ELECTION RETURNS SHOW Decreased Republican Pluralities.

V. S. Senate Republican by 11 Majority; House Republican by 12 Majority New York State Republican by About 11,000, City Democratic by 100,000.

COUNT CLOSE IN MANY STATES.

Territory of New Mexico Republican by 3,000 Majority Territorial Council and House Republican.

The present Senate contains 54 republicans and 34 Democrats in a total of 90 seats, there being two vacancies in Deleware. The term of 30 Senators expire with this Congress. There is also a vacancy for Michigar caused by the death of McMillan. Of the 31 seats to be filled, not including two from Deleware, by including the vacancy from Michigan 19 are now republican and 12 democrat-Wellington of Maryland is classified as a republican and Harris of Kansas, McLauring of South Carolina and Teller of Colorado all democrats. Seven States have elected Senators to take their seats in March 1903. Maryland has chosen Gorman, democrat, to succeed Wellington, republican: Kentucky, McCreary, democrat, to succeed McBoe, republican; Iowa re-elected Allison, republican; Louisiana, re-elected McEnery, democrat; Vermont re-elected Dillingham, republican; Georgia re-elected Clay, Democrat. It is pretty certain that the next Senate will be 52 republican to 34 democratic.

As to the Status of the house, dispatches show that the democrats have elected 161 members of congress and the republicans 147, to which should be added the eight previously elected in Oregon. Maine and Vermont. This leaves seventy districts to be heard from. All the southern states which elect solid democratic delegations are represented in the total of 161. The dispatches show the election of the following:

Alabama, 9 democrats; Arkansas, 7 democrats: California, 1 republican; Conneticut, 5 rapublicans; Deleware, 1 democrat; Florida, 3 democrats; Georgia, 11 democrats; Illinois, 10 re publicans, 6 democrats; Indiana, 4 demo crats, 2 republicans; Iowa, 7 republicans, Kansas, 8 republicans; Kentucky, 10 democrats, 1 republican; Lou-N.M., took two first prizes for isana, 7 democrats; Maryland, 4 republicans, 2 democrats; Massachusetts, 10 republicans, 2 democrats; Minnesota, 7 republicans, 2 democrats; South Dakota, 2 republicans; Tennesee, 9 democrats, 1 republican; Texas, 16 democrats; Virginia, 9 democrats; West Virginia, 2 republicans; Wisconsin, 8 democrats; Wyoming, 1 republican.

About the Orchard.

An exchange reports that a new and important use for refined parafine wax seems to have been discovered by a prominent resident of Ohio, living near Lancaster, who had two trees bady damaged by a storm, one being a Maple and the other an apple. In each case a large limb was broken down from the trunk, but still attached to it. The limbs were proped up and securely attached with straps, very much as a broken leg wound be fastened with splints, and then melted refined wax poured into and all over the cracks. The surgical operation was entirely successful. The parafine prevented the sap from escaping, kept out the rain and moisture which would have rotted the the trees, prevented the depredation of insects, and the limbs seem thus far to be perfectly re-attached to the trees. -Roswell Journal.




