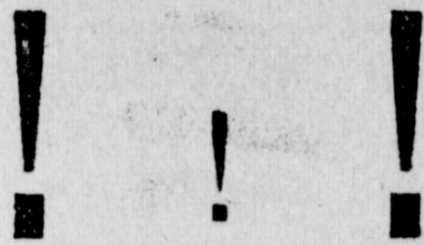

Governor Boies Re-Elected in
Iowa---Large Democratic
Gains.

MASSACHUSETTS ALL REPUB-
LICAN EXCEPT THE
GOVERNOR.

McKinley Gets There in Ohio.

The latest returns from New York show that Mr. Flower's plurality over Mr. Fassett in the state is 40,055. The whole Democratic state ticket is elected.

The Democrats have gained several senators and it is conceded beyond a doubt that the senate will have a Democratic majority of two.

The outlook in Iowa is very favorable for the election of Boies, with a fighting chance for victory for the whole Democratic ticket.

The Republican committee is very hopeful on account of country districts which are slow in reporting and claim everything but the governor though they will not concede that until the back precincts are heard from.

Massachusetts Republicans will undoubtedly elect their whole ticket with the exception of governor.

Governor Russell claims his election by about 6,000. He says:

"It means that Massachusetts is earnestly for tariff reform on the line of free raw material, which has been the chief issue in this state. It also means she is firmly and aggressively for a sound currency."

In Ohio, the Cincinnati Enquirer concedes McKinley's plurality in the state to be about 20,000 and the legislature Republican by from 31 to 35 on joint ballot.

The feature of the result is the complete drop of the People's Party. Their vote in the state will not exceed 11,500 and they claimed before the election at least 75,000.

The Republicans in Colorado will no doubt win everything in sight.

Mr. Frank Dimascio, of the firm of Dimascio & Pelini, prominent contractors and builders of Trinidad, Colo., spent several days in town this week investigating the wonderful marble deposits in this vicinity. He goes away convinced that the black marble is far superior in every respect to all that is being worked in this country and fully equal to the Italian. He will place a fine specimen on exhibition in the Denver Mining Exchange where it will undoubtedly prove a splendid advertisement for White Oaks.

To White Oaks belongs the honor of making the first deposit in the hands of the treasurer, Judge Hewitt giving his check for \$1,000. The line of survey from Las Vegas south, is over the old survey down the Pecos river, for thirty-three miles, being the most practicable route as the grade for that distance in getting down off the mesa is but twenty-two feet per mile.

Work is to commence on the property of the Jicarilla Placer Mining Company at an early date, and will be pushed to completion as speedily as possible. The water resources of the Jicarillas will be fully developed under the new regime and the supply obtained will be utilized on the rich placers of Ancho gulch, owned by this company.

Mr. R. L. M. Ross, general manager of the Jicarilla Mining Co. arrived in White Oaks Wednesday from Las Vegas. He will be actively engaged this winter in developing the water supply in the Jicarillas.

Mr. J. G. Wyatt returned Wednesday, after an absence of five months at Denver. He comes back more than ever satisfied that White Oaks is the place for a young man to tie to.

On October 29th, at Ozanne's ranch, Mary E. Carpenter and J. W. Hale, who have charge of the mountain station, were united in marriage. Rev. W. D. Burk performed the ceremony.

Rev. I. N. Crutchfield will hold a regular quarterly meeting in White Oaks on next Saturday and Sunday, at the Methodist church. Everybody invited to attend.

From D. B. Merry, just returned from the engineer's camp, on the Denver & El Paso short line survey it is learned that work is progressing most satisfactorily. They have found a good line with no grade exceeding seventy-five feet per mile from the point of the Mesa de las Chupalinas to the Pecos river, which they cross at the mouth of Canon Blanco, near the plaza del Llano, about three miles below Anton Chico. The line has been located thus far and from there to the Pintada there will be no difficulty in getting a good grade. The party is camped at Juan Pais and all are in the best of spirits. Mr. Ropes is pushing things to the utmost of his ability and will go sailing down to White Oaks on short order. Let the good work go on. —Las Vegas Optic.

