W. A. McIvers & Co., of Nogal, Have Secured an Eighteen Months Lease on The Deadwood @ Red-Cloud Claims.

A VALUABLE GROUP

The Property of The Gallina Mining @ Smelting Co. \$25,000 Have Been Expended in Development of These Properties.

OPERATIONS BEGIN SOON.

A mining deal of great importance, not only to the parties interested but also to the people of Lincoln county, was closed here on Tuesday last, when the Gallinas Mining and Smelting Company leased to W. A. McIvers & Co. of Nogal, the south half of its Red Cloud and Deadwood mining lode claims up in the Gallina mountains.

The term of the lease is for eighteen months, active operatons are to commence within thirty days from date, and Mr. McIvers will spend many thousands of dollars in the further development of the property.

of this act for a period of five years, thereafter, it shall be un- ing in Old Mexico. lawful to kill or in any wise destroy or injure any elk, deer, antelope, or mountain sheep in the Territory of New Mexico, except on private ground or property by the owner or lessee thereof, or with his permission.

Section 2. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this act shall be punished by any court before whom complaint may be made, by a fine not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100. 00) and not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00), or by imprisonment in the county jail, not to exceed six months and not less than thirty days. Each killing or injuring or in any manner destroying Picacho. any of the animals, except as provided herein, shall constitute Alto is coming to the front: a separate offense under the provisions of this act.

Section 3. The provisions of this act shall apply to all Indians on or off reservations, or coming into the territory from adjoining states or territories, and it is hereby made the duty of the Secretary of the Territory to make certified copies of this act, within ten days after the passage, thereof, and send the same by registered mail to each and every Indian agent and Post-master in the Territory of New Mexico.

Section 4. This act shall take effect from and after its passage and all acts and parts of acts in conflict [herewith] are hereby repealed.

Treating Low Grade Ores.

A well known mining authority made the statement some months ago that the annual reports of the Alaska-Treadwell campany, operating on Douglas Island, Alaska, constitute an admirable text book upon modern mining. They show steady dividends on the one hand -steady improvments in the methods for handling low grade gold ores on the other. Both results are important, and where the improvements exist the dividends are almost certain to follow, as the low grade gold vein is usually generous as to size and permanent in the item of depth.

The Alaska-Treadwell Gold Mining company is a Boston corporation. It is capitalized at \$5,000,000, and the par value of the shares being \$25 each. In January last it opened 1902 by declaring a dividend of \$75,000, and the total paid to that time was \$4,895.000. In his annual report the manager shows that the improved methods in mining and milling, adopted last year, resulted in reducing the average cost per ton, for both these items. from an average of \$1.10-the record heretofore on ores not absolutely free milling-to 66 cents per ton, the new challenge figure. The company owns and operates 550 stamps, which are fed from a mountain of ore. As the ore averages less than \$2 per ton, the new process means not only a cut of nearly one half on the expense of mine and mill operation, but it brings within the field of profitable reduction a vast amount of quartz which under former conditions would be classed as barred and worthless.

In its comments on the astonishing result above set forth the San Francisco Chronicle predicts the Alaska-Treadwell method will make ores worth \$1 per tonfire assay, of course-profitable to work, and in the case of the Treadwell mine the \$1 standard will add millions of tons of available quartz in sight to the corporation's stock.

No one save a practical miner can fully comprehend the significance of a profit in \$1 ore. If the new Treadwell process can be ap- EL PASO--ROCK ISLAND ROUTE plied in California, Colorado, South Dakota and New Mexico, and it probably can, it will bring into the field of active operation an indefinite volume of gold-bearing quartz which now affords no profit whatever. In Colorado and the Black Hills the cost of mining and treating gold ore has been reduced from \$30 per ton in the 1870 period—extending for almost ten years—to about \$5 at present, with even a lower figure where the ore is of a fluxing nature or will yield 90 per cent of its values to cyanide treatment. On the great mother lode in California—one of the largest low

grade bodies in the world—the cost of mining and milling has been cut down from about \$9 per ton twenty-five years ago to \$2.25 at present, and now \$4 ore is worked at a profit. But there is, says the San Francisco Chronicle, "a vast reserve in the vein, carrying from \$2 to \$3 per ton, which nobody can afford to touch with a \$2.25 process, all of which will yield a big profit for working if S. OUR 20-BILLION-DOLLAR FARMS.

When one's urban prejudices move him to sympathy with "the poor farmer" of the land it is well not to generalize. According to the census reports the poor farmer's business in the United States for the year 1899 turned in a gross income of 18.3 per cent.

June 1, 1900, there were 5,739, 657 farms in this country, and they were valued at \$16,674,690, 247, of which 78.6 per cent. represented land and improvments and 21.4 per cent. buildings. On these farms were impliments and machinery valued at \$761,261, 550 and live stock to the amount of \$3, 078,050,041. Total value of farm property thus accounted for, \$20,514,001,638. horny-handed tiller of the soil is established, perhaps to his own surprise, well up in the billiondollar class.

Since 1850 the farms have multiplied four times and the total values more than five times. Gains of value in the west have much more than offset the eastern decrease. As The World recently noted, New York is high in rank among the agricultural States of the Union. It is preceded by Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania, in that order.



IMPORTS AND PROSPERITY.

For the fiscal year that ended June 30 last the exports of the United States were \$105,731,584 less and its imports \$79,739,143 more in value than for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1901.

Nevertheless, these are prosperity figures. No delusion is more delusive than that which regards exports alone as profitable. British imports exceeds British exports in value by about \$800, 000,000 a year, but no country save our own rivals her in wealth and general prosperity. 

PADDING THE NEW PENSION ROLLS.

Pension claims appear to bear no logical ratio to actual deaths and wounds in action. A Washington correspondent compares the records of five "regular" with five volunteer regiments that figured in the war with Spain. The volunteer regiments had not a single man killed or wounded, but they have 3,000 (less 3) pen-The regular sion claims filed. regiments lost 564 in killed and wounded and have only filed 760 claims.

Behind these figures the fine work of the professional claim agent and the "pull" of the Congressman for his volunteer constituents is readily discerned. The "regular" has not so many friends to oull the wires at Washington for him.

It is our civil war experience over again. The grand total of Union soldiers who were killed or died of wounds or disease during "the great conflict" was 279, 376. Three times that number of pensioners have been carried on the rolls for ten years past. Garfield said about 1879 that the civil war pension list had then reached its limit; today, twentythree years later, it carries close upon 1,000,000 names, four times as many as in 1879. Abraham Lincoln put in the field from first to last 2,859,132 soldiers. More than that number of "claims" for pensions have been already filed, and over 50,000 new "claims" are coming forward every year.

The padding of the pension list is one of the worst of the many forms of robbery perpetrated on the people in the name of patriotism.
