several occasions her husband had carried about him in his pockets for some days important letters which she had asked him to mail for her. Recently she gave him a letter addressed to himself, with the request not to read it till he reached his office, says the Philadelphia Times. Although this struck him as a very strange proceeding, he nevertheless concluded to comply with her wish. Arriving at his place of business he opened the letter and read as follows:

"My Dear Husband: I must herewith inform you of a circumstance which will prove to be very disagreeable to you, but is my bounden duty to tell you of it. I have, once for all, determined to bring this matter before your notice, let consequences be what they may. For a week past I have foreseen that this must be done, but I have thus far refrained. The supreme moment has at last arrived, and the crisis is at hand. I am compelled to speak out. Do not judge me too severely and bear up like a man!" By the time that he had read thus far his hair stood on end with horror, and with a trembling hand he turned the leaf and read on further: "We are completely out of soap! Please go at once to our grocer and order a box of—'s soap and have it sent home in the course of the afternoon. I also want a dozen of—'s 2c. package starch. I have adopted this mode of asking you to do me this favor so that you may not forget it!" Nor did he forget.

Sheriff Francis accompanied Wildard T. Johnson, of San Francisco, from here to Canon Diablo last Sat-

urday, from which point the latter gentleman visited a noted crater some twelve or fifteen miles south of the canon. Mr. Johnson was here with Major Powell some ten days ago and is a noted scientist. He says this crater is far ahead of anything he has ever seen of a volcanic nature. There is magnetism about it that draws with an almost irresistible attraction. He purposes making a map of it and ascertaining its capacity. This wonderful volcanic mystery has been known to sheep men for twelve or fifteen years, but has never attracted any particular notice.—Flagstaff Democrat.

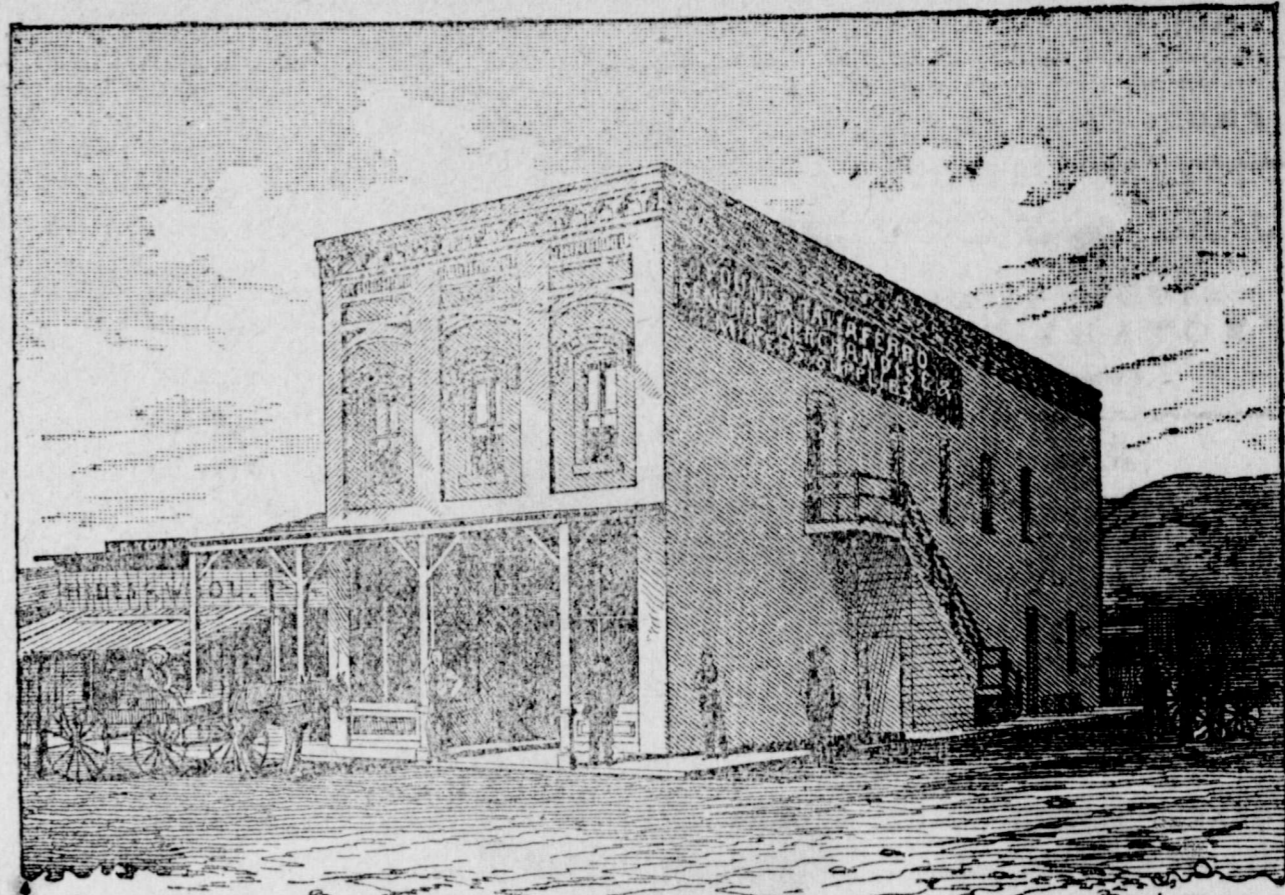

The Annual Report of the County Superintendent of Schools, is now ready and was sent to this office, this week, but owing to its length and the lack of material for getting it up in proper form, its publication will be delayed until the new paper is issued.

