

Hon. G. A. MINE ON FIRE.

"The great fire at the United Verde mine in Arizona presents a problem that is still puzzling the mining engineers. According to the statement of Master Mechanic Adamson of the Copper Queen company of Bisbee, the only supply of water that is available and is competent to extinguish the fire is the Verde river, which is seven miles distant from the mine. Jerome is 5,500 feet high. To raise the river water would require at least two stations of pumps of immense power. 'When the water is raised,' says Adamson, 'there is no certainty that the fire could be put out. The mountain is split in every direction, which would permit the water to run off indefinitely. The Anaconda mine at Butte has been on fire for the last twenty-two years.'

"The Verde fire has wide interest. There are 2000 men at Jerome who rely on the Verde payroll for a living for themselves and their families. The population of Jerome is 4000, and it depends very largely upon the mine for its prosperity. The farmers in the surrounding country, the railroads and the coal mines that supply the Verde with fuel are equally concerned.

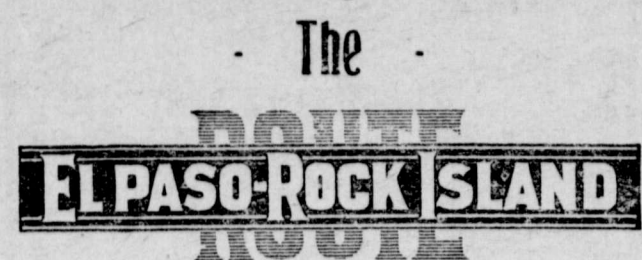

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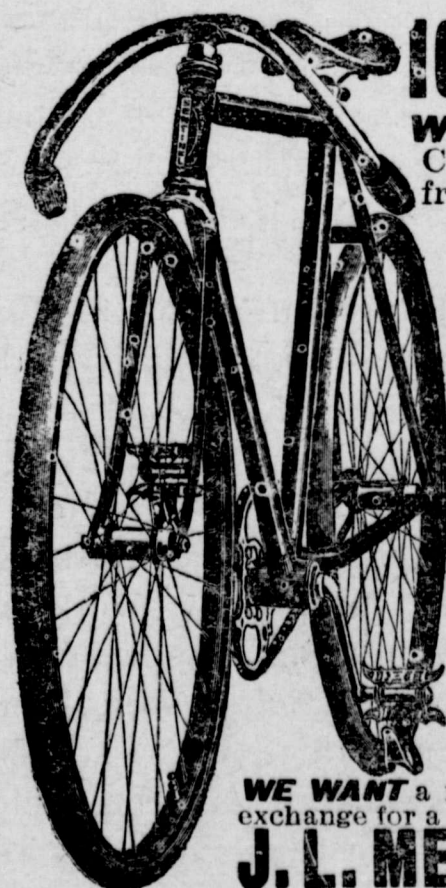