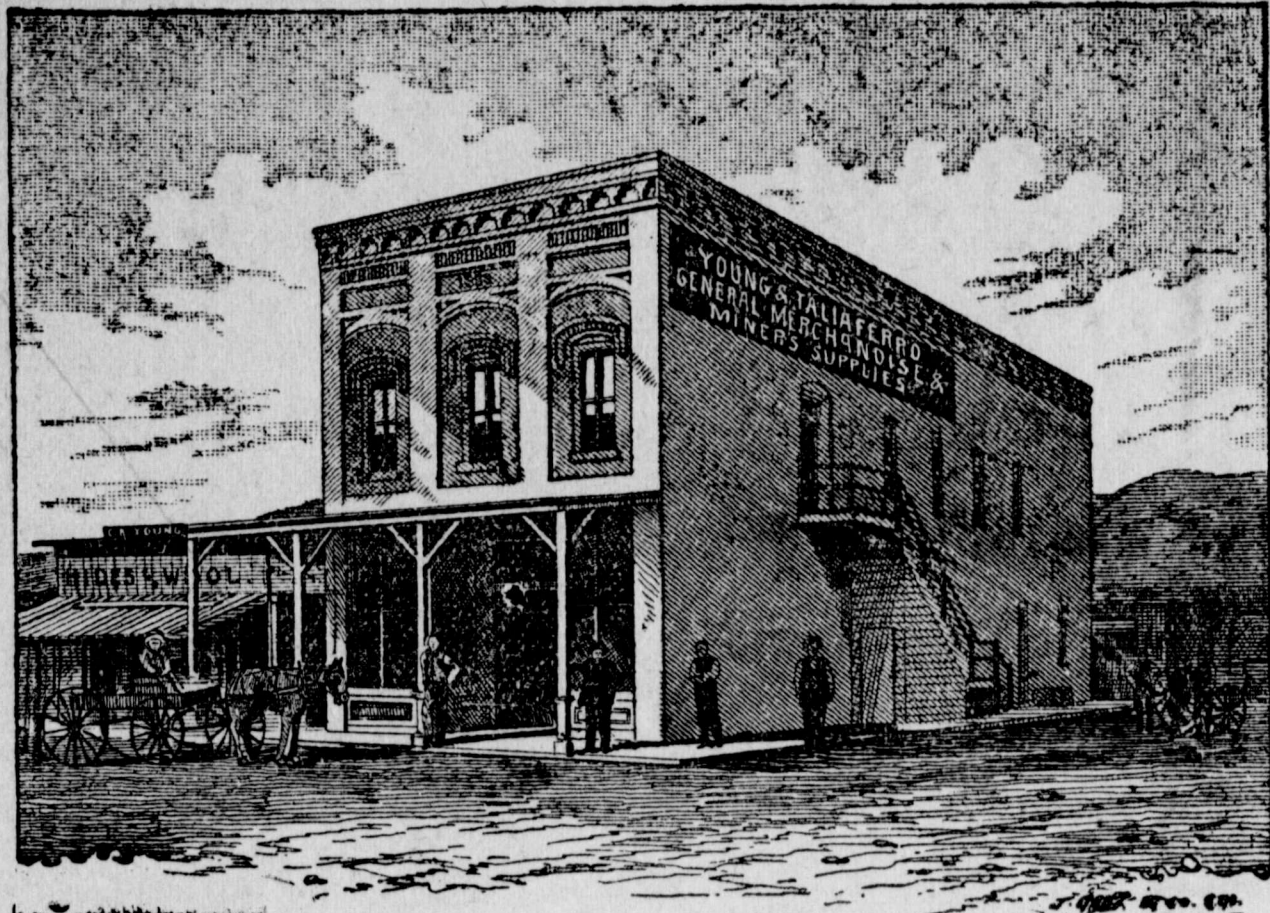