We have had this week the unexpected pleasure of greeting an acquaintance from our old home, Kinsley, Kansas, in the person of Mr. Grant Fulton. He has come here from Las Vegas to work on the new buildings now going up here.

The people of the Rio Grande valley will rejoice to see a line of road completed from Las Vegas to El Paso. If such a road is built a branch road from this city would tap the main line in a very short time, and another from Socorro would be built. Such a system would supply the whole of eastern New Mexico with excellent railroad facilities.—Alb. Citizen.

A special to the Denver Republican from Santa Fe says: The governor's annual report to the interior department, which has occupied a good deal of time, was finished and started by mail for Washington. It is a very comprehensive document, full of facts and statistics, and gives a complete summary of the condition of New Mexico and its progress during the year. Among other recommendations by the governor are the admission of New Mexico as a state, the survey and marking of the boundary line on the Texas side, the re-occupation of Ft. Marcy, the immediate donation of the school lands, the amendment of the land court act so as to protect small owners. The report also deals at length with public schools, irrigation, climate, rainfall, agriculture and stockraising.

At the railroad convention held at Las Vegas, on the 20th inst., reports favorable to the immediate construction of the road were made; it was voted to receive applications for survey of the proposed line, also, that all applications be referred to a committee composed of O. L. Houghton, general manager, M. P. Pels, and J. Y. Hewitt, of White Oaks. The general manager was also instructed to secure, through his engineers, a statement of the resources of the country through which the line of railroad is projected. Much other work was accomplished, but the papers giving an account of the proceedings were received too late for the full report to be copied.

H. L. Ross, the Trinidad gentleman who thinks there is no place on earth so rich, interesting and altogether delightful as the White Oaks region, just visited by him, was a north bound passenger, today, stopping off in this city between up going trains. In conjunction with Frank G. Raible, of the Trinidad Advertiser, who is now east purchasing the plant, he will soon start a seven column, weekly paper at White Oaks, to be known as the Old Abe Eagle, a very appropriate name, considering that White Oaks is in Lincoln county and that the "Old Abe" mine is the chief producer in the camp. It is also understood that the material and good will of the Interpreter will be absorbed by his new publishers.—Optic.

Col. W. H. Weed, the merchant prince of White Oaks, always a man among men, will become a more frequent visitor to Las Vegas and a larger buyer here, after the Denver & El Paso short line of railway shall have been completed to his section of country, undoubtedly one of the richest and most promising on this terrestrial foot stool.—Optic.

An apple of the Maiden's Blush variety, weighing one pound and one ounce, was left at this office by S. E. Weidling, of Tularosa.

Gov. Prince has indited a letter to the several judges in the territory, urging them to hold terms of court in the several counties, even if only for a few days.—Citizen.

The Knights of Pythias have bought three and one-third acres of land for a cemetery. The ground which is situated just east of the cemetery will be fenced and laid out in lots.

General Manager O. L. Houghton has closed negotiations with Horace G. Ropes, the well-known civil engineer, for the survey of the line from White Oaks to Las Vegas. Mr. Ropes will take the field as soon as his corps can be organized.—Optic.

Mrs. Marshall Parker is about to open a school for small children. Parents who object to sending their young children to a public school, will be glad of this opportunity to place them under Mrs. Parker's care and influence.

J. P. C. Langston, Deputy Sheriff, went to the railroad, Monday, loaded down with jail jewelry. He said he should not return alone, but would not give the name of the individual for whose benefit he was carrying chains and handcuffs.

"As soon as the business of the road warrants its extensions will be made" says President Jeffrey, of the D. & R. G. If Mr Jeffrey will take a look over the country between Santa Fe and Albuquerque, White Oaks and El Paso, he will not fail to be impressed with the idea of extending his road southward.—New Mexican.

H. L. Ross, the well known mining expert of this city, returned last week from a month's visit at White Oaks, where he has been making a thorough examination of the mineral and other resources of that portion of New Mexico. 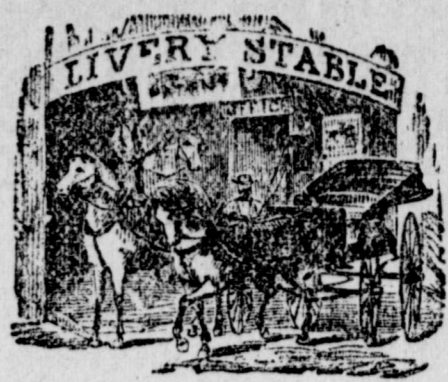
