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WHITE RACE REPORTED FOUND IN PHILIPPINES.

Returning Army Officer Brings Strange Story of Isolated Nation on Island of Mindoro.

DON'T DRESS FASHIONABLE.

San Francisco, July 27.—Lieut. Lorenzo A. De Clairmont, U. S. A., reports the discovery of a white race on the island of Mindoro. According to his story, they are semi-civilized and partly Christianized, but cruelly hostile in their discouragement of communication with the outside world.

The favored few, who have been permitted to penetrate the fastnesses of these Caucasians, tell of a country rich in vegetable and mineral wealth, a people orderly, gentle and hospitable, but well enough satisfied with their little world to resent the intrusion of strenuous civilization.

The whites, according to De Clairmont, have a city of 20,000 inhabitants. They are of fair complexion and have very light hair, which they wear long. The men wear only a breech-cloth and the women wear one sashlike garment which depends from one shoulder and extends in fancy fringes to the knees.

Lieut. De Clairmont says this race lived on Mindoro Island before the Spanish conquest of the Philippines.

Need of a Good Sheriff.

It won't be but a short time before we will be in the field of battle—the field of battle where facts will be arms with which to attack the enemy: When we will be appealing to the good sense, to the conscience, to the patriotism of the honest people of this county.

The people are responsible for this county's administration. We can not throw the responsibility on any certain individual, but upon the party that elects its nominees.

If the delegates of our party, in convention assembled, sets to work and nominates a dishonest man for public office and our party elects him; then we are responsible for that man's doings, and if he does wrong the brand of repudiation is bound to be affixed to our party.

The condition of affairs in our county speaks plain enough of the great need that there is for the good law abiding citizens, irrespective of party if possible, to

take a wise step before this coming political struggle in choosing the proper man for the office of sheriff.

The necessity of so doing is not realized by half of the honest voters as well as it is done by those who tried to enforce the law in bringing the criminal to justice. To convince the mind of the reader on this subject, I will state the following, which I offer to prove at any time if asked to do so:

We have reached the time in our county when the man who tries to enforce the law is looked upon with bitterness by a portion of the population, and hated ten times more than if he were criminal. We have reached the time in our county where the arresting and bringing a criminal to justice is considered by this same faction, an outrage and a great injustice, as it is thought of the arrests made for the two noted murder cases which have been entered in the allegory of the criminal history of Lincoln county in the past year.

We have reached the time when criminals have been let out of jail on straw bond and the officer has assisted in securing payment of lawyer's fees for the defense of the said criminal.

The time has come when the officers are threatened with death if they proceed in discovering the wrong-doer.

I will tell you that if these conditions of affairs are not stopped by electing a good and trustworthy man to the office of sheriff, it will be but two years more till crime will predominate.

Lincoln county is in need of a sheriff who at all times is willing to give each one his dues. One that, when arresting, will not distinguish a friend from his own personal foe. One that is in favor of seeing the rich enjoy the blessings of his millions as well as the poor the fruits of his daily labor. Yes, this county is in need of an executive officer who will discharge his duties according to his oath of office.

We do not want a man for sheriff who is a gambler, an habitual drunkard or a bull-dozer; nor one who aspires for what money there is in the office without stopping to think whether he is competent and worthy of such trust; as I venture to say that many of the present aspirants for this office lack the education, courage, energy and the respect of the people; in other words they are only office seekers.

I wish to appeal to the good sense of the people of this county. As we are all responsible for what our party officers do it is the duty of the republican delegates of the different precincts as American and intelligent citizens when about to exercise and use the prerogative of a free American, which each delegate should use in the coming county convention, to examine this matter diplomatically and come to a conclusion without prejudice, without hatred and then it is their duty to discharge that obligation which the citizens trust them with, according as they believe is for the best interests and honor of the good people of our county.

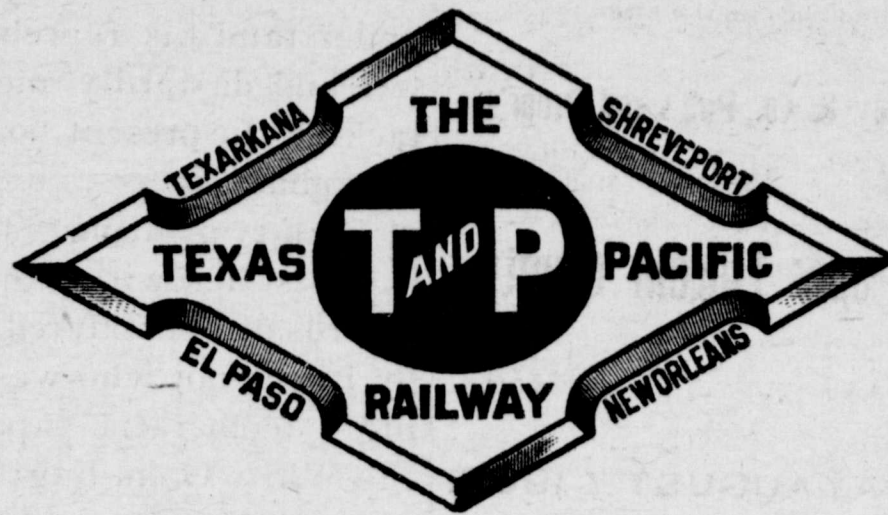

AN OUTRAGEOUS OLD LIAR.

The following clipping from the White Oaks EAGLE and J. H. Lightfoot's comment following it appeared in the Nogal Republican last week. Lightfoot is editor and part owner in the paper:

Lincoln county owes it to the present board of county commissioners to keep them an unbroken board another two years. Lincoln county's finances are in better condition now than for years past, and all kinds of public business in the board's jurisdiction have been efficiently executed.—White Oaks Eagle.

Yes, as far as the EAGLE is concerned, the present board is "a dandy," as that paper gets all the county printing at an outrageous price. The present board sold the county out in order that the EAGLE might get the county printing. Wiener paid a \$234 claim out of the county funds which he and the EAGLE said was illegal, as a compromise that the EAGLE should have the county printing during the term of the present board. The EAGLE would be very ungrateful if it did not kiss the political hand that is feeding it.—Nogal Republican.

The EAGLE has little interest in what Lightfoot says about the "EAGLE" or anybody else and has passed many of his little black-mailing gibes unnoticed, although they have pointed directly at this paper and this community. But in order that his patrons may understand his reprehensible motive and dastardly method of attacking the present board of county commissioners, on the subject of county printing, the EAGLE submits herewith copies of the records of bids offered the county by Lightfoot who was then editing a democratic paper, and of the White Oaks Eagle which explain themselves and very plainly show why his hold-up scheme was turned down by an intelligent county board:

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, New Mexico.

We, the undersigned publishers of the "Capitan Progress," a weekly newspaper published in the town of Capitan, County of Lincoln, Territory of New Mexico, and of general circulation therein, respectfully submit to your Honorable Body the following proposition:

Now regarding the \$234 hold-up mentioned. Lightfoot got the boodle and neither the present board of county commissioners nor the EAGLE had anything to do with it. Neither could the steal be prevented, though an earnest effort was made to do so. The conditions were these:

The republican board of commissioners, who held office before the present incumbents, contracted the county printing to The Capitan Progress, which was then republican and owned by a member of the republican board of commissioners, for a term of one year, from April, 1900, to April, 1901, which time extended three months beyond their term of office. This contract the succeeding democratic (present) board of commissioners claimed was illegal for the reason that a board of commissioners have no power to control the county printing for a period longer than their official existence, but Lightfoot, who had bought into The Capitan Progress and changed its politics democratic with a view of securing the printing from the newly elected democratic board, infuriated because his bid was not considered competent and the contract awarded the EAGLE, insisted on enforcing the old contract which he bought from the republicans through The Capitan Progress; hence claimed this \$234 for publishing the delinquent tax list, which publication had been made by the EAGLE under its contract dating from first meeting of county board in January, 1901, and whose bill for same under said contract was \$155, the bill being made under the EAGLE's contract given above, showing the difference between prices paid by the old republican board and the EAGLE's present contract.

The present board was confronted by these two bills, and considered the EAGLE clearly entitled to the tax list under our contract, but threatened with suit if they refused to pay Lightfoot's bill, they did just what any other intelligent board would have done and asked

the advice of District Attorney Alexander on the matter and, of course, his sympathy for the mistake of the republican board, which had contracted for county printing a quarter of a year beyond their term of office, decided the old contract legal, hence the board had nothing to do but to pay the \$234, which is the hold-up and sale to which Lightfoot refers. In this the EAGLE lost \$155 and the reader may judge for himself whether the county commissioners were to blame or whether it rests somewhere else.

The EAGLE, having lost a quarter of its year's earnings as county printer, then went before the board and asked that its above published contract be extended to January 1, 1903, and same was accepted.

If the precedent of their predecessors had been followed they might have given the printing to the EAGLE for the next 100 years, for if a board has power to go beyond its term of office three months in letting county printing it could as well go an indefinite period.

The bids above are on record in the County Clerk's office at Lincoln and a careful perusal of Mr. L's will show his intention to pull the board into a trap by offering to simply print commissioners proceedings etc. free of charge and charge any old price for all other classes of work not therein mentioned. His bid, as the reader may plainly see was incompetent and could not even have been considered by a board of commissioners no matter what their desires may have been.

As to the outrageous prices charged under our contract, a comparison of the prices quoted above show a saving of several hundred dollars to Lincoln county for printing during the past two years and there is not another county in New Mexico getting public printing at these figures, hence the EAGLE can reach no other conclusion than that Lightfoot is an outrageous liar, seeking to prejudice the minds of Lincoln County tax payers against a board of county commissioners who have complied in detail to their oath of office and have the records to show that the county's affairs are in better financial condition to day than during any period of our past history. Stop thief and try and get some of the venom out of your own dirty old anatomy before you take it upon yourself to vilify men whom the people of Lincoln County have said by their action in selecting them to offices of public trust, are honorable, upright and worthy the confidence of those who offered them political preferment.

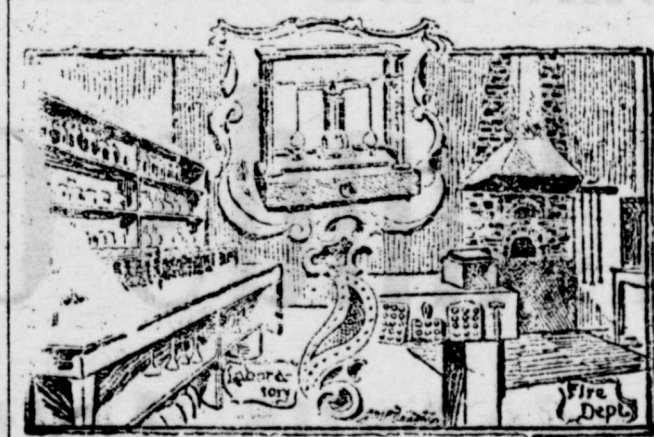

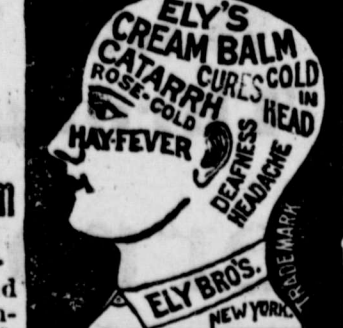
